#### **Funds Are Available**

This past academic year saw Northwest College disperse \$122,966 through the Basic Eductional Opportunity Grant. In addition to this, \$14,002 was dispersed through the Supplemental Educational Opportunity Grant and the State Need Grant amounted to \$3,990. In addition to grants there is the National Direct Student Loan program which provided \$58,973 to students. This year, it appears we will award approximately \$150,000 in the B.E.O.G. funds. If you know of students planning to attend Northwest College, encourage them to write the college and apply for these funds. Mr. Buel Brodin will be happy to answer their questions and help them in any way possible.

Our tallest man on the team, Larry Anderson, who is 6'8", is able to play this year because of the Basic Educational Opportunity Grant he is receiving. Naturally, the Eagles are expecting to be league champs and Larry will be a great help.

#### Fall Enrollment New Record

Autumn quarter enrollment at Northwest College hit an all time high of 628. Enrollment projections based on the application rate had indicated the possibility of an even higher enrollment. However, the admissions office points out that applications leveled out in the period immediately before registration. Hence the applications came more nearly in line with the number of one year ago.

At some points earlier in the year, applications were running almost double of that one year ago. The pattern of receiving applications earlier in the application season is seen as a more collegiate admissions pat-

tern, the office indicates.

The admissions office is currently conducting research to study the admissions application patterns and the materialization rate on the applications. Traditionally, the materialization rate at Northwest College has been

a high rate of 75% to 80%.

The cost of education today is seen as a prime factor in college enrollments in all types of schools in higher education. But many prospective college students may not realize there is an unprecedented availability of financial aid to offset these costs. This aid comes in many different forms to students.

The admissions office is anticipating a good number of deferred entrances at the beginning of winter quarter.

26 Arab-speaking countries; a radio outreach; Middle East Evangelical Theological School; and campus youth ministries.

In addition to his responsibilities as representative for the Middle East and North Africa, Reverend Hoskins also administers the Lillian Trasher Orphanage in Assiout, Egypt.

We feel extremely privileged to have Reverend Hoskins minister at this emphasis. Traditionally, one spiritual emphasis week per year is given over to missionary emphasis.

Services will include the usual morning chapel, which is extended in time, and a special evening rally each evening through the week. The public is invited to attend.

#### Former Library Becomes Music Facility

At a cost of \$99,000 the basement of the Chapel which previously served as the old library is being remodeled to become a new music facility. Each room must be carefully soundproofed, which means having its own heat and cool air ducts, so that sound will not carry from room to room.

When completed, there will be four offices and three classrooms, one of which will have risers and a simulated radio production facility, where taping equipment will be available and where broadcasting can be

taught.

In addition, the facility will provide twelve practice rooms, some of which will serve as teaching studios.
