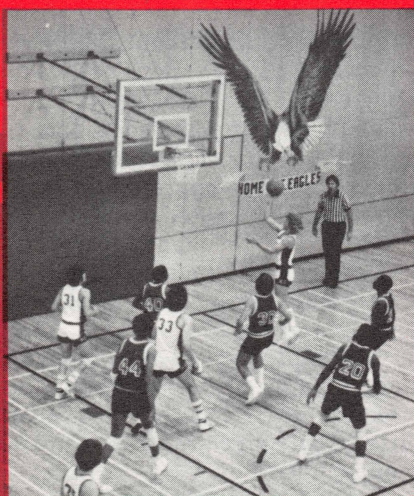

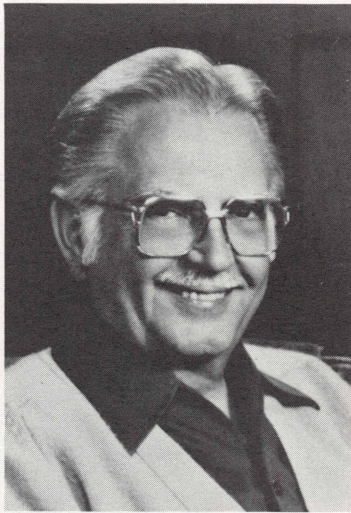

I purchased that dream, now etched in bronze on a plaque, for my wife, Aggie, for Christmas. Secretly, I think it was for me too! 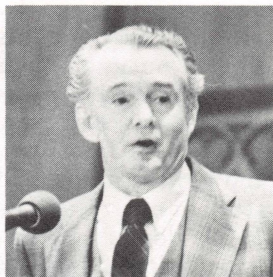

TEACHER FEATURE: MORRIS DEVIN

NC's missionary-in-residence this year is Morris Devin, back home on furlough after some thirty years of missionary service in Indonesia. Missions students profit from his experience, while he has the opportunity to share his own burden

and concerns with them. Apparently it is an enjoyable arrangement for both teacher and students.

One can almost say that Morris was born a missionary, for his parents were missionaries before him—and on the same field. Converted and Spirit-filled at age five, Morris accompanied his parents to Indonesia for missionary service prior to World War II. When conditions forced their return to the States, Morris was able to begin his college work at Central Bible College, but interrupted it in 1950 to assist his father in taking a 100-foot boat (purchased by Speed-the-Light) from Seattle to Indonesia. There he assisted in evangelism by boat for the next two years, during which time his father died, then stayed on for some three more years to work with missions Bible schools. Courtship was carried on by mail during that time with a girl he had met in CBC, and she finally was brought out to Indonesia so they could be married on the field. Joyce and Morris have shared the missions work since 1953—during which time they have reared five children.

During their times in the States, Morris completed his B.A. degree at Northwest College and all coursework for a Master's degree at Seattle Pacific College. This was good preparation for his more than twenty years as a teacher and administrator in missions Bible schools. This has involved several different schools, including teaching and coordinating FEAST extensions in Indonesia, chairing the College Division ICI office, and serving as representative to the Missionary Training Board. He was also chairman of the Field Fellowship for eight years.

From men like Morris Devin, NC students learn about missions—who sat earlier where they sit now. In years ahead, their stories will be told as his has been. And so the wheel continues to turn.

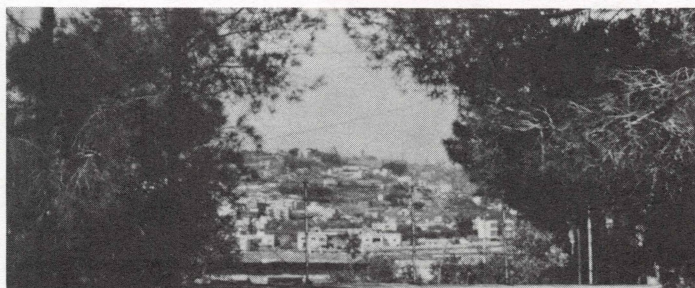

FLYING SEMINAR '82



Nestled in a quaint pastoral setting in the Judean hills south of Jerusalem, Bethlehem is seen in this scene from the village famed as the ancestral home of Boaz and Ruth, of David, and as the birthplace of our Lord. Bethlehem is an ancient Hebrew name, meaning "House of Bread," fittingly named, for here the Messiah of His people was born in a humble grotto-stable now marked by the church of Nativity — the world's oldest Christian edifice. It was built by Constantine in the 4th century and rebuilt by Justinian in the early 6th century and has survived the ages to become one of Israel's most famed visitor points. CAMPUS HAS "INTERNATIONAL" FLAVOR

