There is nothing like alumni to tell what a college is all about!

Today in chapel Ken & Linda Benintendi, with their daughter Melody, were special guests. N.C. graduates of 1967, they have been ministering in Taiwan for the past ten years as missionaries from the Oregon district.



They told of visiting mainland China in June and visiting places where they lived as children with their parents, both couples being missionaries to China at the time.

Pungent lines fell from Ken & Linda's lips as they ministered. They told of encountering a missionary couple who sent word back to Linda's parents — "Tell them the seed they planted over thirty years ago has born fruit!" Linda's parents have waited thirty years to know if it were so! What a message to receive!

They told of young Chinese, Timothy, raised in Vietnam who "escaped" to mainland China, was sent to a farm for "reprogramming" but who was desperately needed to teach english and music in a college in the city. Twice he was warned not to talk about his Christian religion but twice he firmly stated he could not make that promise.

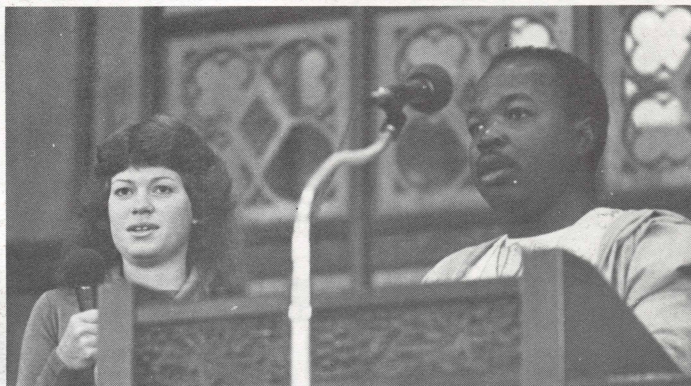
He asked Ken to bring him a cassette tape of special music. He needed the music because he planned to put Handel's Messiah on as a witness using his college choir this Christmas! Again, what a message and what a means!

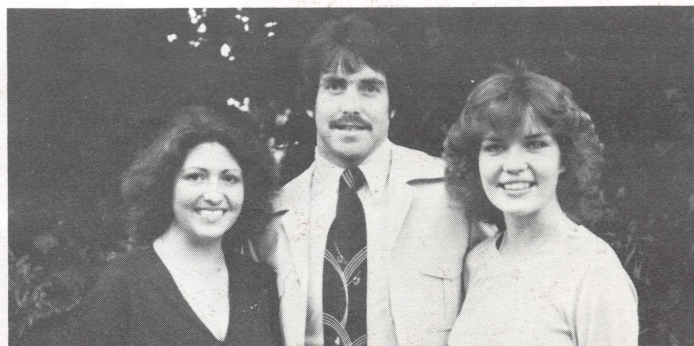

## SATELLITE PASTORS PRESENT ENTHUSIASTIC REPORT

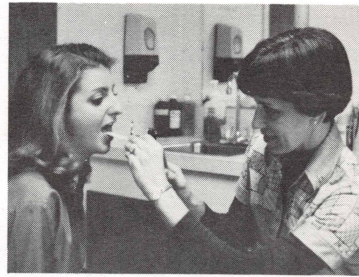


"Enthusiasm for a system" was the clear message that came through to an audience of nearly 800 students, visiting pastor, faculty and administration at Northwest College on October 28th when Pastor Allen Groff and his staff of six satellite pastors presented their story on a relatively new concept in church growth and development. The concept was described as an outreach from the First Assembly of God of Albany, Oregon, through what were described as "satellite" churches founded by the parent church in locations ranging up to 30 miles from the city.

The system came into being under the church's former pastor, a veteran of 26 years as pastor of the Albany church. Following his election to the superintendency of the Oregon District of the Assemblies of God, Pastor Book was succeeded as pastor by Pastor Allen Groff, who took over his charge as senior pastor of the thriving parent church which then had four "satellites" in the area around Albany, a town of 26,000 population. The system continues to grow and the number of satellite churches has grown to six, including a "cross cultural" congregation of Spanish-speaking people with a Spanish-speaking pastor.

