Review

SWORD OF LOVE

The sword, symbol of violence and danger, hung almost constantly over Sister Gwen and Sigi. But a sword also can cut cords and set free the bound. Through their acceptance of great dangers and hardships, in love, many Muslims of Pakistan and Bangladesh were set free from the bonds of sin.

The six parts of the book are a compilation of many stories that vividly recount the experiences of two women during the time of the war for the freedom of Bangladesh.

The God-honoring, faith-stimulating stories tell of God's direct guidance, His protection in the midst of many dangers, and His many exactly-timed provisions.

Parts Two and Four describe the adventures of Sigi when she served alone in that turbulent area. Her fifteen years under the East German Communist regime had schooled her well for such hardship. Part Three narrates the exciting experiences of twelve women, ages eighteen to seventy-three, who joined hands with Sister Gwen and Sigi for several months of service in Baluchistan province.

Uniting the whole is the story of Bangladesh. The brutalities ~~experienced~~ <sup>endured</sup> by hundreds of thousands are told with compassion but with appalling clarity.

These Spirit-filled women are members of a group known as the End-Time Maidens. The ministries related occurred at intervals beginning in 1970.

The book is full of faith in God, challenges to obey the voice of God, and compassion for the people of Bangladesh who suffered beyond description.
