We take pleasure in reverently and respectfully dedicating to all of God's faithful messengers the N. B. I. yearbook of 1942.



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


A Message from Our General Superintendent



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MESSENGERS OF THE KING

REV. E. V. BRONSON

Two thoughts are suggested in the title, the One who sends, and the ones who are sent. The word "messenger" occurs in the Bible over one hundred times, and in nearly every instance it is in connection with the word "sent." Whether the one who did the sending was God or man it is written, "He sent messengers." The One who sends us is Jesus, our King.

John the Baptist was sent to prepare the way for Jesus. "It is written, 'Behold, I send My messenger before Thy face, who shall prepare Thy way before Thee." "That was all that John claimed to be, "one sent before Him."

Jesus was "the Messenger of the covenant." God so loved us that He sent His Son to be our Saviour. Jesus gave us, in His life, an illustration of what messengers should be. He "delighted to do His Father's will," He "finished the work His Father gave Him to do," and "He was obedient even unto the death on the cross."

Jesus said, "As the Father sent Me, even so send I you." He has given to us the Great Commission, to take His Gospel to "all nations," "every creature," and "the uttermost parts of the earth." It is a wonderful privilege to be messengers for the King. It was said of the Priest of Old Testament times, "He is the messenger of the Lord of hosts." It was the same with the prophets. "Then spake the prophet Haggai, the Lord's messenger, in the Lord's message, unto the people saying, 'I am with you saith the Lord." That is the best statement to be found anywhere concerning those who are called to preach the Gospel, "the Lord's messengers with the Lord's message." It is the same now as of old. We are messengers for Jesus, our King, and we are to give His message.

In some of the Scripture references concerning messengers we learn of the qualifications which are to be expected, "obedient" and "faithful." "As the cold of snow in a time of harvest so is a faithful messenger to those that send him, for he refresheth the soul of his masters." It is pleasing to the Lord when we are faithful to our mission. We are to "proclaim the whole counsel of God," both as to grace and judgment. Also it is written of messengers that "they hasted," "they ran," and "they were swift." These speak of instant, exact and glad obedience.

It is not only a great privilege to be messengers of the King, but it also carries with it great responsibility. "Unto whom much is given from him shall much be required." Much has been given to those who are saved and called to His service. This world is in need, and we have that which can meet that need. The messengers not only went forth with the message, but they returned with their report. The Scripture declares that "we watch over souls as they who must give an account." We trust that all of us will be able to give a good report to the One who sent us, and that we may receive His words of commendation, "Well done."

Proclaim The Message with Boldness

"Now when they saw the boldness of Peter and John, and perceived that they were unlearned and ignorant men they marvelled; and took knowledge of them, that they had been with Jesus." Acts 4:13.

One of the essential qualifications of a messenger of God is boldness. This boldness is not mere human fearlessness, but spiritual fearlessness based upon divine principles.

There are four things which contribute to the spiritual boldness of a true messenger of God: First, a definite experience of salvation and sins forgiven; second, a real call of God to the ministry; third, the baptism with the Holy Spirit; and, fourth, a positive knowledge and faith that the message is the very message and Word of God.

WITH HELPFULNESS



There was rejoicing in a certain home, nestled in the shadow of the King's Palace in the City of Oslo, Norway, one summer day in 1894, as Hans and Dora Ness welcomed their first born son, hoping and praying that this son would become a servant of God.

in 1894, as Hans and Dora Ness welcomed their first born son-hoping and praying that this son would become a servant of God. Their faith and prayers were not in vain. Boyhood days quickly passed, and in the autumn of 1911, an enthusiastic youth left the shores of the Land of the Midnight Sun, crossing the deep of the Atlantic Ocean, to seek fame and fortune in the land that flows with silver and gold, namely America. Upon arrival in this country he began a successful career in the drug business in Chicago. He then moved to Minneapolis, Minne-sota, where he operated his own drug store in the commercial center of the city. It was at this time the war started and he joined the Armed forces, where he served as Corporal. At the end of the War he again returned to Minneapolis where in 1919 he married a young lady of Danish birth. Later he accepted a position with the Stan-much that he became the leading man on the sales force. At this time God began to deal with him concerning his soul's need. On a Sunday night his work to accept a call to pastor a small church in Northern Minnesota. After laboring there for some time he moved to Fargo. North Dakota where in process of time a Tabernacle was called to Seattle in the fall of 1933 to become pastor of the Holly-wood Temple. His carnest zeal for God led to the founding of the Northwest Bible Institute in 1934. Hundreds of young men and women who have trained for Christian service in this school are still feeling the Godly influence of their consecrated Principal.

