PRESIDENT HURST BECOMES KIRKLAND'S FIRST CITIZEN







He talks . . .



He acts . . .

Northwest College President, Dr. D.V. Hurst, became the City of Kirkland's "first citizen" as a result of his election to the post of mayor of the Lake Washington municipality recently.

Dr. Hurst's role as a churchman and college president has found a favorable reception among the community's elders especially as they have observed his constructive and active role in community leadership in various capacities over the past several years.

Dr. Hurst points out that the mayor's post does not re-

quire the same degree of time and responsibility as does the mayor's post in many cities because the city operates on a City-Manager form of government. The guiding hand of the Mayor and the City Council, are, however, important factors in setting the directions of the future in the 18,000 population, Lake Washington city which occupies one of the most scenic settings on the Lake.

Dr. Hurst received the endorsement of some of the city's former mayors and community leaders; among whom is former mayor Bill Woods, a Kirkland pharmacist and businessman who said of him, "He brings the leadership qualification that has been there in the past, and I think that is important." He added that "most important, Kirkland mayors in the past have been peopleoriented," and he finds this trait in the new mayor, saying, "I am pleased as a former mayor to have that philosophy continue." The former mayor also expressed optimism and expectation for a good working relationship between the Mayor and the City Council.

Expressing essentially the same views another former mayor and Kirkland businessman, Jim Vaux, said, "I

think he is going to do a good job, based on the experience of the past four years on the Council and in his other community involvements.'

In an interview with Journal-American reporter, Robert Goldstein, Dr. Hurst frankly described himself as a "churchman" . . . who has been President of the churchrun Northwest College since 1966, adding that "to be candid, I feel too many churchmen think they can't mix political participation with the church life . . . but I believe a Christian life is a whole life and included in the whole is community service."

Mayor Hurst succeeds former mayor Robert Neir, Kirkland's three-term mayor who supported Mayor Hurst's candidacy for the post, it was indicated. Former mayor Neir had declined to run for a fourth term whereupon Dr. Hurst declared his candidacy and was elected by the Council to the post without opposition.

Dr. Hurst's new role will not essentially become more of an "extra-curricular" activity than he has had as a city councilman, since the day-to-day operations of the city are under the professional management of the City Manager, he explained.

When asked if he has any new ideas on how to persuade the owner of the Juanita Golf course to sell the land to the city for a park, Dr. Hurst candidly answered, "If I were telling you from a point of view of the College, I would say I'd pray"...adding, "that's not wrong either . . . I think God is interested in community work too." Perhaps this pretty well sums up the working philosophy of Kirkland's new first citizen: "work and pray."

1980 SENIOR PROFILES PUBLISHED

The Northwest College Placement Committee has just completed publication of its profiles on the seniors who

will graduate from the College in May, 1980.

The purpose of the publication is to make available to District Superintendents, Presbyters, Pastors and to church leaders, a background profile on the College's graduates to assist in their placement pursuant to graduation. Included is information on the student's field of preparation; internship experience; Christian Service experience; family data; long range goals; and vocational training and experience in addition to pertinent personal

As an undergraduate professional ministerial institution the College encourages its graduates to seek placement into ministerial openings upon their graduation. Some, however, will go on to graduate school or seminary for advanced training for special fields of ministry; most will go into the work of the church immediately.

To augment the placement process, the College will also schedule what is known as "Superintendents" Week" on campus February 5-7 during which time the District Superintendents of the five cooperating Districts, which make up the governmental structure of the College, will make themselves available for counseling and interviews with the seniors.

The College's placement program, though considered subsidiary to the spiritual factors of the gifts and callings of God upon the lives of its graduates, has been measurably successful in helping graduates find places of ministry upon graduation over the past ten years.


WINTER QUARTER RECORD

The enrollment for the winter quarter was an all time high for any quarter of enrollment at Northwest College this year. This marks the 21st consecutive quarter of growth which means that N.C. has had seven years of steady advancement in attendance.

This is very significant in light of the national statistics which indicate a decline in college attendance in the United States. We feel that one of the reasons for our increase and continued growth is the revival that is taking place in many of our churches. This revival is reflected in lives of young people who commit themselves to Christian service and Biblical training to round out their education.

REVIVAL-MISSIONARY FIRES BURN AT COLLEGE

The fires of revival, missions, and personal commitment to the Lord burned brightly at Northwest College during the College's winter quarter Spiritual Emphasis week with The Reverend Sam Johnson, missionary to Portugal

Spiritual Emphasis weeks have always been bright spots in the College's calendar, but few have seen a greater response from students than did this one, one observer said. Night after night the chapel was packed, even in the balcony, and night after night students responded to calls

from the firey young evangelist-missionary.

