FROM THE PRESIDENT

EBENEZER AND **IUBILEE**

The words these days at NC are (1) "Ebenezer" - "hiterto hath the Lord helped us!" (2) "Jubilee," — "cause the trumpet of Jubilee to sound."

"Ebenezer" is an interesting word, meaning "stone of help." When erected at the place where God evidenced His presence, blessing and aid it stood as a symbol, saying, "God has brought us this far," and again, "He will see us through!"

One of the earliest uses of a stone to symbolize God's presence was in Jacob's use of his pillow stone as a "pillar." He poured oil on it and called the place Bethel. There he vowed a vow, saying that if God would keep him, provide for him and bring him back home, "then shall the Lord be my God." (Genesis

Joshua set stones, one for each tribe, on the banks of the Iordan as a reminder to the children of Israel. The stones were brought up out of Jordan, one each by a representative of each of the tribes. They were brought up right out of the miracle of passing over on dry ground. And Joshua said, "when your children ask in times to come . . . 'what mean ye by these stones?' . . . answer them, these stones shall be a memorial unto the children of Israel forever." (Joshua 4:5-7).

In blessing Joseph, his son, Jacob spoke of his hands being strengthened by "the hands of the mighty God of Jacob," and said "from thence is the shepherd, the stone of Israel."

Isaiah spoke of a "stone of stumbling" and a "rock of offense." (Isaiah 8:14). But later he spoke of a "tried and precious foundation and cornerstone; a sure foundation," while the Psalmist (118:22) had said, "A stone which the builders rejected has become the head of the corner." In the New Testament these references are clearly seen to be referring to the Messiah. And, they can be linked with little straining to the "stone cut out of the mountains without hands," as seen in Daniel.

So the "Rock" that Jacob anointed, that followed Israel, that gave water, that smote the image, that served as the symbol of God's presence, blessing, provision, protection and help, was the one sym-

bolized by the stone that Samuel raised between Mizpeh and Shen, when Israel smote the Philistines (I Sameul 7:12), and called it "Ebenezer, saying hitherto hath the Lord helped us.'

It is with good understanding that during the 50th year of Northwest College, we look to the Rock of God, the Mighty God of Jacob and of Israel and say of NC "Hiterto hath the Lord helped us." And we believe that He who hath brought us this far and having begun this good work He will carry it forward and perfect it in His purpose.

"Jubilee" is an interesting word, also! It stood for the 50th year in Israel's calendar, following seven Sabbaths of years. It was a year of rest . . . a year of freedom . . . a year of debt release . . . a year when men returned to their possessions! (Lev. 25:8-17).

Northwest College has taken precedence this year, its 50th year of ministry — from both of these words: Ebenezer and Jubilee.

Now we near the end of the year and we have set a great 50th anniversary year Jubilee banquet for May 25. Close to 1,000 celebrants will gather to bless God . . . to rejoice . . . to remember . . . and to look ahead!

In the midst of it all we have set a goal for debt release of \$250,000 and we are on our way with \$150,000 (approximately) already given and pledged. In setting the toal, it was determined that \$1.00 = \$2.25 (immediately!) in debt service reduction. (This includes principal and interest payable. The \$150,000 already given and pledged equals \$378,000!)

Now we want to move up toward that goal of \$250,000 or \$630,000 in debt service reduction!

FORTY-EIGHTH BACCALAUREATE AND COMMENCEMENT SPEAKERS ANNOUNCED

Reverend Fulton W. Buntain, senior pastor of First Assembly of God Life Center in Tacoma, Washington, has been selected to speak at the 1984 Baccalaureate. The service is to be held in Butterfield Chapel on Saturday, May 26th, 7:30 p.m.

After graduating from seminary in Springfield, Missouri, Reverend

Buntain's ministry was begun as an evangelist traveling throughout America in local crusades and Youth for Christ rallies. He then accepted the invitation to pastor a church in Oakland, California. After three successful years in Oakland, Buntain accepted a call to Long Beach, California. In 1965 he received a call from First Assembly of God Life Center in Tacoma, Washington. In his 18 years of ministry in Tacoma, the church has grown tremendously from an average of 400 in 1965 to 4,000 in 1983.

During his ministry at Life Center, Pastor Buntain was instrumental in building a retirement center with 169 apartments and full service facilities of dining and recreation on the church campus. Life Christian School, with enrollment of 450 students, grades K through 9, was begun in 1972. "Introduction to Life," a television program hosted by Pastor Buntain, is seen in all 50 states on the PTL and TBN networks. Pastor Buntain and a committee of Christian laymen just recently opened the new Christian television station Channel 20 (KQFB).

Dr. Don Argue, President of North Central Bible College, in Minneapolis, Minnesota is scheduled to be the speaker at the Forty-eighth commencement exercises, Sunday, May 27th, 3:00 p.m. in Northwest Pavillion.

NC Student Competes Nationally



Mandy Scott, a iunior at Northwest College recently competed in the prestigious American Forensic National Individual Events Tournament held in Manhattan, Kansas. Mandy placed in the top twenty percent in the nation. She competed in both the prose and poetry interpretation categories. This is the first

time Northwest has qualified a student in the national tournament.

To compete in these events Mandy chose selections of literary merit and by reading expressively attempted to communicate the author's meaning to an audience and a panel of judges. To qualify, Mandy had to compete with some of the top students from the northwest district in a "tournament of champions." Approximately sixty students from all colleges and universities across the entire United States competed in each event.

Mandy's success came as no surprise to her coach, Darby Swanson, who considers Mandy's interpretive skills among the best in the nation. Coaches from other colleges have also remarked on her abilities as a commnicative reader. Mandy has finished in the top four speaker at every tournament she has competed in during this season and has already won numerous awards in speech competitions for Northwest

She has already used these talents in chapel several times ministering through poems and stories or reading the scriptures to communicate their beauty and meaning.


We are proud of Mandy's success this past year. But most of all, we are glad she is coming back to Northwest next year.

Thirty-one members of the tour party visited Israel from "Dan to Beersheba"

plus Egypt and Greece. Among the highlight points in Israel was the "Good Fence" at the border of Lebanon; Mt. Carmel near Haifa; the Temple Mount in Jerusalem; and the Qumran caves near the Dead Sea where the famed Dead Sea Scrolls were found in 1947 and where current excavations are being conducted in search for some of the temple furnishings as an outgrowth of the Copper Scroll found in 1967.
