

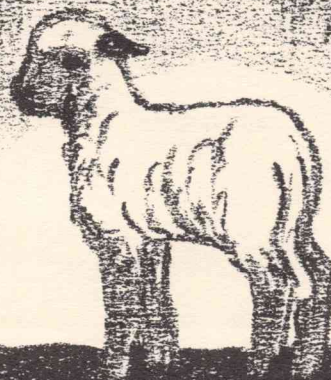

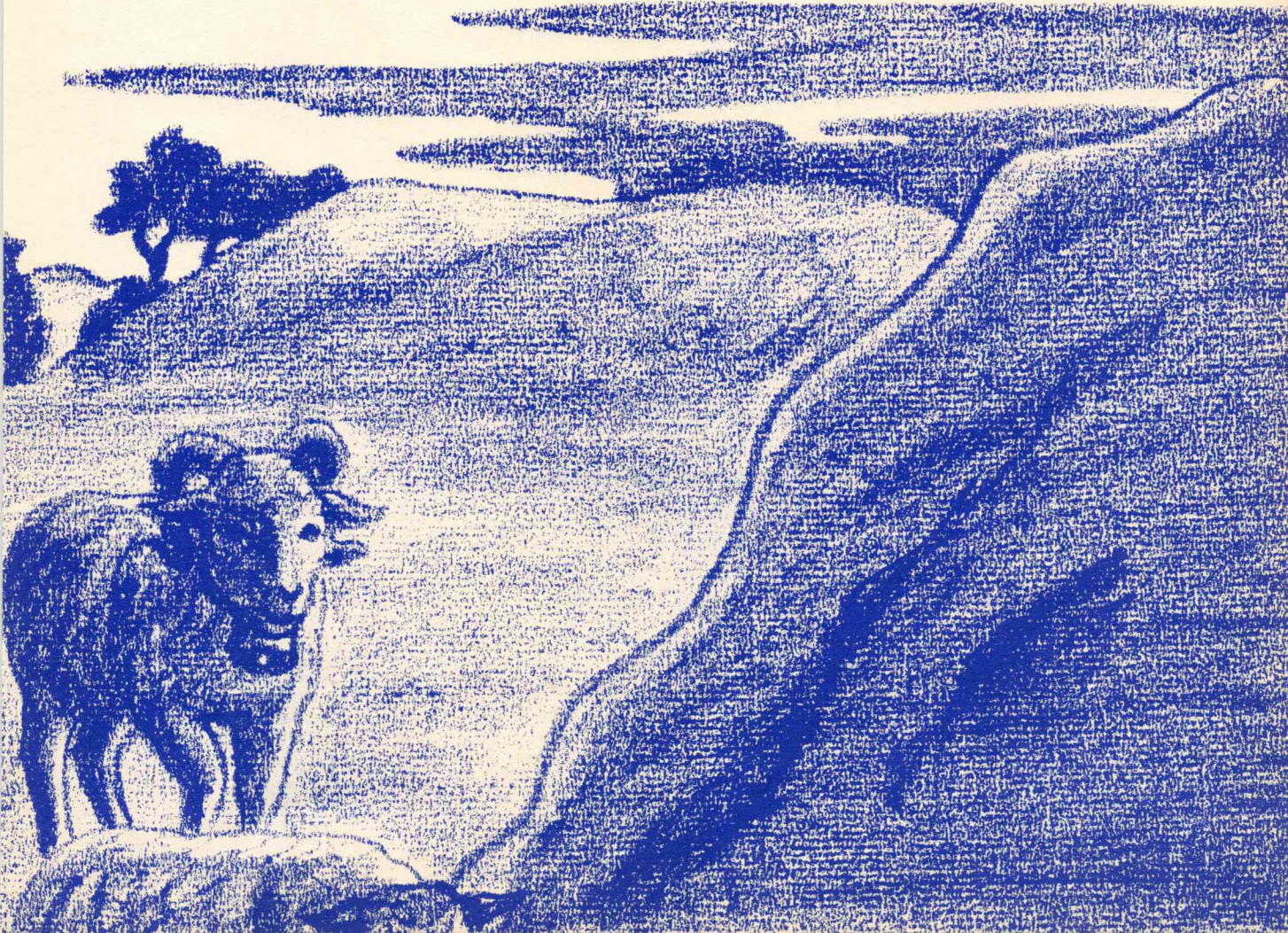

MESSAGE FROM THE DEAN OF MEN

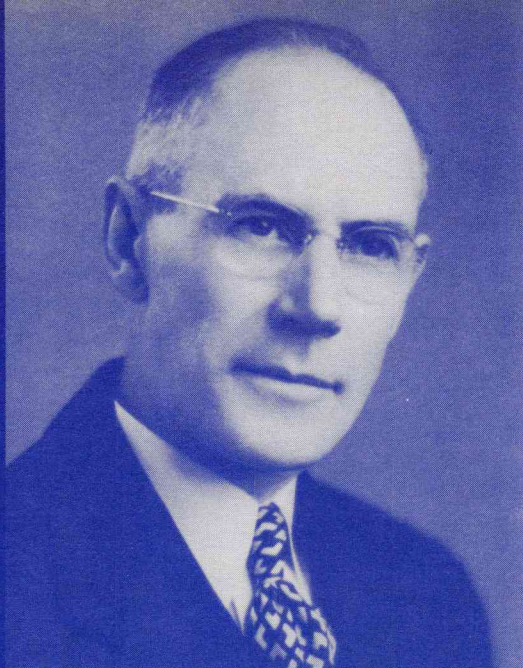

The Master's voice is as clear today as in that glorious day, and the call comes, "Follow me"—an abundant invitation to those seeking a leader and guide.

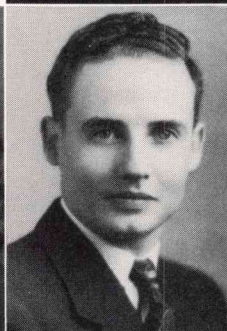
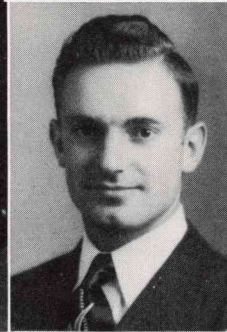

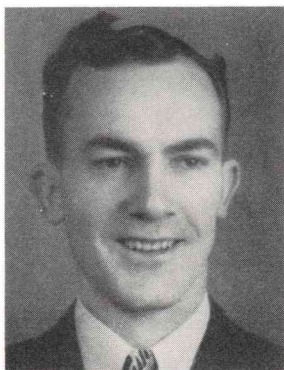

Africa! Land of superstition and darkness! How this land needs the gospel to bring enlightenment to the darkened hearts, hope to the discouraged multitudes, and peace to the troubled souls. Only the blessing of salvation can free the people of Africa from the fear and bondage in which they live.

This year has been a busy one for the Africa Missionary Band. Before Christmas they sent tins of candy to those missionaries in Africa who are graduates of Northwest Bible College. After Christmas they began work on their project which is the construction of a map of Africa showing in pictures and words, the people, their customs, and above all, their needs. It is the prayer of the Africa Band that as people look at this map in days to come many will see the need and will consecrate their lives to serve Him on that large continent. Millions and millions are dying without Christ. They need someone to tell them of the Savior Who gave His life that they might have eternal life.

Just to the northwest of our country lies a land that we may not think of as a missionary field. The territory of Alaska, filled with sin and unrighteousness, needs the light of the gospel as much as any of the other mission fields. The people of Alaska seem to have forgotten God and do not seem to realize that they have a great need: that need is Jesus Christ, the Savior of men. He is the one who can cleanse the hearts of men and give them new hope.

During the year the Alaska missionary band has sent clothing to the children's homes in Alaska which are operated by the Assemblies of God. At Christmas time the members of the band sent Christmas cards with a picture of the band members on them to the missionaries and Christian workers in Alaska. Especially those who are graduates of Northwest Bible College were remembered with these cards. Interest in Alaska has been stimulated by several missionaries from Alaska who have spoken to the band during the year. They have presented the needs of the field and so as the students pray for Alaska, they have a clearer conception of the needs of the people. With their prayers and their offerings the Alaska band contributes their part toward the winning of souls in the frozen northland of Alaska.

