FROM THE PRESIDENT

It was some opportunity to Preach in Eastern Europe (Austria, Hungary, and Yugoslavia) as well as in Moscow.

I had hoped it would work out, but there could be no guarantee. It was to be the last stop of a preaching mission through eastern Europe, which was to follow a week's confrerence in Oxford University on worldwide revival with Dr. J. Edwin Orr and lecturers from England and Ireland.

The conference was stimulating . . . discussing the Welsh Revival and others . . . talking of (1) Prayer that brings revival, (2) Humbling that brings prayer, and (3) Seeing God that brings humility (Isa. 6:1). And then talking of effects of revival: private and

spiritual versus social — even to the point of large emigrations. And finding myself deeply longing to see God's Spirit poured out again, the one real cause of awakening and revival!

It was deeply thought provoking to visit the college John Wesley attended and see the site where he first preached and also the spot of the first Methodist meeting house.

From the conference I flew to Vienna, Austria and met missionary Bob Mackish, Assemblies of God representative to eastern Europe. For

two weeks we motored together during the day and preached at night. We were in beautiful western Austria, foothills of the Alps, visited Berchtesgarden and Hitler's "Eagle's Nest," saw the site of the writing of "Silent Night, Holy Night," and visited St. Stephen's Cathedral, where the counter reformation began.

From Austria we moved into Hungary and saw Budapest and some signs of the move of Russia into that city when the Hungarians had sought a greater measure of freedom. From there

we went into northern Yugoslavia and saw the spreading countryside. In it all, experiencing the relative ease with which we moved past border entries and recalling stories I had heard, questions raised in my mind.

But it was preaching in the churches at night that meant the most by far. Observing the new, struggling Pentecostal churches alongside the ancient buildings of churches that were and sensing the life and growth that is taking place in Austria, Hungary, and

Yugoslavia, was inspiring.
I preached in Vienna, Linz and Bad Ischil in the main churches and "home missions" works. I preached in a church

basement (like where my father used to hold services) and toured the almost completed superstructure. I preached and shared communion in a rural church outside of Budapest. What a moment to sense the spirit of those people and share the common cup. And I preached in what was originally a synagogue in Osijeck, Yugoslavia. When the Pentecostals bought it, it was serving as a barn. What a transformation they made.

I had Sunday dinner with a "District Superintendent" and his family. What a chance to sense the same working of God in a pastor's family behind "the curtain" that I have known all my life.

On Monday I visited the church headquarters of the Penecostal Church of Hungary and saw the "famed" marble stairs the Communists provided. The marble was made available out of "state supplies" when the original, much less pretentious, material planned was lost in shipment. The time for dedication was at hand and the building was all but finished. No way would authorities permit an unfinished building to be "shown-off" and dedicated. No such reflection on the system could occur! God has

One of the most sobering experiences was the chance to visit Mauthausen, the concentration camp in western Austria where 210,000 lives were "taken," some of them "Bible People," according to the records. Seeing the ovens, the death stairs (186 steps) and the "punishment" chain from which many died made me ask, "And I have problems?!"

But then it was time to bid farewell to Bob Mackish. (If ever I have seen a man chosen and placed by the Holy Spirit, it is he!) I flew to Moscow, spent 3 hours "getting through" passport and customs controls and then went to the hotel, one and one-half blocks from the kremlin.

At first it appeared I drew a "blank" No one met me, no one called, and Sunday was coming! I wanted to preach! The cable apparently hadn't gotten through. I spent hours - missed a tour placing an international call. After that things happened. I spent time "solo" with the General Secretary of the Union Baptist Church of Russia in his office. Tears flowed from his eyes as we talked. I visited in the first Sunday morning service — the church was

packed. I heard the choir with their full Russian voices, watched a 50 minute wedding ceremony during the service, listened to the sermon, and pondered deeply what I was seeing, sharing and hearing. (A refined, young Russian lady speaking perfect English interpreted for me.)

Then I preached in the second service. Brother Ilia Orlov, the official organist for the church and Vice Chairman of the International department of the Baptist Union of USSR interpreted for me. He preached as I preached - raised voice, gestures, and all. What a thrill to watch the expressions of response on the faces of those saints as I spoke!

Sights, sounds, feelings, impressions from this preaching mission will linger with me the rest of my days. I don't suppose I'll ever be the same. To see how God, by His Spirit, does His work, in spite of "official atheism," and to observe that it is genuine and real, is soul stiring!

The Lord of the harvest is at work . . . is building His church. Oh, for an outpouring of His Spirit behind every curtain!



Academic Dean Announces Elementary Education Major Receives State Approval!

Dr. J. Melvyn Ming, Academic Dean, reports that the Washington State Board of Education at their September 27 & 28 meeting, voted unanimously to approve the elementary education teachers program of NC. The State Board noted the tremendous growth of Assemblies of God Christian Schools.

Students graduating from NC's newest major, elementary education, will be eligible for state initial K-8 teacher certification. This will allow students to teach in both public and private schools. Dr. Ming noted that "Wherever NC's graduates teach, I feel confident they will represent Jesus Christ effectively."


As a result of the State Board of Education action, NC becomes the *only* fully accredited pentecostal/charismatic college in the Northwest region with a program leading to a state teaching credential in elementary education. In future years this can have a significant impact on Christian schools in the northwest.

