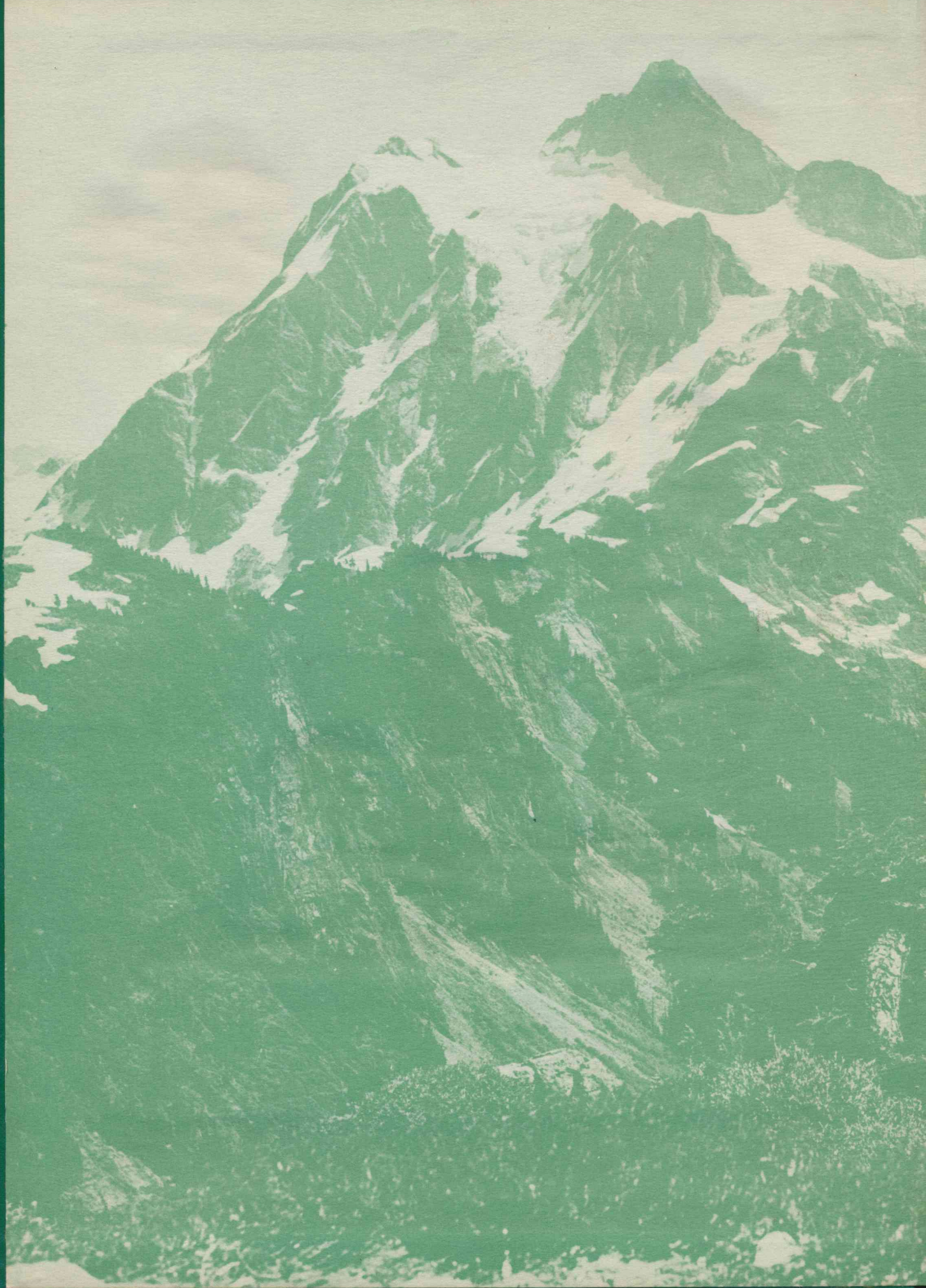

Looking Back

The General Council of the Assemblies of God came into existence as the result of a spiritual revival. No one man could be credited with the origin of the movement, for there were Pentecostal outpourings of the Spirit in widely separated places simultaneously. It, however, owes its existence primarily to an outpouring of the Holy Spirit upon a group of Christians at Topeka, Kansas, in 1901. From this revival small groups of Christian workers scattered throughout Kansas, Oklahoma, and Texas, where assemblies were formed finding common interest in the General Council fellowship.