KIRKLAND, WA—The era of internationalism is making its impact on the campus of Northwest College. A total of 34 students from 14 foreign countries and Canada give the campus a cultural coloration which provides an educational dimension all of its own. While the ethnic representation is predominantly from the Far East and the South Pacific, there are interesting components from Europe and Africa.

Most U.S. colleges and universities do not consider Canadian students as "foreign" in the cultural sense of the word. Northwest's proximity to the land of the maple leaf graces its campus with nine students this year—largest number from any one country outside of the U.S. Korea is represented by six students; Hong Kong by three; Fiji by three; two each come from Sweden and the Philippine Islands; and one each from Japan, India, Malaysia, Switzerland, Western Samoa, Germany, Malawi (Africa), Australia and Liberia (Africa).

Because of its missions emphasis, international students began to find their way to the Northwest campus in the early post-World War II years, and since then the pathway to the college has led from almost every segment of the globe. This year's enrollment is an all-time record for foreign students at the college and represents approximately 5 percent of the student-body, a percentage similar to that at many of the colleges and universities throughout the country, according to a recent survey at a NAFSA conference (National Association of Foreign Students Affairs).

How do foreign students view their experience at NC? Their testimonials given at a recent foreign student banquet radiated a warmth of appreciation for their college experience. Many, if not most, indicated that they expect to devote themselves to missionary service upon completion of their studies in NC.

members, and the college has profited both by having their works added to the library and by the enhanced abilities of the teachers.

An example is Mrs. Shirley Clark, Early Childhood Education instructor and recent recipient of the Pope Grant. By use of the funds, she was able to take special classes and engage in research concerning storytelling and its appeal for young children. Based upon her research learnings, she has produced several audio-cassettes on the subject for library use, and she has written several items for publication.

Mrs. Clark has written two books for children. A major publisher has expressed interest in one of them, entitled **Michelle and the Magic Glasses**—a story derived from Mrs. Clark's own childhood experience, when she learned she would have to wear eyeglasses. She is still seeking a publisher for the other book, **Just a Little Raindrop**, inspired by the abundance of rain in the Seattle area.

Two articles have also resulted from Mrs. Clark's research. One called "Could You Be a Storyteller?"—beamed at children's workers—has been accepted for publication by **Childhood Education** journal. The second, to be published in **Sunday School Counsellor**, is entitled "Tips for Bible Storytellers."

Mrs. Clark has been a part of the Northwest College faculty since 1973. She is excited about the potential for ministry to children, and she is grateful for the help available through the Pope Grant Fund.

POPE GRANT

When the Pope Grant was established a few years ago by NC's Dr. John Pope and his brothers in memory of their parents, its stated purpose was "to encourage and stimulate significant and creative study, research, and writing in the field of Christian and religious studies." It has done so by underwriting the costs of research and writing for several faculty

It was a special day on November 24 when Dorothea Thompson Nunias came back to campus. Just thirty years ago to the month she first set foot on the premises of NC when it was located in its former location in Seattle. Dorothea was one of the school's first "foreign" students. Coming from the Bahamas, garnished with its bright colors and sunshine, she found climate, color, and culture somewhat different. Despite the differences, she adjusted beautifully and became "one of us."

What is especially significant about Dorothea's visit "back to campus" was not just a visit from a long-time alumnus, but it commemorated a memory—the outgrowth of an idea, and an act of faith that gave "legs" to the idea in an ordinary class one day. It represented the "acorn" from which the giant oak—the college's new campus has grown. Dorothea's memory was vividly shared by Seattle alumnus Al Gisselberg, a member of the same class (graduated in 1956) for whom this was also a "first" visit in almost 30 years. It was in the class of which Dorothea and Al were classmates that the idea of a "Jericho March" as it was called, took root. Believing that "faith without works is dead," another student from the Caribbean, Carl Douglas, started what became known as the "campus fund" with two pennies.

