his has been an extremely interesting decade in which I have been privileged to serve as the fourth President of Northwest College. The decade began with the transition of presidents and is now, after eight years, in a transition once again as we look forward to President-elect Don Argue assuming this position in the summer of 1998. This writing represents my final article in Imprint as President of Northwest College. It is my desire to highlight a few of the developments that have occurred during this decade, and it is my prayer that God will continue His work through this college to accomplish His purposes in the future.

The historic mission of the college remains constant through 64 years of ministry and training. Our college mission statement reads: "The mission of Northwest College is to provide, in a distinctly evangelical Christian environment, quality education to prepare students for service and leadership." I am continually encouraged when I realize that this statement isn't just an ideal on the campus of Northwest College, it is also a strong reality. I have observed in my tenure as President of this great institution students with the call of God on their lives. These students want to reach our world with the timeless message of Jesus Christ. They have been educated in an environment which fosters the development of hearts and minds with a burning desire to change the world for God whether they will serve in a full-time vocational ministry capacity or in the marketplace. The theme for the College this year was "Approved by God - in purpose, in preparation, in proclamation" (II Timothy 2:15,16). We were reminded of this theme daily as we enter Butterfield chapel. We are, and will always continue to be, a people with purpose.


My heart is filled with gratitude to all of you for your support of my presidency and of the College during these past eight years. The Board of Directors was kind in giving me the wonderful opportunity to serve as President. I am convinced that they could have done better in their choice at that time, but I have given the best I have in fulfilling the task. I believe this college is a work of God and has been blessed by God since its inception.

I have stated that when the Davis era comes to a close, a historical link in leadership the College has known through the years will be severed. Realizing that my sister is married to the son of Henry Ness, the college's founding president; that Dr.

C.E. Butterfield who followed was president while I was here as a student; that the third president, Dr. D.V. Hurst, has been my friend, and that I was privileged to serve on the Board of Directors with Dr. Hurst for eight years before assuming this position - I understand and value my link to the history of Northwest College. Then after hearing of the Board selection of Dr. Don Argue to serve as the fifth president, I realized that the link to the past will continue. Dr. Argue was an eight year-old-boy when his father became pastor of Calvary Temple in Seattle. He has recollection of Henry Ness and has had a long personal relationship with the Ness family. My three predecessors each made their own distinguishing marks on the development of the College. They were all mighty men of God and of faith which have brought the college to where it is today.

Through these years I have been privileged to serve as an evangelist, to pastor some of the greatest people in the world, to serve as a district superintendent, to preach on nearly every continent, and in the past eight years, to have served as President of your College.

Northwest College will always be in my heart. My love and respect for this college has grown through the years. I pledge my wholehearted support to Dr. Argue to assist him in any way possible, not only in these days of transition, but also in the future. I honestly believe the best days of Northwest College are the days still ahead. And now my prayer for all of you is, "That the God of peace, through the everlasting covenant, keep us (you, me, the Church, and Northwest College) perfect in every way, fulfilling that which is well pleasing in His sight through Jesus Christ to whom be glory forever and ever. New Tax Bill Makes Education More Affordable

ecently Congress passed a bill called the Hope Scholarship Credit to help students pay for college. It allows parents of students to reduce their income tax by the payment of tuition and courserelated fees for college. Subsequent to Congress passing this bill, I attended a conference in Chicago held by the U.S. Treasury Department and the Internal Revenue Service. This was a symposium that included college business officers from around the United States to give input and opinion on the subject of the new bill.

I learned that this Hope credit is available for students in the first two years of college. It is effective for semesters beginning after January 1, 1998. The credit will reduce the parents' income tax or the students' income tax, if the parents don't claim the student as a dependent. The tax credit is equal to 100% of the first \$1000 of tuition and academic fees paid and 50% of the next \$1000 of tuition and fees paid during the year. Therefore, if a student or his/her parents pay at least \$2000 of tuition/fees in 1998, and the student is in the first two years of college, the parents would be eligible for a tax credit of \$1500 for 1998. To be eligible for the credit, a student must be in school at least half time one semester of the year. If parents have more than one dependent in college that qualifies, they could receive this tax credit for each.

Additionally, Congress created a Lifetime Learning Tax Credit. This credit begins July 1, 1998, and it provides a tax credit equal to 20% of the first \$5000 paid for tuition and fees for all higher education up to the doctoral level of study. We suggest you consult your tax advisors for specific details on these tax credits.

