GAGLARDI TO SPEAK AT HOMECOMING

Rev. Philip A. Gaglardi, Minister of Highways for British Columbia, will be the featured speaker for Northwest College's Alumni Homecoming November 5, 1965.

Rev. Gaglardi, a native of Silverdale, B. C., attended NC in 1937-38. He first pastored a Pentecostal Assemblies of Canada church in Langley Prairie, B. C., then in 1945 took over Calvary Temple in Kamloops.

In 1952 Gaglardi ran for the provincial legislature, was elected, and was named Minister of Public Works. In 1955 the highways were placed under a separate department, and he became Minister of Highways.

Since his election he has 'commuted' back and forth by plane between his office in Victoria and the church in Kamloops, which he continues to

pastor with the aid of his wife, Jennie.

ENROLLMENT JUMP FORECAST

A substantial increase in Autumn Quarter enrollment is in prospect, the Registrar's office reports. Applications from Freshmen and transfer students have run fifty to seventy-five percent ahead of last year during the summer.

If present trends continue the college will have one of the largest freshmen classes in its thirty-two year history and possibly its largest total enrollment ever. College personnel anticipate that the school's space shortage will be felt most acutely in housing and that many students will have to live off campus. New chapel and classroom space being developed on campus this summer should meet the heavier demands for instructional facilities.

NEW FACULTY & STAFF MEMBERS NAMED

Three new faculty appointments and four new staff appointments have been announced by Northwest College's president, C. E. Butterfield. All three are additions rather than replacements.

Mr. Larry Pember of Spokane Wash. will be joining the music department teaching staff. He recently completed his Master's degree in music at Whitworth College, where he was also student choir director working

under Prof. Milton Johnson, well-known Northwest musician.

Mr. Pember earned his B. A. degree in Sacred Music at Central Bible Institute, Springfield, Missouri. While residing in Spokane he was choir director at the First Assembly of God Church there. At Northwest he will teach music theory, applied music, and assist in the training of music ensembles in connection with the Christian service department of the College.

Joining the faculty as its first full-time instructor in chemistry and math will be Mrs. Anita Hughes. She received her B.S. in Western Washington State College at Bellingham, Wash. During the past academic year she taught chemistry at the Everett Junior College. The Hughes reside in the greater Seattle area, where her husband is employed as an oceanographer. Her father, the Rev. William Dorsing, is an Assemblies of God minister, residing in Acme, Washington.

Though not new to the teaching staff of the College, the Reverend Alexander Hunter, will join the faculty as full-time professor of Christian Education and Practical Theology. The Rev. Mr. Hunter has been assistant minister at Calvary Temple in Seattle, and since January of this year he has been interim pastor at the church. He received his B. A. degree from Central Bible Institute, Springfield, Missouri, and his M.R.E. from Southwestern Baptist Theological Seminary, Fort Worth, Texas.

Mr. Hubert Secrist of Kirkland was appointed to fill a new post created by the College Board of Directors in its June Meeting --- that of Superintendent of Buildings and

Grounds. Mr. Secrist is a familiar figure on the campus, having served as construction superintendent in the erection of all ten buildings which thus far have been built on the campus. He is currently supervising the construction of the eleventh, the new college chapel. In his new post he will oversee the maintenance, repair and routine development of the buildings and grounds. These duties have formerly been carried by the Business Manager but have now grown to a work level requiring full-time supervision.

Joining the residence-hall staff will be Mr. and Mrs. William Flisram of Bremerton, Wash. Mrs. Flisram is an ordained minister of the Assemblies of God and will serve as residence hostess at the C.C. Beatty Residence Hall for men. Mr. Flisram will serve as a campus mechanic.

The newest staff appointment is that of Mrs. Edith Whipple, who will succeed Mrs. Elsie Hayman as Accountant. Before coming to the Pacific Northwest, Mrs. Whipple lived in Springfield, Missouri where she achieved some prominence as national director of the Women's Missionary Council of the Assemblies of God. More recently she was employed in the District Office of the Northwest District Council of the Assemblies of God in Kirkland.

SUMMER CONSTRUCTION ACTIVITY HEAVY

The upper level of the campus is a busy place this summer, as construction proceeds on one building and major remodeling is done on two more.

Work on the new chapel is progressing after being held up for several weeks when the steel floor girders failed to arrive on time. The laminated roof beams are now in place and the outside of the building is rapidly taking shape. It is estimated that the chapel will be ready for use about November 1.

