

yler Pecota was a special young man. During his short life, he touched the hearts of those around him and showed great courage as he fought a losing battle with cancer. Dr. Daniel Pecota, now a retired professor at Northwest College and Tyler's grandfather decided to start a scholarship in Tyler's name to help future NC students receive financial aid as they attend the college Tyler hoped to one day attend. Doc, his sons Jim and Steve, and Sam Carrigan (a student from Northwest College), raised pledges to ride their bicycles to San Francisco. To date, over \$44,000 has been contributed to the fund, with a goal of someday reaching \$100,000. Their overarching concern was for spiritual formation, that each student would "know" God and learn His will as they prepared to serve Him wherever He would lead.

The goals of the founders were realized through a host of alumni who went out to become pastors, evangelists, missionaries, Christian educators, musicians, editors, deacons, and lay workers. Ministry is our purpose. Ministry is our heritage. Ministry is our product. And, ministry is our passion.

Times have changed. Society's needs are different now. Approaches to ministry have changed, but the underlying commitment remains the same. Northwest is committed to equipping students to bear credible witness in our times to the only Savior of the world. We understand that God calls people to vocational ministry, that the church recognizes and confirms this call. In partnership with the churches, we seek to reinforce this divine call and equip people for ministry by providing appropriate educational opportunities.

The Church Ministries Major is designed to prepare students for vocational ministry in the church both locally and globally. Built on a foundation of general educational studies, the curriculum of the major includes a strong component in Bible and theology, a core of ministerial studies, and options for concentrations in pastoral ministries, missions, educational ministries, children's ministries, youth ministries, adult/family life ministries, church music, and pastoral care. All students complete an internship in a local church under the direct oversight of a supervisory pastor and the guidance of a coordinating professor. Our commitment is to produce graduates who are academically, functionally, and spiritually ready to engage in vocational Christian ministry.

('93) and Yuko ('92) Worm are pioneering a church at Kohoku New Town, Japan. Jill (Llafet) Riley ('94) serves on the ministerial staff at North Seattle Christian Fellowship. Paul York ('90) went on to seminary and now is a missionary in Ethiopia. Jon ('92) and Pat ('92) Lathers are serving in Southeast Asia with Wycliffe Bible Translators. Greg ('92) and Kimberly ('95) Roane are missionary candidates preparing to go to Guatemala and Wendy Storrs ('96) will leave in September for a missions assignment in Germany. Graduates from the Major generally have little difficulty finding a place to serve; and they find that their education prepared them well for the responsibilities they face in ministry.

Jesus said, ". . . everyone who is fully trained will be like his teacher" (Luke 6:40). Church Ministries students at Northwest College study under dedicated, experienced, ordained ministers. Faculty members are committed church leaders with a passion for ministry. They qualified themselves to teach by accumulating years of ministry experience in churches and on mission fields around the world and by earning graduate degrees in their respective fields of expertise. In addition to their classroom duties, faculty members continue to serve in local churches as pulpit quests, Bible teachers, conference and workshop leaders, missions speakers, and as resource consultants. Their passion for ministry compels them to be careful observers of trends in ministry. They attend conferences and keep current with ideas being discussed in recent books and periodicals. The Apostle Paul taught that teachers who equip others for ministry are God's gifts to the church. Faculty members who teach church ministries courses at Northwest take their responsibility seriously. They seek to transmit their passion for ministry to their students.

Not everyone is called by God to vocational Christian ministry. But, if you have received such a divine call, you will find Northwest College an outstanding place to nurture your passion for ministry and to prepare for a lifetime of service wherever the will of God may lead you. (A)

NC has a blazing start

he 1996 season of Track & Field was the first ever at Northwest College. The men's and women's teams performed very well throughout the season. The teams enjoyed the 1996 season as they grew mentally, physically, and spiritually. At the National Christian College Athletic Association National Championships in Cedarville, Ohio, Northwest College was represented by Kim

Maher and Amy Ross. Kim placed 5th in the nation in the 10,000 meter run and 9th in the 5,000 meter run. Amy placed 2nd in the 1,500 meter run and 5th in the 3,000 meter run. The finishes by Amy and Kim allowed NC's women to place 10th in the nation as a team in only their first year. Congratulations to the entire first year track team of Amy Ross, Kim Maher, Jamie Osse, Mindy Walker, Dan Metteer and Dwayne Turner.

