Ability

Last spring when our Teacher Education program went through the re-endorsement review, one of the people from the State Department of Education stated that they had not visited with students any more confident in their preparation than those at Northwest College. I expressed to the faculty that I believe that same thing can be said of students in every major. Our alumni are men and women who have been prepared by godly faculty to meet life's challenges with confidence.

Leadership

NC, through its alumni, holds positions of leadership throughout the world. I cannot possibly recite every position and place where you will find them; however, they serve in influential places as business leaders, medical care-givers, educators, pastors, denominational leaders, public servants, missionaries, legal professionals, musicians, and a host of other areas. I look back on my own classmates from NC and see from that list high school teachers, a police officer, an IBM executive, pastors, missionaries, and many others making significant contributions to our world.

We do not believe that "ministry" is confined to a pulpit or a mission field. We believe that God is using our graduates in a variety of places where they sense His calling and are ministering to elevate the name of Jesus through their lifestyle, their morality, their honesty and dependability. Yes, many have taken places in what we have called "the full-time ministry." (Aren't we all full-time?) Five of our District Superintendents in this region are graduates of Northwest and we have graduates who are here in residence as faculty members.

Are You "A" Christian Or Are You "Christian"?

hat does it mean to think "Christianly" about life? A few years ago the Episcopal Church of America put out a series of provocative posters, one of which showed the face of Jesus with this quote underneath: "He died to take away your sins, not your mind." As Christians we need to use the mind God has given us to study, reflect, and meditate about our relationship with God and with the world He created. Mark Noll's challenging book, The Scandal of the Evangelical Mind, pushed me to do more thinking about what it means to be a Christian who takes the Word of God seriously. He wrote that "...the evangelicals who have made progress in using the Christian faith as a guide to political thought have simply assumed that the whole of the Bible is relevant to the whole of human history and experience."

College students are at the crucial stage of life when they are making decisions which they will live with the rest of their lives. Let's look at some areas of the college students' lives, and think about how thinking "Christianly" might influence their decision making.

Potential Spouse: "Man looks on the outward appearance, but the Lord looks at the heart." (I Sam. 16:7). Unfortunately even in Christian circles both sexes are caught up in the outward appearances, but age and gravity will take their toll on all of our "outward appearances." We all say we believe the Bible, yet often make our choices of companions for reasons that seem almost antithetical to biblical values. When the beauty and vigor of youth has waned, then the inner character and commitment truly come into play, and too often in the society around us, that is when relationships are severed and heartache results.

Vocation: Money, security, status, climate, upward mobility, etc. Would you glean these things from reading the Sermon on the Mount and other biblical passages? We are called to serve our fellow man, to put others ahead of ourselves and to trust God to take care of us. If we truly are biblical Christians, then the "call" of God on our lives cannot be one that has any of the above-mentioned motivations, as those are not consistent with the principles of biblical teaching.

Time: Time is the essence of our lives. We use time or we waste it, even using such a chilling phrase as "killing time." In fact, what we are implying when we say that is we are killing our lives and opportunities. We know that time is the stuff of which life is made and our life is not our own to do with as we want if we have even a cursory understanding of what it means to be a Christian.

Money: Jesus spoke much about money, property and material things. He always seemed to be condemning of those who used it for themselves at the expense of others. He warned of the "deceitfulness of riches." Elsewhere the Scriptures say the "love of money is the root of all evil." Could it be that so many of us have bought into the world's standard of measurement and lifestyle that we cannot see the plain and simple truths of the Scripture on this topic?

Relationships: The tendency is to use relationships to better ourselves, or to gain advantage over others. Too often we want to associate with those who are smarter, more talented, have more money, have a nicer car, or are more beautiful, or in the right group, and so on. Those are often the kinds of calculations that go into choosing friends. Among those who follow the "meek and lowly" Christ, things ought to be different. We love because God loves us and others, with no qualifications or conditions. Relationship with God and relationship with others are the only truly lasting things we can glean from this life.

Authority: There will always be those to whom we are responsible and leaders have differing ideas about what it means to be "loyal". I would hope that most leaders would allow for what some have called "critical loyalty," or "loyal dissent." There is often a tendency on the part of leaders to resist those who raise questions. Another of the sayings from the Episcopal Church series showed a man with his mouth taped shut. A caption overhead read, "**The only trouble with churches that have all the answers is that they don't allow questions.**"

Part of being a Christian who is attempting to be scholarly is to deal with the facts in their proper context, and not be selective or abusive of the facts to make a certain point today. We have to be honest when confronting the various academic disciplines, whether or not we agree with the facts. This may not always be comfortable, and the facts may not always demonstrate what we hope, but we have to be honest in handling information.

Academics: All areas of study are legitimate for the child of God, and we don't have to apologize or necessarily defer to others who take strong stands that are not consistent with what we know about God, His world, and His creation, man. This may mean we don't drink beer or dance, or do a lot of other things, but it surely means more than those rather peripheral things. It means we take seriously what God says about Himself, about His creation, and about our fellow humans.

