Special Honors



Long faculty tenure at Northwest College was once again highlighted at the College in a significant way when two more of the College's long-term faculty members were honored in a special faculty-board dinner meeting during the Board's winter meeting, February 7.

Honored were Professor Maxine Williams, 30-year veteran faculty member who joined the College's faculty in the fall of 1950 and 25-year veteran, Reverend H.W. Crowder, Director of Development, who joined the College administrative staff in 1955.

While most persons reaching this milestone in their careers would be retiring, this is not the case with either Prof. Williams or Rev. Crowder. Miss Williams is currently teaching part-time, and Rev. Crowder will continue, "full steam ahead."

Commenting on the significance of their long and distinguished records of service, College Board Chairman, Paul A. Gray said to Miss Williams, "Your thirty years here have been most meaningful to the work of Northwest College. Your willingness and good spirit have made you a great asset to the administration and to the students. Those who

know you regard you as an expert teacher. Continuity in faculty personnel is a key asset to any college, and your longevity here at Northwest College is an almost inestimable quality." To Reverend Crowder Mr. Gray said, "Your twenty-five years at Northwest College have been good and productive years. Your involvement in the development of the campus in its earlier years as Business Manager and your continued involvement in its development through the Campus Planning Commission, Budget Committee and special assignments, has placed you in a position as personally touching on our every step of improvement. It must be a gratifying feeling to you to see it as it now is. Your continued involvement in fund raising and other special promotions of the College, likewise, has been extremely productive and helpful. Every moment the economic foundations of the College are being strengthened by your faithful service. It is our hope that there will be many good years ahead wherein you can continue to serve our Lord here at Northwest College."

Founder's Fund Reaches Goal Looks Ahead

On February 4, 1980 the Founder's Fund of Northwest College passed the one million dollar goal, two months ahead of schedule! "F.F. Day" is a big and meaningful day in the development of the College, a day marked by thanksgiving and rejoicing!

The Founder's Fund was first unveiled in a preview luncheon in March of 1977. Present and heartily endorsing the concept were President Emeritus Dr. C.E. Butterfield and Mrs. Butterfield, and Mrs. Henry Ness, wife of the College's first President. The fund was launched in earnest in April 1977 at the 13th Annual Lay Council Banquet, with a goal of one million dollars being set. Friends of the College were urged to commit at least one Founder's Fund share of \$1,000, payable over three years at \$333 per year. Response was immediate and heartwarming. Many who had contributed to previous funding drives (Chapel and Library) responded to this new concept.

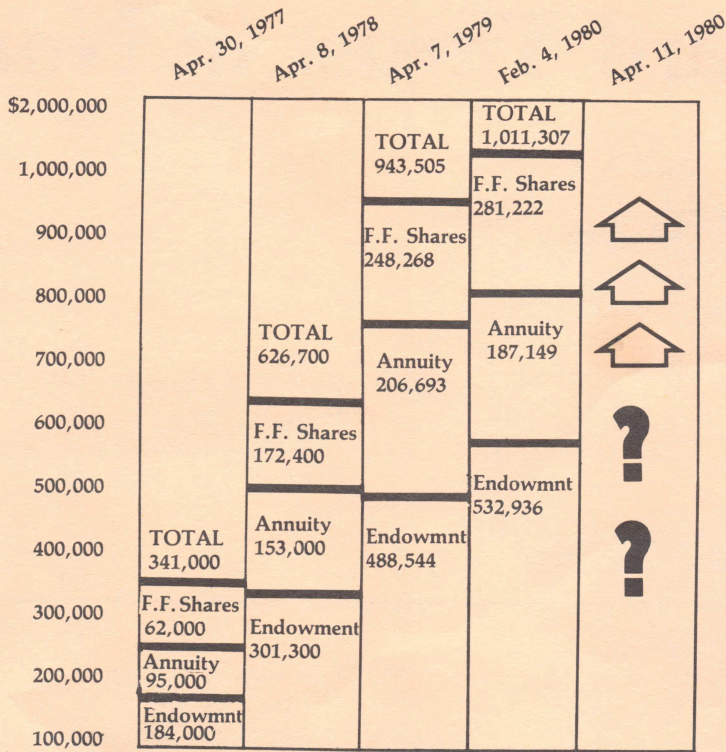
They liked the idea that their gift would not be spent but invested. Only the earnings their gift generated would be spent each year, going into the general operations of the College.

The purpose of the fund was to begin the endowment of the College in order to enrich and undergird the academic programs, to ensure the continuing function of the College, to keep costs to students as low as possible and provide student aids, and to improve faculty salaries.

