CHAPEL PLANS MOVE AHEAD

Plans for NC's new chapel are well under way.

Architect's drawings show an attractive, stone fronted frame building of modern construction located amidst the tall firs in the south-east corner of the campus.

The chapel, seating 600, is being designed to serve also as a music department building. Several classrooms will be included, along with four faculty offices and ten practice rooms. One classroom will function as a band and choir practice area.

On Sunday, November 8, a Campus Chapel Day will be observed throughout

observed throughout the Northwest, Oregon, Montana, and Southern Idaho Districts. At this time the chapel project will be presented to the churches of

the Districts and offerings taken toward the estimated \$100,000 cost.

ENROLLMENT UP

Autumn Quarter enrollment totals 283 students, a new record for any one quarter on the new campus in Kirkland. This represents a 5.2% increase over the number enrolled for the fall quarter last year and stands as a seventeen-year high in quarterly enrollments, statistical records indicate.

Other enrollment statistics indicate that men students outnumber women students by 55% to 45%, and that 38% of the total enrollment is in the Junior College. Fifty-nine per cent of the new freshman are enrolled in Junior College programs with the remaining 41% in Bible College programs.

HOMECOMING NEARS

The schedule of events for Homecoming Day, Friday, November 6, has been announced by Alumni officers.

Activities begin at 11:00 AM with a chapel service in the regular chapel building. Rev. Henry H. Ness, Northwest College's founder, will be the guest speaker.

At 1:00 a free luncheon will be held in the cafeteria.

In the afternoon students and alumni will compete in a 3:00 softball game, weather permitting. In case of rain athletic activities will be scheduled in the Pavilion.

For many alumni the 7:00 PM banquet in the cafeteria should be the day's highlight. Cost will be \$1.40 per person. A number of old time faculty members will be attending. There will be films of earlier years plus other special features.

Because some of the banquet's most interesting features will take place immediately after 7:00, it is very important for all alumni to arrive and be seated on time. It may be well to allow an extra 15 or 20 minutes for the drive to the college to cover any delays on the way. You won't be sorry if you're early; you will be sorry if you're late!

All indications are that this will be the biggest and best homecoming yet. Don't miss it! Join us on November 6 on the campus!

DAUGHTER OF KOREAN SCHOOL FOUNDER ATTENDS NC

Miss Kyocha Kang, 22, of Chunju, Korea, has enrolled in Northwest College to work toward a degree in Bible and Christian Education.

Miss Kang is a graduate of Yonsei University in Seoul, with a B.A. in Education. Her program at Northwest will cover two years.

Hongmo Kang, Kyocha's father, is the founder and president of the Youngseng (Everlasting life) Junior and Senior High School and Evening College, which has a student body of 3,000.

The school was begun as a result of the Korean War. During that war the Kangs, who were Christians though not yet Pentecostal, were forced to flee as the Communists searched for them with the intention of killing them. Kyocha, then eight years old, and the other Kang children were housed with relatives in the country near Chunju while the parents hid in the mountains.

After the war the Kangs, grateful that they had been spared but aware that they well might not have lived, began a free evening school for many of the orphaned children of the area. Their work prospered and in the eleven years since has grown to include 3,000 students and 90 faculty members. The college section of the school is in its first year of existence and has 200 students. Eventually it will be a four-year-college. Tuition is still free to a tenth of the student body, and one per cent of the students actually are given money by the school to enable them to attend.

The Kangs were introduced to the Pentecostal experience just a few years ago, at the time of the Reid meetings in

1962. Since then a number of revivals have come to the school, and many of the students and faculty have been filled with the Holy Spirit.

Kyocha came to Northwest as a result of feeling the need for Bible training to be better able to teach her own people, and as a result of NC President C. E. Butterfield's recent visit to her country. She plans to return to Korea upon completion of her work here.

PRESIDENT IN SAIGON

Northwest College President, C. E. Butterfield, just back from a four-week trip to the Orient said that he found a very casual life among the inhabitants of much-publicized Saigon when he visited there a few weeks ago. "Judging by what a person could see on the streets in that city, a visitor would be unaware of the fact that the country is at war," he said.

Other countries visited by Rev. Butterfield were South Korea and Cambodia. In South

Details on the actual meetings were not available for this issue of the News since press time was prior to the first services.

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Korea, where he addressed a ministers' conference which included ministers of the several major denominations in the land, he said he found the Christian church to be spiritually and numerically flourishing in a way which he has rarely witnessed in all his travels. The churches of the land bear a character akin to that described in the Bible in Apostolic times, he said. He found a state of spiritual fervor, and vitality among the Christians of all denominations, especially among the Pentecostals and the Presbyterians.

In Cambodia he said he found an "explosive situation." Gestures of friendship by Cambodians towards Americans are looked upon with suspicion by officials of the country, he indicated. Hence Cambodians tend to remain aloof from Americans in the country to prevent any question as to their loyalty.

COLLEGE PERSONNEL

Rev. Donald H. Fee, professor of Bible and Practical Theology at N. C., was grad-

uated with his Master of Arts Degree from the Fuller Summer Theological Seminary of Winona Lake, Indiana, in August. His thesis topic was "An Investigation of the Seventh Day Adventists' Doctrine of the Atonement." With the commencement of the 1964-65 school year at Northwest College several new personnel have joined the college staff. Mr. Bill Sutter of Bozeman, Montana, has joined the music faculty. He teaches part-time and directs the college choir while completing his work for his Bachelor of Music degree at Seattle Pacific College this year. Mrs. Helen Wolfe of Kirkland is teaching Elementary German during the coming year. Mr. Wilbur Metcalf will teach Math. Mr. Jerry Creek will supply as Men's P.E. instructor during the fall term while regular instructor, Floyd Beam of Seattle, is cadeting in connection with his education program at the University of Washington. Pastor Phil Johnson of Seattle is teaching part-time in the department of Practical Theology. Professor Daniel Pecota has

stepped into the post of Dean of Students, and his wife, Mrs. Esther Pecota, operates the college bookstore. A new assistant in the library is Miss Margaret Garman of Tacoma, a graduate of the college.

Dean Lackey indicates that an additional appointment will be made for instruction in Chemistry for the winter quarter and that Prof. John Pope, who is on leave of absence to write his doctoral dissertation, will be back for the winter quarter in January.
