SPIRITUAL EMPHASIS SPEAKERS ANNOUNCED

An integral part of the school year at Northwest is a series of special weeks — one each quarter, known as "Spiritual Emphasis Weeks." The heart of the week finds its setting in the College chapel where the ministry of special guests is shared with students and faculty and when the special quest is for the ministry and moving of

the Holy Spirit.

Speaker selections for the 1979-80 school year were announced today by College President, Dr. D. V. Hurst. Coming for the Fall Emphasis Week, October 1-5, will be well-known Denver Pastor, Dr. Charles Blair. Coming for the Winter Missionary Emphasis Week, Jan. 14-19, will be the missionary dubbed, "The Giant Killer" the Reverend Sam Johnson, the youthful, yet veteran of the mission field, newly appointed field represented for Europe. Rev. Johnson has been ministering in Spain for the last several years.

Coming for the Spring Spiritual Emphasis Week, March 31-April 4th, will be the Reverend Dr. Murray McLees, well-known pastor of the Willamette Christiar Center in Eugene, Oregon. The Reverend Dr. McLees har completed doctoral programs with two graduate schools—the California Graduate School of Theology, and more recently with the University of Oregon where his doctoral dissertation was singled out for special commendation.

Leading the weeks as the spiritual leader of the college community will be President Dr. D. V. Hurst. Services will be held each morning at 9:20 a.m. and each evening at

7:00 p.m. The public is cordially invited.

SUMMER SESSION: NEW RECORD!

A new record in summer session enrollments was established at Northwest College, the Registrar's office at the college reported. A total 140 students were enrolled, including 28 auditors, the report indicated. One of the key attractions was the seminar in Biblical Prophecy during the first week of the session which was offered by Dr. David Lewis. Another significant component of the summer enrollment picture was that of the summer internships. A total of 30 students were enrolled in summer internships ranging in locations from Takaoka, Japan; to San Salvador, El Salvador; to Barcelona, Spain; to Fiji in the South Pacific; to Erzhausen, West Germany in Europe. A number of pastoral and Christian Education students are pursuing internships in the Pacific Northwest and Alaska.

Total summer enrollment was up a sharp 32% over one year ago. This was the college's third summer session. Dates for the 1980 session are set for June 2-27.

Students enrolled in the summer session reported that they liked it because of its concentrated "down-to-business" pattern and because of the more personalized student-teacher ratio that summer classes offer.

NEW FACULTY APPOINTMENTS ANNOUNCED

Three new faculty appointments for the 1979-80 academic year, were announced by Dr. Frank B. Rice, Academic Dean of the college. The first appointment is that of the Rev. Wayne C. Werner, who will be teaching in the fields of Music and Christian Education. Originating from Ontario, Canada, Prof. Werner is a graduate of Eastern Pentecostal Bible College; Oral Roberts University and most recently from Trinity Evangelical Divinity School where he received the Master of Divinity Degree. He has served as Minister of youth and music, as pastor, as an associate pastor, and as a Bible College instructor.

Also appointed was Mrs. Judy Nicholson, Werner, wife of Prof. Werner. Mrs. Werner received the B.M.E. at Evangel College and the Master of Music Degree at the University of Missouri in Kansas City Conservatory of Music with a major in Performance Piano. Her teaching experience has been at Evangel College, Continental Bible College, the Jack Benny Center for Arts, and the Zion Conservatory of Music. She has also served as a church choir director. The Werners have two children and will be coming to Northwest from Lake Bluff, Illinois.

The third appointment is that of Mrs. Ruth A. Petty of Metairie, Louisiana, who will be coming as the College's

new librarian.

Mrs. Petty took her education at Southern California College (B.A.) and at the University of Washington, where she received her masters degree in Librarianship. She has served as librarian in Bandon, Oregon; in Roseburg, Oregon; in Modesto, California; and in Waianee, Hawaii.

The Werner's will supplement the music and Christian Education staff at the College. Mrs. Petty replaces Mrs. Julie Meier, who has served as librarian at the college for the past two years. Mrs. Meier is moving with her husband, Larry who is taking up new employment in Spokane, Washington.

The appointment of an assistant librarian to replace Mrs. Marlee Huber will be made shortly, Dr. Rice reported. Mrs. Huber is leaving the college to take up domestic pursuits after several years of service at the col-

lege.

