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Faculty

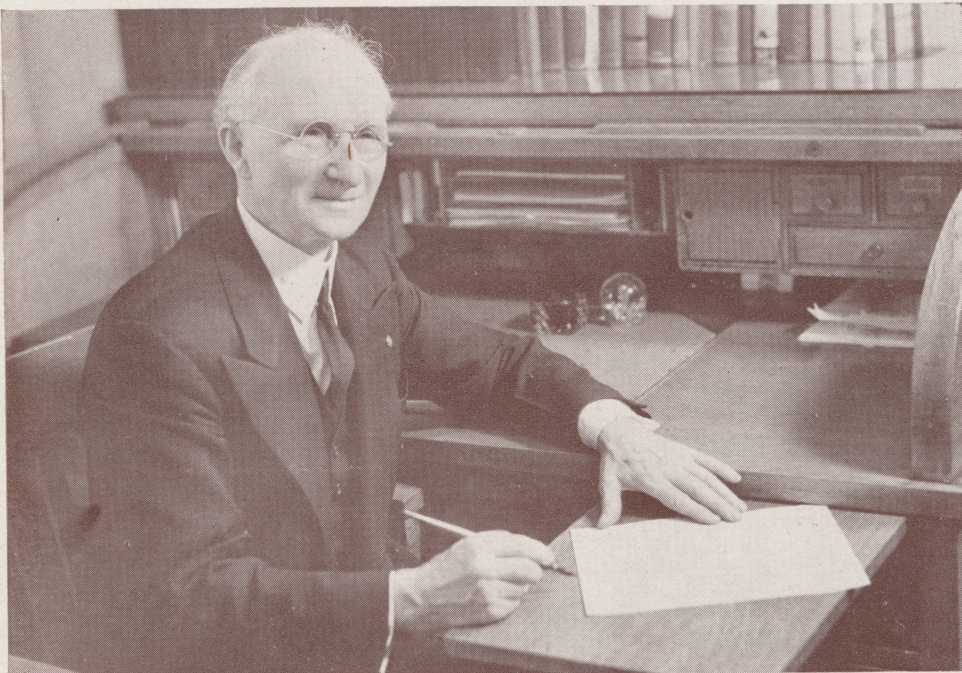

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PURPOSE . . .

Development of genuine Christian character and preparation for Christian service, by the promotion of a more thorough knowledge of God's Word. For those who have been called of God to enter the active ministry, and for others who feel their need of Bible knowledge and instruction, the Institute provides a practical course of instruction and training of ministers, missionaries, and Christian workers along full-gospel evangelistic lines, in an atmosphere conducive to the study and meditation upon God's Word.

The Northwest Bible Institute embraces as its teaching the fundamental doctrines of the Bible as outlined by the General Council of the Assemblies of God.

HISTORY . . .

Realizing the great need of training Christian young men and women so vitally needed in the service of the Lord, the Northwest Bible Institute was opened on October 1, 1934. The enrollment of the school has increased yearly, with a total of over 300 students this past year. Each year has been marked with continued spirituality, and God has marvelously blessed the study of His Word. To the first graduating class, the PIONEERS, have been added in successive years, the CONQUERORS, the LIFESAVERS, the TORCHBEARERS, the BUILDERS, the MESSENGERS, the CHALLENGERS, and the REAPERS.

LOCATION . . .

The Northwest Bible Institute is located near beautiful Green Lake in the residential north side of Seattle. The quiet atmosphere and pleasant surroundings make it ideal from both the spiritual and natural standpoint. Seattle's many parks, museums, and scenic centers offer varied opportunities for wholesome recreation. Nearby shopping districts and its proximity to transit systems provide excellent positions in many fields of labor.

