EXCITEMENT AND THANKSGIVING REIGNED

It was an exciting night. Campus Founders were honored! The Obligation to, "Health, Education and Welfare", pertaining to twenty-three acres of the campus was "burned!" The Founder's Fund share pledges were received as the drive marked its second anniversary—with one year to go in the reach for a million.

At the close of the banquet the Founder's Fund stood at \$943,505.

The big question now is this: "What day will mark reaching the goal of the first million? *What day will be F.F. "V" Day?!*"

Gifts to the Founders' Fund are never spent. They are invested as a perpetual endowment. The earnings they generate go to the operations of the College each year, subsidizing scholarships, faculty salaries, and keeping costs to students down!

This is a way of giving "new birth" to your financial assets. As an endowment the Founders' Fund is designed to undergird the work of Northwest College each year until Jesus comes.

CAMPUS FOUNDERS HONORED

The following Tribute to *Founders and Builders* was read at the banquet by Dr. Frank Rice as the Campus Founders were honored:

"In the history of Northwest College we observe divine principles in action—in the fulfillment of God's purposes, callings, and enabling gifts bestowed upon the men and women who have served Northwest College.

The Apostle Paul said it thus: 'According to the grace of God which is given unto me, a wise masterbuilder, I have laid the foundations, and another buildeth thereon. But let every man take heed how he buildeth thereupon. For other foundation can no man lay, than that is laid, which is Jesus Christ.' (I Cor. 3:10)

In this Biblical statement, articulating how works such as Northwest College are built, three necessities may be discerned. *First*, the Foundation—none other than Jesus Christ—meaning that His work of Redemption affords the singular purpose and basis of our existence. 'No other foundation can be laid than this.' *Second*, the Masterbuilders—the founders or first builders in human terms. The Masterbuilder's function is to lay an institutional foundation. They are the 'pioneers'—men given a measure of the grace of God, a *charisma* of enabling vision, insight, and ability to get the work started. *Third*, the on-going Builders in the work—'another buildeth thereon.' The work of building continues, but must be done with caution adhering to the original foundation and plan—'Let every man take heed HOW he buildeth thereupon.'

These three phases are clearly discernible in the history of Northwest College:

Christ is our eternal foundation. Apart from the great redemptive truths of Calvary and the redeeming outflow of the Cross, we would have no existence. 'Other foundation can no man lay.' Our purposes and message flow out of this truth.

The Masterbuilders of our college were those pioneers who were raised up and inspired with vision by God. He gave them enabling grace and power to bring this institution into being in a manner consistent with its foundation, Jesus Christ.

Since then the on-going development of the institution has been committed to those designated by Paul as *builders*—‘another buildeth thereon.’ The passing decades show the sequence’ The 1930’s were the founding phase, involving the Northwest District Council and Dr. Henry H. Ness, Northwest College’s first President. The 1940’s saw the confirmation and solidification of the basic pattern established in the founding. The 1950’s were clearly marked as the expansion phase—the Board was organized, the Faculty was upgraded, the Student Body was organized, the Campus Development began, the Curriculum developed. The 1960’s, likewise, are clearly marked as the building phase. The newly-acquired campus saw rapid development. The curriculum was further developed to keep pace with new times. The 1970’s have been marked by growth and continued development. They have seen significant professional development, the achievement of academic excellence, continued curricular development, Master planning and development of the campus, and development of financial support and endowment. And throughout the process the caution has been heeded—‘Let every man take heed *how* he buildeth.’

In the work of building, values come into perspective—‘gold, silver, precious stones, wood, hay, stubble.’ The materials—representing the *how* of building—range from the most lasting of mineral elements down to the most ephemeral of vegetation. This brings us to the final phase—testing, symbolized by fire. ‘If any man’s work abide which he hath built thereupon, he shall receive a reward.’

Within this Biblical framework of counsel and caution regarding foundation and building, we find basis for tribute to the Campus Founders of Northwest college, many of whom are present at this banquet. To no small degree, the testing process has already tried the work. The work remains! It continues in the same direction and with the same purposes with which it was founded. It is maturing, growing, developing, and achieving. The foundations remain; they have not been relaid.

So, tonight we honor the Campus Founders and commend them for their work, with gratefulness and thanksgiving to God for the manner in which they heeded the Pauline cautions, building on the work of Northwest college Masterbuilders, and for the way God has enabled their work.”



Carl Douglas, 1956 graduate, was a participant in the Campus Founders’ Celebration. It was Carl who initiated the penny drive in the old Hollywood Temple, which became the first fund-raising project toward the purchase of the new campus. From this significant point of beginning, great things have been accomplished to help perpetuate our mission.

COLLEGE CELEBRATES OBLIGATION RELEASE ON CAMPUS GRANT

April 7 marked an historic event in the history of Northwest College when “obligation burning” ceremonies were held at the Annual Lay Council meeting. This marked the point at which the College fulfilled its obligations to the U.S. Government on 23 acres of the land, which makes up the center of the College campus. The setting was the College Lay Council’s Annual Banquet.

