In this letter to all of our friends he tells us what he found at NC and to send students.



Dr. George O. Wood, pastor of Newport-Mesa Christian Center in Costa Mesa, California will be the Spring Quarter Spiritual Emphasis Week Speaker, March 28 - April 1. The services will be held daily at 9:20 a.m. and 7:00 p.m. in Butterfield Chapel on the NC campus.

The son of missionary parents to China and Tibet, Wood holds a B.A. degree from Evangel College, Springfield, Missouri, and

received Bachelor of Divinity and Doctorate of Pastoral Theology degrees from Fuller Seminary in Pasadena, California.

Since 1971 he has served as pastor of Newport-Mesa Christian Center. The church has grown from a small congregation of less than 100 persons to over 1200.

Wood has authored four books including **You Can't Beat the Beatitudes** and **Acts:** A **Study Guide**. His book on **Acts** is currently being translated into Russian for use by the Evangelical Baptist Alliance of Russia in the training of ministers.

Currently, he serves as a member of the Board of Directors of Southern California College in Costa Mesa, and as a member of the District Presbytery for the Southern California District Council of the Assemblies of God.

He and his wife, Jewel, reside in Costa Mesa and have two children: Evangeline (15) and George Paul (12). Wood has been an ordained minister of the Assemblies of God since 1965

Over the past few years, Northwest College has developed a reputation for the fine quality of its speech students. This fall, Mandy Scott helped uphold this winning tradition by capturing the first place trophy in oral interpretation at the Lower Columbia College Tournament in Longview, Washington. Mandy's reading of two T. S. Eliot poems, captured the regard of the judges with

Part of this time was also spent working with the ICI office in China. Her missionary efforts, however, have not been limited to this. She also spent one year with the mission-conscious Youth With A Mission in Hawaii, Singapore and Indonesia. Two and a half months of this time she toured with a music, dance and drama production which helped lead people to Christ in Southeast Asia and the Philippines.

The initial involvement with the speech program at Northwest College came last spring when Mandy ministered through our Reader's Theatre in Chapel and at various churches. She has also read poems during Special Chapel programs, ministering through the negelected medium of oral interpretation. People like Mandy are one reason our

speech program has enjoyed growing success.

WINTER ENROLLMENT **REACHES 719**

Winter quarter enrollment figures reached a total of 719

This compares with 761 enrolled one year ago and represents a down-turn of approximately six percent. The pattern is said to be similar to that experienced in many other schools in the Bible school field. Enrollments of women were down by thirteen percent while those of men were down only by six percent from one year ago, the office reports.

While Freshman and Sophomore class enrollments were about thirteen percent off from last year, Junior class enrollments were nearly twenty-three percent ahead of last year.

The winter quarter enrollment was within one percent of the enrollment projections made at the beginning of the current school year.

Applications are now being processed for the Spring quarter, which will begin on March 23, 1983.

May I introduce Arvel and Clara Shipley - who are experiencing fulfillment in their lives by serving God with their talents at N.C. - a husband and wife team who have been the chef and assistant chef for over four years.

The Shipleys came to N.C. with a wealth of practical and professional experience in many areas of food service.

Arvel served in the U.S. Air Force Food Service for over twenty-one years. One of his last assignments in the military was that of overseer for the entire food service function for the Minute Man Titan II project in Montana. This involved twenty missile site facilities, each site a composite of fifty missile silos.

Clara also worked for Uncle Sam in food management from 1959 to 1973 in the Army and Air Force Exchange Service. Her responsibilities were broad in scope involving food preparation, purchasing, personnel training and management. At one point she was in charge of seven facilities simultaneously - one cafeteria, one drive-in and five snack bars. Together they have brought over thirty-five years of food management expertise from the strict and disciplined background of military service. All of this qualifies them for the usual and unusual demands of operating a college food service facility.

The Shipleys were both raised in Knoxville, Tennessee and knew each other in grade school. Their initial, casual acquaintance was a result of an introduction by Clara's best girl friend. Their paths parted for many years and Arvel was involved in military service. Coincidently, it was through another of Clara's best girl friends that they learned of the whereabouts of each other and started correspondence. They have two sons and two daughters. All are married and two of them are in the military. They also have four of the greatest grandchildren in the world. (If you don't believe it, just ask them!) Happy, gregarious people! Both have served the Lord seriously for many years.

Northwest College is grateful to God for preparing the Shipleys for their practical ministry and the timely leading to join the staff. Both of them have indicated that food service management here is "an experience and a challenge." They are thankful for the challenge and are equal to it! They serve approximately one thousand meals every day, seven days a week, 221 days per year - that is a lot of food!

Observing them in action, one is aware that they run a "tight ship" (under control) and that everything is "ship shape" (clean). They are used to "white glove inspections." All of these things make them valuable and a blessing to N.C.

"We are enjoying our stay here and we like it. We appreciate working under 'no pressure' (military discipline) and being appreciated and the Christian atmosphere."