These pennies became the "acorn" from which has developed the present campus of Northwest College. It is recognized throughout the nation as one of the finest in the Assemblies of God, and one that will "hold its own" among all colleges of all kinds located in the region. Hence, the visit of Dorothea and Al from the class of 1956 was a milestone of celebration of what God has done in response to faith expressed in a small but tangible way.

As for Dorothea Nunias . . . when she graduated, she turned toward Cuba. This was just before the Castro takeover. There her career was changed when she met her husband, now a Cuban Refugee, an active member of Enterprise, Alabama, Assembly of God church, and a successful businessman in the moving business. Dorothea's ministry is that of a Christian Counselor; she is sought out by those in spiritual need from far and wide.

Al Gisselberg is a Seattle transit driver and an active lay leader in Calvary Temple in Seattle. Carl Douglas is a businessman in the state of Oregon. The monument to their faith still remains. What the eye can see on the campus of NC today was seen by the eye of faith accompanied by "works," be it only two pennies, just yesterday. This is the ongoing principle at Northwest College today.

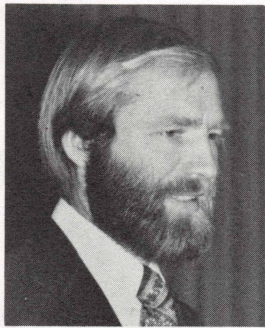
NC BASKETBALL SEASON FLIES INTO ACTION

ALUMNUS TELLS OF POWER OF FORGIVENESS IN CATHOLIC CHURCH

KIRKLAND, WASH.—Few chapel speakers have commanded such rapt attention as did alumnus Rev. William Finke who told Northwest College students recently about his participation in the "renewal movement" within the Roman Catholic Church in Latin America.

It all started three years ago when Bill, who had been a staunch Protestant missionary for fourteen years, was "impressed of the Lord" to go to the local Roman Catholic Bishop in the Diocese in Mexico where he had been living and working as a missionary. "God told me I was to ask his forgiveness for my attitude towards the Roman Catholic Church." As difficult as it seemed, Bill obeyed, and the results were electrifying, he said. He has found such acceptance by the Bishop and from within the church that for the last three years he has been working full-time in the Catholic Church as a school of evangelism instructor with the blessing and oversight of Bishops all over Latin America.

A Northwest College alumnus and graduate of the class of 1963, Bill has spent the last 17 years of his life in Latin American Missions. During the last three years, he has been working with an organization founded jointly by the Roman Catholics and the Protestants known as UCELAM. UCELAM stands for "Union of Christians for Evangelism of Latins in the Americas." Bill has traveled in every country in Latin America, which includes not only the Caribbean and Central America, but South America, also. The reception has been "tremendous" he said. Instead of throwing stones (literally or verbally) at one another, Christians are seeking one another's forgiveness and are finding a "Book-of-Acts" renewal that they have never experienced before.

Within the local Catholic churches, parishioners are being led experientially to the Lord. They are trained to go out into their neighborhoods from house to house and give witness to the Gospel of Christ. The results are "overwhelming" he said. Not only is there a renewal of evangelistic outreach but a renewal of the empowering of the Holy Spirit. Bill estimates that throughout the Roman Catholic world there are no less than fifty million Spirit-filled believers, and the numbers are burgeoning. He sees the Catholic Church as a potential channel of evangelism in reaching the Moslem World, which in itself comprises one-fifth of the world's population.

For the purpose of facilitating this almost "unique" ministry among "our Roman Catholic brethren," he said that he is writing a series of manuals designed for instruction in the basic and the practical outworking of our Christian faith. "Never have we lived in a more exciting time in history," remarked this youthful and energetic, yet restrained, emissary of the Gospel. His travels take him to every country of Latin America each year. The future is virtually bursting with possibility for world-wide revival in fulfillment of the Joelian Prophecy concerning the outpouring of God's Spirit "upon all flesh" in the "latter times"—a time that is peculiarly tied to the restoration of Israel to her own land in the Middle East.

Bill, together with his wife Jan (nee: Wingett) live in Sunnysvale, California, with their family of two sons and one daughter. During his student days at NC, Bill was president of the campus missionary society—little dreaming at that time that his future life and ministry would take him into the channels that it has.
