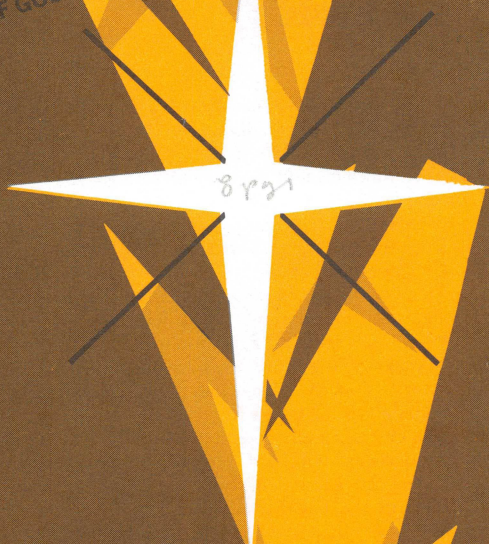

From The President

BOARD APPOINTS COMMITTEE TO STUDY THE FUTURE

With an eye to the future, the Northwest College Board of Directors has appointed a study committee to identify the College's priorities and strategies for future growth and development.

Noting that the College has experienced 15 quarters of enrollment records for each of the respective quarters of the school year and has set four all-time enrollment records in the last five quarters, the Board of Directors especially want to know what priorities should be established for preparing for enrollments at the college for the foreseeable future.

Dr. Frank Rice, Academic Dean, reports that for the Northwest College faculty, this is a year of self-examination, and all are busily engaged in committees studying the effectiveness of the total college operation. All this activity is preparatory to receiving an accreditation team from the Northwest Association of Schools and Colleges October 29 through November 1, 1978. This is expected to result in a renewal of the college's accredited status for at least another five years. The college first became an accredited member of the Northwest Association in 1973. Prior to that, the college had been a candidate for regional accreditation for several years. The college has also had accreditation by the American Association of Bible Colleges for many years.

The process of self-study began for the faculty with the Fall Faculty Retreat in September 1977. At that time the faculty reviewed the history and purposes of the accreditation process and the recommendations made by the previous accreditation team. Self-study committees were appointed at that time. The schedule calls for completion of the faculty self-study by May 1, and printing of the self-study this summer. By September 1, 1978, the self-study report will be mailed to the evaluation team members for their examination prior to their visit to campus. The team will make their report to the Commission on Colleges in December 1978, and the Commission will act upon renewal of the college's accreditation at that time.

Serving on the Committee are several members of the College Board together with members of the College Administration and some from the college constituency as consultants. Chairman of the Committee is Mr. Paul Gray, Tacoma businessman and member of the College Board; the Reverend Frank McAllister, Chairman of the College Board of Directors and District Superintendent of the Northwest District of the Assemblies of God; the Reverend Clifford Hobson, Northwest District Secretary of the Assemblies of God and Secretary-Treasurer for the College Board of Directors; Mr. Henry Portin, Seattle businessman; and Dr. D.V. Hurst, College President.

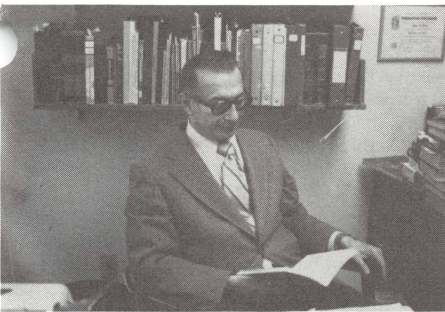
Serving as consultants to the committee are Dr. Frank Rice, Academic Dean; Rev. Herbert Crowder, Director of Development; Rev. Owen S. Hodges, Business Manager; Mr. Carl Kanz, Tacoma businessman; and Dr. Amos Millard, Dean of Admissions and Registrar at the College.

Studies show that all college enrollments are expected to peak within the next several years and then settle back somewhat. However, it was noted that the enrollment at the College runs ahead of national projections for college enrollments.

