It was just ten years ago on July 4 that I set foot on campus and assumed duties as President of Northwest College. These have been ten great years! Years of fulfillment, of dreams and dreaming more dreams!

As for self awareness I believe N.C. has a clearer concept of what it is, what it is trying to do and how it is trying to do it than ever before. The accreditation process helped much in this.

In the midst of all this development...and change...there is one area in which N.C. has not changed. I speak of the purposes and directions of N.C. It is still on course! It's reason for being has not changed.

So, at this juncture I look back with a sense of fulfillment. And I look forward

with a sense of expectancy and excitement. This next year and those following should be our greatest. We just concluded seven consecutive quarters of record enrollment. At this point, it looks like this fall will be another!

It's on with the task! N.C. is going college with a good future! I urge you to join us with your interest, prayer and financial support like you never have before. If you have prayed, pray more! If you have given, give more! If you have sent students our way, send more!

Under God, let's keep N.C. on the move and make the next years even greater years!

Quiet Town On The Move

The cover of the Seattle Magazine, VIEW NORTHWEST, May 1976 displays the quaintness of Kirkland, Washington — the city of Northwest College. Main feature story in the magazine carries the title, "Kirkland — a town on the move." The article tells the story of how the 15,000 population on lakefront city "climbed out" from a posture of small town inefficiency to a "town on the move."

Not a factory town, yet the city is a place of employment with nearly 3,000 jobs. More than that, the quiet, yet bustling city is surrounded by a vast panorama of employment and business opportunity in its metropolitan environs.

The turn came for the city in 1965 when the city employed an aggressive City Manager

hailing from northern Minnesota.

Kirkland's on-the-move symbols are delicately balanced with the symbols of a culture and a solidarity rooting in its pioneer days symbolized by its garret-towered red-brick Peter Kirk Building, standing erect against the sky behind the street sign reading, "Historic Site No. 2". It is a community that has given evidence of its appreciation for the arts. It is a community that puts its best foot forward in parks and water-front reserves for the enjoyment of its citizens and for the preservation of its God-given setting of natural beauty. It has more parks per capital 'than any community in the state. The city itself is something of a green belt of trees. lawn, and waterfront.

Above all else, Kirkland is a city on-themove that has succeeded in preserving its small town flavor. It is still a place with a friendly "hello" on the street. Such is the community setting with which Northwest College has been placed and favored in the providence and goodness of God.

Financial Aid Helps

Federal funds are again available through Northwest College and the B.E.O.G. (Basic Educational Opportunity Grant) program for the upcoming academic year. Students may receive up to \$1,400 for the academic year based on need. This program has already fed \$94,000 throught the College for the upcoming year. New Faculty Appointments

Four new faculty appointments were announced for the coming school year at

Northwest College.

New instructor in Christian Education will be the Reverend J. Melvyn Ming. A graduate of Southern California College (B.A.) and of Southwestern Baptist Theological Seminary (M.R.E.), Professor Ming's background includes serving as teacher and religious director at the Monte Vista Christian High School in Watsonville, California, vouth pastor at the Walnut Hill Assemblies of God church in Dallas. Minister of Education and Vice Principal of the Gardena Valley Assembly of God and Christian School. Minister of Education at the Capitol Hill Assembly of God church in Oklahoma City, and more recently as Minister of Christian Education at the First Assembly of God church in Grand Junction, Colorado, Professor Ming replaces Reverend Stan Drew, who left to serve with Pastor Dennis Davis in The People's church in Salem, Oregon.

New instructor in Speech and Communications will be Mr. Daniel French of Longview, Washington. Professor French did his A.A. degree and his B.S. degree in Broadcast Communications and is currently enrolled in a Masters program at the University of Washington. He, likewise, brings an extensive background in professional work in his field.

In Longview, Washington, he did commercial advertising on KEDO Radio; served as announcer and newswriter on KLVR Radio; served as newswriter, commercials producer and news director for KLFJ Radio in Springfield, Missouri; and did internship work at KMTC-TV, KOZK-TV, and KOLR-TV in Springfield during his college days. He has more recently served as announcer and public service director for KTXR-Radio in Springfield.

Professor French replaces Dr. Donald Tarno who moved to Southern California.

A third appointment is Mrs. Marian Hood who will teach part-time in the Music Department. A "Charismatic" Presbyterian, Mrs. Hood will instruct in Music History, Music Appreciation, and Applied Music. She received her training at Willamette University in Salem, Oregon (B. Mus.) and earned teaching certification in Music Education through the University of Washington. She is experienced in choral directing, having directed at Seattle's Trinity United Presbyterian Church, the Everett First Baptist Church, Woodway Community Reformed Church, the Edmonds Presbyterian Church, and has also directed the Seattle "Sing Out".

A fourth appointment is also a part-time one, and one which will confer strength to the College's athletic program in the person of Mr. Dave Ellis, who will serve as Soccer Coach. Soccer is a relatively new intercollegiate sport at the College, which is a member of the Pacific Northwest College Conference. Mr. Ellis, who is an accomplished athlete in soccer, is a son of Rev. and Mrs. Richard Ellis, Northwest College Alumni and Assemblies of God missionaries to Panama

Panama.

