EIGHT LIFE CHANGING DAYS

NC Students Taking the Urban Challenge Seriously



NC students spent eight days of their annual Spring Break with NC alumnus and church planter, Rev. James Boyd and family, to reach people in inner-city Portland, Oregon.

AN education in a Christian college be a practical means of transforming individuals and society? The answer is a resounding "YES" for students at Northwest

College. NC professors teach, discuss and demonstrate ways students can be a force for hope and change in the modern world. One of the proofs of this is the recent Student Ministry outreach to Portland, Oregon.

Professor Larry Malcolm led seven students in a week long practicum to the Portland community to assist in the planting of a new church by an NC alumnus. As faculty supervisor of Student Ministries, Larry Malcolm is often the prime mover and organizer behind many ministry activities for students — as the Portland project showed. "We were like a breath of fresh air in the midst of a stuffy world in the inner city streets of Portland. Saturday through Thursday was a time of preparation for the neighborhoods through park ministry and door-to-door visitation. The climax was on Friday and Saturday when we had around 425 kids for the services. Each day half of these kids raised their hands to accept Jesus. God is doing a great work in Portland. Please rejoice with us and pray for James Boyd and Family Life Christian Center, that God would pour out his Spirit in abundance."

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Months of planning went into this week of events, and students gave up their spring break in order to touch the lives of people they could only have imagined during the long months of planning. However, as the days of the Portland Outreach unfolded, the once imaginary people of that city were discovered to have faces, and names, and stories all their own.

Student Jeff Portmann recounts,

Professor Malcolm relates their experience during the 10 days in Portland.

"The team gathered for 1 to 2 hours of prayer for inner-city Portland each morning. Following this time we went out and were involved in door-to-door canvassing of the neighborhood the new church is located in.

At noon, we gathered at some busy intersections to pray for the city and also to witness to the people on the street. After lunch, we went back to canvassing the area.

At 3:30 in the afternoon, we gathered at one of the parks to minister to the children and teens. The men played basketball with the boys on the playground. We set up the puppet stage and had puppets, singing, and Bible stories for the children. We had

DOCTORATE CONFERRED -

Dr. Bill Randolph has successfully completed his doctoral studies at Washington State University.

CHRISTIAN LECTURES IN RUSSIA -

Dr. Dan Pecota returned rejoicing from his time in Magadan, Russia, where he was invited to the Magadan Pedagogical Institute to discuss theology and Christianity. He lectured in the former Soviet college in a classroom that had formerly been designated solely for Marxist-Leninist dogma. Pecota has been invited back for a longer lecture series later this year.

U.S.S.R. GRANTS MEDAL TO N.C. PROFESSOR JOHN McMILLIN -

Dr. McMillin was presented one of the last medals to civilians for meritorious service that came from the Union of Soviet Socialist Republics. It was granted on the last day of official activity, February 15, 1992, immediately prior to the dissolving of the USSR. The Union saw fit to extend the award to Dr. McMillin en absentia due to his commitments here at Northwest College. The award recognizes decades of service to the Union under adverse circumstances. Dr. McMillin had endeavored to help them in agricultural and aquacultural policy as they recognized that state ownership over means of production could not provide for the growing needs of that nation.

Dr. McMillin, recognizing that all of God's people - regardless of transitory political realities, have certain basic rights to food and water, proceeded to train USSR technicians as God gave him opportunity. In so doing he was able to witness in unique fashion, unimpeded by irrelevant political factors. He represented the reality of the Savior to people who knew no Savior in an increasingly bankrupt communistic system.

Working with the Soviet government and through their highly politicized Peace Fund, he was able also to enter into joint projects in the least developed countries of the world. Now, a dozen years later, the Soviets wished to acknowledge that period of service and asked that the award be bestowed by a suitably recognized body. The legend on the award sheet and partially on the medal essentially reads, "In recognition for services to the working people of the world and to the international cause of peace, we assign this medal to John McMillin." Dr. McMillin states "I never cease marveling at the ease with which we can witness when we turn over control to our Lord and Master, Christ, and not self." In presentation of the medal, President Dennis A. Davis stated, "Dr. McMillin, it gives me a great deal of pleasure to comply with this request from the former Soviet Union. We will send record of this event for the archives of the now defunct Union of Soviet Socialist Republics, but today in the name of the One who is called the Prince of Peace and who now lives in the world through dedicated believers, we officially present this medal for meritorious service in the name of Him who loved the world and gave Himself for all people."

CHALLENGES NC STUDENTS, FACULTY, AND GUESTS TO DEMONSTRATE THE MEANING AND REALITY OF THE KINGDOM OF GOD

There was a lot of excitement on the NC campus during the days Tony Campolo was lecturing. In his own inimitable way, with humor and wit, he challenged students, faculty and guests to a more serious consideration of the meaning of their Christian walk. He spoke of the work needed among the poor of America and the world. His warmth and sincere faith created the perfect vehicle for his message. That message is one for Christians everywhere to show, by deliberate action, the kind of caring Christian witness that demonstrates the realities of the Kingdom of God. The Staley Distinguished Christian Scholar Lecture Program sponsored Dr. Anthony (Tony) Campolo on the NC campus February 20-21.