In definite answer to a consecrated mother's prayer, a young man nineteen years of age knelt at the altar in Glad Tidings Mission in San Francisco, and Joseph Alfred Bogue found Jesus Christ as his personal Saviour. A year after his conversion he received the Baptism

San Prancisco, and Joseph Alfred Dogue Jound Jesus Christ as his personal Saviour. A year after his conversion he received the Baptism of the Holy Spirit. He returned to his home in Turlock and continued in his suc-cessful career of Mechanical Engineering. God's hand rested in guid-ance upon him, and a year later there was a decided change in this young energetic life. After sreading some time in the ministry he felt his need of further training, and entered Glad Tidings Bible Institute. During his third year in school he acted as assistant to Reverend Craig in the institute and Glad Tidings Temple. Upon graduation with the Pioneers he devoted his time to evangelistic work throughout the United States. In the year of 1928, while engaged in Gospel work in the Northwest, he was united in marriage to Miss Esther Peterson of Seattle. For the past eleven years he has served with the Northwest District Presbytery of the Assemblies of God, in which he now holds the offices of District Screetary and General Presbyter. In 1936 Reverend Bogue was called to be an instructor in the Northwest Bible Institute. Eternity alone will reveal the accom-plishments achieved as a result of spiritual advice and sound knowl-edge imparted to students both in and out of the classrooms.

A native of Seattle, Miss Helen Pettit was born on April 30, 1900, of Christian parents. At an early age she accepted the Lord as her personal Savior and became a member of the First Baptist Church. After her graduation from the Seattle Public Schools, her de-sire to become a nurse led her to attend the University of Washington. stre to become a nurse led her to attend the Oniversity of Washington. During her years in school she was active in church work, being presi-dent of the Young People's Society and the Girls' Missionary Guild. She was also sent as a delegate to the National Student Volunteer Convention in Des Moines, Iowa, where 10,000 Christian students from all parts of the world gathered for a ten-day missionary and inspirational convention.

Inspirational convention. Following her graduation from the University in 1923 with a B. S. in Pre-Medico, Miss Pettit entered the Minor Private Hos-pital for further training. She became a graduate registered nurse in 1925 and did special duty nursing until her marriage to Mr. Harry Giles two years later.

It was while they were residing in the Green Lake District near the Hollywood Temple that God used the large neon sign "Jesus Saves" to lead them into the light of the Full Gospel. Three weeks later, while nursing at the bedside of Reverend Ness in the Swedish later, while nursing at the bedside of Keverend Ness in the Swedish Hospital, Mrs. Giles received the glorious infilling of the Holy Spirit. In October of the same year the Northwest Bible Institute welcomed her as a member of its faculty. As the students and graduates strive to bring the Gospel of Christ into the homes of those whose lives are filled with sickness and sorrow, they have been made to realize more fully the great value of the knowledge imparted by our faithful hygienics instructor.


Our music instructor, Delbert Lee Cox, was born in Nez Perce. Idaho, in the summer of 1909. He was reared in the fear and admoni-tion of the Lord by his mother, the chorister of the local Brethren church. At the early age of eight years he was converted and some vears later during a summer session at Glad Tidings Temple he re-ceived the baptism of the Holy Spirit. From the time of his youth, his secular interests have been predominately toward music. His musical foundation began with the study of piano and violin. During his training at the University of Washington he majored in the field of Public School Music and in 1936 received the degree of Master of Arts. Throughout his life he has worked extensively in gospel circles in the United States and Canada. During a camp meeting at Lake Geneva, Minnesota, he met a young lady, Ruth Remley, to whom he was maried in the summer of 1936. They have a daughter, Bar-bara Lee, who is nine months old. When the Northwest Bible Institute was opende he was called to be Music Director, and under his able leadership the student choir and orchestra have been organized. Besides devoting much time to private teaching, Professor Cox is the organist and music director of the local church. His interest in the development of musical tal-ents for Christian service, and his patient and cheerful nature have been a constant source of inspiration to the students.

