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#### Perspective

Northwest College is a Christian institution of higher learning operated under the control of the District Councils of the Northwest Region of the Assemblies of God. We offer four- or five-year programs on the senior college level aimed at preparation for various forms of Christian ministry and careers, and two-year basic programs similar to those found in community colleges.

### Philosophy

NC's concept of education is distinctively Christian in the evangelical sense. We recognize the authority of the Bible as a divine communication of truth. We view man as having been created by God with intellectual, physical, social, and spiritual potentialities which require development if he is to be a whole person whose life is useful, complete, and satisfying.

History

NC was founded in 1934 in the facilities of Hollywood Temple, Seattle, under the direction of Dr. Henry H. Ness, the first president. The College was originally known as Northwest Bible Institute. In 1949, Dr. C. E. Butterfield succeeded Dr. Ness and, at the same time, the College's name was changed to Northwest Bible College. Then, in 1962, the present name, Northwest College of the Assemblies of God, was adopted, representing a new stage in its development. The College progressed from a three- to a four-year Bible curriculum in 1948, and in 1955 a Liberal Arts division was organized. In 1966, Dr. D. V. Hurst assumed the presidency of Northwest College.

### Accreditation

Northwest College is an accredited member of the Northwest Association of Schools and Colleges and the American Association of Bible Colleges.

We are approved by the Washington State Department of Education for the training of veterans; Department of Justice, for the training of foreign students; U.S. Department of State for participation in the Exchange Student program.

### **Student Body**

NC is small enough to be very personal yet large enough to offer a full, well-rounded program. The Fall 1981 enrollment was 761. These students came from thirty states and fifteen countries, representing twenty-two denominations. The sponsoring organization, the Assemblies of God, makes up 83 percent of the student body.

Campus

NC has a beautiful semi-wooded tract of fifty-five acres. The modern campus has nineteen buildings including the married student apartments, dorm residences, classrooms, administration offices, Student Union Building, library, gymnasium and the Chapel.

### Location

NC is one of America's most beautiful small college campuses, overlooking magnificent Lake Washington and the Olympic Mountains, fifteen minutes from Seattle, Washington, in the Great Pacific Northwest.

**Faculty** 

They are dedicated Christians who are professionally trained. All full-time faculty have a Master's degree and a significant number have attained doctoral level.


### **Athletics**

Northwest College is a member of the Pacific Northwest College Conference and the National Little College Athletic Association. Competitive team sports include men's basketball and soccer, and women's basketball and volleyball. We also have an intramural program involving a large portion of the student body.

### Costs

The 1981-82 charges per quarter are: Tuition \$640 (12-17 credit hours), Room/Board \$548.





### Academic Calendar

NC offers three ten-week quarters (evening classes each quarter), one four-week summer session, one flying seminar, and frequent workshops.

### Student Life

Students come to NC from all around the world. While they are here, they establish friendships that are a source of encouragement and strength for a lifetime. Being surrounded by a caring faculty and student body makes the college adjustment much easier.

The love of Christ is the common bond that enables the NC student to face the pressures of college life. A senior recently shared that NC was a microcosm of the book of Acts, a community working and striving together to be all that God wanted them to be. Yes, student life at NC is exciting and stimulating. Young people are alive in active pursuit of God's best.

Chapel

Chapel is the focal point of life at NC. The daily chapel time provides opportunities to hear well-known speakers from around the world. Faculty members and students regularly share in the ministry of the Word and music. Once each quarter, a week of spiritual emphasis takes place on the campus. These special times are often turning points in the decision-making process during college. The warmth of spiritual commitment combined with rich personal fellowship lends to the development of a well-rounded Christian attitude in life and service.

### **Student Activities**

NC provides many opportunities for involvement. Over ten percent of the student body is in leadership — Associated Student Body (ASB), World Outreach Ministries (WOM), Associated Women Students (AWS), Associated Men Students (AMS), Married Student Association (AMS), and the various class officers.