If the thrust of the messages given during what was known as a Missions Emphasis could be found it would have to be expressed in terms of a call to revival, a call to missions, and a call to commitment and personal dedication to Christ

One of the material measures of response was expressed in a special missionary offering for a project in Portugal which saw the students respond with an all-time single record offering of over \$3,000, with a total weekly giving of \$4,800. For students, this was seen as being significant.







On the final morning of the emphasis week series, the bonds of affection for the speaker were expressed by a special "induction" into honorary membership in the College's Alumni Association.

During the week that followed the campus was basking in a bright January sun which was still reflecting the glow of inspiration and sacred impressions that were so vividly etched upon the hearts and minds of so many young people the week earlier. For many these impressions will never fully lift, and no doubt they will follow them from "college halls to lands afar" in the days ahead, as the College's alma mater so eloquently enjoins.

Reflecting upon the week's experience at the College, Reverend Sam Johnson said, "In my 20 years of ministry I have never ministered to a more receptive student body . . . the air seemingly crackled with anticipation . . . the night attendance was amazing as hundreds came . . . the dedication of students and faculty impresses me to consider Northwest College for my own boys, and I will recommend the school to everyone I meet. Our God lives at Northwest."

SUMMER SCHOOL TO FEATURE APPLIED ESCHATOLOGY

Northwest College will offer a second one-week seminar in Applied Eschatology June 2-6 with guest lecturer, the Reverend Dr. David A. Lewis.

The seminar will be in sequence to last year's, but differs from that of an overview of the major prophetic themes of the Bible, to deal with current-day fulfillment of

Biblical prophecy.

In light of current events throughout the world in general, and in the Middle East in particular, this seminar is seen as being of dynamic relevance for all students of

the Prophetic Scriptures.

Dr. Lewis is held in high repute in the State of Israel and is considered by many to be one of the best-informed scholars and spokesmen in the field of Biblical Prophecy in the current church world. He has made nearly 20 trips to the Middle East and serves in key positions of leadership in a number of organizations which support the cause of Israel from the perspective of the prophetic and theological interests of Evangelical Christianity.

Dr. Lewis is very active in the field of Christian journalism and writing. He edits Restoration Magazine and is copublisher of Dispatch from Jerusalem together with Dr. G. Douglas Young of the American Institute of Holy Land Studies in Jerusalem. He has just written and published two books in recent months, The Daniel Factor: A study in Applied Eschatology and co-authored another book on the John Todd Phenomenon.

An ordained Assemblies of God minster, Dr. Lewis received his theological training at Central Bible College and was honored by the conferral of the honorary degree, Doctor of Divinity by the late Archbishop Antonia Dranellow at the College and Seminary of St. Paul in

Rome, Italy.

The Seminar conducted last year at the College enjoyed a high rating and is considered as one of the finest enrichment seminars the College has ever offered. It holds the record for the largest summer-school course enrollment ever experienced at the College with students from Alaska, Washington, Oregon, and Idaho. It is expected that the coming seminar will attract even greater interest because of its focus on current events.

Teacher Feature:

J. Melvyn Ming

Teaching at Northwest College is the fulfillment of a God-given dream for J. Melvyn Ming, enthusiastic professor of Christian education, evangelism, and youth ministries at NC since 1976. While awaiting the open door, however, he had not been idle, but had served capably as minister of youth ministries or Christian education at major churches in Texas, Oklahoma, and Colorado. Students at NC now profit from his experience.

Mel's Christian experience began with his conversion at age six, so he can speak of Sunday school and youth programs as more than theory. As a teenager at youth camp, he was filled with the Spirit. He has been a licensed or ordained minister in the Assemblies of God since his early twenties. Few men have as thorough a knowledge of educational and church trends — a fact which makes him valuable in faculty and district committees as well as in the classroom.

With a B.A. degree from Southern California College and an M.R.E. from Southwestern Baptist Theological Seminary, Mel came to NC with good knowledge of his teaching field. Nevertheless, he plunged into a doctoral program at Drew University soon after joining the NC faculty, and is pursuing it with dispatch.

Students find the requirements challenging in Mel's classes, but they like his thorough preparation and organization. His sense of humor helps, too, and his hearty laugh can often be heard booming from the classroom or the faculty lounge as he shares an amusing anecdote. Add to that his driving enthusiasm for life — whether teaching, preaching, and advising, or backpacking, fishing, and hunting — and you understand why he succeeds and inspires his students to succeed.
