## News from the Library

## New Person -

Heather VanMouwerik has joined the Hurst Library staff as our new Circulation Coordinator. Heather fills the spot vacated by David Austin, who left to attend school full-time and com-



plete his graduate studies. Heather was born in Wisconsin and has lived in several places across the US, including Seattle, which she considers home. Heather has an undergraduate degree in Political Science from Calvin College where she worked in their library, and also has bookstore experience with Barnes & Noble. Additionally, Heather has travelled and lived overseas and speaks French and Russian. As the Circulation Coordinator, Heather will be "the face of the Library" evenings and weekends—come on in and say "hi!"

### New Extended Hours -

This is not actually extended hours for the Library itself, but the area formerly known as the Library Conference Center, or LCC; it's been transformed into what has formally been designated as H-214. (Some are informally calling it HAL, for Hurst Academic Laboratory, or as in the infamous computer from 2001: A Space Odyssey.) After the Library closes at 11:30pm Sunday through Thursday, H-214 stays open for

student use until 1:30am, when Security closes the area. H-214 has 24 terminal-service workstations, all of which share a room-based printer, and also has an LCD projector. During the day, the area can be reserved for sessions by faculty through Judy Olson-Briggs, and the librarians intend to host most of their library instruction classes there. There has already been steady usage after 11:30pm, and that is expected to increase as more students discover this new resource. Special thanks go to IS and Security for their hard work in getting this for students!

#### New Electronic Database -

In support of the new graduate programs our campus is seeing, the Library has acquired the ProQuest Dissertations and Theses database, specifically the Humanities and Social Sciences Collection. A comprehensive collection of scholarly research in the Humanities and Social Sciences, this database covers more than 1 million dissertations and theses. The database offers full text for most of the dissertations added since 1997 and strong retrospective full text coverage for older graduate works. More than 60,000 new full text dissertations and theses are added to the database each year; check out the dissertations for Drs. Kobashigawa and Heugel, for example.
