PRESIDENTS TO CHANGE JULY 1

Rev. D. V. Hurst of Springfield, Missouri has been named to be the new president of Northwest College to succeed the Rev. C. E. Butterfield.

Rev. Hurst has been coordinator of the Assemblies of God Spiritual Life-Evangelism Commission since February, 1964, and has also served on the faculty of Central Bible College in Springfield during that time. He served on the faculty of North Central Bible College in Minneapolis from 1948-50.

A native of Annandale, Minn., Rev. Hurst was graduated from North Central Bible College in 1944 and subsequently from Sioux Falls, S. Dak. College in 1947. In 1958 he received the Master of Education degree from Drury College in Springfield, Mo. During his academic career Rev. Hurst received several honors, including being named to Phi Delta Kappa, national speech fraternity.

Rev. Hurst began his ministry in 1944 and was ordained in 1946 by the South Dakota District. He served as assistant pastor of the Sioux Falls Assemblies of God Church for three years before returning to North Central Bible College in 1946 where he taught for two years. He then moved to Tulsa, Okla. where he was supply pastor and director of Christian education at Central Assembly.

In 1951 he became Workers Training Supervisor of the National Sunday School Department in Springfield, Mo. In 1954 he became national representative for the department, and subsequently was named its Assistant National Secretary.

From the Sunday School department Rev. Hurst went to the Radio Department where he served as producer -- narrator for "Revivaltime." After six vears there he was named Spiritual Life-Evangelism coordinator. In this post Rev. Hurst's work has been in the interests of coordinating denominational evangelism and promoting evangelistic outreaches such as a mobilization-placement service and literature campaigns across the nation. The department has also developed a fellowship for evangelists.

The Rev. Hurst has traveled

widely and has spoken for Bible conferences, rallies, youth services and other gatherings in the U. S. and abroad. He has written two books, "Ye Shall Be Witnesses" and "And He Gave Teachers." He coauthored a third book, "The Church Begins."

Rev. Hurst and his wife were married in 1944. They have two children, Jayne Rense, 17, and Richard Michael, 12. Rev. Hurst will assume his duties at the College effective July 1. He will be the third president in the college's 32-year history.

BAUNSGARD ELECTED

Rev. Allen Baunsgard, pastor of Beacon-Rainier Assembly in Seattle and a 1958 NC graduate, has been elected Alumni Association Vice-President for a three-year term.

He was elected to the same office last year in a special election called to fill a vacancy. This will be his first full term.

Preceding the commencement was the baccalaureate service in the new college chapel on June 3 at 7:30 p.m. The baccalaureate address was brought by Northwest District Superintendent Rev. R. J. Carlson.

The traditional class night service sponsored by the Associated Student Body was held Saturday evening, June 4 at 7:30 p.m. Held in the college chapel, it featured presentations by four student representatives.

STUDENTS, FACULTY TO TAKE PART IN MISSIONS WORK

Several Northwest College students and one faculty member will be going to various mission fields this summer to work in various projects.

Going to Liberia to work under the Assemblies of God student Internship program will be Junior student Donald Menzies of Lake Stevens, Wash. Accompanying him will be Mr. Donald Peck, another student. who previously served in Africa as a missionary builder.

Approved for internships within the United States are two students. David Delgatty. Junior student from Kennewick, Washington will be going to Arizona to work in an Assemblies of God mission among the Yuka Indians, and Miss Edith Reed of Mountain Home, Idaho will be working in children's home work within the U. S.

Several other students plan to go out under the auspices of Operation Mobilization, a missionary organization among Christian college students, and still others expect to go out under another youth missionary organization known as Youth with a Mission.

Professor Maxine Williams will be taking a six-month Sabbatical leave from the col-

lege to go to San Jose, Costa Rica where she will work in the Assemblies of God Bible School. Miss Williams indicates that she expects to do some teaching there, but her primary mission is to live among the natives in order to gain greater facility in Spanish, which she teaches at the College. She also expects to do some tutoring while there. She will return to the College in the winter quarter, 1967.

ALUMNUS TO RADIO DEPARTMENT

The Rev. Edward S. Caldwell, an NC graduate and former pastor in Caldwell, Idaho, is the new publicity director of the Assemblies of God Radio Department.

Rev. Caldwell, who conducted a daily radio broadcast for five years, succeeds Rev. Wildon Colbaugh of Springfield.

A Seattle native, Rev. Caldwell graduated from Roosevelt High School in 1946. He then entered Northwest Bible Institute, where he graduated three years later. While at Northwest he was art editor and operated a daily radio broadcast.

His ministry has been active and varied. In the 17 years since his graduation from Northwest, he has held pastorates in Mackay, Firth, and Caldwell, Idaho; was pastor pro tem and then assistant pastor in Nampa, Idaho; and has been president and vicepresident of the Caldwell Ministerial Association and chairman of the Canyon County Pentecostal Fellowship. He has edited the Southern Idaho District publication, "The Beacon," and has had articles published in a number of evangelical mag-"Christian azines including Life," "The Christian Bookseller," "Pentecostal Evangel," "Sunday School Counselor", "Pulpit," and "Advance." He Counselor," has been a sectional C. A. representative and secretarytreasurer of the district C.A. department.

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THE CAMPUS SCENE TODAY: What Is Our Status On Accreditation?

'<u>Getting accredited' is often mentioned when people talk</u> about future improvements at <u>NC</u>. Are we not accredited already? The Bible College program has been accredited for many years by the Accrediting Association of Bible Colleges. It is only the Junior College division, then, for which accreditation is still desired.

Is JC accreditation being sought? Yes. College officials have been in contact with the Northwest Association of Secondary and Higher Schools for five or six years, and have attended Association meetings regularly during that time. Two Association officials have been guests on campus.

What steps are there in gaining JC Accreditation? First. the college submits a formal application and a preliminary report. Then an accrediting representative association visits the college. If his report and the college's preliminary report are favorable, the college performs a more thorough self-evaluation study, which is followed by a visit from an accreditation team. When all this is successfully completed, the Higher Commission of the Northwest Association takes official action to accredit during its annual meeting.

At what point in this procedure is NC? The preliminary report has just been submitted; the representative's visit has not yet taken place. The selfstudy may be done in the coming school year.

When might JC accreditation come? The earliest date would be December 1967, one and onehalf years from now.

What changes have been made in the college in preparation for seeking regional accreditation? Several. First, there has been improvement of physical facilities, especially along the lines of gymnasium, science labs, and library. Then, new courses have been added, such as those in mathematics, science, and business. Also, more teachers have been employed, with more stress on each one teaching in his major field.

PRESIDENT BUTTERFIELD NAMED EVANGELISM CONGRESS OBSERVER

President C. E. Butterfield has been named an observer to World Congress on Evangelism in Berlin, West Germany, October 28-November 3.

Twelve hundred church leaders chosen from the world over will participate in the congress as representatives of various churches. 150 will be from America, including four from the Assemblies of God.

Other plans which President Butterfield has on schedule while in Europe will be to speak at several conferences including one of the Swiss National Pentecostal Mission in October 24-28. The Basel, Mission is headed by the Rev. Leonard Steiner, well-known world Pentecostal leader. President Butterfield indicates that he expects to take on other speaking engagements while in Europe.
