# From The President

Dr. D.V. Hurst

We broke ground! Construction is underway! We should have the new residence hall by September 1981, in time for the next school year.

And we need it!

Ground breaking was an exciting time. We went from Chapel directly to the site of the new hall the day we announced we were to build and broke the top soil. It will face on the main street running along campus.

There will be 118 beds in the new residence hall. With adjustments in the existing halls, including relocation of the nurse's quarters to a fine facility in the new hall, we will make six more beds available. A total of 124 new beds.

Through most of this past fall quarter there were 119 "extra" students dispersed throughout the existing four halls, residing as third persons in rooms designed for two.

This shows graphically right where the Board of Directors decision rests. Northwest College is building for existing enrollment.

There's much talk about the 80's and declining enrollments in colleges. Some say the decline hasn't hit Washington State yet but it will. The junior high school and high school enrollment profiles underscore this.

However, the Board of Directors, after careful study, believe the growth of the Assemblies of God—the "new birth" rate—will offset this. And Northwest College will continue to develop and at least hold even in its enrollment. To fail to provide for existing enrollment would be to plan to reduce, and this could be a self-fulfilling prophecy!

The new hall will provide a fine reception and communications center for the entire residence complex, a new health center and a resident Dean apartment, in addition to the residence rooms. The entire first floor (basement) will be left vacant at this time. Eventually it will provide a prayer chapel, as well as recreation, storage with student lockers, and snack facilities. It is cost prohibitive now.

We are financing the hall with a bond issue. Over twothirds of the bonds have already been sold. We believe the rest will be sold by the time the monies are needed.

Sincere prayer is needed toward this end!

Any interested in purchasing bonds should contact the President's office.

Northwest College still needs more miracles! We believe they will come to pass in **His** time!

We have placed our feet in the waters as the priests were told to do. We believe we will see the waters divide! And they are!

Again, I urge you to pray with us! Let the word be heard: Northwest College will have 124 additional beds next fall!

### COLLEGE INVOLVEMENT IN AABC

Though Northwest College has dual accreditation by two accrediting associations, the Northwest Association of Schools and Colleges, and the American Association of Bible Colleges, it is maintaining an active role in AABC, it was observed by the College's Academic Dean, Dr. Frank B. Rice.

The American Association of Bible Colleges is the recognized undergraduate accrediting agency for undergraduate theological education in the U.S. and Canada.

Dr. Rice just returned from the annual meeting of the Association held in Chicago and reported to the faculty that the Bible College movement in America and Canada continues to be strong, and that the AABC continues to receive candidates for membership each year. Assemblies of God schools have maintained a level of participation among AABC accredited schools, with this, another A/G school. Trinity Bible Institute received full accreditation which means that approximately one out of every five students in AABC schools is enrolled in an Assembly of God college.

The active level of participation on the part of Northwest College in the Association is evidenced by the fact that its Academic Dean, Dr. Rice, serves on its accrediting commission and its President, Dr. D.V. Hurst has been appointed to serve on a search committee to search for a new Executive Director for the Association upon the retirement of its present director, Dr. John A. Mostert. It was also observed that among member schools, N.C. is the sixth largest in student enrollment.


The denominational "mix" is similar to the pattern which has been observed at the College over recent years.



**FLYING SEMINAR**

### STUDENTS FROM 27 STATES: 13 FOREIGN COUNTRIES

The Registrar's office at Northwest College reports that slightly over one-half (56%) of the College's record 825 students hail from Washington state; the other half come from 26 states of the union and 13 foreign countries.

About one out of five students come from the greater Seattle region and are considered "commuters" while another 36% come from various places in Washington state. Next to Washingtonians, Oregonians are the most populous group of students on campus with 17% (142) or approximately one student out of every six being from Oregon state.

Next, in order of numbers are Montana, 49 students (6%); Alaska, 44 students (5%); Idaho, 36 students (4%); California, 32 students (4%) and the remaining students coming from 21 states ranging from Alabama to Maine to New Mexico, though largely from the Midwest and Mountain states.

The thirteen foreign countries represented on campus include: American Samoa; Australia; Canada; Fiji; Germany; Hong Kong; Japan; Korea; Malaysia; Philippines; Sweden; Switzerland; and Tonga.

The geographical "mix" is quite similar to that of one year ago. It was noted that last year there were larger numbers from miscellaneous states and 1% more students from Washington state.

The mobility of students coming to Northwest College can be attributed to several factors including the College's location, environment, working and student aid opportunities, and the broad base of participation in its operation by six districts of the Assemblies of God-Alaska, Northwest, Oregon, Southern Idaho, Montana and Wyoming.

### SUMMER SCHOOL COURSES ANNOUNCED

Plans for the College's 1981 summer session have been announced at the College. Course offerings will be similar to those offered in recent years and response to student surveys indicating primary areas of interest to be in the fields of Biblical studies, Christian education, and counseling ministries.

Courses to be offered this summer will include: Hebrews, Acts, Methods of Bible Study, Johannine Letters, Daniel-Revelation, Synoptic Gospels, Principles and Methods of Teaching, Child Growth and Development, and Foundations of Christian Education.

A special one-week seminar this year will be the Summer Institute on Scientific Creationism during the week of June 8-12 put on by the Institute of Creation Research of San Diego, California. The Seminar will present an in-depth study of the various areas of science relating to the origin of the universe, the origin of life and man, dating methods, and other scientific information relating to the evolutioncreation question.

The Institute will be bringing in some of the top men in the field of Creation studies research. The seminar is seen as a valuable tool for teachers, students, and laymen. The lectures will be augmented by a series of film features relating to the topics under study. It can be taken for College credit or without credit. Summer school dates for the full session will be June 8th through July 3rd.

Campus Nominating Committees and Editors of the Annual Directory have included the names of these students based on their academic achievement, service to the community, leadership in extra curricular activities and future potential.

They join an elite group of students selected from more than 1300 institutions of higher learning in all fifty states, the District of Columbia, and several foreign nations.

### FACULTY PREPARATION SUMMARY

Although the Masters degree is considered minimal preparation for NC's faculty, and eight teachers have earned doctorates, degrees do not tell the full story of their preparation for ministry to the students they serve. A variety of other experiences have provided strength.

In terms of teaching experience, full-time faculty report 56 years as teachers in public elementary or secondary schools before coming to NC, nineteen years in private schools, and nine years in other colleges. Add to this the 310 years they have taught at NC, and you have a whopping 394 years of teaching experience. (Although the spread is from 2 to 31 years, the average faculty member has been with NC ten years.)

Figures are equally impressive for ministerial experience. The faculty report 145 years of pastoral experience, twenty-three years as missionaries, seven years as evangelists, and forty-two years as chaplains. They have served as ministers of youth (15 years), ministers of Christian education (13 years), and ministers of music (40 years). Ten years as a pastor's wife is also reported.

The NC faculty are products of the local church and have a long record of service and leadership to the churches they attend. More than two hundred years of Sunday School teaching are reported, twenty-five years as Sunday school superintendent, and eight years as Sunday school secretary. They have served thirty-seven years on church boards, twenty-four years as counselors, ten as elders. They have contributed to the church's music ministries some 145 years as choir members, forty-four years as choir directors, forty-six years as song leaders, and forty years as pianists or organists for their churches.

Other church service too multitudinous to calculate was also given. They have sung in special musical groups, served as stewardship chairmen, church council secretaries, or on library committees. They have worked in the church offices, been church ushers, led children's services or VBS, led neighborhood Bible studies, and worked in the various departments of the church and its programs. In short, whatever it is NC teachers tell their students to do, they probably have done it themselves first!


