FROM THE PRESIDENT

Dear Friend of Northwest College:

You can be the key in the life of some young

person!

When I think of motivating and directing young people toward the ministry and directing them toward Northwest College, I'm aware that **you could very well be the key!** You are in a strategic position in relation to some young people. They are looking to you for encouragement and guidance. No one can help us get the message to the young people about the advantages available at Northwest College like you!

Important points you can help us communicate about NC

are:

- 1. NC is your Assemblies of God College. It was brought into being to serve the youth of our region by our church.
- NC is located conventiently to students in the Northwest. Many students find it most convenient to return home several weekends during the school year.
- 3. NC has a broad range of job opportunities all around it. Businesses in the area favor Northwest's students. The employment rate is 95 percent on the east side of Lake Washington, the area where the College is located. Thus, there are excellent job opportunities for our students right in the immediate area of the College, a most important consideration in today's economy.
- NC has the best accreditation available.
 Transfer of credits is the best possible.
- 5. NC has a place for every student who will come. The new residence hall dedicated April 30, 1982, has made it possible for us to say it. NC is on a beautiful 55 acre campus with most new facilities.
- 6. NC has excellent education programs for Bible College students and Junior College students two-year, three-year, four-year and five-year programs. Young people can start at NC and finish elsewhere if they are not planning for full-time ministry. But, their first two years can be in a Bible college setting. If full-time ministry is their goal, they can get as good, or better, a Bible college education as anywhere both B.A. and Th.B degrees are offered and majors include: Pastoral,

Youth Ministries, Christian Education, Missions, Religion and Philosophy (for seminar-bound young people), and Biblical studies. Important, strong **minors** include: Preaching and Speech, Counseling Ministries, Early Childhood Education and there are others.

- 7. NC students qualify for federal and state aids. Our full-time Financial Aids Officer has the latest complete information about these aids and is ready to help young people take advantage of them.
- 8. NC has a highly trained and committed faculty. They have a long record of distinguished service at NC. All full-time and most part-time faculty are Assemblies of God.
- 9. NC graduates are placed in our churches throughout the northwest and around the world. Over 90 percent of the four-year graduates go into full-time service or on to graduate school. The prospects for a young person who enrolls at NC are good.
- 10. Costs at NC are low. A careful study of State university and college costs and private college costs reveals that NC charges are low. Only one private college in the northwest charges less and many of them charge far more. Also, even State university and college total costs are equal to or higher, especially when board and room charges are considered. Also, hidden costs such as work requirements to raise the charges of some, making them even more expensive than NC.
- 11. NC is an exciting place filled with fine Christian young people who are here in obedience to God's call on their lives. The atmosphere is charged with the eternal implications of the fulfillment of that call.

God has helped those who have labored at NC for these almost 50 years now as they have built this slate of advatages for our young people. We believe our Northwest Assemblies of God youth should know about these advantages and should choose to attend NC this fall. Will you help us get the word to them?

I am praying that the Holy Spirit will move all across the northwest in a revival way and recruit young people to ministry. Will you join me in that prayer? Together we can build the program. We can put together a great 1982-83 year for NC and we can see our church move forward for God's glory.



SCENES FROM THE FORTY-SIXTH COMMENCEMENT

The flag-furled colorguard that left Northwest College's Butterfield Chapel at 3:00 p.m. on Sunday, May 31st, led the procession of graduates, including the College's largest graduating senior class to date. The processional was a continuous line, two abreadst, from the Chapel to the Pavilion where it was greeted by a capacity crowd which not only filled the Pavilion but overflowed with over 100 guests on the lawns outside. It was the College's forty-sixth graduating class, and it signaled a new milestone of over 3,000 grads in the School's nearly fifty-year history.

The two-hour ceremony was marked by "Pomp and Circumstances" and a great deal more . . . ranging from the lift of the congregational hymn to the choral tones of the College's "King's Choralons" which reverberated throughout the auditorium. Guest speaker for the occasion was the Reverend Dr. Thomas F. Zimmerman, General Superintendent of the General Council of the Assemblies of God, and himself an alumnus of the College dating to the year of 1964 when the college

conferred upon him an honorary degree.

Climaxing the ceremonies was the conferral of 183 degrees to candidates for the Associate of Arts degree and for the Bachelor of Arts Degree. Perhaps the most suspense-filled moments came when the College honored one of its own "pioneer" members of the faculty, Miss Maxine Williams, with its highest honor, the Doctor of Divinity degree. Miss Williams is retiring from the faculty after thirty-two years of service to the College. Dr. Williams, to whom the honor was unannounced until the ceremonies took place, was also publically honored with a floral tribute on behalf of the whole family by her nephew, son of the late Reverend P. T. Emmett, District Superintendent of the South Dakota District of the Assemblies of God.

