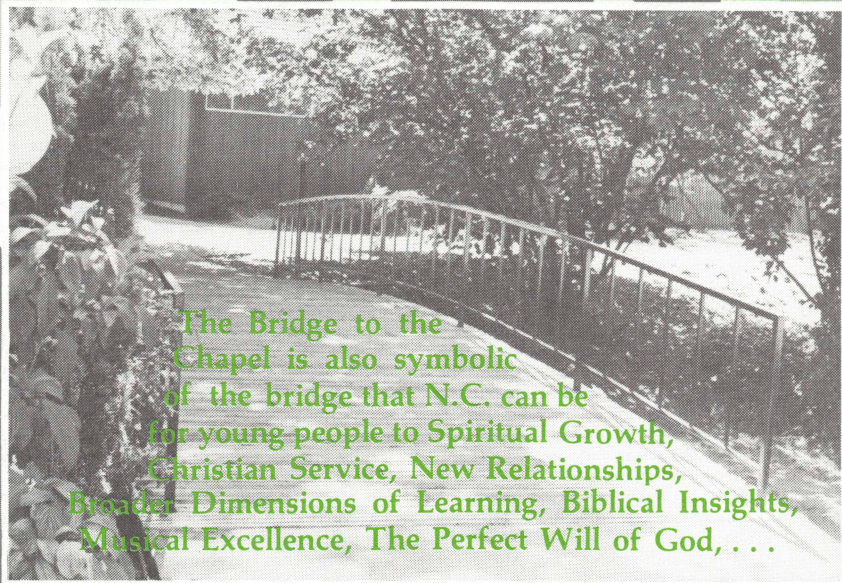

DR. HURST ANNOUNCES FIVE NEW FACULTY

Five new faculty appointments for the 1977-78 school year at Northwest College were announced by the College President, Dr. D.V. Hurst.

Stepping into Dean of Students' post will be the Reverend Waymon P. Rutledge from Salem, Oregon. An ordained Assemblies of God minister, the Reverend Mr. Rutledge brings with him an extensive pastoral background, as well as in social services administration for the State of Oregon. Dean Rutledge received his education in Bethany College, Oregon State University, Willamette University, and Oregon College of Education. He holds the M.S. Ed. degree at the latter, where he has also served as guest instructor. He succeeds former Dean Orville V. Clark who will be going to full-time teaching faculty at the college effective this fall quarter, Dr. Hurst announced.

Another key appointment to the faculty is that of the Reverend Dwaine Braddy, who comes to the college from O'Fallon, Illinois. An ordained Assemblies of God pastor, Professor Braddy received his training at Central Bible College in Springfield, Mo., and at Concordia Seminary in St. Louis. He received his Master of Arts in Religion at Concordia. Professor Braddy's coming to the college is coincidental with the inauguration of the college's new Pastoral Ministries major this fall. Professor and Mrs. Braddy have two children.

Another key appointment is that of Dr. Robert Parlotz, who will assist in the Pastoral Studies field at the college and will specialize in Counseling Ministries, replacing Dr. Jack V. Rozell, who is leaving the college to take up the duties as pastor at the Neighborhood Church in Bellevue.

Dr. Parlotz, who also originates in the Assemblies of God, received his education at Bethany Bible College, Cabrillo College, Wheaton College, and at Texas Christian University. He received the Master of Divinity and the Doctor of Ministries degrees at Texas Christian University. An ordained minister with the North Texas District Council, Dr. Parlotz indicates he will give a pastoral emphasis to the Counseling Ministries coursework in which he will engage at the college. Dr. and Mrs. Parlotz and their two children will be moving to Kirkland from Fort Worth, Texas, where Dr. Parlotz has been in service with the Bi-County Information and Referral Office, a specialized screening and referral unit of the Dallas County Mental Health Center.

Mrs. Julie Meier, who was a student at Northwest College in 1952, will return to campus this fall to serve as Assistant Librarian. She received her B.A. at the University of Hawaii, and received her Master of Library Science while working with her husband in missionary service in Hawaii. During the past two years she has served as librarian in Eastern Washington, her last position being at Deer Park. She replaces Mrs.

