

A YEAR IN THE MAKING

Exciting things are happening at Northwest College! It's a new year! Hundreds of freshmen and returning students are heading to campus. The crisp fall air, and college students checking into dorms...signing up for classes...asking questions...seeing old friends...making new friends...looking ahead...looking back and feeling lonesome. Yes, there are sometimes tears. But they soon give way to the excitement and activity of a new year underway.

But other things are happening. The \$250,000 set of computer hardware given to the College for instructional purposes will be in full use. Hands-on training in the use of computers and in computer programming will be in progress — enrollment full, no doubt. And there is more. Instructional program software will be developed on campus including Biblical languages and other studies. Church management systems, too. And there will be others. This is the day of using the computer in the church. Through a generous gift, NC is able to meet the challenge this new development presents.

At NC, the 1st century in Biblical studies and the 20th century in technology meet!

The newest instructional program at NC is the elementary education teacher certification program. It is fast developing, with full expectation that it will be in place completely by the fall of 1984. NC plans to train certified elementary teachers for both the Christian schools and public schools.

Some classes which will enable the students to meet some of the required standards as the program is completed will be available this school year of 1983-84.

We believe NC is right on target in pursuing the fulfillment of its total mission in this program.

And charges at NC are attractive!



He also conducted seminars and a radio broadcast, and both he and his wife, Gail, taught at times in Bible colleges. From rich practical experience Dwayne will be able to teach missions.

The passing years bring changes. The Turners' two sons were only babies that first year at NC. Now Philip is a junior in college, and Steve a junior in high school. Gail has acquired an M.A. degree in missions, and Dwayne is in the final stages of his D.Min. program. What their next mission assignment will be is unknown. For now, they will share their knowledge and enthusiasm for missions with NC students. And the cycle goes on.





year old sentence, 'Go into all the world and preach the gospel to all creation.'



"This is a broadening of NC's purpose, not a change of it," President Hurst told the new Elementary Education Program Unit at its formative meeting on July 14 at Northwest College. This committee, whose principal purpose is to guide the formation of a teacher education program at NC, is chaired by Academic Dean Frank Rice. Its membership includes a public school administrator, Dr. Darrell Hines; a public school teacher, Mrs. Carol Smith; a private school administrator, Dr. J. Arthur Stewart; a private school teacher, Miss Nancy Owings; a member of the NC Board of Directors, Mr. Henry Portin; NC President, Dr. D. V. Hurst; and NC's Coordinator of Elementary Education, Dr. J. Melvyn Ming. Dr. Edwin Lyle, Associate for Teacher Education in the office of the State of Superintendent of Public Instruction also attended the meeting.

The Program Unit adopted bylaws to guide its operation, and established the time line for the program's development. Their goal is to have a state certified teacher preparation program in operation by the Fall Quarter 1984-85 - but the


task has only begun!

NC'S UNIQUE ELEMENT - SPIRITUAL LIFE

Northwest College is unique! Unique because of the strong spiritual life emphasis that makes up the

daily college routine.

From the residence halls to the classroom, the gymnasium to the chapel, the cafeteria to the office, that spiritual aspect can be felt. It's not the buildings that make NC unique, it's the quality of spiritual life of those that live, work, and study in those buildings that sets NC apart. The campus is alive with the Spirit of Christ. That atmosphere doesn't just happen. It's prayed for, planned for, and encouraged to be developed by everyone on campus.

The students, administrators, faculty, and staff all have one desire and that is to become more like Christ. That desire manifests itself in the many activities and opportunities that are provided.

The daily routine of life on Northwest College's campus includes a wide variety of opportunities for spiritual growth. Each day the students worship together in Butterfield Chapel. Two of these services each week are organized and carried out by student leaders. Guest ministers and musicians come from around the world to share the gospel message. NC students have the privilege of hearing some of the finest preaching anywhere. As students enter the classroom, the class time begins with either a word of prayer or the singing of a familiar chorus. If students are in need of counsel or assistance in any way, they can talk with their faculty advisor, resident counselor, or any member of the faculty, staff, or administration. All of these people are serving Northwest College because they want to minister. Joint times of prayer and spiritual support come from the dorm meetings, the prayer partners that the students have within the dorm, and the many different class gatherings that are planned throughout the school Each Northwest College student has the opportunity to choose an area of ministry that he would like



to become involved in. These MIN-INSTRY INTEREST GROUPS are a branch of the World Outreach Ministries. These MIGS include: Serviceman's, Evangelism, Gospel Team, Children's, and the list goes on. Many of the students are involved in internships in local churches, serving as music directors, youth directors, children's church coordinators, Sunday school teachers and so on. This gives the students practical application to the things that they are learning in the classrooms. Those with musical abilities have opportunities to share those through the ministry of the two traveling choirs: The King's Choralons and the Maranatha Sounds, or by being selected as a Summer Ministry Team which travels throughout the Northwest region representing the school by ministering in youth camps and churches. Whether it is in a public ministry or two students kneeling together praying for one another in private, the deep awareness that spiritual life is encouraged and developed is very evident.

NEED MONEY FOR COLLEGE?



Northwest College's Financial Aid Officer, Beverly Johnson Westlake is constantly asked questions regarding what financial aid will be available for the 1983-84 school year. Here are some of those questions as were recently asked by an incoming freshman to Northwest. Let's listen in on their conversation

1. Student: What financial aid is available if I come to

Northwest College this fall?

Bev: Pell Grants, Washington State Need Grants, College Work Study, State Work Study, and Guaranteed Student Loans.

2. Student: Can I get a Guaranteed Student Loan if I am a freshman or sophomore student since I have heard that

these loans are limited to upperclassmen?