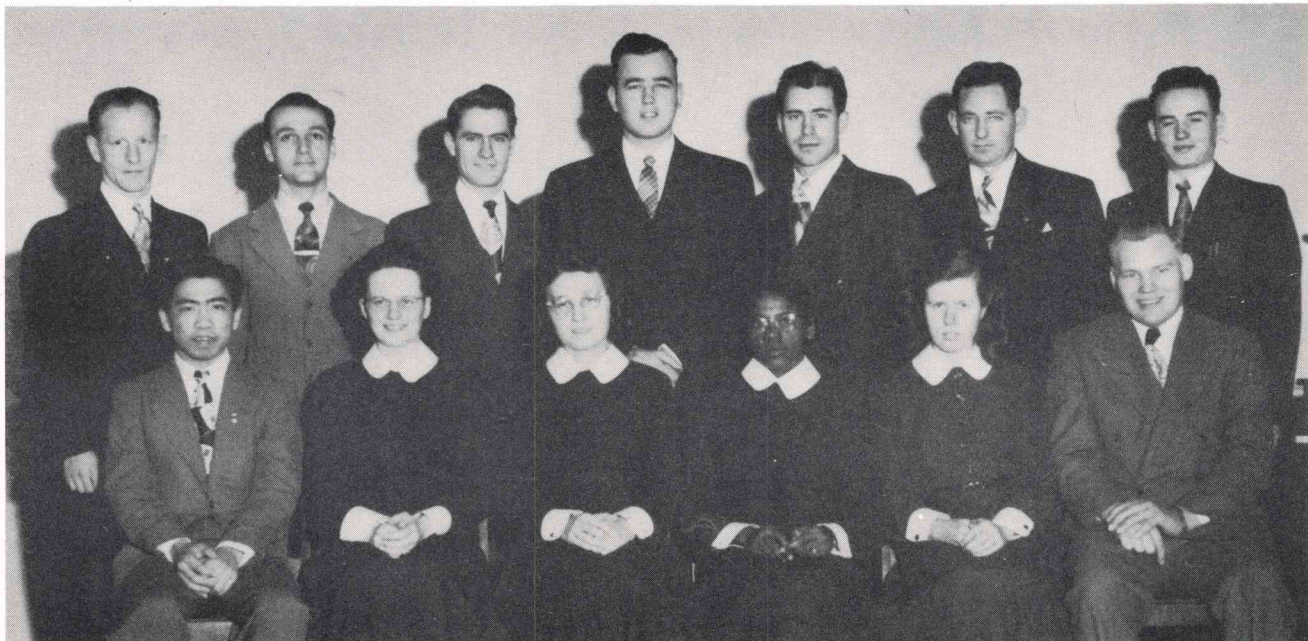

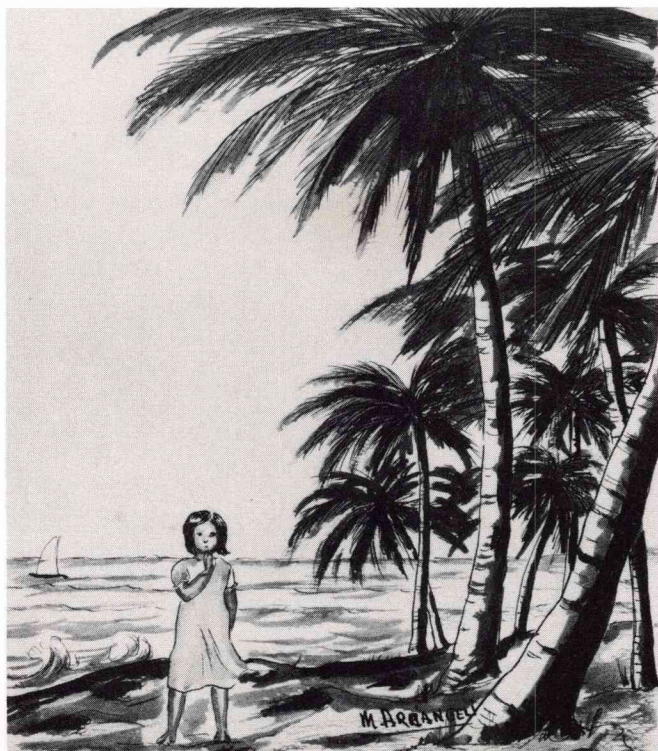

Many races and classes of people are included in the name Islands of the Sea. They are varied in color, religion, customs, and social status. But in one respect they are all alike. They are all sinners for whom Jesus Christ died. Whoever they are and wherever they may be, God loves them and wants to save them. The responsibility rests on us as Christians to bring them the good news of the gospel.