Dr. Don Argue Completes Religious Bridge-Building Mission to China

Recently, Northwest College president-elect Dr. Don Argue completed an 18 day fact-finding mission on religious freedom in China that grew out of Chinese President Jiang Zemin's visit to Washington D.C. last October. Dr. Argue was hand-picked by President Clinton as part of a high profile, three member team of delegates to represent the U.S. government in China on matters of religious freedom. The delegation also included the Most Rev. Theodore McCarrick, Roman Catholic archbishop of Newark, N.J. and Rabbi Arthur Schneier, president of the Appeal of Conscience Foundation.

After a one hour meeting with the Chinese President, the three American clerics said that their visit had opened the door to better contacts with the Chinese leadership on religious issues. Dr. Argue feels that the delegate's visit succeeded in that it gained them access to impress senior Chinese officials with the importance of religious freedom to the American public.

The teams' main objective was to examine the state of religious freedom, one of the most volatile human rights issues in American diplomacy issues with China. President Clinton and President Zemin agreed to the mission during their summit meeting last year.

The group met with officials and religious leaders in Beijing, Shanghai, Nanjing, Chengdu, and Hong Kong. They were also granted rare approval for a visit to Lhasa, the capital of Tibet. The Chinese and American governments feel that this visit will build friendlier religious, political, and economic ties between the two countries.

Counseling and Career Development Center Opens at Northwest College

his past fall, Northwest College's own Counseling and Career Development Center opened its doors to serve students and employees. Adding to our growing co-curricular program, the Counseling and Career Development Center meets needs in two distinct areas: general counseling

services provide individual, marital, pre-marital, and group counseling; and the center also provides crisis intervention and counseling support to NC's Resident Life Staff.

In the Career Development area, services provided include: access to educational material resources, career and vocational testing, assistance with resume' writing and interviewing skills, assistance in job placement,

and access to the SIGI-Plus interactive career development software program. The Counseling and Career Development Center also provides consultation and referrals to services in the community for NC employees.

Funded by donors, the center is located in the Perks' residence hall, providing easy access for students. The remodel from dormitory space to office space was completed last summer.

Teresa Regan is director of the center, after first having worked with NC students on a part time basis. Teresa completed her graduate work at Seattle Pacific University, has been an educator in the public school system, has spent eleven years in Asia in missions work, and has been on the pastoral staff of a Federal Way

> church. In addition to her duties at NC, Teresa maintains a small private counseling practice. She and her staff welcome the opportunity to be involved in the lives of students at

Recently, the Counseling and Career Development Center hosted its first Northwest College Career Fair. The Career Fair included more than forty exhibitors and eight workshops. At the fair, NC

students interacted with local employers to learn about ministry and vocational career opportunities. Students also had the opportunity to fine-tune their resumes, explore internship possibilities, and make connections that may lead to short-term, summer, or long-term employment. 🚯



hen Kristi Brodin came to Northwest College, most schools did not have women's athletic teams. But times have changed and so has Northwest College. Coach Brodin is responsible for beginning and guiding women's sports at Northwest for the last 25 years, beginning with the volleyball program in 1973 and women's basketball in 1977.

Literally around the world, there are women who hold Kristi Brodin in the highest regard. On Saturday, February 21st at halftime of the last women's basketball home game, a number of former players returned to honor Kristi in her final regular season game as the NC women's coach. Others, who were unable to make it to the game, sent their expressions of love and appreciation for all that Coach Brodin meant to them in their lives. The 1997-98 team presented Kristi with flowers, and Vice President Marshall Flowers gave her a plaque expressing


the College's appreciation for her commitment to excellence in coaching. An additional highlight was to recognize Kristi's parents, Buel and LaVerne Brodin, who have followed the teams so closely, and who are beloved by so many of the players.

Coach Brodin and her early teams endured some long seasons, but have many great memories and have remained close friends all these years. In the 1980's, Northwest joined the National Christian College Athletic Association and began playing for opportunities to go to national tournaments. The teams of the late 80's and early 90's distinguished themselves, winning five national championships, once with only six players! In recognition for these accomplishments, the Northwest College Women's Basketball Teams have had their pictures placed in the Kirkland Plaza of Champions in Marina Park in downtown Kirkland.

Kristi was chosen to be the Division Two National Christian College Coach of the Year in 1989, and she was inducted into the National

Northwest College has been blessed to have a woman with Coach Brodin's Christian commitment, commitment to young women, her commitment to Northwest College, and her commitment to sportsmanship.