Charles Clifford Beatty was born in the little town of Knox. Indiana. on the 8th day of July, 1870. Death claimed his father while Charles was yet young. leaving his widowed mother to assume the responsibility of providing for her three children, of whom Charles was the eldest. At the age of sixteen, he was given the opportunity to learn telegraphy, and after a year of hard work he was able to take a position as Station Agent's assistant. The follow-ing years were spent in railroad work, one promotion succeeding an-other until he became a train dispatcher. In the good providence of God, he was converted in April of 1898, and was called into the ministry. Three years later he was ordained in the Baptist denomination. On June 10, 1902, he was married to Miss Hattie M. Leonard of Elgin, Illinois. After five years of pastoral work in Indiana, he and Mrs. Beatty were led into evangelistic work, holding campaigns in different cities throughout the country. In 1918 they received a call to Duluth, Minnesota, to superintend the Bethel Mission, an inter-denominational work for men. After several years of service there, God definitely led them into the Pentecostal expreince through the ministry of Doctor Charles S. Price. Immediately they became affili-ated with the Assemblies of God, and Mr. Beatty was eledted to the office of Assistant District Council. Later he was elected to the office of Assistant District Superintendent. Together with Reverend F. J. Lindquist and other ministers. Reverend Beatty caught the vision of the need of a training school for young people, and was largely instrumental in the launching of the North Central Bible Institute in Minneapolis. He served as Dean of this school for five years. In 1934 he accepted a call to assist in the founding of the

of this school for five years. In 1934 he accepted a call to assist in the founding of the Northwest Bible Institute. The enthusiasm and zeal of our Dean have been an inspiration to both students and faculty.

Eugene V. Bronson, the youngest of twelve children. eight of whom are still living, was born in Urbana, Illinois, February 24, 1883. After attending public schools in Urbana, he entered the University of Illinois where he majored in Entomology. He expected to make this his life work, but at the age of nineteen he was con-verted and felt God's call upon his life. After finishing four years of study at the University, he entered Garrett Bibical Institute, a Methodist Theological school on the campus of Northwestern Uni-versity. At the conclusion of his first year of theological training he met a young woman during a meeting of University students who had volunteered their lives for foreign missionary service. A friendship developed and after his graduation in 1907 they were married. They received appointment as missionaries to Iquique, Chile, but illness prevented their going: consequently they went to the West coast where he accepted the pastorate at Hood River, Oregon. In eighteen years as a Methodist minister, he labored in churches in Idaho. Wash-ington, California, and Nevada. During the World War, he served as Army Chaplain with the 91st Division in Camp Lewis and over-seas. After receiving the Pentecostal Baptism in 1925, Mr. Bronson became affiliated with the Assemblies of God, and since then has spent most of his time teaching in their Bible schools. He taught for a few months in Glad Tidings Bible Institute in San Francisco. after which he went to San Diego where for four years he served as Principal of Berean Bible Institute. Before coming to Seattle he spent one year as Principal and one year as Dean of Southern California Principal of Berean Bible Institute. Before coming to sattle he spent one year as Principal and one year as Dean of Southern California Bible School in Pasadena. For the past five years the students of N.B.I. have been greatly blessed by Reverend Bronson's faithful teaching

The privilege granted by God to Dagmar Haugen was that of spending her childhood days in a Christian home. She early accepted Christ as her Saviour and with Him as her Guide and Friend began a life of Christian service and devotion to others. In 1909 her family moved from North Dakota to Washington where she received her public school education in the Tacoma and Seattle schools. While in Tacoma she and her father through the ministry of music found opportunity to serve their Master in the church which they attended. After moving to Seattle several years later, she became active in Sunday School work and hospital visita-tion. At the opening of the North-west Bible Institute she accepted the position of matron and since that time she has been sincerely devoted to the welfare of each stu-dent. She has proven to be one from whom wise counsel and Godly instruction can ever be obtained.