Contributions to the fund have varied, with a large part being in the form of \$1,000 cash F.F. share gifts. Others have included gifts of land—with the donor retaining the income from the gift for life and receiving a fine tax benefit, as well—and gift annuities, as well as other special kinds of gifts. (Not included in the total but none the less of great significance are many certifications of gift expectancy as individuals have drafted their wills and pledged a portion to Northwest College upon their decease. According to the action of the College Board of Directors these gifts will go to the Founder's Fund in the years ahead and will continue to build the endowment).

The fund continues to move upward. The whole College community is eagerly looking forward to April 11, 1980 when the Lay Council will sponsor its "Friends of Northwest College" Banquet and a report covering the full three year period of the F.F. Drive will be given. "What will the total be then?" is the question on many minds!

Commenting on the Founder's Fund concept on February 4—"F.F. Day," President D.V. Hurst said, "I felt the Lord laid this burden on my heart. I sensed it was the direction Northwest College supporters should go at the time. I particularly remember originally recommending that we set a goal of \$500,000. This would have been in keeping with other drives. But I also remember distinctly sensing God's leading that we should raise the goal to \$1,000,000. I acted to do this although the Board had approved the \$500,000 goal. Thank the Lord, the Board later approved the new goal. And now we've made it!

"Praise God! And this is not the end; the drive continues through deferred giving—wills, trusts, etc., through annuity gifts and other life income gifts. We have two very committed and capable men working full-time in Christian Stewardship and God is blessing their efforts as they help people plan their estate transfers and giving to the work of God. Reverend H.W. Crowder, Director of Development, and Reverend Woodrow Fletcher, Stewardship Consultant, are being used of the Lord. Fruit from their labors will continue to build the Founder's Fund in the years to come—should our Lord tarry. I believe we will see the 5 million and 10 million goals reached! Praise God!"

FORWARD THRUST CAMPUS DEVELOPMENT TO BE LAUNCHED APRIL 11, 1980

Northwest College is growing and developing! The enrollment has continued to climb! Five all-time high records have been set in the past eight quarters! The campus is feeling the pinch. The Chapel is crowded out; the residence halls are "tripling up," and the administrative/faculty office areas are "hurting"—having not been enlarged basically since first built over twenty years ago!

The Board of Directors has carefully studied projected enrollment trends and believes we should build for present enrollment. The Board is working and acting in faith! It believes the growth of the church and the uniqueness of Northwest College will more than offset any projected enrollment declines which some say will occur generally in the 1980's!

The Board of Directors has authorized planning for campus development totaling over 2.5 million dollars. This includes a new residence hall, a greatly enlarged Administrative/Faculty Complex, an enlarged Chapel, a new athletic field, parking and street development and additional tennis courts.

The residence hall will be self-funding. The Administrative/Faculty Complex (already under construction) will be funded by debt service monies released from previous construction already paid for and fees. But the other developments will need to be funded through gifts. Construction will be authorized by the Board of Directors as funds are raised. These Forward Thrust developments total \$333,000 and include:

1. Forward Thrust Project Number One
Enlargement of C.E. Butterfield Chapel now seating 650 to a total capacity of 960. Also enlarged will be the Music Center classrooms and storage facilities. The total cost will be \$163,000.

2. Forward Thrust Project Number Two
Development of the Athletic Field and related street and parking facilities. This is prerequisite to the development of the new main campus entrance pictured on the Master Plan. (The existing athletic field cannot be sacrificed until the new one is provided). This has been described as the "domino" problem in our campus development. Total cost of Project Number Two is \$100,000.

3. Forward Thrust Project Three
The Pavilion Parking Lot and 53rd Street development. This parking lot must be surfaced and a storm retention system installed. Required will be a re-development of the College portion of the street and sidewalks of 53rd Street, the south border of the campus. (Fortunately, the College has had to do very little street development. Most was done prior to acquisition of the site). Total cost of this development—\$50,000.

4. Forward Thrust Project Four
Two new tennis courts located near the Pavilion, serving the needs of P.E. classes and providing additional recreation facilities for students, are a must. The total cost will be approximately \$20,000.

It is confidently believed that the friends of the College who have helped so often, along with new friends, will subscribe to 333 Forward Thrust shares and fund these developments. A Forward Thrust share—as in other funding plans—is \$1,000, payable over three years. Many, we believe, will pledge three shares—one a year. Many others will give five . . . ten . . . fifteen.

