

Welcome to this extraordinary day in the life of Northwest College. Today marks the culmination of a great deal of work by a number of key people, punctuated by God's performance of truly remarkable miracles. Thank you for sharing this day with us as we dedicate the Mark and Huldah Buntain School of Nursing.

In the life of Northwest College, this day was set into motion over 65 years ago. When we examined the College's earliest documents, we discovered that the founders called for a nursing program. From the very beginning we understood that the gospel was often best proclaimed through hands of compassionate service. The dedication of the School of Nursing today is, in many ways, the culmination of steps that began at Northwest's formation.

In my life, this day was set into motion almost ten years ago when I learned firsthand how nurses reach a hurting world.

In 1992 I accepted an invitation to minister with former students on one of the toughest mission fields in the world: Cambodia. The only reason

the communist government had even admitted these young missionaries was because they were willing to establish and run *Mission of Mercy* clinics and orphanages.

I am not generally given to tears, but I literally wept through Cambodia. I have been to third-world countries. I have witnessed abject poverty and suffering. But nothing had prepared me for the devastation in Cambodia.

The need, however, wasn't what moved me to tears. It was the sacrifice of these young missionaries. They had left every comfort to answer God's call to that faraway land. It was clear to me—and to everyone who saw their labors—that they were making a significant difference for the Kingdom with people who had never heard the Gospel. It was also clear that the nurses on the team were the ones who really opened the doors for this ministry.

I've never forgotten this experience. And it has always fueled my vision to build a school of nursing.

An incredible series of events have brought us to this extraordinary day. Our faculty and board have embraced the vision. The Lord has provided leading

experts in nursing education to guide us. We have assembled a highly qualified faculty led by a Dean of exceptional character and credentials. Our first class of upperclassmen are already in classes and will graduate with Bachelor of Science degrees in Nursing within two years. And key organizations and individuals have pledged financial support needed for start-up funds.

We even feel that the name of the school was the Lord's idea. A few of us—including an alumnus—were discussing our dreams for this new program when it hit us: **The Mark and Huldah Buntain School of Nursing!** What could be better? The Buntain name (along with *Mission of Mercy*) is synonymous with proclaiming the Gospel by serving hard-to-reach people in tough places.

It is a special thrill to have Huldah Buntain participate in this special event. We honor her for her life of sacrificial service; we are honored by her presence.

Thank you again for celebrating with us. To God be the Glory!



Mark Buntain is known as a pioneer missionary with extraordinary vision and compassion. The Buntains founded Mission of Mercy in Calcutta in 1954. After 35 years of ministry there, Mark passed away in 1989. Today, Mission of Mercy is ministering in 25 countries around the world.

Carl Christensen identifies with the Buntain School of Nursing's emphasis on nursing as a calling and an avenue of Christian ministry. In 1974 he sensed God's call to become a nurse while on his first job in a nursing home. Carl is amazed at the array of ministry opportunities he finds in nursing; from praying for patients to serving as a trustee on a board which develops and manages Christian retirement communities. Dr. Christensen holds a Master's in Nursing degree from Oregon Health Sciences University and a Ph.D. in Public Administration from George Washington University. 
Becky Budke Adjunct Professor, Nursing B.S.N., Seattle Pacific University, 1973 M.S.N., Seattle Pacific University, 1999

Becky Budke has been a registered nurse for twenty-seven years. She currently works at Providence Medical Center as a clinical quality improvement educator. Previous healthcare experience includes the development of a care management program for all patients admitted to Northwest Hospital in Seattle, Washington. She directed the program for eight years. Other clinical experiences include the delivery of care for pediatrics, surgical, and oncology patients in the acute care setting, caring for oncology and hospice patients in home health, and directing a home infusion and pain management program in the community.

Annalee R. Oakes, graduated from St. Luke's Methodist Hospital in Cedar Rapids, Iowa, and began her career as an operating room nurse. She has provided care in a wide array of specialty areas including pediatric, tuberculosis, emergency, and critical care units. She was involved in the development of Seattle's world-renowned Medic I system. After thirteen years of clinical practice, she returned to the university setting to study nursing, physiology and bio-physics. Findings from her master's thesis were used by NASA scientists in measuring heart rates and EKGs of astronauts while in space. Dr. Oakes taught nursing for twentyeight years at Seattle Pacific University. She served as Director of SPU's first RN Baccalaureate Program, the first Director of its' graduate program in nursing, and as the Dean of the School of Health Sciences. At SPU she initiated the Japanese Nurses Exchange and the Chinese-Taiwan Nurses Exchange programs and took groups of nursing students to Asia for cross-cultural clinical experiences. Dr. Oakes provided consultation for the development of baccalaureate nursing programs at Gunma University in Japan and National Yang Ming Medical University in Taiwan. Dr. Oakes is widely published and is a Fellow in the American Academy of Nursing. Her life is committed to serve wherever God calls, and she takes pleasure in using nursing as the vehicle. Dr. Oakes relies on Philippians 1:6 and she is frequently heard to say, "If it doesn't count for eternity, it doesn't count!"
