Have You Met?

THE REV. DAVID L. AASEN, a native of Eau Claire, Wisconsin, arrived in Seattle last August as the new Dean of NBC. His route from Eau Claire to Seattle extended over a period of years and contained numerous detours.



With the call of God on his life, Brother Aasen went to Great Lakes Bible Institute, Zion, Illinois,

to prepare for the ministry. Following graduation at GLBI, he continued his education at Goshen College, Goshen, Indiana, where he received the Bachelor of Arts degree.

His next stop was Bethel Biblical Seminary in Chicago. In 1951 he graduated with the Bachelor of Divinity degree. Brother Aasen later became pastor of the First Assembly of God church in Aurora, Illinois, where he remained until called to join the faculty at Southwestern Bible Institute.

While teaching at SBI, he began work on his doctor's degree at Southwestern Theological Seminary at Fort Worth. The subject of his doctoral dissertation will be "Forty Years of New Testament Teaching and Preaching in the Assemblies of God."

Dean Aasen supplements his ministry in Christian education with preaching engagements.

TWENTY-EIGHT YEARS of successful ministry have provided Rev. Donald Fee with a great insight into God's Word and a wealth of practical teaching experience.



Before coming to NBC, Brother Fee pastored churches in Oregon, Washington and California and also for the last three years was in evangelistic work,

particularly in a teaching ministry.

Brother Fee has these objectives for his teaching ministry at the College: To see that the students are well grounded in a systematic understanding of God's Word and are taught the art of studying.

NEW COURSES ADDED TO CURRICULUM

Dean Aasen reports many new courses will be added to the college curriculum in the near future. Practical Evangelism, the first in a series of four progressive courses in evangelism will be added this year. A total of five courses will be offered within a two year period.

A preaching seminar is scheduled to begin this quarter with a course in Contemporary Preaching Style. The seminar will include six new courses in preaching for a total of eight to be offered in this field by the school. This means that NBC will soon be offering the most courses in evangelism and preaching of any school associated with the Assemblies of God.

Also to be introduced, is a course in Family Life. This course will deal with courtship, marriage and family

life from the Christian viewpoint. A new course, Leadership Training, is being designed to assist students in preparing for Christian leadership.

These courses are being added to the curriculum after much consideration of the student's need for more complete and practical training.

LARGE ENROLLMENT INCREASE LISTED

For the third consecutive year the enrollment has increased at NBC—this year 15 per cent. The first quarter ended with 203 students enrolled. According to Registrar, Amos Millard, approximately twenty new students will be added to the above figures when they are welcomed to the school for the beginning of the winter quarter.

The geographical representation shows 15 states, 2 territories and 5 foreign countries. Of the first quarter enrollment, 132 came from Washington, then Oregon with 17, Idaho 9, California 8, Montana 7, North Dakota 5, Colorado 3, two each from Nebraska, Michigan, Illinois and one each from Wisconsin, Pennsylvania, Wyoming, Ohio and South Dakota.

Four came from Alaska and one from Hawaii. The foreign countries are represented as follows: Jamaica 2, and one each from Canada, Bahama Islands, Sweden and the Fiji Islands.

GOSPEL TEAMS ARE OPERATING

North, east, south and west; each week-end small groups of students load their musical instruments into cars and travel to various churches in the Northwest District for services.

Under the direction of their team leader they minister with music and testimonies. One member of the group acts as speaker.

The teams usually travel within a one hundred and fifty mile radius from the college. In most cases the host church is responsible for travel expenses and entertainment of the group.

These young people are sincere in their consecration and in their desire to minister the Gospel of Christ. Because they depend on God to anoint the meeting, many profitable services have been reported already this year. Pastors indicate that the teams are an encouragement to their young people.

RUDY ESPERANZA

Who could guess the plans God had for the little bundle born to the Esperanzas in the distant Philippines that April day in 1908? Yet, from this home, devoted to Roman Catholicism, came the first, and present, General Superintendent of the Assemblies of God in the Philippines.

While in intermediate school, Rudy Esperanza began attending the Methodist church where he learned about God. Though often convicted through the years, he never yielded to Christ.

After high school he received an exhorter's license and an offer to attend seminary. Turning from these to his youthful ambition—America and education—he left for Seattle in May, 1928.


"I was caught in the depression, and began to drift along with my own kind in Chinatown. My religious background was not enough to keep me, and I found myself in a life of sin. When filled with sorrow, tired and sick, someone invited me to attend a Full Gospel mission. . . . I went to the altar, and as soon as my knees hit the floor, I knew I was saved."

God's call and conflict followed. He remembered the poverty and struggle of his boyhood pastor; and there was the old desire for an addendum to his name. Once the decision was made, he was filled with the Spirit and entered NBC, to graduate with the Conquerors, '38.

Spring, 1939, found Rudy back in the Philippines, where he began preaching among relatives. In December he dedicated the church built that year. The ensuing years have been busy with District work and teaching in the Bible School.

Leonor Buenavista, Pioneer Class, Bethel Bible Institute, became Mr. Esperanza's bride on June 22, 1949. Rudy, Jr., three and a half, and Rebecca, two years, help to complete the happy little family.

God's plan has come to pass. He has a representative in the Philippines, conquering for Christ among those ". . . caught in the depression of life, drifting along with their kind."

Waldo, '44, and Kathryn (Stone), '39, Nicodemus are on furlough from Cuba.


Maynard Oss, '37, pastor at Everett, was camp speaker for northern Missouri district at Chillicothe last summer.


HARRY LEID HEADS ATHLETIC PROGRAM

Student Employment is High

Mrs. Mollie Perks, Dean of Women and employment counselor, reports that approximately eighty-six per cent of the students at NBC are currently engaged in part-time employment.

For students of limited financial means, Seattle continues to offer excellent opportunities for part-time work. In order to help students take advantage of these opportunities, Northwest Bible College maintains an employment service. Students are assisted in finding jobs that are compatible with their school program. When necessary, young people are able to finance the entire cost of their Bible college training through part-time employment.
