THE TWIN ACRES

A Story Behind the Story of Northwest College

It was one of those balmy February days of 1984 which found Northwest College groundsman Dan Paulssen working in the woods above the College chapel. The clear sunshine gave the woods a glory known only to those who have experienced it. From the street alongside of Dan's working position, where he was burning tree trimmings, a man emerged. As he approached Dan, his eyes were knowingly searching the woods to the north of where Dan's fire crackled. These woods are now the headquarters of the Seattle Seahawks football team.

The gentleman introduced himself as Mr. Robert Jackman, then began a conversation that was to be as enlightening as the sun which was sending shafts of light through the forest canopy overhead. It took little time for Dan to learn that Mr. Jackman was retracing his childhood footsteps, for it was in this wooded area that Jackman had grown up in a log cabin accessed by a narrow road that had been cut through the woods near where the two men were standing. The log cabin stood at the end of the cul-de-sac which now services the Northwest College Firs apartments for married students. The foundation is still there. This cabin once had housed the Jackman family with its fourteen children. Dan and Mr. Jackman could trace the remnants of the old access road that had threaded its way through the dense woods and undergrowth. But more was to come in the conversation.

Mr. Jackman recalled another house in the neighborhood - the residence of two sisters. They were school teachers. But they were more than that; they were Christian ladies concerned about reaching the unreached with the Word of God. As Dan and Mr. Jackman looked westward, Jackman pointed at C.E. Butterfield Chapel and commented, "Their house was right where that building sits. Their place was known as 'The Twin Acres'. Every summer they would bring some Japanese young people out to their house for a couple of weeks and teach them about the Bible." The ladies were named Stewart, and the area was later called Stewart Heights.

It was the desire and prayer of the Stewart sisters that some day the government would put streets and sewers in that area and that many more young people would find their way to this house to learn about the Word of God. This was in 1934 - the same year that Northwest Bible Institute was founded in Seattle. Little could they visualize then the present streets through that solitary forest, which curtained and filtered some of the Northwest's most beautiful scenery — Lake Washington gleaming like a mirror in the foreground and the majestic snow-mantled Olympics rising in the background. Just seven years later, the U.S. Government purchased that land, including the Twin Acres, and turned it into Stewart Heights Housing Project to house workers from nearby Houghton Shipyard on Lake Washington.

Edith May Butterfield Remembered

Widow of Northwest College's second President

Edith May Butterfield was born May 3, 1906 in Orofino, Idaho, the first child of William and Mary Demarest. At age twelve, she moved with her family to Everett, Washington, where her father worked as a baker. She gave her heart to the Lord and was baptized at the Baptist Church.

Following a two year courtship, she married Charles Butterfield on September 27, 1926, in Eugene, Oregon. During the following months they ministered in several churches across Oregon, learning to live by faith, believing God to provide their daily bread

They returned to Everett in 1927, for the birth of their first child Dwight Robert. In 1928, they were asked to become pastors of Bethany Temple, now Bethany Christian Assembly, where they continued to serve for more than two decades. During this time Edith gave birth to David Alan (1928), Grace Elaine (1929), John Elber (1930), Mary Elizabeth (1931), Yvonne June (1933), Charles William (1935), Edith May (1936), Ruth Jo Ann (1938) and Paul Sherman (1946).

In the fall of 1949, they moved to Seattle, and subsequently Kirkland, where Charles served as President of Northwest College. Edith operated the College bookstore for twelve years, where her wise councel blessed the lives of many students.

Upon retirement from the college in 1966, Edith continued her life-long foreign travels with Charles, who visited seventy-six countries and preached in fifty-nine.

Edith was an active participant and sharing partner with Charles in the countless events surrounding his long years of ministry as pastor, school administrator, and missionary.

On her eighty-fourth birthday in 1990, she presented to each of her children a copy of her life story, which she had undertaken to write in her later years. During this time, she was also often asked to speak to church groups and share her lifetime of experiences. Her recent daily life was full and fulfilled by her delight in her family.

Edith was blessed with good health and awareness until her gentle departure to her Lord in Heaven on April 12, 1993, in Tacoma, Washington at age eighty-six.

She was preceded in death by her husband of fifty-two years, Charles, and her daughter, Ruth Jo Ann.

She was loved by all who knew her. We miss her, and will keep her memory alive in our hearts.

PRESIDENT'S PERSPECTIVE

NORTHWEST COLLEGE IS A LONG STORY OF MIRACLES.