Looking ahead to the 1997 season of Track & Field, both teams will take another step forward. The women plan to field a team of at least 10, while the men could field a team of more than 20. # DEBATE TEAM PLACES AT NATIONALS FOR SECOND YEAR

**Next Dream: World's Tournament** 

he debate team of Roger Altizer (Live Oak, California) and Ryan Doughty (Bakersfield, California) reached double octo-finals (top 32) at the National Parliamentary Debate tournament held at Rice University, Houston, Texas, on March 23-26. Competing against 117 teams from all over the country, Altizer-Doughty placed above teams from Alaska, Idaho, Washington, and Oregon except the University of Oregon, which also reached octo-finals, and Willamette University, which took third place at the meet. Last year Northwest reached octo-finals (top 16) at Nationals. 1995-96 was the most successful season in more than 11 years with Northwest winning 35 debate and public speaking awards at nine weekend competitions from October to March. This year ten students participated.

places, and one third place in parliamentary debate at five tournaments. At the end of the year the College ranked 20<sup>th</sup> in the nation for total winning points, out of more than 158 colleges and universities that compete in the National Parliamentary Debate Association.

Each two-student team debates 6 preliminary rounds against a team from another institution. Topics dealing with

current events or political philosophy are announced 15 minutes before each debate. Teams must then create speeches and rebuttals for or against the resolution. Some topics include "The minimum wage should be increased," "Violence is a justified response to political oppression," or "School uniforms would be desirable."

The program's next goal is to send

ach year the College identifies a group of outstanding incoming freshmen as PRESIDENTIAL SCHOLARS. ew Orleans: home of Jumbalaya, the French Quarter, Creole, and some strong accents! Although we were in the States, we didn't sleep in beds and eat at Taco Bell for dinner. This was one of the more challenging mission trips I've been on. The people we witnessed to are just like you and me. Actually, we witnessed to individuals from many different backgrounds, age groups, and lifestyles. Approximately 19 NC students participated in this outreach, which was about the third largest group of students there. We were split up and combined with students from other colleges. We got the opportunity to get to know other students really well. We all ministered in different ways. We did dramas,

puppet shows, passed out tracts, and more. We worked with the churches in the area. We slept at the churches and were fed by the churches. One of the biggest blessings from one particular church was when they did our laundry.

This was no vacation, but everyone's life was touched in some way. I think everyone had a wonderful time ministering, and each of us has stories we could share about our experience. I think one of the biggest lessons learned for most of us is that sometimes we are to just plant the seed. Too often we want to see the fruits of our labor. but most of what we did in Louisiana was to plant seeds. Now their lives are in God's hands.

One of my personal stories is about a teacher I met. I was in front of an elementary school inviting children to our Vacation Bible School when a teacher walked up and asked if I was part of the puppet show that was teaching kids the song "Jesus Loves Me." I answered "yes" and asked if she saw some kids doing the motions. She said she just saw one boy doing it, but he was teaching the whole class. Stories like this kept us going through some of the trials we ran into. No, not everyone was open to hear what we had to say, but spreading the Gospel isn't always wonderful stories about people changing their lives. As long as we tell them, God will do a work in their lives.

# STUDENT MISSIONARIES IN JAPAN

## NC students use English to reach others

our Northwest College students are spending their summer in Japan working as student missionaries. Each student is working under the supervision of the pastor of a Japan Assemblies of God church. They are assisting in a wide range of ministry activities. One of their activities is teaching English evangelistically. The churches invite people from the local neighborhood to study English with American teachers. Through these contacts the student missionaries gain opportunities to share their faith in Jesus Christ and show their Japanese students that God loves them. All four of the NC students gave testimony that God has called them to missions in Japan. Roger Altizer, a senior from Live Oak, California, is working in Hiroshima City. Beginning with a dream he experienced in 1994 and other divine confirmations, he believes God has called him to career missionary ministry in Japan. Roger believes God opened this door of opportunity to help prepare him for future service. Roger is a Religion and Philosophy major and is also earning a certificate in Teaching English as a Second Language.

Nika Bezdicek believes that God really wanted her to invest this summer in Japan. She said, "He supplied all the money for the trip in just one month's time. This was a miracle." God has put Japan and the Japanese people on her heart in many ways. Carnation, Washington, is Nika's home town. She is a senior pursuing a major in Elementary Education and a minor in Missions and also is completing the qualification for a TESL certificate. Nika is working at Chino City, in Nagano Prefecture.

Pursuing an Interdisciplinary Studies major and a Missions minor. Steve Cave, a senior

from Medford, Oregon, returned to Japan. He spent one year there as an exchange student after graduating from high school, and was part of an NC exchange group that went to Japan in 1995. "I've been to Japan to study; now I get to go to minister," Steve said the day before leaving. He is working at a church in Ogaki City in Gifu Prefecture.

Aimee Weisberg, from Enumclaw, Washington, received her B. A. degree in Church Ministries with a Missions concentration with the class of 1996. She was called to missions as a teen and that call focused on Asia while she

Aimee said. The provision of her finances also was a confirming miracle. She is working at Koriyama City in Fukushima Prefecture.

