

fold: It required large expense for upkeep. and it was felt that the car was not beneficial to the student body as a whole. The car has been sold for \$1,060. This money will be used for a new project, the construction of a tennis court. However, there have been some expenses accrued in connection with the sale so the approximate · profit available for the new project is \$950.

At the present time the A.S.B. Council is working with the Administration and the Ground Planning Committee to find a suitable location for the new court. The project will be one double court 60' X 120', a total of 72,000sq. feet.

Copies of the A.S.B. Constitution will be available in the Dean of Students office in the near future. The Council of 1959-60 revised the Student Body Constitution and there have been several changes made to bring it up to date.

The Council would like to thank the student body for the payment of your tithes in our Monday morning offerings. A sufficient amount of money has been received and we have made the first \$1,000 payment on the purchasing of the Student Union Building.

We also thank those girls who have so faithfully acted as supervisors for the S.U.B. in the evenings. The following girls have been responsible for seeing that the building was locked, windows closed, and lights turned out: Mary Ballenger, Paula Wells, Carol Smith, Pat Hall, Carolyn Aho and Joanne Cline.