Reverend Fletcher Stewardship Consultant

The Rev. Woodrow Fletcher, an ordained Assemblies of God pastor, has been appointed to the position of full-time Steward Consultant. Rev. Fletcher has a long and varied pastoral and professional background, having pastored eight churches in Canada and the U.S. and extensive experience as a Life Insurance and Investment Broker Counselor. He pioneered the last two churches he pastored — one in Federal Way and the other on Mercer Island.

Rev. Fletcher originates from Canada, where he served in the Royal Canadian Air Force. He is a graduate of the Western Bible

College in Winnepeg.

Commenting on the appointment, President Hurst observed that "Reverend Fletcher brings a broad background of financial and investment consultant experience to investment consultant experience as well as a rich background of pastoral experience to his work as Steward Consultant, making him ideally suited for the post to which he is being appointed."

The deferred giving aspect of N.C.'s development is moving very well. As Woodrow Fletcher joins together with our Development Director, Reverend Herbert Crowder, it will move even better. In these two men, I believe that the College will have a stewardship team serving our great Northwest re-

gion that is unrivaled anywhere."

BUEL B. BRODIN

Mr. Buel Brodin of Olympia has taken up duties as the College's new Financial Aids Officer, succeeding the Reverend Lyle B.

Spradley who retired last June.

Mr. Brodin, whose daughter Kris is Women's Physical Education Instructor and Residence Counselor at Northwest College, has considerable background in financial research and analysis. A graduate of Concordia College with the B.A. degree in Economics, Mr. Brodin had a long service experience with the state of Washington. From 1946-68, he worked in the State Budget Office as Budget Analyzer and in the Department of Revenue as Tax Research Supervisor. From 1968-71, he was Director of Financial Planning at Evergreen State College in Olympia and from 1972-73, he was Chief Budget Analyst for the State.

The Brodins originate from Minnesota. They have four children including Kris, two grown sons and another daughter, Kari, who is in high school. They reside in Olympia, where the Brodins are members of the Evergreen Christian Center and where he has served on the Board of the church.

Commenting on Mr. Brodin's appointment to the College, College President D.V. Hurst said, "We are very pleased to have 'Brod' join the family of Northwest. He is ideally suited for the position and keenly interested in helping students. His contribution of service to the College and its students is deeply appreciated!"

Alumni of the Year Honors

The Reverend Walter Buck, pastor of the First Assembly of God church in Spokane, and Mr. Merrill Womach, nationally known concert soloist and Spokane businessman were named as "Alumni of the Year" by the Northwest College Alumni Association at its Annual Homecoming on May 28, 1976.

The Reverend Buck graduated from the college in the class of 1943. He has served pastorates in Washington and Montana and as a former president of the Alumni Association. He was cited for distinction and effectiveness in his pastoral and leadership roles since his graduation from the college.

Mr. Merrill Womach, a graduate of the class of 1947, has been known for his musical talents from his student days at the college. He was cited for his distinguished and effective Christian testimony after an airplane crash in 1961 from which he miraculously escaped. Notwithstanding the extensive and continuous physical suffering he has experienced as a result of burns in the crash, he has climbed to an unparalleled level in his professional career and ministry. He is featured in the documentary film, "He Restoreth My Soul" that tells the story of the plane crash experience. He was featured on the cover of a recent issue of Christian Life Magazine, and on the nationally televised program, 700 Club, and was cited as Outstanding Citizen of the Year by his home city of Spokane.

His wife is the former Virginia Kuck, also an alumni of the College. Making the presentations was Alumni President, Reverend Allen Baunsgard of Anacortes, Washington.

Spiritual Emphasis Series Announced

Leading off the series will be the Fall Quarter Emphasis week October 4-8 with the Reverend Bill Popejoy, pastor of the Belton Assembly of God church of Belton, Missouri. He is survived by his wife, Ofreida, four

children, and his mother.

Northwest College faculty and staff personnel are literally on a globe-wide front in their summer ministry and work appointments, it was observed at the College recently.

President Hurst led off with a World Missions Convention in Seoul, Korea where he was a special speaker at the 40,000 member Full Gospel Central Church in early June. He also spoke at the Annual Field Conference of the Assemblies of God and the Pentecostal Assemblies of Canada in Hong Kong as well as at other speaking appointments on the tour. Upon return to the states, he was Bible Conference speaker at two mid-west conferences - one at Fort Dodge, Iowa and another at Carlinville, Illinois.

Academic Dean, Dr. Frank B. Rice, together with his wife, Ernestine, is on assignment as a writer at the Assemblies of God International Correspondence Institute in Brussels, Belgium this summer. Dr. Daniel B. Pecota was a ministers' institute speaker for the Montana District at its Bible Conference at Hungry Horse, Montana and then went to instruct in an extension school for the Far East Advanced School of Theology in Malaysia.

Professor Maxine Williams is instructing at the Bethel Bible Institute, an Indian school sponsored by the Alaska District of the Assemblies of God in Bethel, Alaska. Dr. Jack Rozell was speaker at the Family Conference sponsored by the Kings Garden organization at its Island Camp on the Kitsap Peninsula.