Marlee Huber who is taking up domestic duties in her home in Kirkland.

The Reverend Robert F. Abbott will be coming to the campus as special instructor in Missions on assignment from the Foreign Missions Division of the Assemblies of God. Mr. Abbott received his training at North Central Bible College in Minneapolis, and at the Assemblies of God Graduate School in Springfield, Missouri. He has taken further work in several universities, including Beirut University College in Beirut, Lebanon, where he served as a missionary. Rev. and Mrs. Abbott have three children.

Augmenting the Biblical Studies faculty at the College will be Professor Darrell Hobson, who will be coming on faculty full-time. Professor Hobson has been instructing part-time since 1973. A product of Northwest College where he earned both a B.A. and a Th.D. Degree, Mr. Hobson received his graduate training at Seattle Pacific University. Professor and Mrs. Hobson have one child. They have been active in associational ministry at White Center Assembly of God and more recently at the Fall City Assembly of God.

At the other end of the tenure spectrum at the College, Dr. Donald H. Fee, Professor Emeritus, will return to the classroom on a special lecture-ship basis. The esteemed Professor Emeritus was honored by the College by the naming of one of the academic buildings on campus in his honor at the College's Commencement Exercises last May.

Among those leaving administrative or faculty posts is former Dean of Students, Rev. Orville V. Clark. Dean Clark will become Professor Clark, and will be teaching in the fields of the Social Studies. Dean Clark has served as Dean of Students for five years, and prior to that he served on part-time faculty while pastoring the Kenmore Assembly of God. Mrs. Clark will continue to serve at the school as the College Nurse.

Dr. Jack V. Rozell, who is leaving to resume pastoral ministry in a local church, came to the College in 1967 to serve as Dean of Students. After serving in this position of administration for five years, he transferred to full-time teaching, a post which he held for five years. During this time, Dr. Rozell gave leadership to the development of the College's Counseling Ministries Program while also teaching in the fields of Bible and the Pastoral Ministries.

Northwest College has a record and reputation among Assemblies of God Colleges for long-tenured faculty and administration, Dr. Hurst observed. The changes represented by the coming of the new faculty this year reflect the normal level of changing roles of domestic and professional life that are common to many institutions of Christian higher education. "I would urge our friends and churches to bear these new faculty members up in prayer that God might give them the special ministry gifts and graces for the benefit of the many young people who will be coming to the campus this new school year."

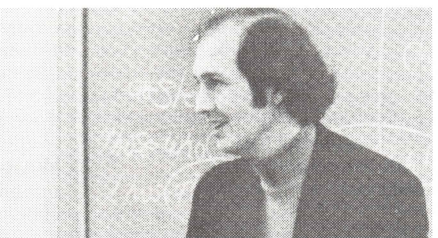

Dr. Amos D. Millard had taught as part of the part-time faculty for several years. This year he moves into the full-time status. He is fast becoming one of the more popular faculty, yet has a reputation of laying on the work.

Action was taken by the Northwest College Board of Directors to continue the scholarship provision for students who pursue the Th.B. program at the College. The scholarship program provides for tuition scholarships for the fifth year of studies in ratio to the amount of work taken at the College leading to the B.A. degree. Thus, if a student has taken the full extent of his B.A. work at N.C., he would receive the full amount of the tuition cost of his fifth year through the scholarship.

The purpose of the provision is based on two principles: (1) To encourage seniors to pursue the Th.B. program because of its training strength for the ministry, and (2) to implement the principle of assistance in denominational theological training for ministerial preparation beyond the first baccalaureate degree level.

Comparative analyses of the College's Th.B. program show it to be a "strong and solid" training curriculum for ministerial preparation, comparing favorably with M. Div. programs offered in many seminaries. The program places emphasis upon studies in Biblical languages, theology, Biblical studies, and Church History. Further observation shows that a high percentage of students who have completed the Th.B. program are eminently successful in the roles of ministry which they have pursued since graduation. At least two Th.B. graduates from the College are on the teaching staff of the College pursuant to supplementing their Th.B. work with Masters' studies.