In the city of Grand Forks located on the banks of the Red River of North Dakota, a happy Norwegian family welcomed a baby girl into their home on October 25, 1908. Little did they realize that day what blessing and inspiration this daughter would bring to hundreds of lives, both young and old. Immediately after finisoing high school. Margaret Knutsson's zeal for souls led her to enter gospel work. She became affiliated with the North Dakota District Council and traveled in evangelistic work throughout the Dakotas and Montana, also serving as pastor's assis-tant in several assemblies. Among these were the churches in Hettin-ger and Bismark, North Dakota and in Great Falls, Montana. In 1934 she came to Seattle and enrolled in the Northwest Bible Institute. Upon graduation three years later with the Pioneer Class, she returned to Montana to minister in the Great Falls Assembly of God church. She labored there for over a year, and thea, under

She labored there for over a year, and then, under the auspices of the district council, went to Rugby, North Dakota, where meetings were conducted in the district's portable tabernacle. In 1939 Miss Knutsson came back to Seattle to be the Hollywood Temple church missionary. Some time later she accepted the posi-tion of Registrar and Practical Work Director in the Northwest Bible Institute. Since coming to Seattle she has been happily joined in matrimony to Mr. Wentzel Hansen. Mrs. Hansen's spiritual life has been an example to us all, and we have learned to appreciate her efficient work among us.




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
Go Ye . . . BUT STUDY

"GOD'S WORD is the standard and the rule for Christianty. To know its meaning for ourselves, to rely on its promises, to trust in its Redeemer, to obey Him from delight of love, and to refuse to follow any other teaching is Christianity itself."

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The messenger's chief thought should be, not of men's approval, but of the approval of God. Although some aim at the applause of a crowded assembly as they minister the Word, the true messenger must study to approve himself and his ministry to God.

The only safety in these troublesome times lies in an unbroken communion with God and an experimental knowledge of the Scripture gleaned in hours of study.


Freshman Class Message





THE KING'S MESSAGE

REV. J. A. BOGUE

One of the great fundamental doctrines of the Bible is repentance; yet it is one of the truths that many people do not understand. There are possibly more people in darkness concerning this important message than any other fundamental doctrine. Moreover, it was one of the great messages, if not the message of Christ.

No one is ready to receive the Gospel and be saved until he is willing to repent and turn from sin. John the Baptist had but one message until he met Christ, and that was, "Repent ye; for the kingdom of heaven is at hand." Matt. 3:2. Then he added, "Behold the Lamb of God which taketh away the sin of the world." John 1:29.

When Christ commenced His earthly ministry, he took up the same message, "Repent for the kingdom of heaven is at hand." Matt. 4:17. When He sent forth His disciples, He gave them the same message, "That men should repent—" Mark 6:12. After the resurrection and ascension, Jesus sent for the Holy Spirit, and we find Peter on the day of Pentecost raising the same cry, "Repent." It was this preaching of repentance and believing in Christ that brought such great results. Acts 2:38-47. When Paul went to Athens, he proclaimed, "God commandeth all men, everywhere, to repent." Acts 17:30.

What is true repentance? It is laying aside every sin and turning to God with the whole heart. In short it means "right about face!" Turn away from the paths of sin which lead to hell and commence to walk in the path of righteousness which leads to heaven. Again, repentance means a change of the mind and purpose. It is the abandonment of all self-confidence, self-righteousness, and trusting entirely in the mercy and grace of Christ. Godly repentance and saving faith always go together. You need not worry about salvation and deliverance from sin if you believe in Christ.


You may be in darkness and in the bondage of sin because you are not willing to repent. The Bible does not have any message of forgiveness unless you are willing to confess and forsake your sin. Bear in mind that this is the only day of mercy you will ever have. You can repent now and have that awful record of sin blotted out. God is seeking you and is patiently waiting for you to repent, that He may forgive you. The Message of the Bible clearly states that there is no repentance after death. You have time enough to repent and be saved now; you can turn from your sins this moment if you will.


Christ said, "I came not to call the righteous, but sinners to repentance." Are you a sinner? Are you unsaved? Then this message of repentance is addressed to you. Acknowledge your guilt; say, like the publican of old, "God, be merciful to me a sinner!" and see how quickly He will forgive you. He will give you full assurance that you are ready to live or die. You will have joy unspeakable and full of glory. "Turn ye, turn ye, for why will ye die," is the message of your Redeemer.