In the system, it was said that pastors of the satellite churches are members of the staff of the parent church, complete with pastoral staff meetings each week. Oldest of the satellite congregations known as Central Valley Church, was established ten years ago. Today the church has a congregation of over 200 members.

The workshop at Northwest College in which the Albany pastoral staff were participants, was sponsored by the College's Pastoral Workshop Committee. Future workshops will include the Robert H. Schuller Film Workshop in cooperation with the Northwest District Council of the Assemblies of God on February 9-10, and a Christian Education workshop with Rev. Rodney Towes on March 31st.

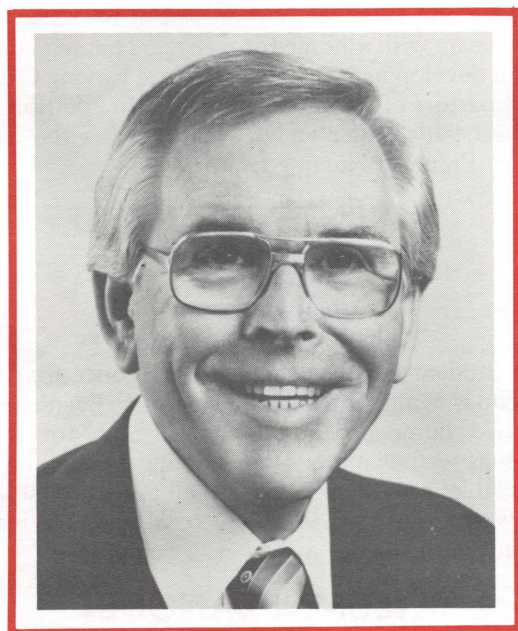

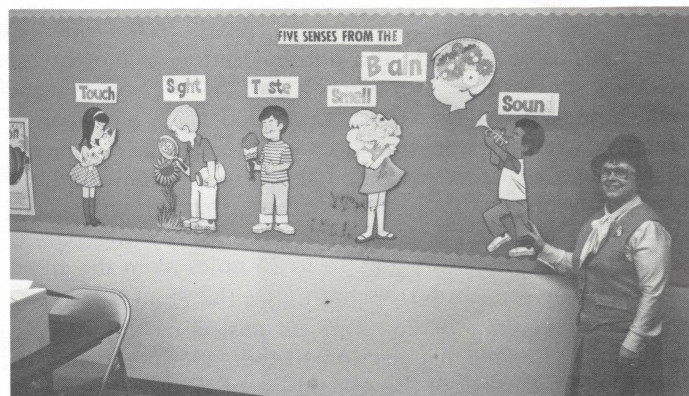

The golden dome in this scene marks the approximate site of one of the most sacred spots to Judaism — the Temple site. Today the huge rock, known as the Rock of Sacrifice, believed to be the spot where Abraham offered up his son Isaac, is covered by the edifice in this photo known as the Dome of the Rock, a Moslem structure, dating to the 7th Century, built by Caliph Abdul Malik. In the times of the ancient Jewish Temple, it is believed to mark the place of the Altar of Burnt Offerings. 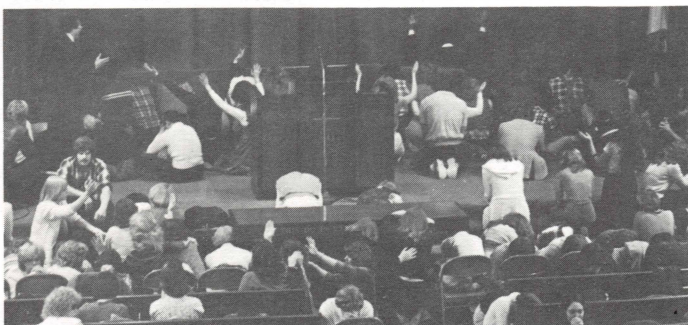
## FALL SPIRITUAL EMPHASIS

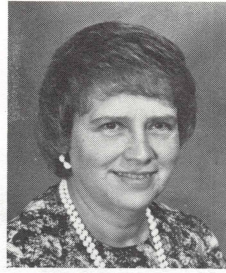