Leaving the college after 13 years of service on the faculty is Prof. Jack Dorwart. Prof. and Mrs. Dorwart have moved to San Diego to embark upon a new type of educational career at the preschool level together with former speech professor, Dr. Donald Tarno. Prof. Dorwart's teaching duties will be redistributed among the several members of the college's English faculty, the newest member of who is Mrs. Marjorie (Sell) Stewart, alumnus of the college. Mrs. Stewart is currently enrolled in a master's program in English at the University of Washington.

DARRELL HOBSON

Among the younger members of the NC faculty is Darrell Hobson, Instructor of Biblical Literature with special interest in the Old Testament. Darrell is a graduate of Northwest College, having received both the Bachelor of Arts and Bachelor of Theology degrees in 1970. Afterwards, he entered graduate studies at SPU and began teaching at NC on a parttime basis in 1973. Since 1977 he has been a member of the regular teaching faculty.

In conversing with Darrell, one is likely to be impressed with his knowledge of the many authors on Biblical subjects. But his preparation for a teaching career has also included practical experience. While a student, he served several churches as part of their pastoral staffs — a practice he has continued since joining the faculty. He also augmented his income by selling shoes in a nearby department store — a job he commends for the development of patience.

Darrell is very popular with students who have a serious purpose to learn the Bible. Some have called his approach to teaching "new and inspiring." Obviously, he both loves to learn and to teach.

SUMMER INSTITUTE OF LINGUISTICS

This is the fourth summer that the SIL has used the campus as their headquarters for one of three summer sessions. People from several missions groups come each year for training with approximately 20% of the students being a part of or becoming a part of the Wycliff Bible Translators. Course work is taken at the University of Washington with a small number of courses taught at N.C. The students and families use the Northwest College dorms, the cafeteria and the Learning Center. Special times each day are set aside for group devotions as they share together.

Three basic subjects are taught each summer. One is a full course of phonetics, which deals with the principles of formulation of the various speech sounds that the human vocal apparatus is capable of, including tone, intonation, stress, and duration. The second course in Phonological Analyst, which is very involved and the final result is the development of an alphabet. The third course is Grammatical Analysis. Simply stated, this involves the analysis of words, sentences, etc.

JUNE FLYING SEMINAR HAD "VARIETY"

The nineteen members of the Northwest College Flying Seminar to the Holy Land which just returned to campus, chalked over 17,000 miles. They travelled via an unusual variety of travel modes ranging from horseback to jet plane and ship. "Everything moved like clockwork," reported Dr. Amos D. Millard, who lead and hosted the College's 12th Flying Seminar.

The group averaged nearly 1100 miles per day for the 16 day seminar. They covered a variety of Biblical settings ranging from those of the Patriarchs in the Book of Genesis to those found in the geography of the Book of Revelation. They utilized modes of transportation varying from horseback to the fabled city of Petra in Jordananian mountains south of the Dead Sea, to a cruise of the Greek Islands on the MTS Atlantis out of Athens. The greatest number of miles were chalked by air using the famed polar route from Seattle to Copenhagen and thence to Amman, Jordan where the group deplaned for visits to Jordan, Damascus, Petra, and Israel.

Among the highlights of the tour in Israel the groups had opportunity to meet U.S. Senator Henry M. Jackson, in Bethlehem. Senator Jackson was the honored guest of the Israeli Government during the time that the seminar

party was touring Israel.

Concluding the 16-day seminar was a four-day cruise of the Greek Islands which took the seminar group to quaint sea-side Greek villages and historic spots on the islands of Mykonos, to ancient Ephesus in Turkey, to the famed Isle of the Apocalypse, Patmos, Rhodes, Crete, and Santorini, of geological fame for its volcanic eruptions around the time of the Exodus from Egypt. On the return flight the group toured Rome and then onto Copenhagen for its return to Seattle on July 10th.

Among the 19 members of the Flying Seminar party were several teachers and students.

The tour for the coming year is being planned now and will concentrate in the Land of Israel. Tentatively dubbed as a "Dan to Beersheba" tour the itinerary will give special emphasis to biblical, historical, and archaeological sites in Israel including a number of "off the beaten path" places. Dates are set for March 6-20.

There is no plan to schedule a summer tour next year. Interested persons may be put on the College's mailing list to receive monthly bulletins detailing information on the college's tour plans. FOUR JOIN HEAVEN'S ALUMNI CHOIR


