# A NEED MET... AND A NEW NEED

It's exciting, to say the least!

The enrollment for the fall quarter set another all time high of 688, up from 628 in the fall quarter last year, a 9.6% increase. Last year's winter quarter saw 640, an all time high up to that point. Normally, the winter quarter sees a drop from the fall quarter.


This is the eleventh consecutive quarter of record enrollment for any particular quarter—whether for

Fall, Winter, or Spring.

All of this happening at the time when some schools are reporting only holding even or even drop-

ping is especially gratifying.

The record of fall enrollments at Northwest for the past decade shows an interesting trend, as indicated on the graph.



A major economical slump paralleled the drop in the 1970-71 year. The recovery which followed was slow. However, the gains in the past few years have been significant, especially in 1975 when we grew 75 and now in 1977 when we have grown 60. They closely compare to 1967 when we grew 65. Last year we held even.

A whopping 73% of the total enrollment is enrolled in the Bible College Division, though among new freshmen, the Junior College enrollments hold up to 44% of the 305 Freshmen enrolled. Not only are new Freshman enrollments up (13%) from last year, but Sophomore enrollments are up by 11%; Junior enrollments are up by 27%. Senior enrollments are down slightly but will climb as third quarter Juniors achieve senior standing after the current quarter. The number of men students is up by 2% from last year.

Of more interest, however, than the statistics is the spiritual impact they represent. They represent young people—heading for the ministry! Young people who have heard the call of God, who desire to give themselves . . . to prepare . . . to go! The Church they represent is alive and well. It all speaks of great things ahead.

There is need for them. Our Dean of Admissions, Dr. Amos Millard, who handles placement says, "We need more! I wish we had two or three times the number of men who could assume roles as associate pastors. The opportunities are greater than the supply of graduates." So, we will enlist more... to the best of our ability.

At the same time, the campus is feeling the pressure of students now. At several points we will need to make provision. In the next few months, we will be talking about this in earnest.

Pray about the above and for the faculty and student body this year. We are off to a great start. God's blessing has rested on us in a sweet way. The official opening Convocation and Communion Chapel was a blessed sight. Our expectations are high! Praise God!



#### A Prophetic Symbol

Of the eight gates which give access into the ancient walled city of Jerusalem, this is the only one that is sealed.
