The Reverend Dr. Yonggi Cho, superintendent of the Assemblies of God of Korea, will be guest speaker at Northwest College January 20-24, 1975.

I am pleased that we can bring his ministry to Northwest College for our Winter Quarter

Emphasis Week.

Traditionally the world missions emphasis, this will be a rare occasion when a product of Assemblies of God missions who, in turn, has been used of God so mightily, can come to campus and preach a missions emphasis.

A native of Korea, Dr. Yonggi Cho is now pastor of the Full Gospel Central Church in Seoul. With a congregation of 24,000 active members, this is the largest Pentecostal church in the world. A new church plant completed and dedicated in September 1973 has a seating capacity of 10,000 persons. It accommodated the daytime activities of the 1973 World Pentecostal Conference which was held in Seoul.

As superintendent of the Assemblies of God of Korea, Dr. Yonggi Cho leads the administrative board governing the largest Assemblies of God Bible school overseas with approximately 330 students enrolled.

Converted from Buddhism and healed of tuberculosis by the power of God, Dr. Cho relates his testimony in a recently published book **To God Be The Glory.** A dynamic speaker, Dr. Cho's ministry has received worldwide

recognition.

I have been privileged to minister in his great church on two occasions, once in a weeklong youth crusade two and one-half years ago, and again just this past summer on a Wednesday evening when in two different services—5 p.m. and 7 p.m.—approximately 7,000 people were present.

I never cease to be amazed at the Korean Pentecostal revival, the intensity of worship these fine people show and their devotion to the ministry of prayer.

The church there is growing phenomenally and a world mission emphasis is developing. In their first World Missions Conference earlier this year, the Full Gospel Central Church of Seoul alone gave \$70,000 towards missions in one month. Dr. Cho's missions goal for the church for the month of May in 1976 is \$500.000.

I believe this man of faith and vision will bring a missions awareness to N.C. that is unexcelled! I urge any who can to share the services with us and all friends of N.C. to pray that God will make it a great week for world evangelism!

Almost one out of every five students enrolled in Northwest College during the autumn quarter is receivsubsistence from three government regular educational benefit programs, the Registrar's office reports. Leading the list are 62 students attending under the G.I. Bill, with two receiving assistance under the War Orphan Assistance program, and 23 receive benefits under the Social Security Educational Assistance program. Financial Aids Officer Lyle B. Spradley estimates

have been assisted by Government College programs over eighty students administered directly by the College. Included are grants and loans to needy students. Mr. Spradley estimates that as many as seventy percent of those students receiving assistance were awarded outright grants. He noted also that the Washington State Grant program for General Studies Students amounts to some \$10,000 and the Basic Grant program funded by the Federal Government amounts to over \$40,000 (\$9,000 last year). The number of students receiving grants and loan benefits will increase, he added, as processing of current applications continues.

Even more substantive sources of student help comes from the College's employment service to its students. Miss Bessie Guy, Director of Employment at the College, estimates that over eighty percent of NC students work to help earn their way through college.

She summarized, "They come prepared to get work, and they get it."

In spite of rising costs, the old adage, "where there is a will, there is a way" was never more true than for today's young person desiring a college education.

Flying Seminar: Following Paul in Rome

The old adage, "All roads lead to Rome" bespeaking Rome's reign of imperial rule over the Mediterranean world for over half a millenium, will take on new meaning to NC's Flying Seminarians during the College's Sixth Annual Flying Seminar March 12-23, 1975.

Flying from Tel Aviv, Israel to Rome, will be a morning flight for the Seminarians. For the Apostle Paul, it turned out to be a voyage of several months, a voyage that was completed only by divine intervention.

Of special interest to the tour party will be the marble-studded ruins of the ancient Roman Forum, center of the empire that ruled the world when our Lord was born as a Babe in Bethlehem some 1,500 miles away.

In the Plain of Rome is the site of most of the Catacombs, where the "Trophies" (name given to departed Christians) were buried and where early Christians worshipped in the era of the Imperial persecutions.

The visit will help to highlight the contrast between the fading glory of the kingdoms of this world and he increasing glory of the city which God has prepared for them that love Him. What a dynamic xperience awaits Flying Seminarians as they view the remains of an ancient city where indeed the blood of the martyrs became the seed of the Church!

Faculty Doctoral Thesis Published

Dr. Jack V. Rozell today announced the publication of his doctoral thesis, as part of a symposium of doctoral dissertations at Fuller Theological Seminary, entitled, Biblical and Psychological Perspectives. The book contains abstracts on four doctoral dissertations written by doctoral students at Fuller Theological Seminary in Pasadena, California. Writing his dissertation while in residence at the Seminary in 1973, Dr. Rozell entitled it "Implications of the New Testament Concept of Conscience for Pastoral Counseling." In his dissertation, Dr. Rozell conducts a study into the meaning of the New Testament concept of conscience and its implications for Counseling. The book is published by Publishers Services, a subsidiary of William Carey Library in Pasadena.

At the College, Dr. Rozell is Director of Counseling and professor of Counseling Ministries. In view of current trends in the pastoral ministry involving pastors up to 60% of their professional work time



in counseling, the College has inaugurated a new training program in Counseling Ministries offering a minor in the field. The new program has been largely developed and coordinated by Dr. Rozell, and is also taught and staffed by Christian professional personnel in the greater Seattle area.



Demographic Survey: Autumn, 1974



A demographic survey prepared by the Registrar's office shows the autumn quarter students come from 25 states and nine foreign countries. Leading the list for the number of students is Washington State with 302 (55%) followed by Oregon and Montana. The sharpest increase in terms of numbers came from Washington State with 42 more students on campus than were enrolled a year ago, a 16% increase.
