OUR PRESIDENT SPEAKS...



Ready my place to fill;




WE GATHER FOR PRAYER

Coach Floyd Schrader directed the team through exciting competition as they battled with other school and church basketball teams.



In order to qualify for graduation, each student is required to earn at least one-third of his academic credits in this department. One of the principal aims of the College is: "To offer a thorough course of instruction in God's Word to all students, so that, by the time of his graduation each one will have studied every book in the Bible." In addition to this, each student pursues courses of study in the great doctrines of the Bible, in order that he may be "a workman that needeth not to be ashamed, rightly dividing the word of truth."

What a blessed privilege it is for young people to be able to study the greatest Textbook in the world—the Holy Bible—in a school that is 100 per cent Christian and under a faculty that is 100 per cent Spirit-filled!

There is nothing more essential in the development of Christian missionaries, evangelists, or pastors than practical experience on the field.

Seattle with its surrounding territory affords marvelous opportunities for every type of gospel ministry.

Pastors are constantly calling for Gospel Teams to take charge of their morning and evening services, or to do house-to-house visitation on Sunday afternoons. Other calls come from leaders of Christ Ambassador groups in various churches.


Rescue missions' services are a regular weekly assignment and afford opportunities for street-meetings and personal evangelism.

In addition to these, the Marine Hospital, the jails, and the Boys' Reform School open up wonderful avenues of service.

The student body is divided into several gospel teams, each with its speaker, song-leader and pianist, and other musical talent. Every student has the privilege of going on at least one gospel assignment a week.

God's blessing has attended the efforts of the students during the year. Encouraging reports have been received from pastors telling of souls saved and spiritual uplift among their young people through the visit of a Gospel Team.

CHRISTIAN EDUCATION



"And he gave some to be teachers. A pastor must be apt to teach." This department is designed to train workers in the expression of the knowledge gained in Biblical studies. In the second year the student is introduced in a survey course to the multiplied forms of Christian Education—youth work, adult education, Sunday schools, week-day church schools, vacation Bible schools, camps, and the various agencies that co-operate in such education. In the quarters that follow, particular skills are developed: the art of teaching, the ability to organize and plan Vacation schools and Sunday schools, the art of story-telling, and the proper use of many forms of visual aids. Because "learning is the residue of pupil participation," the series culminates in a course of practice teaching in a local church under the supervision of an experienced teacher. All of these courses are in addition to the many studies in the Bible and its related subjects.

In recognition of work done in this department, the Northwest Bible College, in addition to the degree with a major in Christian Education, grants the Workers' Training Master Diploma issued by the Sunday School Department of the General Council of the Assemblies of God, and the diploma of the Evangelical Teachers' Training Association.



We must do our best for God; we must obey His command; then we shall hear Him say, Well done thou good and faithful servant: enter thou into the joy of thy Lord.


HOME AND ALASKA

To the graduates of NBC who will be joining the ranks of our alumni go our prayers that God's richest blessing shall rest upon them in their various fields of labor.