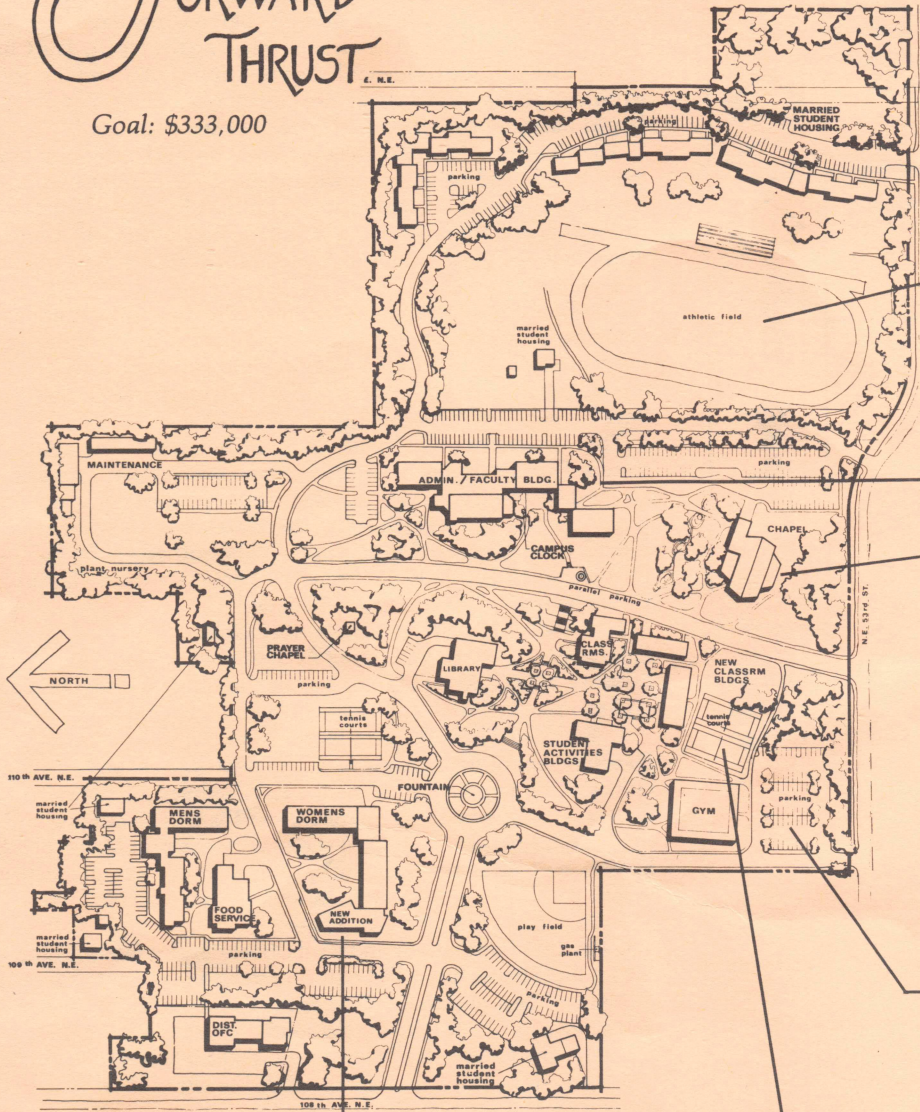
This is a goal well within our reach! If we go beyond the goal, we will be able to think about the new entrance to campus—a development that will dramatically change the campus face!

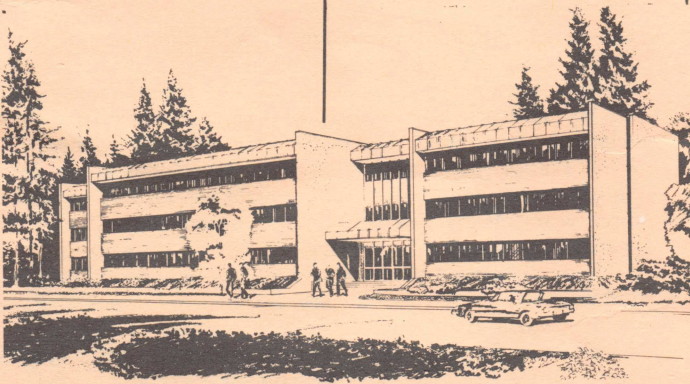

 Enlarged Chapel seating 960 students (now 650) and enlarging Music Classrooms on first floor. Cost: \$163,000

