

FROM THE PRESIDENT

AN AFFIRMING COLLEGE

Northwest College is an affirming College. In all, it is and does, it has a point of view.

There is no such thing as neutrality in the classroom. Every professor or instructor, whether he be in the state or private institution, has a point of view . . . a world view. Alas, all too often in the secular institution, the view derives from the theory of evolution, from secular humanism, from materialism. Man is supreme in this view. And within the view of prevailing philosophies, man is of little more value and has not many more rights — if any — than all else of living things.

The point of view — yes, the world view of N.C. — derives from the Biblical view of creation, from the supremacy over creation by man, from the Biblical view of redemption — God's son died to redeem man, all else will "melt with fervent heat" and be remade — from the centrality of God's son, the Lord Jesus Christ, in all things, from the fact that He is the Way, the Truth, the Life, and He is the One in Whom all knowledge finds meaning and integration.

As an affirming College — with this view — N.C. expects that all classroom instruction will be integrated with Christ at its center — whether it be in Biblical studies and theology, in the humanities, in the social sciences, life sciences, hard sciences, political sciences, arts, or any other. Jesus Christ is at the center. God, the Father, ordained this and N.C. professors teach from this view.

Not only does N.C. have such a world view, but it also has a Biblical interpretation and a theological view. It is unabasedly evangelical and Pentecostal when it comes to theology and Biblical studies, it is again an affirming College. When classical evangelicalism differs from Pentecostalism, it is Pentecostal.

Its statement of belief derives from its sponsoring church, the Assemblies of God. Therefore, N.C. espouses and affirms the view that:

- 1. The scriptures are inspired verbally and are the infallible rule of faith and practice.
- 2. The one true God has revealed Himself as the eternally selfexistent "I Am," Creater, and Redeemer.
- 3. The Lord Jesus Christ is divine, the eternal Son of God.
- 4. Man was created good and upright, but voluntarily, transgressed and fell.
- 5. Man's only hope of redemption is through the shed blood of Jesus Christ, the Son of God.
- 6. The ordinances of the church are water baptism by immersion and Holy Communion.

- 7. The Baptism in the Holy Ghost is distinct from the new birth and evidenced by the initial physical and outward signs of speaking in tongues.
- 8. The church is the Body of Christ, the habitation of God through the Spirit, with divine appointments for the fulfillment of her great commission.
- 9. Santification is an act of separation from that which is evil, and of dedication unto God.
- 10. The ministry is divinely called and scripturally ordained.
- 11. Divine healing is an integral part of the gospel. Deliverance from sickness is provided for in the atonement, and is the privilege of all believers.
- 12. The resurrection of those asleep in Christ and their translation, together with those who are alive and remain unto the coming of the Lord, is the imminent and blessed hope of the church.
- 13. The second coming of Christ includes the rapture of the saints, which is our blessed hope, followed by the visible return of Christ with His saints to reign on the earth for one thousand years.
- 14. There will be a final judgment in which the wicked dead will be raised and judged according to their works.
- 15. We look for a new heaven and a new earth, wherein dwelleth righteousness.

To be sure, the views that some may hold which are distinct from those of the Assemblies of God are studied in the classroom. Effort is made to clarify them, to see why some espouse these varying views, but the Assemblies of God views are affirmed and supported in the classrooms of N.C.

This is one of the reasons why all full time teaching faculty at N.C. are Assemblies of God. Care is exercised in choosing them. They go through a regorous time of involvement and evaluation before they are eligible for tenure. Now, a full five years is required. All who teach in the Biblical and Theological areas are credentialed by the Assemblies of God. This evaluation process is done separately from the college by the presbyteries of the various districts from which the professors come, as is the case with all Assemblies of God ministers.