The subject of Dr. Campolo's lecture series was based on the theme of *The Kingdom of God*.

Dr. Campolo is Professor of Sociology and Director of the Graduate Program in Urban Studies at Eastern College in St. David's, Pennsylvania. He is also the founder and President of the Evangelical Association for the Promotion of Education an organization committed to meeting the social, economic, and spiritual needs of people in various Third World countries as well as urban America. Dr. Campolo has authored 14 books, the most recent of which is *The Kingdom of God is a Party*. He is also the Associate Pastor of the Mount Carmel Baptist Church in West Philadelphia.

Each year the student body at NC enjoys **The Staley Distinguished Christian Scholar Lecture Program**. Guest speakers are invited from throughout the world for this significant time of spiritual renewal. This is a project of the Thomas F. Staley Foundation of New York.

The Thomas F. Staley Foundation is firmly persuaded that the message of Christian Gospel when proclaimed in its historic fullness is always contemporary, relevant, and meaningful to any generation.

The Lecture presentation included the following topics:

- Christ at the End of History
- Whose World Is It Anyway? and
- Love in the Marketplace

Dr. Richard Blue to Head Teacher Education Program

Secondary Education Program to be Added to Curriculum

eyond the natural changes that come to all colleges, NC's faculty and curriculum will be showing two new strengths in the coming 1992-1993 academic year.

Though the Elementary Education programs will be relinquishing Dr. Ray White, its head and very dear colleague, to Southern California College, it will be adding the highly qualified and respected educator, Dr. Richard Blue, to fill the position in this vital academic program at Northwest College.

Dr. Blue comes to NC with many years of teaching experience. His education and expertise provides him with a solid background and thorough understanding in the areas needed to make the Elementary Education program a continued success.

With a B.A. from Alaska Methodist University, M.A. from Stanford University, and a Ph.D. from University of Oregon, Dr. Blue has contributed greatly to the field of public education and has served in several levels of administrative offices in the Anchorage, Alaska and Medford, Oregon School Districts. His most recent position was Assistant Superintendent of the Medford, Oregon School District. It is from there that Dr. Blue comes to NC.

This change occurs at a time when the department is being enhanced in several ways. One of those is the introduction of a Secondary Education program. The introduction of this new major transforms the previous Elementary Education program into a new *Teacher Education Program*.

Based upon a market survey of current and prospective students, the College Board has authorized the start-up of the proposed program. The survey was conducted in order to determine interest and feasibility The results of the investigation showed strong interest by both groups of young people. Secondary Education will require the introduction of academic content majors. Under consideration are English, History, Psychology, and TESL (Teaching English as a Second Language). Right now, the Elementary Education major at Northwest College is designed to provide future educators with the knowledge and skills necessary for teaching young people in a complex society. Since its inception in 1983, the program has been providing teachers for both public and Christian schools. Of the 39 students who graduated since 1988 with their Bachelor of Arts Degree and Initial Washington State

Certification, 32 have found employment in the education field. Eighteen are currently in public schools and 14 are serving in Christian schools. The college has recently been accepted into membership in the *American Association of Colleges for Teacher Education*.

The Elementary Education program continues to grow. It is now the largest major on campus with an enrollment in excess of 110 students. That is about 17 percent of the total student body. Continued growth looks promising. Twenty-two percent of the students making application to NC for the 1992-1993 academic year have designated Elementary Education to be their intended major.

Field practicums along with intense course work are considered important components in the degree program. Gone is the day when a student would find out in his or her senior year that they "weren't cut out for teaching." Today freshmen and sophomores who are enrolled in Introduction to Education have a supervised field observation experience in a local Christian school. In addition, juniors and first semester seniors have further field practicums to thoroughly immerse them in the elementary classroom prior to student teaching.

The program at the College is continually monitored by a dedicated faculty and by the *Professional Education Advisory Board* (PEAB). The PEAB is composed of public and Christian school educators, college faculty and administrators, and a student representative. This board meets five times each year to oversee and advise in matters dealing with the program.

As part of every Elementary Education major's course work is a twenty credit academic focus. At the inception of the program in 1983, three foci were in place: Language Arts, Social Studies, and Science. Since then two additional foci have been added in Basic Skills and Teaching of English as a Second Language (TESL). This Spring, three additional foci were added to provide for more options to meet the requirements of students; these were in English, History, and Psychology. These three plus TESL have been designed so that students will receive an additional endorsement on their teaching certificate as well as an Elementary Education endorsement which all education majors receive regardless of their academic focus.

(1) to qualify for initial certification as an elementary school teacher in the State of Washington;

(2) to manage an elementary classroom;(3) to apply the principles of current education psychology and learning theories in the classroom;

(4) to design and present appropriate age level instruction;

(5) to articulate a personal education philosophy;

(6) and to plan further professional development.

While NC is dedicated to graduating adequately trained teachers who have an understanding of the knowledge and skills necessary for teaching, it is a goal of the college that these people possess an integrated understanding of the Christian faith and its application to teaching. Further, to be truly successful, these graduates must possess the skills of caring, patience, and love for children to be truly termed adequately trained. This is the program's goal.

