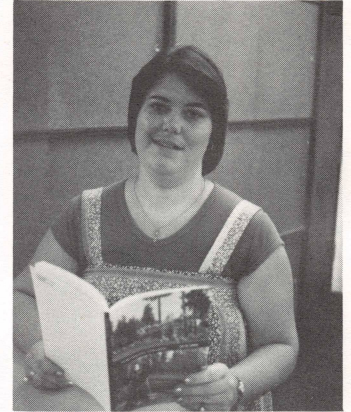
So this is why I'm so excited about each new year — watching the unfolding working of the Holy Spirit in students' lives — making ministers of them, and working with Him!

As you read these lines, the year will just be getting under way. Breathe a prayer for the faculty, the administration, and the students of N.C., and ask God to give us a great year!

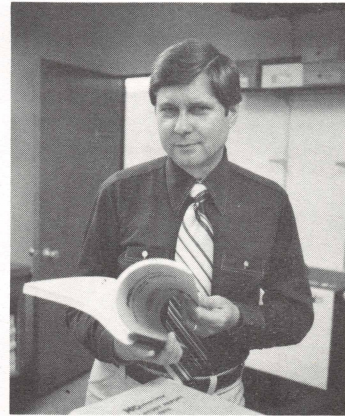

Accreditation Self-Study Completed

At long last, the 150th copy of a 150 page Self-Study Report which has engaged the Academic Dean and his secretarial help much of the summer is completed. This marks the end of a full year of self-evaluation for Northwest College in preparation for re-examination by the Northwest Association of Schools and Colleges, the regional accrediting body, this fall. Northwest College has been a fully-accredited member of NASC since 1973.

Now that the self-study process is completed, copies of the Self-Study Report will be mailed to members of the accrediting association's evaluation team and commission on college accreditation. An evaluation team composed of educators from various parts of the Northwest will visit NC's campus October 30-November 1 and make a report of their findings to NASC's College Commission. Early in December the College Commission will consider Northwest College's Self-Study Report and the evaluation team's report, question the College's President and Dean in person, and then determine NC's continuing accreditation status. The College is hoping to receive an extension of its accreditation for a period of at least five years.

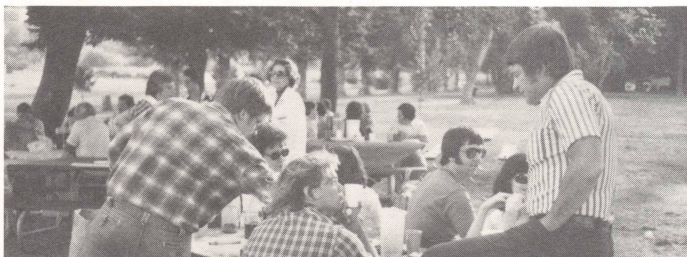

SUMMER SCHOOL FIGURES ANNOUNCED

Over eighty students were enrolled in the College's second Summer School session this past June. The student enrollment is slightly higher than that of last year. Men students outnumbered women by two to one in the summer school stats, and the predominant student classifications were juniors and seniors — 68%, followed by sophomores — 17%, and freshmen — only 9%. The distribution follows closely the survey figures coming out of earlier studies to determine possible enrollments and subject matter. Plans are underway for the College's third annual Summer School session, slated for June 4-29 of 1979.

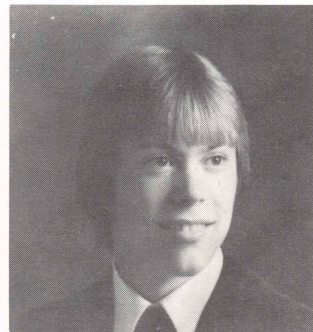
One "missionary kid" told the P.R. Director that he has crashed the picnic every year except one since 1973. It was obvious that he and everyone else enjoyed the great variety of food.

NEW RECEPTIONIST



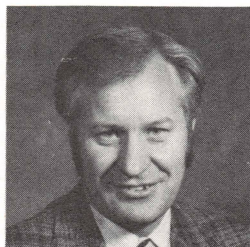

AGE LEVEL AT COLLEGE RISING

Studies by the Registrar's office show a rising trend in the average age level of the student body at Northwest College over the last five years. The average all-school age level in 1973 was 21.04. In 1977 it rose to 21.92, or to a level nearly up to 22, which is normally the age of college seniors if the starting age level in the freshman year is age 18.

The average age of freshmen in 1973 was 19.64, which rose to 20.06 in 1977. During the same period, sophomores' ages rose from 20.86 to 21.87; juniors from 22.60 to 23.72; and seniors from 22.60 to 25.56. It is in the senior category where the jump is most pronounced, the statistics show. In summary, it can be said that the age levels of students enrolled at the College have increased slightly, but steadily over the last five years—possibly reflecting a new trend in higher education towards greater number of adults in ratio to teenagers who are going back to college.

