## Triumpb $\mathscr{A}$ inistries

Jesus said, "In as much as ye have done it unto the least one of the least of these my brethren, ye have done it unto thee." (Matthew 25:40). The students involved in Triumph Ministries are discovering just how rewarding it can be to do so. They see the impact they can have on the lives of hurting people as they visit people who are in prison.

The group has witnessed grown men cry out in gratitude to the Lord for loving them and forgiving them. A nine-year-old in the juvenile detention center felt that his life was worth something simply because he was given an opportunity to play the drums and loved it. One young lady cried as she was moved by the Spirit to simply worship from her heart, and teens brightened up on Christmas Eve when NC students went to hang out with and sing carols with them.

The group has taken a band in to lead worship, sing songs they have written, and sing carols with kids who were unable to go home for Christmas. Through it all, they have shared the word of God's love.

It is not only the prisoners who are blessed, but also the students presenting the good news. When students become involved, they often catch the vision to pray with the people as well as hang out, play games, and provide friendship. One guy became misty-eyed over the people who need a friend to simply care for them.

The outreach leader, Joey Costello, explained, "My love grows more and more for these prisoners, and God just fills our hearts with more passion to go around. We desire to do more. There is room for those who have a passion to pray, sing, preach, play instruments, do drama, or just be a friend. I feel that my time is well spent. Nothing can replace that joy of feeling that you are about the Father's business."

Waterfront Worship is a radical breakthrough in outreach ministry. It captures the worship of a passionate generation, one previously wrought only in pews and altars, and delivers it on the cold, hard streets of our city. We provide a fresh opportunity for those who don't know Christ to see and experience our God in a powerfully expressive way. Amidst bars and clubs, backdropped by the water of Lake Washington, and covered by the sparkling sky, we bring a band and supporting students whose sole purpose is to give God praise and glory, both in music and in the relationships we build with those we meet.

This year has been a success. Each night was marked by a great turnout of students who engaged in an awesome time of public worship. We pray God will one day harvest the seed that He used us- in sharing Jesus, the greatest form of wor-ship- to sow.

# Spring Break Trips