Our four teams include: A.C.T.S. (drama), The Edge (drama), Reality (music/worship), and Peanut







One Of The Best College Buys In The U.S. for the Second Year In a Row

Northwest College has again been named one of the one hundred best college buys in the United States by a publication that rates America's colleges and universities. The prestigious "Student Guide to America's 100 Best College Buys" profiles the schools that are the highest rated academically but have the lowest total cost for the college year.

Compiled by Institutional Research and Evaluation in Gainsville, Georgia, the guide not only lists the one hundred best college buys, it also gives complete information on each one, listing cost, sources of financial aid, majors offered and information on campus life at each school.

"The company researched almost 1,800 colleges," said John Culler, publisher. He added, "Our research has shown that a prospective student could save thirty to fifty thousand dollars or more on a quality college education," if he or she chooses one of the selected "best college buys."

Showing a geographic diversity from New Jersey to Hawaii, schools from forty states are represented. The smallest school listed is Lyon College, in Arkansas, with fewer than 500 students, and the largest is Texas A&M, with more than 29,000 students.

To be considered for America's 100 Best College Buys, a college must meet very specific requirements. It must be an accredited, four year institution; offer opportunities to qualified students for need-based, academic-based, and athletic-based financial aid; have an entering freshman class with a high school grade point average and SAT or ACT score above the national average; and maintain a cost of attendance below that of the national average.

Northwest Students Challenge the World

Sixth -ranked US Debate Team Does Well at International Meet

rom December 30 to January **♦** 6, four Northwest College attended international debate and speech competition held in Athens, Greece the cradle of debate and public speaking for the western world. The students were matched against others from some of the world's best known colleges and universities including 292 teams from 155 schools and eighteen countries, all attending this year's World Universities Debating Championships - the eighteenth to date. Topics concerned political philosophy and current events and were assigned fifteen minutes before each round. Some of the topics debated included: European economic union, smoker's rights, a ban on land mines, and Microsoft's domination of the computer industry. At the end of the nine preliminary rounds, the team of Troy Anderson and James Stewart ranked 75th and the team of Jacob Witt and Joshua Brittingham ranked 106th. These rankings put Northwest above some teams from Harvard, Yale, Princeton, Rhodes, Oxford and Cambridge. Only thirty-two schools had high enough scores to reach finals. After four finals' rounds, London's Grays Inn law school won first place.

In addition to the debates, a more light hearted public speaking event was held. A total of 180 students competed in impromptu speaking in which students were given words or situations and asked to make a seven minute speech on the spot. Winners of this event are considered some of the finest public speakers in the world. James

Stewart – a twenty-year-old Northwest College English major – was named one of five finalists – the highest placing American. He was asked to give a speech at the tournament's banquet.

The World tournament marked a high point in the debate season, which began in September at the Air Force Academy and ended with nationals at Texas Tech University in March. Two hundred teams competed at nationals at which Northwest students were asked to host chapel for the tournament participants on Sunday morning. Northwest currently ranks sixth in the nation in the National Parliamentary Debate Association, an organization with more than 200 participating schools.

After returning from victories at the World Tournament, the students took top honors at four regional tournaments:

- Two Quarter Finalist Awards at Oregon State University, Corvallis, Feb 20 - 21. Seven schools, twentyeight teams.
- Second Place, University of British Columbia, Vancouver, Canada, February 13 - 15. Twenty teams from eleven colleges and universities, coming from as far away as Toronto, Louisiana and Los Angeles.
- Second Place, Western Washington University, Bellingham, February 6 Twenty teams from seventeen west coast schools. Jacob Witt, rated Second Best Debate Speaker out of forty.

Third Place and an Octo-Finalist (top sixteen) award, Willamette University, Salem, Oregon, January 24-25. Thirty-two teams from nineteen colleges and universities. Jacob Witt, First Place Best Speaker (167 points, the highest of the sixty-four debaters at the tournament).

The tournament held just before World's in November was one of the most memorable for the twelve students who make up the debate program. Linfield College's sixty-fourth annual tournament - one of the nation's largest - attracted 210 debaters from thirtythree schools. Northwest led the tournament's Sunday morning chapel, and more than forty students attended. Josh led worship, Jacob prayed and Troy preached on glorifying God. With a 9 wins to 1 loss record, Jacob and Josh won first place in senior debate. Then Troy and James, with an 8 to 2 record, won first place in junior division. To win first place in both divisions is a rare achievement for a single school especially when it is a small Christian liberal arts institution with only 860 students.

Next year promises to be an exciting year, with trips planned to Colorado, Los Angeles and Washington, DC. However, budget shortfalls this spring mean that funding is limited. The program welcomes tax deductible gifts to provide the means for students to experience debating the best schools from across the nation.