The outpouring of the Holy Spirit, accompanied by the sign of speaking in other tongues as the Spirit gave utterance, at Los Angeles in 1906 was followed by other outpourings around the world, and the spread of this Pentecostal message became known as the "Pentecostal Movement." Those that became a part of the new movement had grown up under various schools of religious thought and practice; therefore, there arose an inevitable difference of opinions concerning doctrine and practice.

The movement at that time had no head and no central body to determine standards; it was because of this need that a group of Pentecostal ministers decided to issue a call for a General Council, patterned after the Council described in the fifteenth chapter of Acts.

The first General Council was held at Hot Springs, Arkansas, from April 2-12, 1914, followed by a second in November of the same year at Chicago, Illinois. At the fourth meeting in the fall of 1916 at St. Louis, Missouri, the *Statement of Fundamental Truths* was adopted. It was specifically stated at this time that this statement did not comprehend all truth, but that the truths declared were considered to be fundamental to a sound full-gospel ministry. The effect of this decision was felt all over the country; other Pentecostal ministers, pastoring independent assemblies, and foreign missionaries applied for membership in the Assemblies of God. Also, a large number of assemblies asked and obtained official recognition as part of the newly organized movement.

The Assemblies of God as an organization is still a movement, showing an increase that is considered phenomenal for its age in churches and personnel each year. It has a Foreign Missions Department, several other departments, a large publishing plant, and it gives official accreditation to ten Bible schools.

The Assemblies of God teach not only the necessity of the new birth and the need of personal holiness but also the privilege of a personal baptism with the Holy Spirit. It is estimated that possibly ninety per cent of the membership claim to have received this New Testament experience, and the remainder firmly believe in it.

Abide in me, and I in you. As the branch cannot bear fruit of itself, except it abide in the vine; so neither can ye, except ye abide in me.

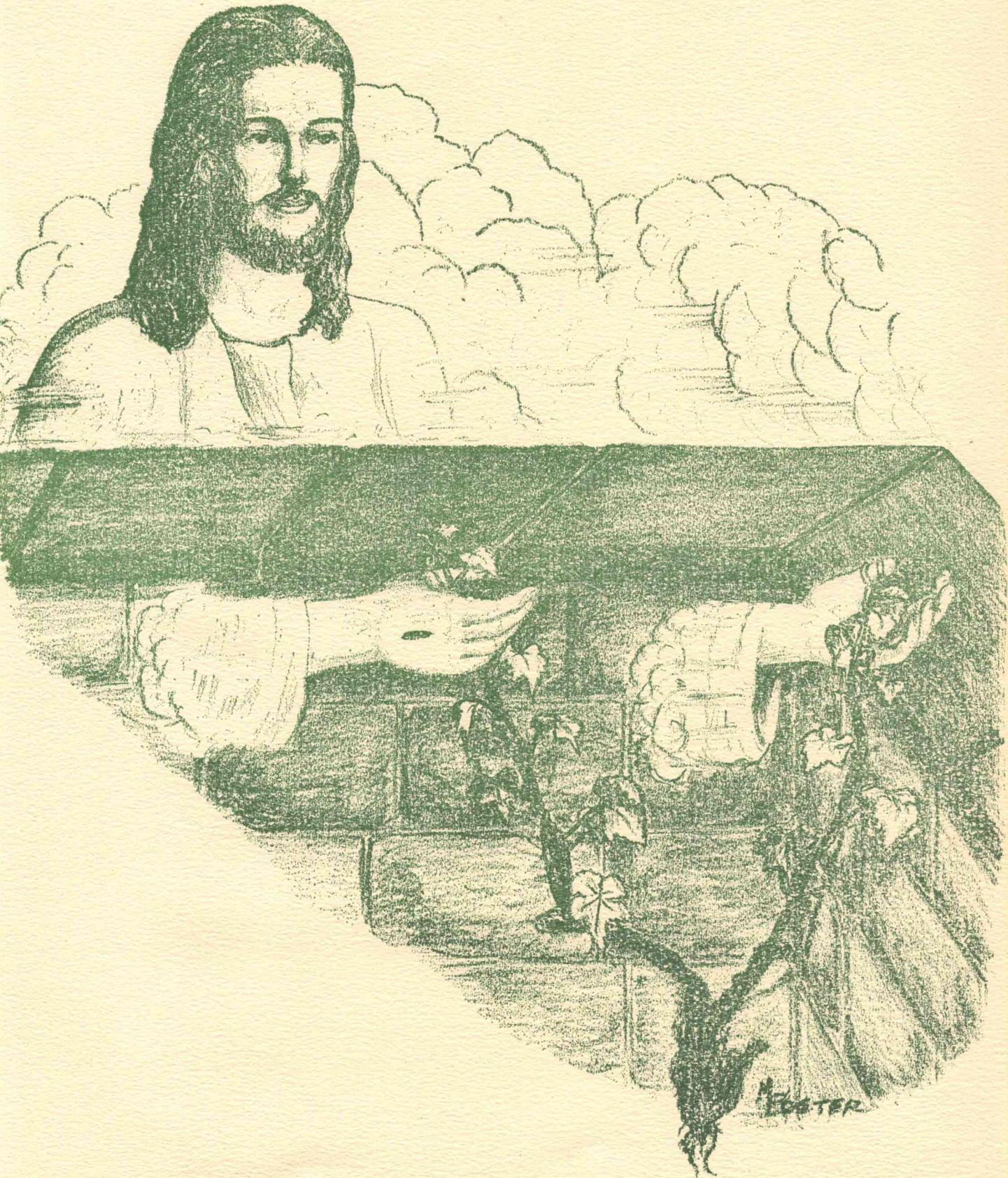
I am the vine, ye are the branches: He that abideth in me, and I in him, the same beareth much fruit; for apart from me ye can do nothing.

