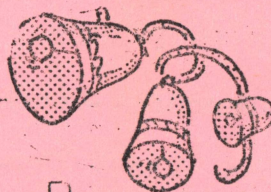

own actions, from the perspective of eternity.

One who is truly educated, then, will refuse to view his present acts as isolated experiences. He knows only too well that Today is father of Tomorrow. Not only this. The educated person seeks to view, by Christian insight (and foresight), and sanctified imagination, the consequences of his present actions, and to see these in the sum total of their relationships. That is, he attempts to see things in their totality. He knows that the acts he committed yesterday, and the deeds he performs today, all go together to make up the man he shall be tomorrow. He knows, too, that a deed performed today, whether good or bad, is a seed that is inexorably certain to bear fruit. He knows also that according to the law of the harvest, it takes good seed to bear good fruit.

Here, I believe, the Christian dimension must enter. For it is my conviction that no one can per-
