Victory!

It's a great feeling . . . exhilarating, rewarding and satisfying. And then it's challenging and encouraging to go further and do more! The feeling of victory!

And this we have at Northwest College . . . on several fronts.

1. We have secured a piece of property-1.8 acres-that was critical to the long range development of the campus. In fact, it has been identified as the "lead domino in the row" for several years. Located on the east part of the campus right next to the proposed new athletic field, it had to be secured before the field could be developed. This had to occur before the new entrance to the campus could be developed eliminating the small athletic field, and additional parking, movement of the student activities building and further development of the academic core and walk system could take place. In fact, we had to have this piece of property, which was completely surrounded by the east campus, before the Master Plan Phase 2 could be presented to the City for approval. Master planning had to include the property.

But we now have it! Thank God, papers have been signed!

It will take \$10,260 in unbudgeted gift income next year to make the payment. A total of \$72,000 over a ten year period will be needed. But, we believe that victory will come, too!

2. And we now have the *right zoning* for the campus!

Due to a complex zoning situation in the City the College has been zoned single family residence all these years and has had to seek a Conditional Use Permit with each new structure. In recent years this required the long and often delayed route of public hearings.


But this has changed. Northwest College is now identified as "Planned Area 1—Private College or Residence Single Family." Only one thing remains—City approval of the Master Plan. Most certainly this will require one more set of hearings. After that the College will be on a more direct path for future City approval of development. This is a second victory. And the timing of it all was something else! Ask me sometime. I'll be eager to tell you!

3. And another victory is in the making. The Founder's Fund is off and running! (The complete text on the program was in the last issue.) And we've just started. The accompanying graph shows the progress toward the \$1,000,000 goal set for April 1980.

You can count on it! We'll keep you posted! And I believe it will be total victory. Join us in it and subscribe to at least one \$1,000 Founder's Fund Share.

4. Still another victory is the record graduating class—142. A total of eighty-eight were Seniors. Another all time high! (You will find more about this year's commencement elsewhere in this issue.) Think of what the level of performance would mean to the Assemblies of God of the Great Northwest if it continued for even the next ten to twelve years. One thousand well trained prospective pastors, missionaries, associates . . . I would call that victory!

Excited? I'm sure you can sense I am! Thankful? Yes, indeed! God is good! And His blessing is resting upon Northwest College.

Eighteen Ordinants Trained at NC

"Northwest ... recognizes a distinctive obligation to propagate the historic faith of the sponsoring church ... and continues to have a particular concern for those vocational areas relating closely to the church's Great Commission." The meaning of these words found in the College's Educational Goals ("The Northwest Perspective") was dramatically demonstrated at the Northwest District Council of the Assemblies of God in Yakima on April 26th when eighteen of the thirty-two ministers ordained to serve in the Assemblies of God were Northwest College graduates or former students.

A survey of the ministerial activities reveals that seven are serving as associate pastors in the Northwest District; five as pastors; two are under missionary appointment; one is a college instructor; one is a youth director; and one is an evangelist. Another graduate, Dan Williams, will be ordained in behalf of the Northwest District by the Southern Missouri District where he is attending the Assemblies of God Graduate School to prepare himself for the military chaplaincy.

Dr. John M. Pope, faculty sponsor of the Sophomore class revealed that an appreciable number of Associate Degree grads will be returning to Northwest College for advance studies.

Coach Carl Kinney, sponsor of the senior class announced seniors' plans that involve such points on the globe as Finland, Thailand, Africa, Spain, Australia, The Pacific Northwest region, and graduate schools in Seattle, Portland, California, Kansas, and Texas among other places.

The commissioning prayer was one of the high points as seniors and graduates were called to the front of the chapel for special prayer.


Executive Presbyter Applauds New Pastoral Major

A veteran pastor, district superintendent, and executive presbyter of the General Council of the Assemblies of God, the Reverend Dr. N.D. Davidson applauded and endorsed the new Pastoral Studies major to be instituted at Northwest College this coming academic year. Dr. Davidson said the new training program "will be of inestimable value to those who are preparing for the Pastoral Ministry." He noted especially the emphasis upon Ministerial Ethics, Ministerial Relationships, Public Relations and Promotions, Work, Church Management, and the "whole spectrum of Pastoral activities" in addition to a foundation of study in the Biblical studies.

Dr. Davidson also rated the internship feature of the program in which pastoral and professional interaction involves the student during his senior year as being "well conceived." The veteran superintendent, sometimes called the pastors' pastor, said in conclusion, "I can wholeheartedly recommend that young men, whose plan is to pastor, avail themselves to this program."

The new major comes into being after over a year of study by a committee of pastors, district officials, and faculty at the college. Committee members were: Frank McAllister, Chairman; Frank Rice; Earl Book; Glen Cole; Mike Kirkelie; Dan Pecota; Jack Rozell; Bob Harris; D.V. Hurst; and Amos Millard, consultant. The program will be officially put into being as a new program offering at the college this fall.

COMMENCEMENT SETS NEW RECORD

The forty-first Commencement at Northwest College established a new record for size and also presented some other features that were somewhat unique in terms of human interest features. The 141 graduates presented a colorful spectacle as the double column of grads led by a color-guard linked the area from the College Chapel to the Northwest Pavilion on the afternoon of Sunday, May 29, which itself was marked by the color of blue skies, fluffy white clouds, and a radiance which illuminated a groomed campus of emerald.

Of the graduates, 88 were awarded Bachelors Degrees and 53 received Associate Degrees, and 1 honorary degree, Doctor of Divinity, was conferred upon the Reverend Dr. E.M. Clark, president of North Central Bible College in Minneapolis. Dr. Clark brought the commencement address.

The Baccalaureate service on the evening before the commencement featured the Reverend Allen Groff, pastor of the First Assembly of God of Albany, Oregon, and ministering parents of some of the grads.

Inducted into the Delta Epsilon Chi Honor Society of the American Association of Bible Colleges were graduates and two alumni, Mr. Merrill Womach of Spokane, graduate of the class of 1947, and the Reverend Paul Pomerville, graduate of the class of 1967.

President Receives Permanent Appointment



In an unprecedented move, the Northwest College Board of Directors voted to grant Dr. D.V. Hurst an appointment as president of the College "as long as he wishes to be president". This announcement was made to the faculty and student body in the College's final chapel service of the 1977 academic year and brought a standing ovation of approval from the chapel assembly.

The announcement was made by Board Chairman Reverend Frank McAllister, who explained that presidential appointments have been made for four-year terms, but that it was the unanimous feeling of the Board, in reviewing the eleven-year record of President Hurst, that he be offered indefinite tenure.

Dr. Hurst in responding to the announcement, said, "It is gratifying and heart warming to receive this expression from the Board of Directors. These have been eleven great years. The challenge of presiding over the operations of such as Northwest College constitutes an exciting opportunity. We have seen many significant developments through the years. The Campus has been enlarged from 35 to 55 acres. The building space has approximately doubled. The enrollment has grown to 640 as the new record. The College has received full accreditation with the Northwest Association of Schools and Colleges, having had accreditation with the American Association of Bible Colleges for sometime. Under God we are trusting for continued growth and development. I am humbled and honored by this action of the Board and pray that I might prove myself worthy of their trust."