NORTHWEST COLLEGE continues to position itself for Century 21 ... for providing a quality Bible-based education for ALL of our students... to be a "key-player" in these days of unparalleled opportunity and HAR-VEST.

I was appalled to hear again at a recent meeting of the Board of Christian Higher Education of the Assemblies of God that only 10% of our college age youth who are part of the sponsoring church of this college attend one of our schools. I have been on my "soap box" ever since I became president (I am now beginning my fourth year here at Northwest) that we are facing an enormous leadership vacuum in our Fellowship. That is why NC has, through the years, continued to broaden its curriculum to meet the needs of our students preparing for every field of service and leadership.

We were visited late this Spring by the accrediting team from NASC (Northwest Association of Schools and Colleges) for our five-year review. This is a secular accrediting agency that deals with all the colleges and universities in the Pacific region. They wrote in their report, "One must conclude that although the College holds fast to its mission laid down by its founding fathers, it is not the Bible College of decades ago." (Meaning that the curriculum has grown and developed over the years.) "It is a vibrant, modern center of higher education which could serve as a model for many other aspiring institutions."

When I phoned the chairman of the accrediting team to acknowledge that I had received the draft of the report that was being sent to the accrediting agency office, he told me, "I am not a part of your church, but I want you to know that if I had a young person in my home today, they would be at Northwest College. I have never been in a more wholesome educational atmosphere."

Isn't it interesting that miracles always occur when we step out in faith, not when we just sit passively by and hope that something might happen. Our Board of Directors at their annual meeting in May took another gigantic step of faith in unanimously approving the new Secondary Education major. We had been denied a grant request that was greatly needed, but the decision was made to move forward anyway. The Board felt that if we as a College are going to fulfill the mission of the founding fathers to change this world, we must prepare our students for ministry in one of this nation's most vital areas of need and that is our school systems. We cannot complain about the de-emphasis in moral and spiritual values if we are not preparing ourselves to change the situation.

Professor Darrel Hobson Awarded Doctor of Ministry Degree

Dr. Hobson was also visiting professor for the Assemblies of God Theological Seminary extension session held on the Northwest College campus, May 24th through May 28th.

Rev. Charles T. Crabtree Receives Doctor of Divinity Degree

ment speaker following the Conferral of the Doctor of Divinity Degree. Dr. Crabtree was recognized with the degree for his distinguished career of Christian service as an evangelist, pastor, church leader, conference speaker, and author of note in the Assemblies of God and in the evangelical church world.

Dr. Crabtree serves currently with distinction as the Director for the Decade of Harvest, the single greatest evangelism effort in the history of the Assemblies of God.

President Davis and Dr. Amos Millard Lead Flying Seminar to Israel

President Davis and faculty emeritus, Dr. Amos Millard, led 30 people to Israel and Greece for a tour of relevant Biblical sites.

The Flying Seminar has been an annual project of the President's office in conjunction with the service and leadership of Dr. Amos Millard. This year's tour represented the twenty-fourth Flying Seminar sponsored by Northwest College. The seventeen day

excursion has become a great opportunity for College friends and alumni to enrich their understanding of Biblical sights under the dynamic instruction of Dr. Amos Millard.

President Davis and Dr. Millard were also accompanied by Dr. Dwayne Turner, Program Director for the Pacific Rim Center for Cross-Cultural Studies at Northwest College. Dr. Turner contributed his expertise as a co-host and lecturer during the tour event.

Dr. Francis Thee Awarded Bible Lands Study Grant

Northwest College provides an Endowed Study Grant for research in the Holy Land on an annual basis. Dr. Francis Thee has been the recipient for this grant for the summer of 1993. He will spend the first two weeks of July at the Institute for Holy Land Studies involved in continued research to the life and times of Christ.

During January, Dr. Thee served as the visiting professor for the Assemblies of God Theological Seminary extension program held at Northwest College. His presentations were on the subject matter New Testament Theology.

Dr. Bill Randolph Awarded Two Studies Grants

Dr. Bill Randolph has received both the General Studies Grant and the Pope Memorial Grant to do studies and travel related to Creation/ Evolution studies. He is intending to gather a lot of new material and develop a study guide for churches in the Creation debate area. He will also be viewing many of the available video resources now available and including recommendations for usage as part of the study guide.

Dr. John McMillin and Dr. Bill Randolph took a team of students to Sordo Mudo, Mexico in the first Northwest College food raising project. The Biointensive Agriculture class held during spring semester gave basic theory, and the group put their theory to practice by helping a small Christian deaf school develop abilities to raise and sell food to support itself.