Supporting beams for the bridge near the new chapel are in place, and a sidewalk has been laid from the old chapel to the bridge.

Meanwhile, the former chapel building has been remodeled into a lecture room containing one large and three medium-sized classrooms.

The biology lab has been moved from Perks Hall to the education building, where it has been installed next to a lab preparation room which will also serve the chemistry lab. With these changes the education building has essentially become a science building, though still retaining two lecture rooms.

In still another project the blower system in the existing lecture halls is being changed to provide more efficient air circulation.

Supervising these projects is Mr. H. J. Secrist, who was recently named to the position of Superintendent of Buildings and Grounds.

PRESIDENT
MINISTERS ABROAD

Northwest College President C. E. Butterfield recently embarked upon his fourteenth missionary evangelism trip abroad, leaving Seattle on August 6 for Europe where he will fulfill a busy speaking itinerary into September.

His first engagement will be a unique one which will take him to Claremont-Ferrand, France to address a Gypsy Convention under the auspices of the Assemblies of God of France to an anticipated audience of 5,000 persons. A significant work of evangelism has been done among the Gypsies of France under the leadership of the Reverend Clement Le-Cossec, an Assemblies of God minister, who has devoted his fulltime to evangelization among these colorful and nomadic people. Reverend Le-Cossec's son, Jean, is a ministerial student at the Northwest College in Kirkland.

Reverend Butterfield's other speaking engagements in Europe will take him to Barcelona, Spain, where he will lecture in an Assemblies of God school; to Rhonda, in southern Spain, where he will spend some time with American Assemblies of God missionaries, Reverend and Mrs. Roy Dalton; to Belgrade, Yugoslavia, where he will address a convention of Evangelical Pentecostal ministers; to Athens, Greece, where he will conduct a week of special services at an Assembly of God church; to Austria, where he will address another convention of ministers; to Rotterdam Holland for a week of special church services; and to Stuttgart, Germany, where he will address a convention of Assemblies of God ministers from throughout West Germany.

This will be President Butterfield's second trip to Europe. He visited there five years ago in 1960. Accompanying him on the trip are his wife, Mrs. Edith Butterfield, and his son, Paul Butterfield.

WOMACK NAMED
GPH MISSIONS EDITOR

DAVID A. WOMACK, who received his B.A. and M.A. degrees from Northwest College in 1956 and 1960 respectively, has been named editor of Assemblies of God Foreign Missions publications effective September 1.

The new editor succeeds the Rev. John E. Garlock, who resigned to enter fulltime teaching at Central Bible Institute.

Besides editing magazines such as "Global Conquest," "Forum," and "Call to Prayer," he will serve as contributing editor for missions articles published in the "Pentecostal Evangel."

After graduating from Northwest, Rev. Womack was assistant pastor at First Assembly of God, Tacoma, then pastor of the Assembly of God in Union Gap, Washington.

He was ordained by the Northwest District in 1958, served as interim pastor of Glad Tidings Church, Vancouver in 1959-60, and received missionary appointment to Colombia in 1960.

In Colombia he served as the Assemblies of God treasurer, directed the Bible school for training national ministers, and more recently was pastor of Bethel Temple Assembly of God, Bogota.

HOLY LAND TOUR MADE

Northwest College's Registrar and outgoing Public Relations Representative, Amos Millard and Ben Birkeland, returned July 8 from a tour of the Holy Land.

The two were among four Seattle area ministers taking part in the Bible Lands tour directed by Rev. Ralph Harris, director of the Church Literature Department of the Gospel Publishing House.

The group left Seattle June 3 and New York June 8. The tour included stops in Glasgow, London, Naples, Rome, Cairo, Damascus, Jerusalem, Athens, and Paris.

Side trips included visits to Pompeii in Italy; Baalbek in Lebanon; Samaria, Bethlehem, Hebron, and the Dead Sea in Jordan; Galilee, Megiddo, Haifa, and Caesarea in Israel; Corinth and Mycenae in Greece.

Bro. Millard reported that the contrast between Israel and the other Near East countries is striking. Israel is modern, well developed, and productive. Scientific methods have paid notable dividends in its food growing areas, which closely resemble those of California. There is a high cultural level and a strong sense of unity and destiny.

Among the trips interesting sidelights were a Sunday night visit to an Assemblies of God church in Rome, and a meeting with the former Peggy Richey and her husband who are attached to the U.S. Embassy staff in Damascus.