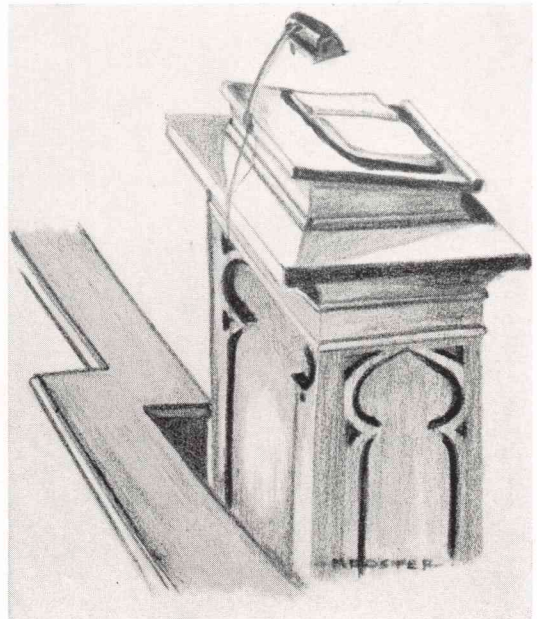

Christ, The True Vine

"I am the true vine."

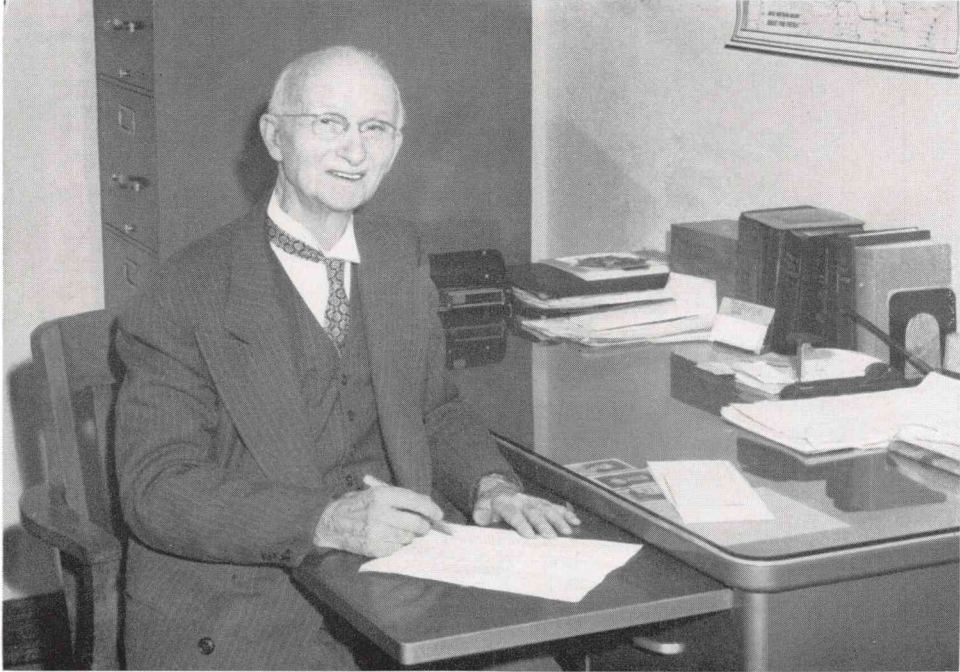
In this metaphor Jesus typifies Himself as the true Vine and His followers as the branches. He is the true Vine as truth is opposed to pretense and counterfeit.