However, education can lead to pride and arrogance toward those who may not have our level of "sophistication." Such arrogance is also incompatible with biblical teaching. To those of us who may be tempted to arrogance about our education and our wisdom I would say, as a plaque on the wall of the Lutheran Center of the University of North Dakota put it, "In pursuit of the sheepskin, don't lose sight of the sheepherd."



Congress & Principles

Congresswoman Linda Smith speaks in chapel service

n April 1, 1996, Congresswoman Linda Smith visited Northwest College and spoke in the chapel service. A committed Christian, Representative Smith challenged NC students to stand for their beliefs no matter what the cost. Representative Smith also spoke of the miracle by which she was elected to the United States Congress in 1994 as the first person in Washington State history to qualify for a general election ballot as a write-in candidate. She also discussed some of the challenges of her job in Washington, D.C. Before Representative Smith was elected

to the U.S. Congress, she was a member of Washington State's Senate from 1987 until 1994. She authored two Washington State Initiatives, Number 134, the Fair Campaign Practices Act approved by voters in November 1993, and Number 601, a limit on state expenditures and taxes also approved by voters in November 1993.

Northwest College students were blessed by Representative Smith's message and challenged to live according to God's principles no matter what the situation.

STALEY LECTURE PROGRAM

Dr. Richard Allen Farmer Challenges NC Students

ach year Northwest College is privileged to host the Staley Distinguished Christian Scholar Lecture Program. Guest speakers from throughout the world are invited for this significant time of learning.

Preacher, teacher, and musician Dr. Richard Allen Farmer ministered at Northwest in the April 1996 program. Based in Dallas, Texas, Dr. Farmer travels full-time using powerful expository preaching and a unique blend of traditional and contemporary music to renew the church.

Dr. Farmer's preaching and teaching in workshops and worship services cover a variety of subjects including leadership, creativity, and worship. He brings a background rich in experience as a senior pastor and as Dean of the Chapel at Gordon College. His focus while at Northwest was on "The Musts of Worship." The published titles for his morning chapel messages were "We Must Worship in Spirit and in Truth," "We Must Worship Privately" and "We Must Worship Corporately." Dr. Farmer also spoke in some classes and in a faculty

and student leader forum, and attended a reception featuring a review of books he has authored, including *It Won't Fly If You Don't Try* (a handbook on creative thinking). His combination of sound scholarship with humor, music and sensitivity to the needs of an audience made the services with Dr. Farmer a powerful experience.

As a Staley Foundation lecturer, Dr. Farmer visits several college campuses each year. Northwest College is pleased to have had the opportunity to host him during this year's Staley Lectureship Series.

The Staley Distinguished Christian Scholar Lecture Program is sponsored by the Thomas F. Staley Foundation in New York, which seeks to bring to American Christian colleges and universities outstanding scholars who truly believe in the power and relevancy of the Gospel and who can clearly communicate with students. Previous Staley Lecturers at Northwest College have included Dr. Paul W. Brand, Dr. Russell Rogers, Dr. Murray Dempster and Dr. Anthony Campolo.

GEORGE KAFWIMBI

Kitwe, Zambia

eorge Kafwimbi came to
Northwest College as a student
in the Fall semester of 1991,
from Zambia, Africa, where he served as
a pastor and as the Dean of Students for
six years at The Pentecostal Assemblies
of God Bible School in Kitwe, Zambia.

Following graduation from NC in '93, George, his wife Merina, and their four children returned to Kitwe, where George resumed responsibilities as Dean of Students at the Bible School. Merina is a full time lecturer and the Dean of Women.

Recently, Pastor George has been appointed President of Trans Africa Theological College for Zambia. He reports that the college campus has grown to two hundred acres, portions of which will be used for agricultural and farming interests. The Bible School students and the Zambian church join in outreach to the neighboring country of Malawi and in evangelistic work in Eastern Zambia among the Muslim

groups. An extension of the Bible School will be started in the neighboring country of Zaire.

Pastor George also serves as District Superintendent for the Copperbelt District of the Pentecostal Assemblies of God. He travels the country of Zambia, overseeing, encouraging and ministering to over 100 pastors and lay ministers.

George came to Northwest College, as have many international students over the years, to train and to gain knowledge for taking the message of Jesus Christ back to his native land. He states, "Northwest College should to be encouraged that the message of the Gospel continues to be told year after year, by students who return to their homelands to teach and preach the Good News to their own people."

When asked, "What one thing that you learned at NC has been most valuable to your ministry at home?"

George replied that the Lord taught him to work with his mind and his hands. He came from a position where he could give directions and assignments, but at NC he was the student and employee. Others were giving him the assignments. He states that those experiences have added strength and character to his life and are valuable lessons in his ministry of relating and having understanding for students and co-laborers.

George Kafwimbi was encouraged to come to Northwest College by his good friend and co-laborer, Joshua Banda ('89). Preceding Joshua, George Mbulo ('84) came from Zambia. Maybin Chisebuka is a '94 graduate and current students are Simon Sichangwa with his family and Arthur Mwanza.

Students reach out to the streets of inner-city Portland

Team members began by going door to door and inviting children of the neighborhood to a children's outreach. team moved to a local mission and helped feed those who came off the street looking for food. They also handed out clothes to many individuals who were in need of them. 