The greater Seattle area also affords the student unlimited opportunities whether it be sports in the Kingdome, water-skiing on the many lakes, or snow-skiing in the Cascades located only an hour's drive from the campus. The metropolitan area also provides ample cultural and educational opportunities.

**Student Housing** 

The NC students enjoy the beautiful surroundings of a spacious and modern campus. Students are housed in one of the five dormitories; or, if they are married, they may live in the Firs, a 36-unit married-student apartment complex. The lounges in the dormitories are a frequent meeting place for students to enjoy the fellowship of playing a table game, singing around the piano, or just talking.





Financial Aid

We believe at NC that no student should be denied his educational desires because of lack of funds. More and more students and their families are seeking assistance in the form of grants and loans to help meet those costs. The staff in Financial Aid are available to help you sort through the maze of financial aid applications and to give you guidance concerning the type(s) of aid for which you may qualify.

### Eligibility

Eligibility for financial aid is determined by establishing proof of financial need by completing the Financial Aid Form and the F.A. Information Worksheet, both available in the Financial Aid Office.

To apply for financial aid, you must be a United States citizen, a permanent resident, or one who is in the U.S. for other than temporary purposes. You must be accepted for admission to NC and be enrolled for at least six credit hours per quarter.

The best time to apply for financial aid is before the priority deadline of May 1, prior to the fall quarter for which you are requesting aid. You should, however, contact the Financial Aid Office when you first apply to NC, regardless of the time of year, so that the application for aid process can begin as early as possible.

### Financial Aid Available

Approximately half of our students receive financial aid from at least one of the four basic types of financial aid available:

- 1. **Grants** are gift aid and are awarded on the basis of financial need. **No** repayment is required.
- 2. Loans will offer you the opportunity to defer the cost of your education until the completion of your college program. At that time you will be responsible for repayment of the loan at a reduced interest rate.
- 3. Scholarships are available to NC students for outstanding academic performance in high school or for service to NC. Tuition discounts are also available to dependents of ministers and missionaries, student spouses, and ministers, missionaries and their wives.
- 4. Work opportunities are plentiful in the greater Seattle area for NC students. Some on-campus jobs are available through the College Work Study program. State Work Study jobs are also available off-campus for NC students.

### Administration & Faculty

NC is strengthened by the commitment of administration and faculty. The administration is concerned about the welfare of each student and seeks to be known by the student body as a whole

The faculty are known for their personal ability in assisting students to become all that God intends for them. They aren't restricted by having too large a class to offer such help. They have had a great effect on students' lives here at NC.



- 1. Complete the College Application form in ink or typewriter. Be sure that all parts have been answered completely and that it has been **signed.** Mail the application to the College Admissions Office, Northwest College, P.O. Box 579, Kirkland, WA 98033. Enclose with the application the following:
  - (a) A photo or snapshot of yourself (must be submitted even if application is presented in person).
  - (b) The \$15 application fee.
- 2. At the same time, file a request for your high school transcript by addressing a letter or card to your high school records office requesting to have your transcript sent to the College Admissions Office. You may use the clip form at the bottom of this sheet for this purpose.

If you attended a college, you should do the same to have your college record sent to the Admissions Office.

You need NOT have your references sign your application. The College will send reference forms directly to them for completion.

When you have completed the above steps, the College Admissions Office will take care of the remaining procedure until your application has been acted upon. Normally, it requires about two weeks to complete the procedure, depending on how promptly the references respond and on how promptly your transcript is sent to us.


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### **Academics**




### Division of Religious Studies




### Division of General Studies


Today, the professional and business world is very demanding and competitive. Northwest offers a program in general studies that trains individuals and helps them reach their potential while adding Christian ethics and values.

In offering general studies, NC can provide a well-rounded education for all of the students. This is very important in a world that deems knowledge a necessary quality in communication and relationships.


Within the Religious Division majors, the general studies are part of the requirement and may also be used as the personal electives that each student is required to include in their academic calendar.









### Area and Campus Maps
