## COME TO THE CAMPUS THIS YEAR!

April 2 is the date for this year's College Day on the campus of Northwest College, during which time young people will be invited to visit the campus.

Activities will include class visitation and tours of the campus, a choir concert and chapel service, a basketball game or other evening entertainment, and a workshop-informatorium.

Plans call for the schedule to end by mid-afternoon so there will be adequate daylight travel time for those driving back to their homes. Overnight accommodations will be provided for those coming from distances, and meals will be provided by the college.

Especially invited are pastors, young people of high school age, and their parents. Chairman of the College Day committee will be Dean of Students Daniel B. Pecota.

## SERVICES RUN TWO WEEKS

Student interest was high and spiritual benefits were many during the Winter Quarter spiritual emphasis week with Rev. Linfield Crowder.

The impact of the meetings was attested to by the testimonies of numbers of

students and by an unprecedented extension of the meetings through a second week in response to popular student request. Several students received the infilling of the Holy Spirit. Rev. Crowder sought to inspire the students to a literal, practical appropriation of and obedience to the Word of God.

A secondary impact of his ministry came by way of demonstration and his own testimony, and that was to give validity to the training which he had received at Northwest College (he graduated in 1953). Brother Crowder is the fourth alumnus to come back to the college as its spiritual emphasis week speaker. Others include, Rev. Maynard Oss, class of 1937, Rev. Ernest Francis, Class of 1939, and Rev. Walter Buck, class of 1945.

This series and the fall series with Rev. Buck both witnessed very high sustained levels of night-time student attendance.

## CHAPEL NEARS

March 1st has been set for the beginning of construction of the new Northwest College chapel. Ground breaking ceremonies have been set for February 24th during the college chapel hour at 10:00 a.m.

Present plans call for some modifications from the previous plans. A single-unit structure will be erected instead of a double-unit structure, and it is expected that this will result in an appreciably reduced cost.

The structure will house a sanctuary with seating for

600 persons.

Architectural work is being done by designer Gordon Nickell of Seattle, and construction will be done under the supervision of Mr. H. J. Secrist of Kirkland. This will be the eleventh building Mr. Secrist has constructed on the new campus since 1959, when the College acquired the site.

Heading the planning commission is D.H. Fee. Other members include B. P. Birke-land, C.E. Butterfield, H.J. Carlson, H.W. Crowder, and H. J. Secrist. It is hoped that the chapel will be ready for use by next fall.

## BRIDGE PLANNED

The Associated Student Body has been given a "go-ahead" from the Board of Directors on a proposal to build a foot bridge spanning the small creek on the campus between the site of the proposed chapel and the educational building complex. The bridge will be constructed under architectural supervision and is expected to add beauty to the campus in addition to its functional purpose. It is planned that eventually a pond will be created near the bridge.

ALUMNI PRESIDENT'S COLUMN

Dear Alumni:

Ofttimes we think in terms of what we do to show our cooperation in areas of church or school or even in our civic or community affairs. Someone has said that loyalty to any particular phase of life is best shown by how we cooperate. I'm thinking today, although a graduate of several years past, how marvelous the move of God and the supplying of needs by the hand of God has been here in Northwest College. I believe in a God of miracles. Consequently, all around us here on campus, we are reminded that God has indeed performed many marvelous things whereof we are glad.

I'm also happy to recognize that this is a school where the training of our young people in Christian idealogies and Christian atmosphere goes forward in the midst of a world of education that does not always enhance a spiritual or moral atmosphere in the lives of youth. With a spirit in the world today of rebellion against all of the things that we have held as very sacred, it would only seem that the rebellion against the Bible and God and the church is necessarily making the testimony of the church weaker today than it has ever been. Thus we appeal for a stronger emphasis on the basics that are still a part of our American way of life in the training of our young people.

I think in terms of our school that all of us, especially we who are of the alumni, ought to be vitally concerned that we do all we can to encourage and build and solicit support for the school. Progress is of the essence. Progress and moving forward is the essence of the day. Moses at one time, faced with the Red Sea and the insurmountable cir-

cumstances and the Egyptians behind him, cried out, "Stand still, and see the salvation of the Lord." But remember, this was only the cry of Moses, because immediately following, God said, "Go forward." And the moment that they went forward, all of the obstacles diminished under the mighty hand of God. Could I suggest, alumni, that you and I manifest our loyalty to our school by showing every sense of cooperation and urging that the word "go forward" be the very theme that our Administration, our Board of Directors, and all of us can share together in the year that lies ahead of us, until Jesus comes.

Actions included a decision to go ahead with the new chapel according to the original plan, a single-unit structure to house an auditorium-sanctuary rather than a dual-unit structure to include a music wing. This modification will result in reduced cost for the present time. Construction is geared to acquisition of minimum cash resources.

**ENROLLMENT GOOD**

278 students have enrolled for the winter quarter---the highest in seventeen years. The previous record in 1948-49 included large numbers of World War II veterans.

A record number of new mid-year enrollees entered on January 4 to bring the college's cumulative enrollment

for the year up to 313. The cumulative enrollment for the entire 1963-64 school year was 299. Anticipated spring quarter enrollment could bring cumulative enrollment up to an almost ten per cent increase over last year.

A survey of new mid-year students indicates that almost one-half of them came from the greater Seattle area.

Denominational affiliations of students in the college continue to grow, with twenty denominations or church groups being represented in the student body thus far this year. A study of fall quarter enrollment showed that 88 per cent of the students originated from Assemblies of God churches, and 12 per cent from other groups.

The Fall 1964 student body came from 10 states and 8 foreign countries. Leading states were: Washington (182), Oregon (40), Montana (18), Idaho (14), Wyoming (4), North Carolina (4), Countries were: Canada, France, Jamaica, Fiji, Philippines, British Guiana, Japan, Korea.