Commenting on the task of the committee Dr. Hurst said, "Anticipating the growth pattern of Northwest College requires careful study, inasmuch as the growth of the church, the curricular pattern of the college, financial aid availabilities, and the ability of the college to provide needed facilities are all special factors that will affect it along with such factors as population trends, economic conditions, etc. The committee's charge for study centers in the sequence of facilities and the financing package(s) that will be required. The Committee has already met and assigned two sub-committees to work after generally reviewing the needs. A full report will be going to the Board of Directors in late May."



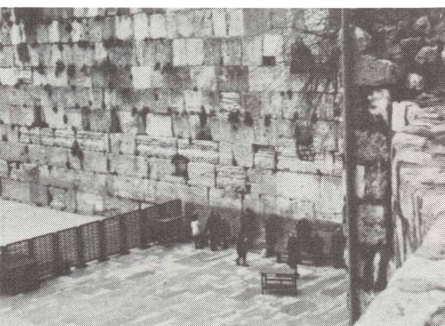
Pictured are Dr. Hurst, Paul Gray and Carl Kanz members of a sub committee of the priorities and strategies ad hoc committee of the College Board.



Dr. John M. Pope has been a faculty member at N.C. since 1960. He has a rich background of academic training and practical experience. He graduated from Central Bible Institute in 1945, Wheaton College in 1948, and received his M.Div. from Fuller Theological Seminary in 1951. He did work on his doctorate at the University of St. Andrews from 1958-1960; included in this was one year at the University of Geneva, and was awarded his Ph.D. in 1975.

Dr. Pope has had several years of practical ministry in the military chaplaincy in both active and inactive status. He began active duty in 1952 and has served in the active reserve for many years.

Dr. Pope has a vital interest in doctrine and church history. He teaches a variety of subjects including Bible, Philosophy and Apologetics, Church History, and Contemporary Theology. Commenting on his years at N.C. he said, "It's been an exciting and rewarding time challenging young people in both thought and practice."

NEW FINANCIAL AID OFFICER

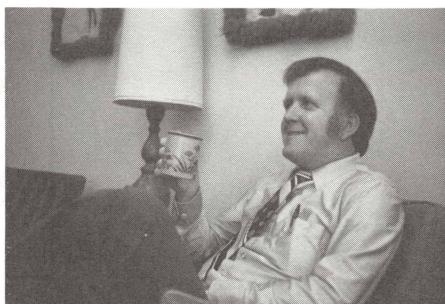

Bev is a 1977 graduate of N.C. and served as the Public Relations secretary while a student. Before coming back to N.C. she worked a year in the offices of Continental, Inc. in Seattle.

Bev has a keen interest in the needs of students and will serve in the office as the full time financial aid officer.

One of the main areas of financial aid is the Basic Educational Opportunity Grant (B.E.O.G.). It is given according to need and this year a student could receive as much as \$1400 for the academic year. The Congress is now considering raising the limit and if this is passed the result will be a great help to college students.

Professor Johnson's roll was three fold: to be one of two responders to the main speaker, deliver a talk on the "Historical Relationship of the Church and Mental Health" after which he served on a panel to field questions from the audience. Mr. Johnson commented about his role as, "All in all, a very stimulating experience."

LEAGUE CHAMPS



The Women's Basketball Team completed a very successful first year by bringing home the Pacific Northwest College Conference championship from the League Tournament in Portland. This is the first year that the League has had women's basketball, although several of the schools had played some games other years. But for Northwest, the 1977-78 season was their inaugural year.

Kris Brodin coached the women to their 11-3 won-lost record after coaching the Women's Volleyball Team through a good season of league play fall quarter. The Eagles were led in scoring by Carol Carlisle, who is an excellent outside shooter, and by Cheryl Lundvall, who at 5'10" played well around the basket. In the tournament Jan Kruger led the team in rebounding and also scored well in their come from behind wins over Warner Pacific College and Concordia College. Most of the players will be returning to Northwest, so the future looks good for Coach Brodin and her team.

