From The President

MASTER PLAN APPROVED BY CITY

A Master Plan which projects future development of Northwest College's 55-acre campus was recently given approval by the Kirkland City Council with some minor modifications. The Plan projects a traffic system, campus beautification, as well as the development of new facilities in the forseeable future.

The Master Plan is the product of a long process of work by the Campus Planning Commission after which it came under review and hearings by the City Planning Office, the Houghton Community Council, and finally by the Kirkland City Council.

The Council's action is significant and has the effect of creating proper zoning for the College and for the future development of the campus without further public hearings—unless there is a major change from the Master Plan. Dr. Hurst points out that this provision is also important in the light of hearing procedures tied to the environmental impact trend of the day. A clock tower planned for the upper campus will require public hearing when designed. Significant in the approved plan will be a provision for three entrances onto the campus from the south side of the campus, and a provision for dense buffering primarily on the north side of the campus.

Some developments in current planning, which are part of the Master Plan, will include the Administration-Faculty complex, married student housing, an athletic field, a new main entrance to the campus from 108th Avenue, and other related developments.

The College is currently finishing new classroom and office facilities on the first floor of the Library building, and the development of eight additional rooms in Perks Residence Hall for women students.

The newly approved Master Plan not only clears up some legal hurdles to future development but intrinsically provides for future development as growth of the College requires in an orderly and programmed manner, Dr. Hurst points out.

OREGON SUPERINTENDENT: "Blessing and Brokenness"

Reverend Earl Book, District Superintendent of the Oregon District Council of the Assemblies of God, was the featured speaker at the Northwest College convocation, marking the official opening of the 1978-79 school year.

In a moving message that claimed the attention of a capacity audience of faculty and students in the College's C. E. butterfield Chapel, the District superintendent spoke about "Brokenness and Blessedness." The eloquence and power of his words made their appeal to the spiritual consciousness of his hearers, holding them in rapt attention in a manner which almost seemed unusual to observers who were present.

Starting with the theme of the Lord's Supper, a feature of the Convocation Service, the Superintendent reminded the listeners that Jesus blessed and broke the elements representing his body, as He did when He fed the multitudes and in experience on the cross and resurrection. Finally, the Superintendent spoke of a time coming when the Christian experience will be brokenness no more, but final triumph and blessing.

Dr. D. V. Hurst, College President, kept a 43-year-old tradition going by directing the Convocation Service. Guest musicians were Mrs. Joy North Burchett and piano accompanist, the Reverend Mr. Donald P. Galloway, minister of Music at the First Assembly of God Church in Tacoma, Washington.

FALL ENROLLMENT SETS NEW RECORD


Fall quarter enrollment at Northwest College broke all previous records when the College registered 727 students for the quarter. The fall enrollment figure is not only an alltime record, but it is the 17th consecutive quarter that the College has experienced a record enrollment for a respective quarter.

The previous all-time enrollment record was experienced last year during the winter quarter when the enrollment reached 707 students. Freshman enrollment is up almost 9% over last year, while over-all enrollment is up by almost 5% over last year.

A profile on the new students developed by the Admissions Office reveals that new students came from 30 states lead in order by Washington, Oregon, Idaho, Montana, and Alaska—and from seven foreign countries.

Grade point averages earned by the incoming students this year are up over last year, the office reports, with 86% of the new applicants holding grade averages of 2.5 or above compared with 76% one year ago. At the same time, 60% of the groups earned grade averages of 3.0 or better, compared with 47% one year ago.

An increase in the number of transfer students is also noted by the Admissions Office. The study reports applications from 140 transfer students compared to 119 one year ago.

They joined an elite group of students selected from more than 1,000 institutions of higher learning in all fifty states, the District of Columbia, and several foreign nations.


Outstanding students have been honored in the annual directory since it was first published in 1934.

WORKSHOP TO EXPLORE RECENT DISCOVERIES



Biblical Archaeology is one of the fields of investigation that has had a phenomenal development in modern times. "Recent discoveries in the Middle East", will be the special topic for a lecture series with Dr. Robert A. Cooley, wellknown Assemblies of God scholar, who has himself conducted recent excavations in the Delta region of Egypt in what is known to Bible students as the "Land of Goshen."

Dr. Cooley also worked with the late Dr. Joseph Free, of Wheaton College, in excavations which brought to light the ancient biblical city of Dothan. It seems significant that Dr. Cooley's field work starts with the exit point in Israel where Joseph was sold as a slave to traders who took him to Egypt, and that his most recent work has to do with an area in Egypt from whence the Exodus from Egypt took place after some 400 years of Hebrew sojourn there.

The one-day lecture series is set for April 17th and will provide a prime opportunity for pastors, lay persons, college students, and teachers to gain insights on up-to-date research surrounding the Bible today.

The seminar is one of a series of workshops and seminars sponsored by the College in its continuing education series for the updating and enrichments of its students, faculty, pastors and friends of the College.

Professor Jack Dorwart



His license plate reads "JULY 4", for Jack Dorwart was born on his country's Independence Day. Somehow this seems appropriate for the man who has taught all of Northwest College's American Literature courses and most other English courses since 1966. In fact, it seems to have set the tone for his whole life. Collector and scholar of Americana, he enjoys traveling to historic and literary sites along the Eastern seaboard when possible, and taking special courses or seminars relating to the history and literature of the American colonies on site. His young son, "Nat", is the namesake of the famous American author, Nathaniel Hawthorne.

Motivated by a desire to contribute to the training of future ministers, Jack and his wife, Barbara, moved west from Pennsylvania to Washington in 1966 to join NC's teaching faculty. Barbara taught in the public schools in Kirkland until the coming of their first child last year. Since joining the NC faculty, Jack has taken a second masters degree at the University of Washington. He had previously received the B.A. degree in Bible from Central Bible College, and an M.A. in English from Bradley University. His latest degree emphasized oral interpretation of literature.

He teaches Sunday school or fulfills other leadership roles as needed in his church. He believes in working hard at worthwhile tasks and his students know he expects the same of them.



1979 Flying Seminar Information



Why is the western wall of the Temple Mount in Jerusalem so sacred to Israelis today? It marks the closest proximity to the location of the Holy of Holies of the ancient Hebrew Temple. Excavations below the level of the pavement in this photo reveal that the wall reached down to a depth equal to the visible portion of the wall in the picture. It was here where 200,000 Israelis celebrated the Jewish Feast of Shevouth in so dramatic a manner in June, 1967. It was also here where Rabbi Goren blew the Shofar when Jewish soldiers retook the old city of Jerusalem and declared, "The Messianic Age has begun." The wall prophetically symbolizes the hopes and dreams of the Jewish people ever since the fateful day on the 9th of Ab, (August) – almost two milleniums ago-when the Temple and the city were destroyed by the Romans under Titus. It will be one of the most significant visitor points in the College's coming Flying Seminars to the Holy Land in March and in June.