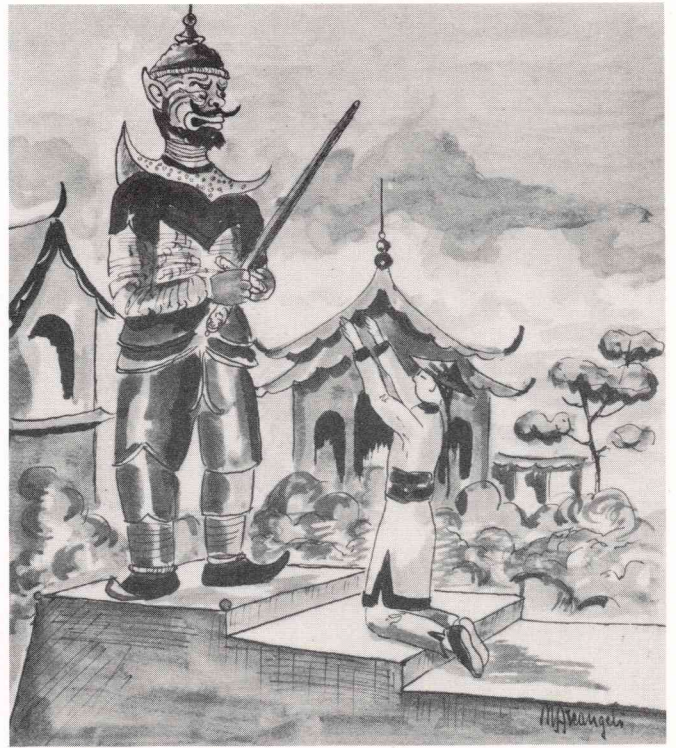
The Islands of the Sea Missionary Band is trying to help spread the gospel to these people. The most important part of the band's work is the time spent in prayer. Letters from missionaries and personal experiences of the members serve to stir the interest of the band and to burden their hearts for the various fields.

One of their projects this year was to send three large boxes of new and used clothing to Jamaica. They helped to fill a box for the Philippine Islands, and now they are collecting material for the work in the Fiji Islands. Cloth and literature are the greatest needs of the Fiji Islands at the present time. The band also hopes to be able to supply some books for the school in Indonesia which is operated by Rev. and Mrs. Busby. The members of this band pray that this little that they are able to do may help spread the gospel to the islands of the sea.

For years the countries of the Orient have been torn by war and turmoil. The people struggle to eke out an existence and to repair the devastation wrought by the war. They toil from sunrise to sunset to get enough for themselves and their families to eat.

Most of these poor creatures have never even heard of the name of Jesus. They are not only poverty-stricken materially but poverty-stricken spiritually. They live and die in complete ignorance of the true and living God. They have gods; enormous, magnificent, golden Buddhas, but these gods cannot help the people; they cannot save them from their sins. Only the Son of God who died to save them can give them deliverance from their sins.

During the year of 1949-50 the Oriental Missionary Band sent Christmas letters and packages to our missionaries in the Orient. A committee was formed to answer the letters for the band. By corresponding with missionaries the band can come to a clearer realization of their needs and burdens, and this enables them to pray more effectively for these needy people. An offering was sent to Rev. Clement to aid in the support of a Bible school student in Japan. Rev. Tangen, a former missionary to China, spoke to the group several times presenting a clear picture of the need of the people of China, their spiritual as well as their material need. It was a striking challenge to the students which will not soon be forgotten.

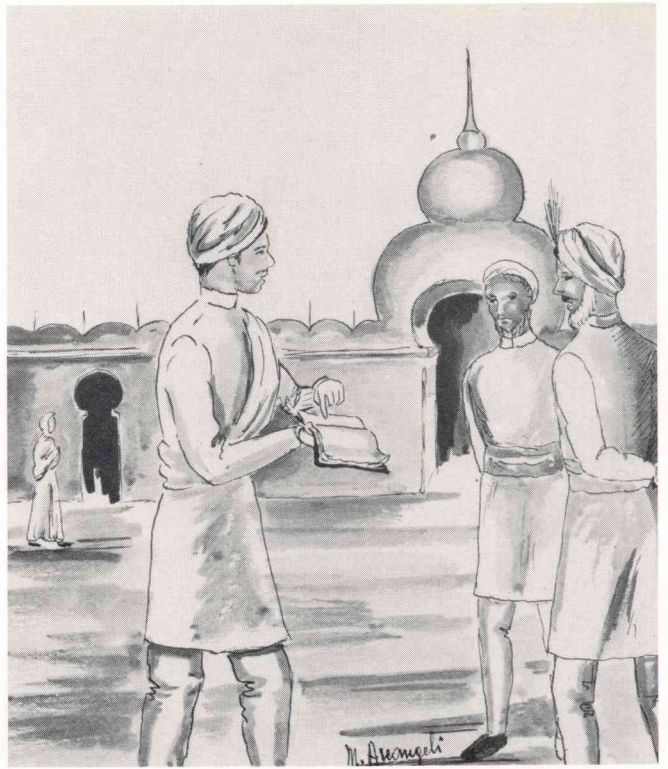
Thousands and thousands of people on the continent of Europe are homeless, destitute, and starving. The war has left them without hope. Families are broken; loved ones are dead. Their homes are destroyed; their means of living are gone. There is no one to whom they can turn. But there is One who cares for them, Who sees their dire need, who knows their hopeless condition. He is waiting for you and me to catch the vision of these souls who are daily perishing without hope in this life or the life hereafter. He is waiting for you and me to go and tell these people of the hope that is found in Christ, and He is waiting for us to pray.