WORLD HUNGER AND THE CHRISTIAN

Dr. Daniel Pecota, professor of Greek and theology, recently participated in a significant gathering at Western Washington State University. A conference, sponsored by the various Christian groups on campus, had the theme, "A Christian Response To World Hunger." Dr. Pecota was the principal speaker, addressing the group three times and participating in a panel discussion with several seminar leaders. In addition to the plenary sessions and several films, there were seven seminars that dealt with the various aspects of the problem of world hunger.

His purpose, he says, was to present the Biblical-theological basis for a Christian concern. That purpose took two directions. First, he attempted to show that of the world views one may adopt, the Judeo-Christian view is the only one that has a "built-in" concern because of its high view of the nature of God and of man. Secondly, he pointed out the kind of life-style the Bible calls for, *i.e.*, dependency on God, simplicity in one's own living and service to others. He reports that he was personally challenged by the experience and expresses great appreciation for the leaders of the conference and for those who contributed to his own life.

42ND COMMENCEMENT TO HONOR 126 GRADS

The high point in the careers of 126 candidates for graduation at Northwest College will be observed in the College's 42nd Commencement on May 28.

Commencement speaker will be Dr. John Mostert, Executive Director of the American Association of Bible Colleges. Baccalaureate speaker will be a well-known figure in the Northwest District of the Assemblies of God, and in the national leadership, the Reverend D.H. McLaughlin. Rev. McLaughlin, who served as pastor and District Superintendent in the Northwest District until 1959, will be honored by the College with the conferral of an honorary doctorate at the Commencement exercises.

The occasion will primarily honor 126 graduates of the class of 1978. The Registrar office reports that the roster includes 77 candidates for the B.A. degree, 2 for the Th.B. degree, 1 for the Diploma, and 46 for the A.A. degree.

The Baccalaureate service will be held in the College Chapel at 7:30 p.m. on Saturday, May 27, and the Commencement in the Pavilion at 3:00 p.m. on Sunday, May 28.

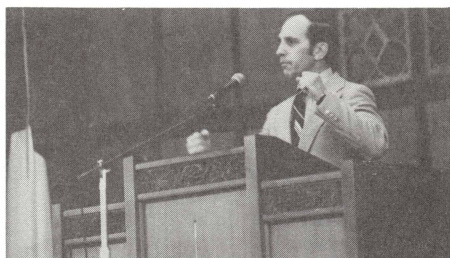

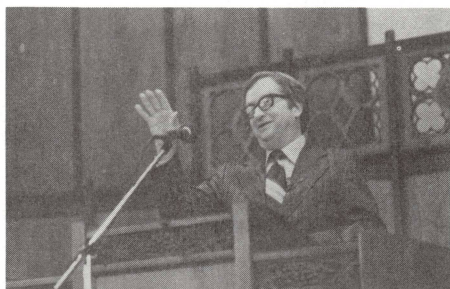

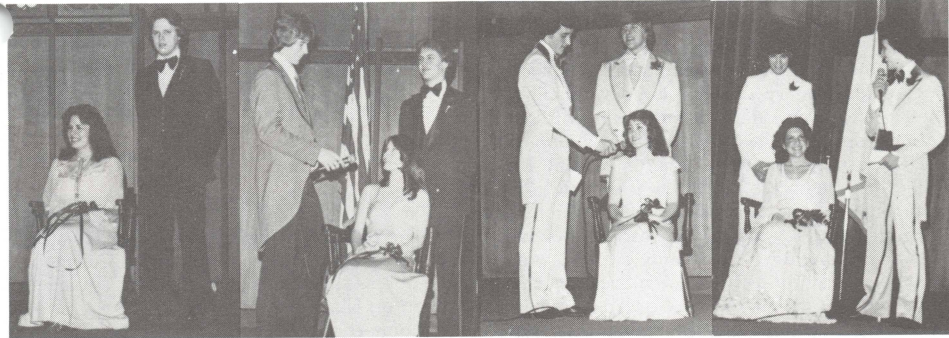