Seattle is a city of unusual beauty, covering seven hills overlooking three large lakes. Here are some interesting facts that make Seattle an ideal place to visit and a still more wonderful place in which to live: Altitude—Sea level to an elevation of 450 feet. Health—One of America's healthiest cities; birth rate averages 17.65 per thousand population; death rate 9.75 per thousand people annually for the past fifteen years. Climate—It has a climate which is as near ideal as can be found anywhere. The average winter temperature is 41 degrees above zero, and the average summer temperature is 62 degrees. Rainfall—Seattle's average annual rainfall is 33 inches, which is less than that of Cleveland, St. Louis, Kansas City, Cincinnati, Philadelphia, Indianapolis, Boston, Washington, D. C., New York City, Little Rock, Ark., Atlanta and New Orleans. Population—The city's cosmopolitan area of 53.7 square miles embraces a population of 508,700. Seattle is the largest city of its age in the world.



General Information

SCHOOL FEES

Cost of the regular course per year, including notes, books, registration, tuition, library fee, and personal service is \$35.00. (This does not include board, room and laundry). Of this amount, \$35.00 must be paid when the student enters school.

Tuition rate for special students is \$10.00 per month, which must be paid in advance, or \$75.00 for the entire year.

REQUIREMENTS FOR ADMITTANCE

Requirements for admittance to the NORTHWEST INSTITUTE are as follows: a vital experience of Salvation; sound bodily health; age 18 years or older; assurance of compliance in full with all the rules and customs of the Institution. Every question on the application blank MUST be answered.

Applicant MUST WAIT FOR NOTICE that references have replied and that application has been approved by the faculty.

EXAMINATIONS, REPORT CARDS, CERTIFICATE, DIPLOMAS

Examinations are given from time to time during the school year and are compulsory for all regular students.

A careful record is kept of the subjects and scholastic marks of each student. Report cards are issued to students at the end of each term.

Certificates of promotion are given at the close of each year to students who have completed the year's work.

HOUSING ACCOMMODATIONS

The institute owns three large houses which have been converted into men's and women's dormitories. These are conducted on a co-operative basis.

In view of the moderate charge of board for board and room, each student living in the dormitory is required to contribute a portion of time each day as his share towards maintenance. This arrangement provides splendid practical experience for the students.

EMPLOYMENT

The Institute assists in finding part-time employment in private homes for the young women students desiring such work, where they are given board and room, and compensation. In this way, many are able to work their way through school.

Because the NORTHWEST BIBLE INSTITUTE is an institution of learning duly recognized by the Department of Labor at Washington, D. C., foreign students may obtain a students' "visa" and are permitted to take employment.

The Dean of Women of the Institute renders every reasonable service in assisting the students in securing employment.

Men students are able to obtain most any type of part-time employment.

GOVERNMENT RECOGNITION

The Northwest Bible Institute is also duly recognized by the headquarters of the Selective Service System, Washington, D. C. Students duly enrolled with this Institute for the purpose of training for the ministry are granted 4-D classification from their draft board.

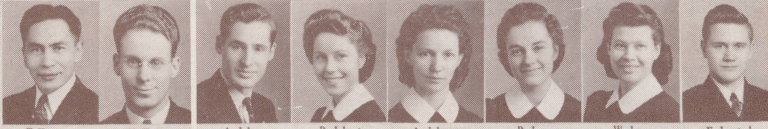

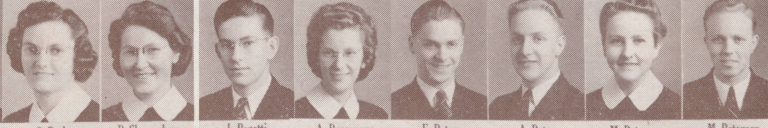

Courses

ACTS . . . A detailed study of the book of Acts, dealing with the history of the early Christian Church, and its origin and activity in spreading the Gospel. —Rev. E. V. Bronson.

BIBLE ATLAS . . . A study of Biblical geography including the drawing of corresponding maps. —Rev. E. V. Bronson.

CHILD EVANGELISM . . . A study of methods of teaching the child and how to present to them the Gospel. —Mrs. R. A. Busby.

