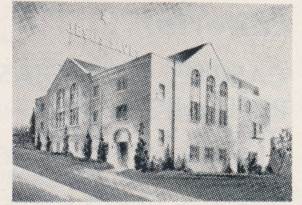

## ENTHUSIASM MOUNTS HIGH AS CAMPUS PLANS PROCEED

"Won't it be wonderful when we have a campus!" "Maybe our class will be the first to graduate from the new campus!" Such remarks were common in the halls of N.B.C. during the last few weeks of the 1953-54 term, as the long-time dream of a campus began to show possibilities of becoming a reality. Enthusiastic students raised \$1,564 in a "Pennies for Progress" campus fund. Student pledges at the end of May amounted to an additional \$1,250.

To investigate the matter of a location, a committee has been appointed by the directorate. This committee has met twice and examined five possible campus sites, but as yet no selection has been made.

## ALUMNUS TO INSTRUCT; A. BRILL WILL HEAD LIBRARY

Returning to N.B.C. as an instructor will be coming "home" to Professor Arvin W. Glandon, who received a diploma from this school in 1942. He also has a B.A. degree from Southwestern Bible Institute in Waxahachie, Texas, a Th.B. from the Baptist Theological Seminary in Fort Worth, Texas, and a M.Ed. degree from North Texas State College.

Professor Glandon has taught Greek and systematic theology at S.B.I. during the past six years, also serving as Dean of the Bible College division during that time.

His parents are native Northwesterners, living in Portland, Ore. Mrs. Glandon also attended N.B.C. in 1939. Her parents live in Mukilteo, Wash.

### Miss Brill to Head Library

Miss Ann Brill, who joins the faculty this fall as librarian, brings years of education and experience to her new position. She received a B.A. degree from Central Bible Institute in 1950 and has also studied at Kansas State Teachers' College and the University of California. From 1946 to 1954 she was head librarian at C.B.I., and served as student library assistant at Kansas State Teachers' College during the summer of 1951 and as reference and circulation librarian at Wheaton College during the summer of 1953.

### 8000 VOLUMES, LIBRARY DRIVE GOAL, NOW REACHED

Eight thousand volumes by the fall of 1954—that was the goal of the library committee and it has been reached! On Sept. 1, 1953 the library contained 5,755 volumes. During the 1953-54 school term and summer 2,415 were added, bringing the total to 8,170. Eight thousand were needed for accreditation purposes.

Books were donated by the Christ Ambassadors of the Northwest and Montana districts, the Seattle Public Library, the University of Washington library, and ministers' libraries. Several substantial cash gifts were also received. "By next year we hope to raise the library holdings to 10,000 volumes," Dean Aasen stated.

### NEW COURSES, SEMINARS ADDED TO CURRICULUM

Among the new courses being added to the curriculum are two law courses, Elementary Law for preachers and International Law for Mission majors, both to be taught by Dr. Crawford Bishop. Dr. Bishop's qualifications for this instruction include many years in government service in the United States and abroad.

Three preaching seminars are also being offered for the first time this year: Seminar in Expository Preaching in the fall; Seminar in Preaching from the Prophets in the winter, and preaching for Special Occasions in the spring.

**"ONE PER CENT PLAN" WILL BENEFIT N. B. C.**

Since tuition pays only part of the expenses of N.B.C., the remaining amount, approximately \$125 per student every year, must be met by outside support.

At the Northwest District Council of the Assemblies of God in Spokane, April 28-30, the following resolution was passed:

"RESOLVED that the Northwest District Council give its wholehearted support to the raising of \$10,000 annually for the Northwest Bible College in addition to the 10 per cent ministerial tithe, such additional sum to be raised by recommending to each church that it contribute monthly to the District office one per cent of its total income, exclusive of Sunday School funds, for the support of the Northwest Bible College. This plan to go into effect May 15, 1954."

This plan replaces the Dollar Per Member plan which had previously been in force. "Many churches have already responded enthusiastically to this new plan. It should help appreciably in meeting the operating needs of our college, President Butterfield stated.

**FALL ENROLLMENT PROSPECTS GOOD, REGISTRAR STATES**

Exactly the same number of applications have been received for the new fall quarter as had been received this time a year ago, reports the registrar's office.

On the date of this writing 85 new applications have been sent—exactly the same number as last year. This figure, however, represents a considerable increase over the number of applications received at this date in years before last year. It is expected that a large percentage of the former students will be returning to resume their studies and that nearly maximum use will be made of the school's facilities in accomodating students. "Applications will be processed up to the beginning of the new quarter, Sept. 8, however, applicants are urged to get their applications in at least three weeks before that date to allow adequate time for completing the admissions procedure," Registrar Millard stated.