A survey of Th.B. grads over the last ten years shows that nearly one-half of them are in the pastoral ministry and nearly one-fourth are in Christian Education at the College level. The remaining grads are in missions, youth, and intercity ministry.

DEAN OF ADMISSIONS IN WHO'S WHO

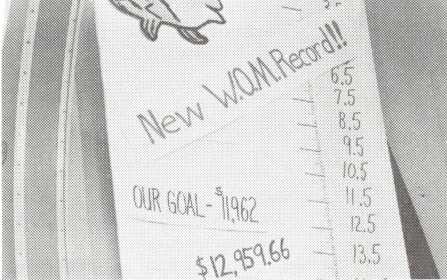

College Shares Campus With Summer Institute

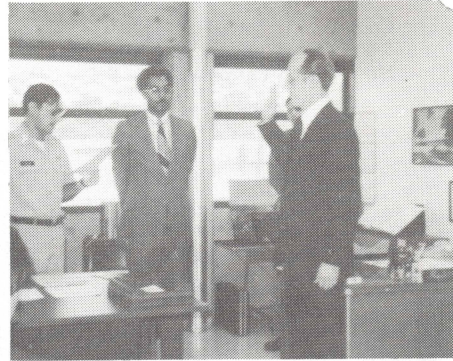
Our campus was not idle during the summer of 1977. It was pressed into educational service twice during the summer, Owen S. Hodges, Business Manager at the College said.

The first usage was the College's own summer session held during the month of June. During the month of July, the campus became an auxiliary unit for the famed Summer Institute of Linguistics sponsored jointly by the Wycliffe Organization and the University of Washington.

The affinity of purpose between the institute and N.C. was perhaps aptly symbolized by the Institute's Open House held on campus, July 31, which featured displays of Bible translation work, artifacts, and lectures about the instruction provided by the Institute.

The Institute anticipates a return to the campus next summer.

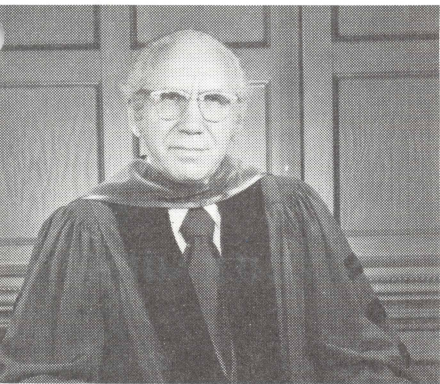
Grad Sworn Into Chaplaincy

One of the academic buildings known for years as "C" building was renamed in honor of Dr. Fee. This Fall he will return to the college to teach on a special lecture-ship basis.

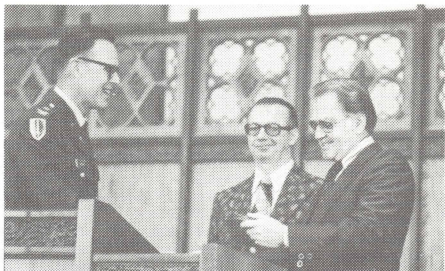

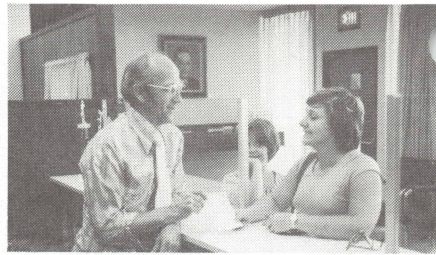

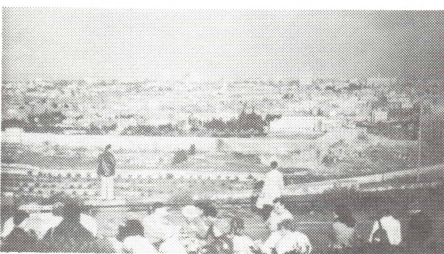