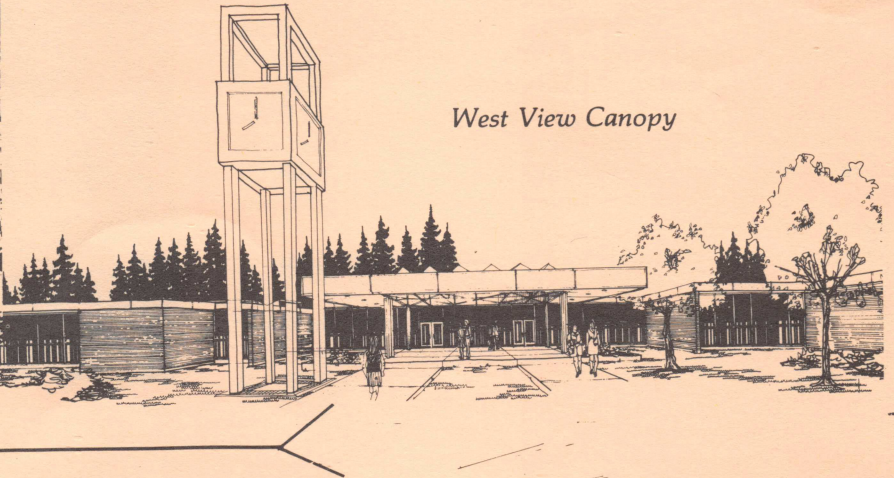
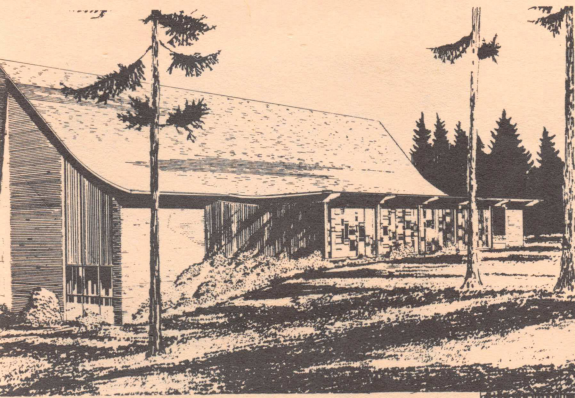

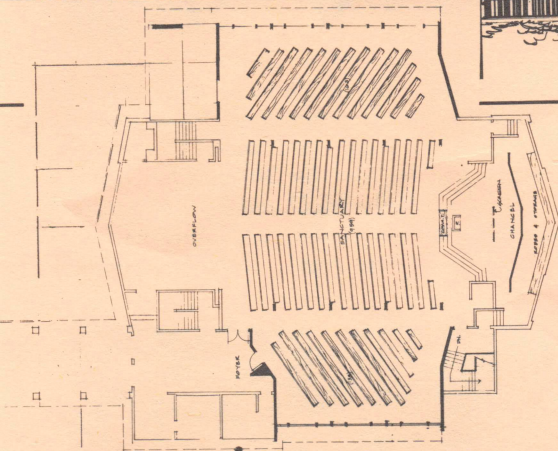

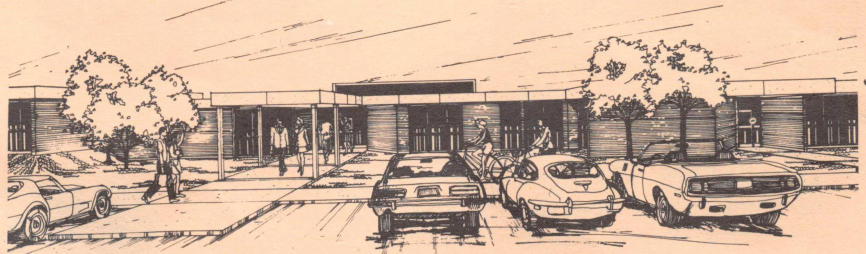

Prophecy Seminar To View World Trends . . .

The College's forthcoming Prophecy Seminar lecture series by the Reverend Dr. David Lewis, June 2-6, will focus on current world conditions and on some practical helps for ministers and laymen who teach biblical prophecy.

The series will be known as a seminar in Applied Eschatology and will focus on such trends as the Presidency in the 1980's, the Holy Spirit and the End-time, the Biological Revolution, Cults and the Occult Spiritism, the World Economy, the Outer Space Connection, and the Middle East. The lecture series will also focus on what Dr. Lewis calls the "Daniel Factor" which will highlight some practical living principles in the light of Biblical Prophecy.

Known for his skills and expertise in preparing and using visuals in the teaching of prophecy, Dr. Lewis will devote one lecture on how to prepare visuals for teaching prophecy.

The series follows in sequence the Prophecy series last year which emphasized basic Bible doctrines relating to the field of Biblical Prophecy, but will stand independent of it. It will be an entirely new series.

The popular series received "high marks" last year from an overwhelming percentage of those who were enrolled for it, and was the College's largest summer school enrollment in the history of its summer schools. The series attracted pastors and laymen from Alaska to Southern Oregon and Montana as well as College students.

Dr. Lewis, who is an evangelist, author, editor, traveler, and consultant on a number of commissions and organizations devoted to Israeli-Christian church relations, is regarded by many to be one of the outstanding observers and spokesman in the field of Biblical Prophecy in the Evangelical Church world today.

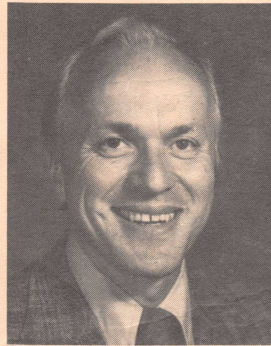