CHRISTIAN EVIDENCES . . . Provides an abundance of clear proof why Christianity is more than a mere religion, and is, in truth, the only way of salvation. Deals with the Divine authorship of the Bible and the Deity of Jesus Christ. —Rev. J. A. Bogue.

CHURCH HISTORY . . . A course covering the history of the Christian Church since the days of the Apostles, and dealing with the Church's heroes and martyrs, the dark ages, and the reformation. —Rev. J. A. Bogue.

COVENANTS . . . A comparative study of the Old and New Covenants, and God's dealings with His people. —Rev. H. H. Ness.

DISPENSATIONAL STUDIES . . . God's dealing with mankind in various periods of Biblical history, and a detailed study of "God's Plan of the Ages." —Rev. J. A. Bogue.

SYSTEMATIC THEOLOGY . . . A course covering the fundamental doctrines of the Bible, dealing separately with each in a careful and inspiring study. —Rev. E. V. Bronson.

EFFECTIVE SPEAKING . . . Training the student in the art of clear and forceful speech from the standpoint of voice, bodily gesture, and organized thought. The delivery of original speeches is required. Prof. D. L. Cox.

ENGLISH . . . The Bible cannot be properly studied nor correctly interpreted and expounded without a thorough understanding of English. For the prospective missionary this course is essential as a foundation for the study of foreign languages. Prof. D. L. Cox.

EPISTLES . . . Analyzing of the General and Pauline Epistles written to the early church. —Rev. C. C. Beatty.

HISTORY OF MISSIONS . . . The original and development of foreign missions, with studies of famous missionaries down through the years. —Rev. E. V. Bronson.

HERMENEUTICS . . . A course in the science of interpretation and explanation of the Scriptures. —Rev. E. V. Bronson.

HOMILETICS . . . The sermon, its preparation, and delivery. Opportunity is given for the student to present his sermon before the class. —Rev. E. V. Bronson.

HYGIENICS . . . A practical course in first aid, personal hygiene, practical nursing, and tropical diseases. —Mrs. H. M. Giles.

MINISTERIAL ETHICS AND ETIQUETTE . . . Ethical practices in the life of the minister. —Prof. D. L. Cox.

MUSIC . . . Music fundamentals, the names of the lines and spaces, scales, counting, syllables, the application to hymns and church music, and conducting. —Prof. D. L. Cox.

NEW TESTAMENT SYNTHESIS . . . Contrasting the Old and New Testaments and the Gospels, including the life of Christ. —Rev. J. A. Bogue.

OLD TESTAMENT SYNTHESIS . . . The presenting of human-history beginning with Genesis, and including the study of the important Old Testament characters. —Rev. C. C. Beatty.

PARLIAMENTARY LAW . . . A most practical study of the parliamentary procedure necessary in the conducting of business meetings in the church. —Rev. J. A. Bogue.

PASTORAL THEOLOGY . . . Practical studies regarding the duties, activities, and problems of the pastor. —Rev. E. V. Bronson.

PERSONAL EVANGELISM . . . A study involving the worker's need of contacting God and methods to be followed in winning souls for Christ. —Rev. J. A. Bogue.

PNEUMATOLOGY . . . A study in the theology of manifestations and gifts of the Holy Spirit. —Rev. H. H. Ness.

POLEMICS . . . A study which will equip the personal worker to deal intelligently with those who have become ensnared with false religious systems and to prepare the pastor to protect his flock therefrom. —Rev. E. V. Bronson.

PRACTICAL LANGUAGE STUDY PRINCIPLES . . . A study regarding correct methods to be used in learning a new language. —Rev. J. J. Clement.

PRACTICAL MISSIONARY PRINCIPLES . . . The prospective missionary and his preparation for the foreign field. Rev. J. J. Clement.

PRACTICAL WORK . . . A subject to equip the student to intelligently equip himself for varied types of Christian service. —Rev. C. C. Beatty and Rev. J. A. Bogue.
