princess and escort. Senior


princesses and their escorts

HERITAGE WEEK

The celebration of the sixtieth anniversary at Northwest College commenced with Heritage Week chapel services on February 23-25. Each chapel featured speakers who have contributed greatly to the development of the college.


On Wednesday, February 23, President Emeritus, Dr. D.V. Hurst spoke to the student body. Dr. Hurst's son-in-law, Dr. Darrell Hobson, led the chapel in hymns of faith and commitment that speak of the pentecostal message. The words of Faith Is The Victory, Jesus Keep Me Near The Cross and The Comforter Has Come all proclaimed that the scriptures are indeed Wonderful Words of Life. Dr. Hurst not only challenged the student body to "Seek first the Kingdom of God and His righteousness and all these things will be added unto you," but he spoke of how to do it. "Take no thought for tomorrow for tomorrow will take thought for itself. Live life a day at a time.

God built life into days. That is the heritage of Northwest College. The leaders lived it a day at a time, in faith, in commitment, in the present. Start the day with the word of God. Sing a song; plant the songs in your mind. Breathe a prayer. Wait on the Lord. 'They that wait on the Lord shall renew their strength.' Go forward! Grab hold and take possession of the day. When the going gets tough and you have doubts, take one step at a time."


Thursday's chapel service featured a team of speakers who shared highlights from history. Mrs. Bessie Guy McMullen did not believe the Bible when she came as a student, but she was born again in a chapel service in the early days of Northwest Bible Institute. Her challenge to today's students was "Always keep close to your heart the things that are close to God's heart." Mr. Paul Gray represented his father, Rev. Frank Gray, whose name appears on the men's dormitory. Paul was in the second graduating class at NBI and remembered hard times during the depression when the Lord provided for the college family. Dr. Donald Fee served the College on the Board of Directors at the beginning and

came to be the principle Bible teacher in 1953. One of his first students was Dennis Davis. Mr. Herb Crowder was called to supervise the development program of the campus. He spoke of the miraculous provision of the Lord through gifts of people in many places including a substantial gift from a lady that he met when he stopped on a mountain pass. God's provision never seemed to come too soon but was always on time. Dr. Amos Millard spoke of how the Spirit of God has moved over the years, at times in a divine interruption, and of the students being empowered by the Spirit of God. This is the continued desire for the future at Northwest, the touch of God on students' lives so they can touch the world.

Rev. Owen Hodges challenged the students in the Friday chapel service to keep the pentecostal heritage. This has made the difference throughout the history of Northwest College and it shows the faithfulness of God. God is still moving by His Spirit at Northwest College.



COLLEGE YEAR-1994 CELEBRATION



FOR SUCH A TIME AS THIS

The 20th century stands unique in human history for many things. It was ushered in by spontaneous revivals in Wales followed by remarkable, spontaneous outpourings of the Holy Spirit in places the world over. It was the century that would see the rise of Zionism under Theodore Herzl and the start of the return of the Jews from the world over to the land of their fathers as the prophets foretold.

It is the century that has seen an explosion of technology and travel only hinted at by the Hebrew prophets. It is a century that would see a population explosion unparalleled in human history and unparalleled missionary evangelism and ingathering in the history of the Christian church. It is a century that would bring the human race to a capability of self-annihilation and space exploration. It is a century of unparalleled internationalism driven by technology, and a herd instinct for global survival.

It is a century uniquely visited by the pentecostal outpourings and the gifting of the Holy Spirit as perhaps in no other century since the first century A.D. It is a century that saw the Bible college movement emerge in response to a commitment of faith in the scriptures, an evangelical fervor for winning the lost and a sense of the soon return of Christ.

Out of the matrix of this background and in the wake of some of the greatest revivals ever to come to the Pacific Northwest, through the ministry of the late Charles S. Price, came the Assemblies of God and the Northwest Bible Institute.

My personal arrival to the college was the middle of what might be called the pioneer era of the college's history. Perhaps the thing that made the greatest impression on me was the prevailing spirit of prayer that rested on students and faculty. The school year was started with extended times of prayer. Students would regularly come early and spend time on their knees in the main auditorium before classes. Friday afternoons were times of prayer for missions. On occasion there would be several days at a time when the Spirit of God mightily visited the school and a spirit of prayer was so manifested that classes were suspended.

Faculty yielded to the clear direction of the Holy Spirit and participated with the students on their knees before the Lord. Only eternity knows the farreaching effects of these times

of revival under the superintendency of the Spirit Himself. It was not uncommon to hear the voice of a young man or a young woman interceding in a prayer vigil in a prayer room behind the baptistry or from a Sunday School room off the balcony.

Out of this atmosphere of prayer our students were imbued with a zeal for God and a zeal for souls. Testimony times were called 'popcorn' services because students popped up all over the chapel at once to bring ringing testimonies of what the Lord meant to them.

During the years of academic development and campus development Northwest College has been mightily blessed. But its birthright stems from the intangibles of its calling and its mission to take the gospel of Christ to the ends of the earth. Never in history has that calling and mission been more relevant to the needs of the world as the shadows grow long in the day of opportunity to win men to Christ.



Northwest College experienced its own "March Madness" when the College hosted the women's National Basketball Tournament for the National Chrisfracture injury which had kept her out of competition for several weeks. Janea had been voted to the 1993-94 All-American team earlier and was voted the Most



tian College Athletic Association Division II schools, March 3-5, 1994.

Seven teams from across the nation competed to wrest the National championship away from the defending champions, Coach Kristi Brodin's Northwest College Lady Eagles. When the cheering stopped, the host Lady Eagles remained national champs, defeating the number one seeded team from Kentucky Christian College, 55-44. En route to the championship the Eagles also defeated Johnson Bible College from Tennessee and Mid America from Oklahoma City.

The Lady Eagles were led by sophomore Janea Powell from Meridian, Idaho, coming off a stress

Valuable Player in the Tournament, scoring an average of 20 points per game. NC's Dawn Reid of Seattle joined Janea on the All-Tourney team. Brooke Miller from Post Falls, Idaho, and Nicole Story from Sandpoint, Idaho, from the Eagles qualified for the National Scholar Athlete squad.

The 1994 National championship banner will hang alongside the championship banners for the lady Eagles from 1988, 1990, 1991, and 1993. Congratulations to coaches Kristi Brodin, Aiyanna Marcus, Kari Brodin; Manager, Mandi Farmer; and the other members of the team: Kim Smith, Marlo Hutchison, Wendy Snell, Stephanie Baller, and Julie Hagen.