Guided by highly qualified professors, in a professional level curriculum, students from Northwest are finding widespread acceptance in these fields as well as career fulfillment.

Today, more than ever, NC is strongly positioned to make a significant contribution in both the Elementary and Secondary education fields. Students desiring a topnotch education in a sound Christian context find that NC provides them with both.

With this in view, NC welcomes this new development. Dr. Blue's arrival is a solid demonstration of Northwest's commitment to the ongoing development of these programs.

Upon completion of the Elementary Education Major, it should be possible for the student:

TARGET 2000 ZEROS IN ONSecondary Education Funding

he Secondary Education Major at NC with corresponding majors in English, History, Psychology and Teaching English as a Second Language (TESL) has been identified as the top 1992-93 Target 2000 Project.

This important part of NC's strategic plan needs \$300,000 in funding. The College Board of Directors has challenged constituents to provide the resources for start-up of the Secondary Education Program apart from tuition or student fees.

According to Vice President for College Advancement, Randy Barton, the following have been identified as project component costs:

Library Resources for Academic Majors - \$44,250 Secondary Education Library

Additions - \$14,000

Curriculum Library for Secondary Education - \$15,000 Computer Resources -\$20,523

Science Lab Development -\$80,000

Personnel, Secondary Education Specialist - \$60,000.

Redevelopment of Fee Hall (to accommodate the Education Department, classroom space for expanded majors and faculty offices) - \$50,000 Software for Secondary Education - \$8,000 Promotional Materials -\$5,000

President Davis shared with the College Board of Directors that market studies showed an overwhelming interest in Secondary Education from prospective students in our sponsoring churches and also from current students. The need for qualified teachers in our Christian and Public Schools, and for overseas missions opportunities, is tremendous.

The project campaign will begin in June of 1992 as NC launches into its 59th year of service.

MRS. ANNA M. NESS REMEMBERED



nna Margaretha Molgaard Ness, wife of NC's first president, Henry H. Ness, passed away quietly on January 12, 1992. She was born in Lokken, Denmark, her to attend a revival meeting held by Gustaf Johnson. It was here that she accepted Jesus into her heart and her lifelong desire to see Him face to face began. With her witness and prayer, two weeks later Henry also accepted Jesus.

In 1924, as part of the initiation process for Eastern Star, Anna was asked to memorize a portion of scripture. While doing so, the Holy Spirit convicted her, prompting In 1950 Henry accepted the position of Chairman of the Washington State Board of Prison Terms and Paroles and served six years. Here again, Anna accepted any duties in this role with grace and dignity.

Their formal ministry, spanning thirtyfive years, ended with a pastorate in Oakland, California in, 1960. In 1970 they returned to Seattle; Henry died later the same year.



cripture indicates that God taught Adam to tend the garden, and that mankind is a steward of His creation. Being a steward requires that you 'know the Boss', find out how the Boss wants His property cared for, and diligently apply yourself to the task. We are the operators, not the Owner, and we are the

stewards, not the Savior. These lines may sound simplistic, but there is a definite difference between saving "Mother Earth" because "She is the mother of all life" and being a responsible steward of the property of the Only Creator God.

NC is located close to some spectacular and pertinent areas that help drive home the importance and possibilities of stewardship. Within just a few hours we have one of the two temperate rain forests in the U.S., a still active volcano, ocean beaches and sound, old growth forest, estuaries, nuclear power plants, and large urban populations. Our Northwest Ecology class spends time in each of these areas trying to grasp the importance and impact of the dynamics involved. The reason for this class is that too many people have felt that ecology was fodder for the media or involved extremists that were set on the extinction of mankind. The description of the worst case scenarios was overwhelming and solutions seemed far beyond what little bit you or I could do. The result has been that average people didn't know how to participate or didn't feel that their little bit would make a difference.

This class was developed specifically for the nonscientist with the twofold objective of (1) placing the individual in direct contact with some of the problems, and (2) finding practical ways each person can do their part.

We stand in the middle of a landfill with trucks rumbling by dumping 100,000 tons of garbage per day and talk about "reduce consumption, recycle," reuse". We watch how two rivers are purified and put into the water pipes of Greater Seattle and talk at length of showers, lawn watering, etc. We stand in the sewer treatment plant and see how two rivers of water have been degraded and must be revitalized before reuse can occur. We actually stand inside the five foot thick walls of a nuclear containment chamber and talk about the problems of energy use.

Two Options Offered

The first option students will choose this year is a two credit class called *Urban Ecology* that centers around Seattle. It meets for two weeks in May, 11-22. The second option is to take a five credit *Northwest Ecology* class which combines the first two weeks with two more weeks (May 11- June 5). The first course costs tuition plus a \$15 lab fee and a \$30 fee.

The second course costs tuition plus a \$15 lab fee and a \$150 fee.

This course spends 6 days and 4 nights off campus; the \$150 covers food, travel, and lodging for those trips.

Week one: Primarily classroom, one field trip to marshland area and Seattle City Water.