Series of Articles to Come

For some time, it has been felt that this publication, The Northwesterner, might undergo a slight change of purpose. Traditionally, it has been a "promo" piece, an informational bulletin about N.C. This will continue to be the case. (Through the years, I have been gratified for the many comments I have received about the content and format of The Northwesterner. N.C.'s "message" has been communicated in it.) However, I have felt the Lord would have us broaden the purpose of The Northwesterner to include articles by faculty from time to time in which the theological views of N.C. will be affirmed. Not only will they then be affirmed in the classroom, but here in The Northwesterner, too. And, the articles will be of the clipout variety. They will not be copyrighted. Friends of N.C. will be encouraged to duplicate them in whole or in part for use in classes, church bulletin inserts, etc. I believe N.C. can perform an added service to its constituency this way.

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Herb Crowder: A MAN CALLED OF GOD

Herb Crowder is more than the name of a veteran administrator at Northwest. He is a "tradition," whose ministry, life, and influence is inextricably woven into the fabric of the history of Northwest College. For thirty years, having served under two presidents, Herb, as business manager and then as development director, has traveled the length and breadth of the Northwest Region in the interests of fund raising for Northwest

College. For Herb, it was more than a job. It was a calling for which his background in the business world and pastorate admirably suited him. It was a ministry for which God had uniquely gifted and prepared him.

Raised in the small town setting of Tenino in Western Washington, Reverend Herb Crowder learned the meaning of frugality and faith. "God engineered the circumstances of my life before I ever came to know Him," he recalls. "When I was born, my mother was not expected to live, and in her moment of desperation, she told God that if He would let her live long enough to raise her child, she would give him to Him for His service." "The remarkable thing," Herb recalls, "is that at this time my mother did not know the Lord, but God heard her cry and my whole life has been a fulfillment of her prayer." She later became a Christian. "Before I was ever saved," he continued, "I knew that God's hand was upon me for the ministry."

At nineteen, Herb came to know the Lord to Whom he had been dedicated as a child. "I would cry myself to sleep many a night without really knowing why. I sensed God's call upon my life," he recalled. "It was a black preacher who led me to Christ," he said. "I set myself towards the ministry just as I was, taking my first pastorate in Yelm, Washington at age twentyeight. After Yelm, it was Auburn, where I pastored for five years. Then came a ten year interim. No church opened." Herb went into the business world where he received valuable "on-the-job" training that would uniquely prepare him for the ministry God had for him "down the road."

Herb's third church was at Colfax, and the providential nature of the circumstances leading to his going there were no less miraculous than the other chapter of his life and ministry.

"While I was in Colfax," Herb says, "I was praying one day. I said, 'Lord, I don't know what you have in mind, but I would like it to be something I have never dreamed of doing something that will be meaningful to You and something that will be challenging to me. If You will open the door, I will take it." It was six weeks after Herb prayed this prayer that he received a telephone call from Dr. Charles Butterfield, then president of Northwest College, asking him if he would consider coming to work at the College in campus development. "I was on a hospital call in Colfax and the Mother Superior had me take the call in her office," he recalls.

From then on, things happened rapidly. A new chapter opened in Herb Crowder's life. It was to fulfill a call and ministry for which God had uniquely prepared him. The story of Brother Crowder's ministry at the College is nothing less than a series of miracles that make up the story of the acquisition and development of the campus in Kirkland, one that rates as the "most beautiful" in the Assemblies of God. More beautiful than its physical environment and plant, is the beauty of God's Hand that brought it into being. Herb recalls how God moved upon many, many persons ranging from the Superior Court, to the Senate, to officials in state government, to individuals skilled and called of God for specific roles in the development of a campus that would represent God's Handiwork at Northwest College. In case afer case, God moved upon individuals with means to provide funds, often against a curtain of time limits.

What is Herb's greatest satisfaction, as he approaches the "sunset" of his career at the College this January? "These have been wonderful years. I have seen the Hand of God move so many times," he says. But even more than that, Herb takes satisfaction in the product — of the school for which he has invested himself over the years. "My expectations have been fulfilled in that I have seen hundreds of young people trained and go out into the ministry," he states.

What will he do now? "I would like to do some things I never had time to do during the past thirty years, to do some traveling — perhaps to the Orient, and Australia."

As surely as it could be said of the heroes of faith in the Bible, it could be said of Herb Crowder . . . "By faith . . . Herb was called . . . By faith he responded and obeyed . . . and by faith Herb did great exploits for God — the setting of which happens to be Northwest College."