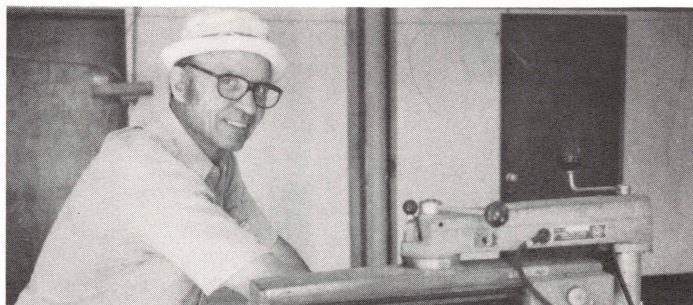
YOUR GIFT COULD BE DOUBLED

Several companies have recently indicated that they have a matching fund program for college contributions. It works in a very simple way. Just recently, we received \$1,025 from the Boeing Company in matching funds. \$210 from Kraft Company, which is also a matching fund.

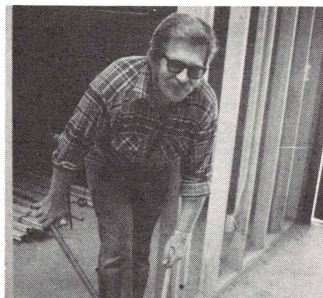
The Boeing Company inaugurated this plan this year. Their second deadline for applications will be December 15.

Money Can Help

There appears to be an increasing concern over the meeting of college expenses. Students are taking more advantage of the federal aid programs available to them as Northwest College students. Approximately 40% of NC students received financial aid in 1977-78. The average federal aid award was \$1,023. It is anticipated that over 300 students will be eligible to receive federal aid during the 1978-79 academic year.

Northwest College students are eligible to apply for the Basic Educational Opportunity Grant, Supplemental Educational Opportunity Grant, College Work/Study, National Direct Student Loan, and the Guaranteed Student Loan. Students may be eligible to receive up to \$1,600 in Basic Grant alone in 1978-79. The College also offers institutional scholarships and loans, as determined by scholastic ability and/or financial need. It is important to note that a student must maintain satisfactory progress in order to keep receiving financial aid once he is determined to be eligible.

Many students would not be able to attend college without financial aid. In a recent survey of 1976 college graduates, it was found that students who received financial aid were more likely to finish their education than students who did not receive financial aid. This attitude is reflected in a letter received by the Northwest College financial aid officer that reads in part; "I would like to express my gratitude for the financial aid I am receiving to forward my education at Northwest College for the academic year 1978-79. Without your help, my educational career may not have been continued."

Northwest College has a financial aid staff that works closely with its students to help meet their individual financial needs, as determined by the College Scholarship Service and the financial aid office at Northwest College. The Financial Aid Form, which is submitted to College Scholarship Service, as well as the institutional application for aid, forms the basis of determining the student's financial need. To obtain these applications, contact the Financial Aid Office at Northwest College.

Just off the press are full-color brochures detailing each of the College's 1979 Flying Seminar tours to the Holy Land. Both the March and the summer tours will have some special features in addition to a comprehensive itinerary of the Middle East.

A special feature of the March 8-23 tour will be three days of visit to the cities of the Seven Churches of Revelation in Western Turkey. Its Middle East itinerary will include visits in Israel, Damascus, Amman, and Petra, but the emphasis will be in Israel—especially Jerusalem.

The special feature of the summer tour, June 21-July 6, will be a four-day cruise of the Greek Islands following visits to Athens and Corinth and the same itinerary in the Middle East as will be taken by the March tour.

Leading the March tour will be Dr. D.V. Hurst, College President, together with Dr. Frank B. Rice, Academic Dean at the College. Dr. Amos D. Millard, who serves as instructor and coordinator for the Flying Seminar program at the College, will lead the summer tour. Interested friends are invited to write the College for copies of the brochures—each of which gives a detailed outline of the proposed itineraries. The College's instructional services are given as a special service without charge to those participating in the Seminars.

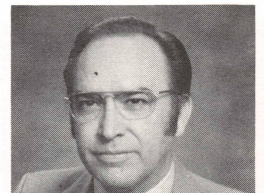
FOUNDER'S FUND LUNCHEON October 5, 1978

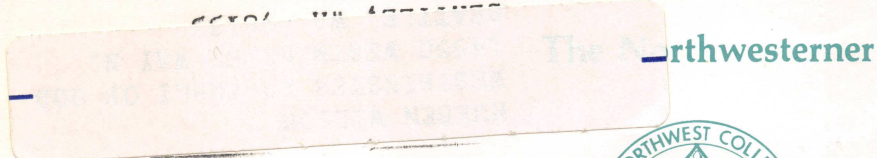