The ability to provide food for starving people is a joint effort of our Business and Science departments. They worked with the people to establish food and possible income sources in an atmosphere of Christian love and mission. This program is in its infancy, but we are excited at the prospects. A greenhouse that includes fishraising technology is being built this summer. This will add to our training and research base. The combination of Bible based training with practical Business and Science education that extends both a physical and a spiritual hand of love is an exciting new arm of the ministry.

Vice President Flowers Travels to Magadan, Russia Visits the International Pedagogical University

Dr. Marshall Flowers, Jr., Vice President for Academic Affairs, represented Northwest College in continued dialogue with the International Pedagogical University of Magadan, Russia.

Northwest College and the International Pedagogical University have protocol letters indicating a desire to establish a sister college relationship. During the past two academic years, Professors Dan Pecota and Marjorie Stewart have travelled to Magadan for extended lectureships. During the summer of 1993, seven Professors from the Magadan University will come to Northwest College to participate in the Teaching English As A Second Language Institute August 2 - August 20th. Dr. Flowers' trip to Magadan provides an opportunity for strengthening the relationship between these two institutions.

Dr. Randall Barton Honored at 1993 Commencement Exercises

Board of Directors for his commitment to excellence and leadership during his eight and a half years of service to Northwest College. Although Dr. Barton's leadership has been broadened beyond Northwest College, we continue to benefit from his counsel and enthusiasm.

Dr. Richard Blue, Board Member and Director of Teacher Education, Honored During 1993 Commencement

Dr. Richard Blue was presented the President's Award during the 1993 Commencement Exercises. Dr. Blue served on the College Board of Directors for sixteen years, chairing the Curriculum and Personnel Committee of the Board. During this year, he served as the Director of Teacher Education leading a major restructuring of the curriculum in preparation for the addition of Secondary Education to the academic programs of Northwest College.

A Northwest College friend had an old will. He knew he should change it to protect his family, to save taxes, to add new bequests. But he was always too busy. Tragically, death came without warning.

An unusual case? Not really. Over half of all Christians die with an outdated will or without a valid will. Why? Because making a will seems less important than the other business of day to day living. Most of us regard writing a will or other estate planning methods as unpleasant or a costly ordeal. Let's face it. Making a will is not a fatal experience; in fact, it has been said with tongue in cheek that when your estate planning is done, you have extended your life because of the removal of stress and tension and thinking about it. Your will is part of the business of day to day living. As stewards of God's resources we have a responsibility to see that those things we have been entrusted with during our life, are properly handled after our death. An hour or two with an estate planning counselor can help you plan for the important needs of your loved ones and friends who depend on you.

What's Wrong With Your Old Will?

Maybe you thought your will was eternal. Once done, you put it away and forgot it.

Not so! Your will is a snap shot of your wishes at a given moment of time. It may provide for some contingencies, but it cannot read your mind. Often births, deaths, new marriages, divorces, or other reasons, require that you consider additions or deletions.

Other circumstances can have a major impact on your estate planning. Your assets or your values may have changed. There may be new federal laws or state laws. You may have moved to another state with different probate statutes. Perhaps you would like to include a bequest to Northwest College. Your will isn't written on a stone tablet. You can amend it at any time with a codicil.

Has your marital status changed since you made your last will?

Do you want to provide for a new child or grandchild? Do you need a new plan because of medical situations that might have occurred?

Have you changed how your present estate may contribute to good works that should continue after your lifetime?

Don't take chances. For a peaceful mind, call your estate planning counselor information on what you might need to consider to update your will now.

DID YOU KNOW OLD INSURANCE POLICIES CAN BECOME A NEW GIFT?

Have you ever wished your life could have a special impact for Christ? A significant planned gift might accomplish this wish. One way is an insurance gift which might be an old policy which you have held for years that is fully paid up, but no longer necessary for your risk management planning.

You can simply request a change of beneficiary form from your insurance company. This form can then be rewritten to add your church and Northwest College to share in the proceeds from the insurance policy at the time of your death. The day you sign this change of beneficiary, you have generated a charitable gift deduction for that tax year. The value of the charitable gift is related to the cash value of the policy or the face value of the policy that will be deducted at your death as a charitable deduction. This type of a gift does not impact your cash flow, at this time and does not put at risk any of the assets or resources you presently have in place for your needs and the needs of others during your lifetime. DO YOU HAVE UNPRODUCTIVE PROPERTY IN YOUR ASSETS TODAY?