Like a beam of bright golden sunlight radiating life, love, inspiration, hope, and joy into the despair of total darkness, the message of Christ and His love is wafted on the wings of the evening to bring hope and peace to all who will hear. As the soft, mellow strains of the studio organ are sent forth over the air, the Gospel in song and testimony is again broadcasted by the students of the Northwest Bible Institute.

The value of music as the language of persons from all walks of life is fully realized. But the greater opportunity is afforded students in proclaiming the Gospel of Jesus Christ in music over the radio. Our students, trained in the Institute Music Department, present the Gospel in music every Friday evening over radio station KJR.

The message reaches over the mountains to the East as far as Kansas City, Missouri, South to lower California, and Westward to the Hawaiian Islands and ships at sea. In the North we have regular listeners in the Yukon territory and Alaska. Even as God's all-seeing eye searches and knows the hearts of men, so has God's Word by ether waves pierced into regions almost inaccessible by any other means.

Above is a map showing the extent of our practical work activities. Our opportunities for Gospel work are not limited to the confines of the city of Seattle. During vacations and week-ends students sometimes travel within a radius of two hundred miles or more on assignments.

During Thanksgiving recess and on Thanksgiving Day special assignments have traveled to churches in the Yakima Valley and Centralia. At other times groups of students have gone to points in Southwestern Washington and on the Olympic Peninsula, and also east as far as the Wenatchee Valley. "Therefore they that were scattered abroad went everywhere preaching the Word." Acts 8:4.

After tarrying and receiving the gift of the Holy Spirit, the believers could not be content to stay at home and revel in the joys of salvation, but went forth in the power of the Holy Spirit and proclaimed the saving grace of Christ our Lord. They "went everywhere preaching the Word," into streets, lanes, highways and hedges; we believe that the same responsibility is ours. We try to parallel our Christian experience with this marvelous example of missionary zeal and practical Christianity.

The following sketches give an insight into the different places where students herald forth the glorious gospel of Christ in message, song and testimony. CHURCHES—Our many Pentecostal churches and branch churches of the Hollywood Temple, together with numerous denominational churches, are open for the services of N. B. I. students.

SUNDAY SCHOOLS—One of the most important phases of Christian work is among the little ones of whom Jesus said, "Suffer little children to come unto me: for of such is the kingdom of heaven." Each week our students reach boys and girls of all nationalities in the Sunday Schools in and around Seattle.


MISSIONS—Several missions in the downtown district welcome our young people to aid in conducting evangelistic services. Many wretched and unfortunate souls are delivered by the power of Christ from drunkeness and despair to become earnest Christians and respectable citizens.

STREET MEETINGS—Many street meetings are held by the students in the downtown section of Seattle. In this way large numbers of people, who never would enter a church or mission, hear the Gospel and are led to the Saviour.


HOSPITALS—Even today, pain-filled bodies are relieved and fevered brows soothed by the nail-pierced touch of the Christ of Galilee as students, filled with the love of this same Jesus, move about on errands of mercy in hospitals of this district. "The Lord shall raise him up; and if he have committed sins, they shall be forgiven him" is the good news spread abroad in this ministry to the sick and afflicted.

PARENTAL SCHOOL—Twice a month our students are privileged to visit the Mercer Island Boys Parental School. Here they combine forces with other Christian workers in bringing the Gospel of Christ to these under-privileged youths.

JAILS—Each week students carry the light of the Gospel to hundreds of men and women who sit in shadows of sin far more cruel than the shadows cast by the steel bars of the City and King County Jails of Seattle. Many of these souls have been triumphantly set free from the bondage of sin by the power of Jesus' blood.


MUSIC





On February 19, 1937, the first graduating class of N. B. I., the Pioneers, officially organized their class for the purpose of forming an Alumni Association. Their object was to promote Christian fellowship among graduates and former students and to cooperate in advancing the interests of the school.

They elected as officers, Harry Pennington, President; Margaret Knutsson Hansen, Vice-president; and Irene Langdon, Secretary-Treasurer. In 1938 the fifty-seven members of the Conquerors' class were combined with the Pioneers to form the embryo of the present Alumni organization. In the absence of Harry Pennington, Velmer Gardner was chosen Alumni President in 1939 and has filled that office until the present time.