Bev: Yes, Guaranteed Student Loans are readily available to freshman and sophomore students through selected lenders. Some lenders do restrict their borrowers to juniors and seniors. If you have a problem in finding a lender, please ask my office for suggestions.

3. Student: What is a Guaranteed Student Loan?
Bev: A Guaranteed Student Loan (GSL) is a loan arranged through a local linking institution such as a bank. It does not have to be repaid until college graduation at a minimum \$50.00 per month (depending on the total amount borrowed). Interest rates for new borrowers will

4. Student: How much can I receive from a Pell Grant? Bev: Pell Grants range from \$225 to \$1,800 for the 1983-84 academic year. Eligibility is based on 1982 income and current assets of both you and your parents (if you are dependent) or of you and your spouse (if you are independent). One-third of the Pell Grant is awarded for each

quarter.

5. Student: What is a Washington State Need Grant? Bev: The state of Washington has grants for "extremely needy" students, with awards ranging from \$300 to \$810 for the 1983-84 academic year. Eligibility is determined by the Financial Aid Officer using a set formula regulated by the state. At Northwest College, only freshman and sophomore students enrolled in the Junior College Division are considered for the Washington State Need Grant.

6. Student: Can I receive College Work Study (CWS) or State Work Study (SWS)? What is the difference be-

tween the two programs?

Bev: Yes, you may be eligible for CWS or SWS depending on the information on your Financial Aid Form (see next question regarding the FAF). To be eligible there must be a defined financial need, as determined by the Financial Aid Office. College Work Study is part of our on-campus employment program, involving federal funds. State Work Study is part of our off-campus employment program involving state funds. To be eligible for the State Work Study program, students must be enrolled in the Junior College Division. In both programs, regular paychecks are received.

7. Student: What forms do I need to apply for financial

aid?

Bev: The Financial Aid Form is the basic aid application which you submit to College Scholarship Service (CSS). They will process it and send our office a "needs analysis" report, which we use as a base to determine your aid eligibility. CSS also performs another service for you by submitting all necessary information to the Pell Grant

processing center, which eliminates a second aid application. Pell Grant will then process and send you direct notification of your eligibility, called a Student Aid Report which you should send to my office upon receiving. To apply for a Guaranteed Student Loan, request the GSL application packet. If other forms are needed, in addition to the FAF or GSL application, I will contact you.

8. Student: When will I find out about my financial

Bev: You must allow six to eight weeks to process your financial aid application before expecting to receive notification.

9. Student: Who do I contact for further information

about regular off-campus employment?

Bev: Our Job Search employment office is the place to go when you arrive on campus. Mrs. Bessie McMullen is our Job Search coordinator and she will do all she can to help you find a job. Note: If you are inquiring about the State Work Study Program, please see me for further in-

10. Student: How do I apply for on-campus

employment?

Bev: You should fill out our part-time student employment application and then be available at the beginning of fall quarter to talk with our work supervisors about job openings in their areas on campus.

11. Student: What if I have more questions?

Bev: If you have more questions about financial aid, please feel free to contact the Financial Aid Office and talk with either me or my assistant, Gwen Griffin. Either of us will be more than happy to talk with you.

WE'RE HAPPY TO ANNOUNCE



NC entered the computer age with a bang this year! An agreement between NC and Bi-Tech, Inc., has made available to the College nearly \$250,000.00 of up-to-date computer equipment, with expert instruction and maintenance being provided by the company. A modern classroom with

twenty terminals is now in use. Some courses were offered this spring, and several of the students have already found employment with Bi-Tech.

WHY EVERY CHRISTIAN SHOULD SPEND AT LEAST ONE YEAR AT NO

True, not everyone is called to professional ministry. Also true, Northwest College cannot offer the educational programs needed by all. Yet, almost any Christian young person will profit from time spent at NC. Do you ask

'Why?'

1. To get basic understanding of the Bible and its doctrines. Surely none is equipped for life without basic knowledge of THE BOOK - God's message to man! Given the present views about the separation of church and state, Biblical truth is hard to come by on secular campuses. Old and New Testament Surveys and Christian Doctrines are courses taken by all freshmen at Northwest College. The rest of life can build upon this firm founda-

2. To see the unity of all knowledge and learn to think Christianly. Differing subject fields on some campuses seem unrelated or contradictory. But all Truth is one, and the fields relate to each other when they begin with God the Creator and His revelation to man. The Christian student will want more than instruction toward materialistic goals of success, leaving moral and religious questions (the most important questions in life) to be answered without guidance. NC students learn that Christian principles shed light on all of life - not just the "religious" part.

3. To experience Christian fellowship and build lifelong friendships. Often Christian young people have only a small circle of Christian friends in their home church or school. What a delight to find hundreds of like-minded Christians at NC! They stimulate and encourage one another, and friendships are made which provide support for the rest of life. In fact, a high percentage of the students make their choice of life companions here. Christians marry Christians when their circle of friends is

4. To develop spiritaully through worship, ministry, and leadership opportunities. The college years are the time when life's most important decisions are made and life's directions set. Chapel and prayer times are the ideal setting for this. NC provides numerous opportunities to know God better and "practice" ministry for Him. Being a small college oriented to personal ministry development, NC has many organized student activities in which young people may learn to lead — as they will all their lives!

5. To listen to God's voice. Even though they come to NC with minds made up about their life vocations, students may discover they have failed to hear God's choice for them - a tragic error for a Christian. No, they aren't given a "sales pitch" or made to feel that other careers are not Christian. But they learn to listen to God here, where everything has reference to Him. And "God reserves the best for those who leave the choice to Him!"