Hurst Library Joins Network

Services at NC's Hurst Library were recently enhanced greatly when the college joined one of the nation's major library networks, OCLC — the On-Line Computer Library Center. This organization, whose headquarters are in Ohio, serves over 3,500 member institutions.

The chief value to Northwest College from joining OCLC will be in the area of cataloging. The process of acquiring new books and preparing them for circulation to students is more complicated than most people imagine. Average process time without a network's help is 59 minutes per book. By getting the information from OCLC's computer, the time is reduced to less than five minutes. Futhermore, catalog cards are also ordered via the computer, saving even more time and costs. OCLC has particular advantages for NC, because its membership includes a number of other theological institutions in the West — insuring that most books desired by NC will already be listed in the computer file.


Another important value to NC students will be accessibility of inter-library loans. In addition to Hurst Library's 60,000 volumes, students will now have access to the eight million volumes in OCLC member libraries throughout the nation. A request via the on-line computer will quickly locate and bring the needed book or article to the student. Quite an improvement, they think!




The Annual Bonfire

Convocation Service "LET THE FIRE FALL"

It was an hour of glory in Butterfield chapel at Northwest College when the Reverend Dr. Paul Tehupuring, Superintendent of the Assemblies of God in Indonesia, spoke about the "fire of God." His message followed the conferral of the honorary degree, "Doctor of Divinity" upon him, by the col-


lege, on September 24th.

He traced the secret of revival in the land of INDONESIA from it's antecedents in the history of Israel on the various occasions when the manifest glory of God fell — the form of fire and left a lasting imprint upon the life and memory of the nation. So it has been up to the moment in the land of Indonesia, he said. After months of travailing in prayer with fastings, a great moving of God's Spirit began to occur among the few and small churches that dotted the Moslem dominated land of Indonesia.

Today the fire is still burning and there is an in-gathering of converts that challenges the ability of the growing Assemblies of God movement to keep pace with. The churches could once be numbered with the fingers on our hands. Today they number in the hundreds, all in a few short

years. This is the product of revival that came out of the months and years of sowing, travailing, and ultimately prevailing intercessory prayer.

Present for the occasion were a number of Northwest College alumni missionaries who have served on the field in Indonesia. It was a moment of glory in which they shared as they saw one of their "own" honored with the highest honor the college could bestow. It fittingly marked the school's on-going interest and support of missions over it's 50 years of history, President Hurst said. Participating in the service was NC graduate Morris Devin, former faculty member and missionary to Indonesia, whose parents were instrumental in bringing Dr. Tehurpuring into his Pentecostal experience some years ago.

The Resident Assistant Instruction and Training Program for Student Development at NC is a new course designed to assist the student to develop outside of the academic realm. This special "on-the-job" training program will offer opportunities for students to grow in social, physical, and spiritual areas.

The residence hall experience is a most important factor in determining student's satisfaction with college and in developing interpersonal social skills. This new program will head students to a realization of their responsibility before God (*James 1:27*) and at providing an atmosphere of true spirituality which is an integrated part of residence life (*Phil. 1:17-30*). Emphasis will be on leadership training, especially in the area

of relations. Peer counseling, philosophy and administration of discipline, and the development of a program for student development will be considered and implemented. One credit hour per term will be given each student completing the program during the first year of service. The training and grading will be under the oversight and supervision of the Dean of Students Office and Counseling services.

Dean "Tex" Rutledge, Dean Jelsma, and Dean Lehman are very excited about this new training program and the impact it will have on the NC students, both in residence hall life and in the skills that will be learned that will impact lives for years

to come.

"Timothy's Working With Paul's" By Dr. Dwaine Braddy, Professor of Pastoral Ministries

Summer 1984 was an exciting year for pastoral interns. A total of sixteen, the most ever in the summer, enrolled for pastoral internship. Three of them, Dean and Keith Jackson and Miguel Perry, ministered overseas, in Japan and Spain respectively. Two more, Jon Davidson and David Baker, served in home missions churches, having received a full tuition scholarship provided by Capitol Ministries. Jon served in Anchorage, Alaska and David in Everett, Washington.

Greg Wingard served as an evangelistic intern with Evangelist Linfield Crowder for twelve weeks during the summer. The responsibilities included everything from soloist, song leader, preacher, prayer warrior, altar worker to speaking with the use of an interpreter to a Ukranian congregation in Alberta, Canada. Rev. Crowder shared that, "My wife and I learned to accept an intern in evangelistic work is as equal to adopting them in the family for three months. This work afforded numerous hours of close sharing that is not usually possible. It was a good summer and Greg is a compliment to Northwest College."

addition, his extensive preaching ministry included Malaysia, Singapore and the United States.


Dr. Tex Rutledge was active in preaching ministry.

The Flying Seminar



THE TEMPLE MOUNT would not look like a mountain by our standards. In ancient times it was a long ascending ridge terminating where Gordon's Calvary is located today. In the time of Herod the Great the platform on which rests the Dome of the Rock, was leveled and extended out like the deck of a great battleship. Today the Temple Mount is a "battle ground" between Moslems and Orthodox Jews (the latter are forbidden by Moslems to pray on the Temple mount). The Bible indicates that a third temple will vet be built on this spot, which some archaeologists today believe, is farther north of the dome in this picture and at a point where it would align with the Eastern or Golden Gate. In the foreground is the famed western wall where JEWISH people for centuries have lamented the destruction of the Temple and pray for its rebuilding, the regathering of ISRAEL and the return coming of Messiah.