Do you have investments that yield little or no current income? If so, by making an outright charitable gift to Northwest College, you could secure a valuable tax deduction. You might be counting on future income from this property, perhaps at retirement.

Here is a great way to benefit from such an asset now. It's called a "Charitable Remainder Unitrust", an investment plan that not only saves you taxes at the outset, but also assures you of income for your lifetime.

The Method Is Quite Simple

Under a Unitrust deferred gift arrangement, Northwest College receives nothing now, but after your lifetime, the remainder goes to us to help fund a scholarship endowment or to help the college with its day to day work.

With a Unitrust, the trustee will pay you an income each year, right from the start. The amount you are going to receive is calculated by a fixed percentage multiplied by the market value of your trust assets which are revalued annually. You choose the percentage at the outset of the trust, but the payout will be at least five percent every year.

Favorable Investment Strategy

Even after reinvestment, a low/high yield growth investment strategy could be followed in earlier years, with a switch to high current yield in the later years. One possibility: In its discretion, Northwest College as the trustee could purchase zero coupon bonds. Rather than paying interest, these are sold at a price that is steeply discounted from the face value. When redeemed, the profit is the discounted amount. After your retirement, the zero coupon bonds could be sold and the proceeds reinvested in income producing assets, so that you will begin to receive both current income payments and payments necessary to make up for the Unitrust amount that was not paid to you during your working years

This is an attractive investment strategy that allows you to benefit not only from a tax free buildup of principal within the Unitrust, but possibly also from a lower tax bracket when the payout begins.

TRUTH IN FUNDRAISING

A truth in "tax exempt giving act" has been re-introduced by Senator John Warner of Virginia to again put before Congress a bill that would require Northwest College and other charities to inform donors and potential donors of the availability of a financial disclosure form. This form would be available to donors of Northwest College upon request. Northwest College would also have to list their top five paid employees and also any other employees earning over \$100,000 per year.

Northwest College, along with other charities under present requirements file a form 990 with the IRS listing income, expenses, and fundraising costs. Northwest College is notifying you today that you are always welcome to request a copy of the form 990 which we file annually with the IRS and/or any other financial statements that will allow you to review our income and spending procedures. These documents have been available to you throughout the years past and we are making this article a reminder that these information documents are continuing to be available to our donors. The most practical way at least for you to be reminded of this availability will soon be revealed on each gift acknowledgement receipt. Donors can be notified in other forms. However, they require a great deal of time and expense.


INTO THE WORLD

The Stewart sisters had ambitions for their home which went beyond the ordinary. They had a yearning for it to someday be used to train young people in the Word of God. "Indoctrination", was what Mr. Jackman called it.

When the U.S. Government purchased the land including the Twin Acres, it did indeed put in the streets and utilities. Unknowingly, it was preparing it for the ultimate use for which the Stewart sisters had prayed - a place of training of young people in the Word of God.

The next link in the chain of events was a phone call to C.E. Butterfield, who was then President of Northwest College. The call was from a Mr. Cox, a real estate man who lived on 108th Avenue in Houghton. He had heard the College was looking for property on which to relocate, since the freeway project was soon to take the building "out from under the college" in the late 1950's.

Dr. Butterfield was a man of prayer and of faith. When he first viewed this property, it was clear to him that this was God's choice - it was the promised land for Northwest College. Dr. Butterfield returned to the property one day and knelt on a concrete slab on which had once stood a housing unit of the old Stewart Heights Housing Project. There he "claimed this property for God". The story from that point on is well known in Northwest College circles - a story of miracles in the face of impossible odds.

It seems more than a coincidence that the spot where Dr. Butterfield knelt was the spot where the Stewart sisters had had their home. It was a spot sanctified by their prayers and dedication and service - a spot today sanctified by the "crown jewel" of all buildings on the Northwest College campus, C.E. Butterfield Chapel. The Chapel sits in the center of what was the Twin Acres. Today hundreds of young people still find their way to the Twin Acres on NC's present fifty-five acre campus for "indoctrination" in the Word of God.

The story of the Twin Acres is ongoing. Of the ephemeral character of the world, the Apostle John declared, "The world passeth away and the lust thereof; but he that doeth the will

of God abideth forever". The stamp and character of the eternal is upon that which is dedicated to fulfilling the will and word of God! May it ever be so on the parcel of ground once called "The Twin Acres" and known today as Northwest College of the Assemblies of God.