In recalling his thirty years at Northwest College, Herb says, "I have served under two Presidents, Dr. Butterfield and Dr. Hurst. I have the highest regard for these two gentlemen. During my time here I have had different titles — Assistant to the President, Business Manager, and Development Director."

Herb's successor is a young man — Randy Barton, an alumnus of Northwest College, an attorney, and minister, whose training and background are somewhat different from Herb's, but which are nonetheless uniquely appointed by the same Lord who called Herb Crowder. The eternal stamp of faith continues through the callings and gifting of the men whom He raises up for the work of His kingdom.

In commenting on Herb Crowder's retirement, President Hurst said, "We are grateful to God for placing Herb at N.C. when He did, and permitting him to serve here for three decades. His contribution to the Kingdom can hardly be measured in words. His positive manner, always expressed, has been a source of strength and confidence to all who have associated with him. The "seeds" he has planted in his later years of service as Development Director will bear harvest for many, many years to come. He has blessed N.C.! I personally have enjoyed his friendship and working with him as a co-laborer immensely. He will be greatly missed, even as he is greatly respected."

Randy Barton: "Named Development Director" by Dr. Amos D. Millard



It was "twelve years to the day" when a former Westpoint cadet sat as a student in Butterfield Chapel on the campus of Northwest College where he testified that he had received the call of God upon his life for Christian service. The student was Randall Barton. The occasion was a Spiritual Emphasis week service in which "Randy" participated along with his

classmates. "Twelve years to the day," Randy Barton was back in the same chapel during the College's fall Spiritual Emphasis week. This time he was introduced as Dr. Randall Barton, the newest member of the college administrative staff, who will succeed the Reverend Herb Crowder as Development Director for the college, commencing full time in January.

When Dr. Barton left NC in 1973 he said he felt led to attend Northwest Nazarene College in Idaho. There he completed his Bachelor of Science degree in Mathematics and Engineering. However, while serving as a studentbody leader there, he became interested in law and went on to enroll in the University of Idaho where he received his degree, Doctor of Jurisprudence in 1977.

From the University Dr. Barton entered the legal profession as a partner in the law firm of Holden, Kidwell, Hahn and Crapo in Idaho Falls, Idaho, now the third largest in the state. His field of specialization is in taxes and estate planning.


During his legal career in Idaho he has had considerable involvement in the work of the church. He is a member of the Financial Advisory Committee for the Southern Idaho District of the Assemblies of God. He serves as legal counsel for the District and is presently preparing a financial program for the District. He has been Assistant Pastor at New Life Assembly of God, Idaho Falls where he participated in a "full round" of pastoral work including preaching, teaching, counseling and administration. He is an elder in New Life Assembly of God. He is the legal representative assisting the Christian Broadcasting Network and their Christian Financial Planning Department. He is a founding member of the Board of Directors of Good News Radio, Inc., a non-profit FM Christian Radio station and has been program assistant for the Idaho Falls Chapter of the Full Gospel Business Men's Association.

In the professional world he presents an impressive list of credentials including that of past president of Idaho Falls Estate Planning Council; a member of the American Bar Association; a member of the Idaho State Bar, for whom he has lectured and authored a number of papers on behalf of the State Bar and the Idaho Law Foundation in the field of taxation.

Concerning Dr. Barton's coming to Northwest College, College President D. V. Hurst said, "We are deeply pleased that Randall Barton is joining us at NC in the Development/Stewardship office. He is extremely well prepared. His commitments to our Lord and the work of the church and to Northwest College in particular are firm. He is already putting together some creative approaches to fund raising, deferred giving and endowment fund development. Building on the long history of service to our church here in the Northwest which Rev. H. W. Crowder and Rev. Woodrow Fletcher have done, I believe he will carry the development office forward to new levels of effectiveness. All who work with him will quickly sense the quality of his work and will place confidence in him. I believe God has picked him and prepared him for this work."



Dr. Barton, his wife, Bobbie and seven month old son, Bryan, will assume residence in Kirkland January 1, 1985. He will be available for consultations and seminars almost immediately thereafter.