The program which made the opportunity possible is jointly sponsored by the Pacific Rim Centre for Cross Cultural Studies at Northwest College and the Youth Project Committee of the Japan Assemblies of God. The students left for Japan June 11th and will return August 19th. Dr. Dwayne Turner directs the Centre and missionary Joyce Kitano oversees the project in Japan.

## Michelle's Story

une 20, 1984, was a day that changed the lives of Jeff and Linda Richards forever. On that day Linda gave birth to the Richards' first child, a little girl named Michelle. The baby was born with an undiagnosed medical condition that led to some very serious complications. By the time she was two weeks old. Michelle had suffered serious brain damage. For the rest of her life Michelle would need constant care. She would be fed through tubes and would be confined to a wheelchair.

Taking care of Michelle became a huge part of Jeff and Linda's life. Long days and nights soon made it apparent that it would take many people to help care for their daughter. Besides the professional medical care that assisted the family they would also need Bathing, dressing, and feeding were just a few of the things that had to be done for Michelle every day.

Not far from the Richards' home was Northwest College. They decided to call and ask if there were any students who were

College students would have with the Richards family. From 1984 to 1994, at least a dozen women from Northwest took part in caring for Michelle. When one student graduated or moved out of the area, one of her friends stepped up and took her place. The Richards' one phone call to the College opened a door that would see NC students care for Michelle throughout her life.


Marcy (Reeves) Smith was one of the NC students who worked with Michelle. Marcy was part of Michelle's life for four years. She fell in love with Michelle the first time she met her and recalls Michelle's special way of communicating. "There were times when Michelle would smile or giggle when she felt good. Sometimes I would be up in the middle of the night with Michelle and I would be so tired, that I would not want to be awake. It was at those times that Michelle would do something cute to communicate with me and it would all be worth it."

Linda tells how the women from Northwest treated Michelle. "They

would fix her hair and paint her fingernails. One time they even helped Michelle dress up like a cheerleader. They loved Michelle, and you could see it in their actions."

On December 17, 1994, Michelle went to be with the Lord. Marcy Smith recalls, "When I got the news that Michelle was gone I cried for awhile because I would miss her, but I knew that Michelle was in a much better place. Now Michelle could run and play and do all the things that she could never do in this life. The wheelchair that once held our little angel was now replaced by the arms of Jesus. Today she is a whole person who one day I will see again."

If you ask Jeff and Linda Richards about Northwest College, they don't talk about the beautiful campus or the high academic standards, though all of that is true. They talk about the students, because that's who touched their lives. People being what they are supposed to be, Jesus' hands extended. That's what the students at Northwest College are all about. Reverend London has pastored since 1965. He served the Salem, Oregon, First Church of the Nazarene (1968-1985) as a fellow pastor in the city with President Davis who served at The People's Church. His most recent pastorate was the 3200 member congregation at First Church of the Nazarene in Pasadena, California (1985-1991). He hosted a daily radio program, "Lifeline to Truth," for 14 years in Salem and for 6 years in the Los Angeles area. He also had a weekly television program, "A New Way to Live," in Portland, Oregon.

After serving 31 years in pastoral ministry, Reverend London accepted the invitation to become Assistant to the President for Focus on the Family. His assignment is to serve as liaison to pastors and churches ... a kind of "pastor to pastors." Since joining forces with Focus, he has directed the development of ministries to pastors and their spouses, and given oversight to ministries affecting physi-

cians, crisis pregnancy centers, youth culture, the inner city, missionaries, chaplains, and basketball camps for the children of single parents in many cities throughout the U.S. and Canada. He communicates with hundreds of pastors and church leaders each week through "The Pastor's Weekly Briefing" (a fax network) and produces a bi-monthly "Pastor to Pastor" cassette and newsletter. He also co-authored with Neil B. Wiseman the books, PASTORS AT RISK (Victor Books), THE HEART OF A GREAT PASTOR (Regal Books), and MARRIED TO A PASTOR'S WIFE (Victor Books). These resources are consistent with the mission statement of Pastoral Ministries: to be a catalyst to the spiritual renewal and restoration of ministers and their families and to assist them in better management of time, finances, and family.

H. B. London, Jr. was one of the plenary speakers at the National Summit on Christian Higher Education sponsored by the Assemblies of God, and will be the Sunday morning speaker at this winter's annual meeting of the Assemblies of God District Superintendents, Secretaries, and College Presidents.

District Superintendent Warren Bullock and President Dennis Davis are inviting the pastors from the greater Seattle area to take advantage of all of these sessions with Pastor London which will prove to be very beneficial in our pastoral/ministerial development.