On hand for the gala event were present and former officials of the College and its governing board, leaders and members of the College’s Lay Council, faculty and alumni. Among the special guests were Dr. and Mrs. Charles Butterfield, President Emeritus—in whose administration the College acquired the present campus property; and Mrs. Henry H. Ness, wife of the founding president of the College. A special tribute was given to persons associated with the College who were identified as “Campus Founders.”

The ceremonies marked fulfillment and release of all obligations on the 23-acre portion of the campus received in grant from the Government in 1958. Terms of the grant called for development and use of the property as an educational facility over a twenty-year period of time, during which time credits were earned by the College.

Presiding over the ceremonies were College President Dr. D. V. Hurst, who announced that unlike current property grants, this one has been accorded full waiver against reversion.

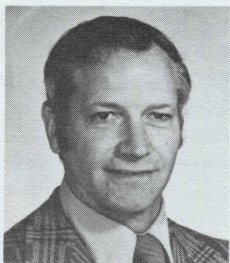
Participating in the historic burning ceremonies were former chairman of the Board, Dr. D. H. McLaughlin; former secretary of the Board, Ralph M. Phillips; former chairman of the Board and Planning Commission, Reverend R. J. Carlson; Director of Development, H. W. Crowder; and Dr. Charles E. Butterfield, President Emeritus. It is noted that the grant comprises only about 40% of the College’s land holdings. The remainder was purchased by the College. Today the campus and its holdings have a replacement value of well over eight million dollars.

Orville Clark

Orville Clark was first a part-time instructor, then Dean of Students, and now is full-time teacher of Sociology and Psychology at Northwest College. Even before he joined the faculty in 1971, his wife Jean was serving as nurse at N.C.

Although his quiet humility might make it easy to overlook him, few men command as much respect as he does—from students and from his colleagues. They know that his warm friendliness and understanding are blended with polite firmness when required. Without calling attention to himself, he "gets the job done."

Before joining N.C.'s faculty, Orville had already acquired breadth of experience well-suited to his current responsibilities. He had directed Christian education, youth, and music programs as Assistant Pastor; served as chaplain to problem adolescents at a Children's Farm Home; and served as a Senior Pastor. He had earned Bachelor of Arts and Master of Arts degrees at Willamette and Oregon State Universities, after completing his Bible college studies.

Scientific and Biblical principles are well integrated in Orville Clark's classes, so that human behavior finds its explanation in terms that are understandable and that ring true. This is good preparation for a modern world in need of direction.

SPRING QUARTER

19th Consecutive Record

A new spring quarter enrollment record was set at Northwest College, according to the Registrar's office. 666 students were enrolled for the quarter, a figure which compares with 632 one year ago. The enrollment figure is an all-time high for a spring quarter and marks the 19th consecutive quarter when such a record has been set at the College.

College records indicate that contrary to predictions of declining enrollments for private colleges, Northwest College has experienced steadily climbing enrollments.

"We must be doing something right," College President, Dr. D.V. Hurst, commented today. "Perhaps, 'doing something right' is a matter of working at quality education in a Christian frame of reference—a task which requires maintaining fidelity to the College's institutional calling under the direction and purposes of God and of keeping pace with the developing needs of the work of the Church in today's changing world. The task of training workers for the Kingdom of God has never been greater," the energetic President observed. "This is where we find our area of strength and calling."

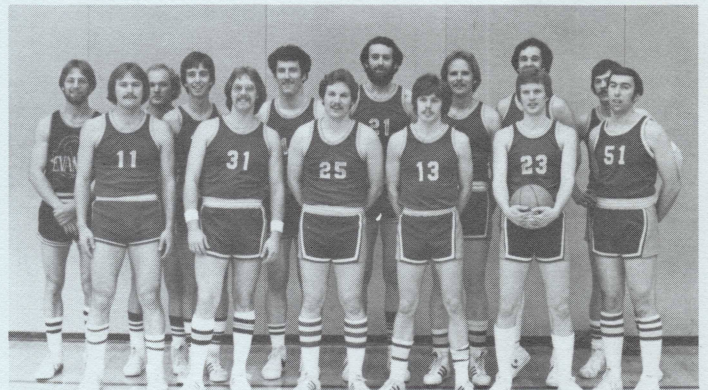

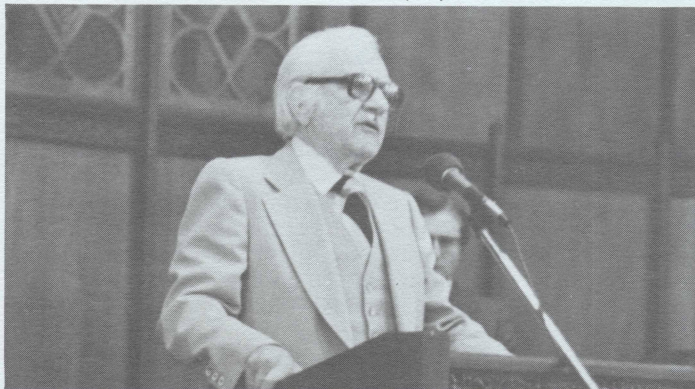