Other "high points" of the afternoon came when seven graduates were formally inducted into the Delta Epsilon Chi Honor Society and when three alumni were given the tokens of honorary membership in the same society. Honorees included Dr. Alf Nilsson of Stockholm, Sweden; Mr. Russell Smitchger of Anchorage, Alaska; Mrs. Rose Mary Novak of Portland, Oregon; Mr. Norman Christofferson of Havre, Montana; Mrs. Linda Welk of Nampa, Idaho; Mr. Philip Wiebe of Bellevue, Washington; and Mr. Richard Smith of Kenai, Alaska. Another dramatic moment came when alumni honorees came to the platform

— one in a wheelchair, veteran missionary Miss Pearl Estep of Yakima, Washington. She was followed by Reverend Duane Buhler of Nampa, Idaho, and Reverend Roy Brewer of Arvada, Colorado (represented by Dr. Daniel Pecota of the College faculty).

Among the special notes of the occasion was the announcement that during this commencement the College graduated its 3,069th graduate. Never had there been such a diversity of foreign lands represented in an NC graduating class — ranging from Australia to Sweden, from Hong Kong and Korea to Liberia, Africa, and the South Pacific Islands of Western Samoa and Fiji. Not only did the signs of the times emerge geographically, but in religious backgrounds. Wearing the Prayer Shawl, or tallis, of his Jewish people, Mr. Geoffrey Ugent symbolized a "new day" when many Jewish people, especially those of the younger generation, are finding Jesus Christ as their Messiah.

The grand prelude to this scene was the Saturday evening Baccalaureate service in the College Chapel which brought to the campus guest speaker, Reverend Samuel Benson, pastor of the fast growing First Assembly of God church in Billings, Montana. Pastor Benson spoke to the graduates with the fervor and earnestness of an evangelist as he talked about commitment to the call of God.

Students selected for the Student Life awards are chosen on the basis of Christian testimony and life, citizenship and leadership. Presenting the awards was Dean Rutledge, who noted that these students represent "many fine students on the campus who hold the highest ideals and the finest traditions of Northwest

College.

Top honors for academic awards went to Junior College graduate, David Green of Billings, Montana, while Bible College graduate awards went to students from the Far East and Europe in the persons of Enoch Choy of Hong Kong and to Dr. Alf Nilsson, a medical doctor

from Sweden.

Within the departments of studies, graduates achieving the highest grade levels in their specialization studies were Mrs. Linda Johnston of Seattle, Washington, in Christian Education; Mr. Scott Hadley of Camas, Washington, in Pastoral Studies; Mrs. Rose Mary Novak of Portland, Oregon, in Sacred Music; and Mr. Marty Folsom of Woodinville, Washington in Youth Ministries.

Underclassmen were likewise recognized for academic excellence. They included Freshman students, John Winsted of Evansville, Wyoming, and Barbara Wilson of Seattle, Washington; Sophomore student, David Iull of Bremerton, Washington; Junior student, Wesley Meyers of Kirkland, Washington; and nongraduating senior, Jerry Dahlberg of Lebanon, Oregon.

HERB CROWDER HONORED AT "FRIENDS" BANQUET

April 24th was a banner day for the Reverend Herb Crowder, veteran member of the College Administrative staff. It was the Northwest College Lay Council day. The newly completed H. W. Crowder Residence Hall was dedicated in his honor at ribboncutting ceremonies earlier that day. The annual Lay Council Banquet featured spoken tributes and a skit which packaged both memory and humor tributes to

the veteran Director of Development.

The Reverend Mr. Crowder came to Northwest College in 1955 from Colfax, Washington, where he was pastoring at the time. He had previously pastored churches in the Northwest District and had a background in the world of business through his career with the Crown Zellerback Corporation, whose famous "Diamond-Z" trade-mark he originated. Mr. Crowder told a capacity banquet audience, "I knew before I ever received that memorable telephone call from then-President C. E. Butterfield, that God had a new ministry for me and that it involved my business training as well as my past ministry."

The story of the acquisition and the development of Northwest College's multi-million dollar campus is not only a miracle story, but it is a story that inseparably in-

volves the person of Herb Crowder.

The naming of the H. W. Crowder Residence Hall and the honoring of the man who gives it his name is seen as a tribute to the grace of God and the power of faith which undergirded his contribution to the development of Northwest College.



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FLYING SEMINAR PLANS SET FOR 1983

KIRKLAND, WASH. — Flying Seminar dates are set for the College's sixteenth Flying Seminar to the Holy Land, it was announced at the College today. Dates are March 11-12. Tour plans this year call for "Israel-in-depth" and will concentrate on Israel covering a range of travel points from Galilee (where the group will stay in a Kibbutz) to the Gulf of Aquaba in Eilat — now the southern tip-end of Israel on the Sinai Peninsula. The "dessert" of Israel will be a special feature of the seminar travel, since the Scriptures speak much of the in-gathering of Israel in the dessert. One of Israel's top guides will be with the seminar group in Israel.

A stopover tour in Athens is planned on the return route home. This year the tour will use Scandinavian airlines and Copenhagen, Scandinavia's gateway city,

as an overnight point for the journey.

Leading the tour will be Dr. Amos D. Millard, Dean of Admissions, and instructor-coordinator of the College's flying seminar program since its innauguration in 1970. The number of participants, including friends of the College, students, faculty and administration who have gone with the tours over the years, is now approaching 400, College records show.
