Even so quickly may one catch the plague? - from Twelfth Night

The play's central theme is the transforming power of love. Beginning with "love at first sight." typical of Shakespearean romantic comedies, the play asks modern questions of its characters and of us all: why do our hearts fall for one but not for another? What risks do we take when we fall in love? Why is love worth it?

Shakespeare's romantic comedies strike a dark cord as well. Ever fall for someone unavailable? Someone who turns out not to be real?

Creativity reigns in theatrical performance: it is living art. Unique to this play, Shakespearean lines mingle with modern ones: a fictitious character speaks in a live, contemporary interview: an historical king tells his-story: a fairy queen and her helper, well, help the rest of the characters – and us – see truth.

The play unfolds as if it's not in a script but as if it's a script someone might want to write someday. As Puck says, "It works out well." I hope you agree.

I dedicate this play to my husband Mike and to our family for their generous love, support, and belief which empowered me to write it in the first place.

Bramaturges Protes

Just as this play joins seven known Shakespearean characters with seven characters of Julia Young's invention in a new, yet familiar setting, so Shakespeare drew on various sources and settings to create his thirty-seven plays. His ability to adapt these sources, from history texts to epic poems, and to recreate classic tales with freshness distinguished him from the beginning of his career. In 1592, Robert Greene, a fellow playwright, described Shakespeare as "an upstart crow beautified with our feathers." A harsh comment, perhaps, but Shakespeare's ability to tell stories on stage, an ability which Greene so envied, continues to invite imitation.

As director, I have the delightful responsibility of choosing the play's actors and then working them to the bone. The actors in this play have been exceptional in skill, energy, and dedication, and I so appreciate each of them.