While the members of the European band are not able to go right now, they can still pray that God will lay a burden on someone who is able to go. With their offerings they have sent clothing and food to these homeless people. They pray that the sufferings of these people may be alleviated, and, most important, that they may find the One who loved them and gave Himself for them. The members of the European band pray and give and some day they hope to be able to go with the gospel story.

India is truly a land of great need, their primary need being the Lord Jesus Christ. We know that it is only God that can change the conditions in the sin-darkened land of India. They are so bound by superstitions and fears that looking at the conditions from a natural standpoint would lead one to believe the people to be utterly hopeless—poor, wretched, and blind. However, we realize that these people are included in those for whom Christ died. We realize that He loves them as much as He loves us and is not willing that any should perish, but that all should come to repentance.

The India Missionary Band is supporting a little orphan girl who is living at the orphanage which has been operated by Howard Hawkes and his wife. Recently it has been taken over by two missionary girls. It is the prayer of this band that this little girl will come to a saving knowledge of Jesus Christ.

Every Friday as the band meets, they pray for the people of this land and for the missionaries who are laboring there for the purpose of promoting the gospel of Jesus Christ. They also pray that the Lord will lead them to His plan for their lives whether it be in India or elsewhere.

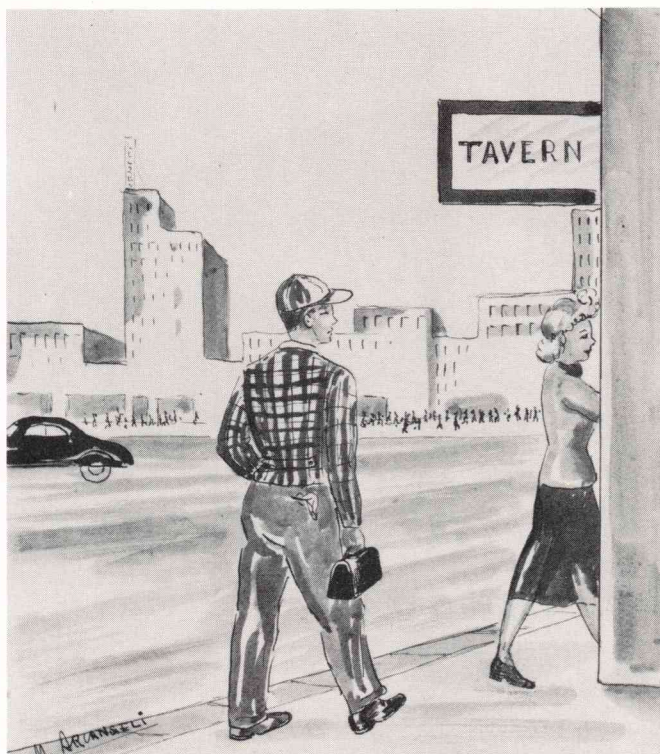
"Behold I have set before you an open door."

Chapel contributes to our spiritual growth and is a time of rich spiritual experience and blessing.

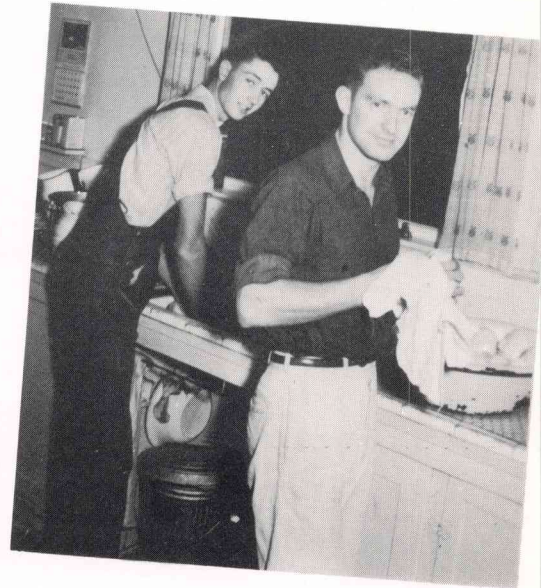
STUDENT SERVICE
