## Normal? Not a Chance!

"Oh God, whatever You do, please don't let me be normal!" is the heartfelt prayer of NC's new English professor, Debbie Pope. In her introductory address to the students, Prof. Pope declared, "I am abnormal. I'm an abnormal Christian. I asked God to make me abnormal."

Prof. Pope's prayer for individuality has certainly been answered, for her attitude toward both teaching and life itself is anything but average. Energy and a bold personality accompany everything she does. Miss Pope's background and present outlook on life reflect her own statement of herself: "I don't fit any mold."

Debbie Pope's early years were spent in Chattanooga, Tennessee with her parents and younger sister. At the age of 23 , she left Chattanooga for a life of her own. Have you ever wondered about life in a convent? Ask Debbie Pope. She spent seven months
living in an Episcopalian convent in the upper west side of Manhattan.

Debbic Pope's experiences prior to coming to NC include working as an ESL coordinator for World Relief Organization, and teaching at several different colleges. In 1991, Pope traveled to Kochi, Japan, and held a teaching position for six months. Although it was a growing experience, homesickness drove her to vow that she would "never leave the U.S. again.'

What sets Debbic Pope apart as abnormal? Ms. Pope considers her gender a major point of difference from other professors. She makes little effort to be mainstream, and doesn't seem concerned about what others think of her. Despite her differences and successful abnormality, it seems she will be an asset to the NC faculty.

How does one write a tribute to Dr. Dan Pecota, a man who has distinguished himself as a servant and leader here at Northwest College? Mere words seem inadequate when considering his thirty-seven years of NC service to God, to students, and to faculty and administrative staff as well.

Dan and Esther came directly from Northwest College from Fuller Theological Seminary in fall, 1958. Actually, Dan taught first at NC's former location in Seattle's Hollywood Temple before the college moved to its current site.

In his years at Northwest, Dan has taught countless classes and has even enjoyed a brief stint as Dean of Students. Although reputed then to be a strict disciplinarian, he often revealed his true "teddy bear" nature as he combined appropriate measures of law and grace. As Professor of Greek and Systematic Theology, Dan has endeared himself to generations of students. His scrupulous study of the scriptures and their theological applications stand clearly in the minds of alumni around the world, many of whom "rightly divide the Word of Truth," a skill they learned as Dan modeled the correct approach to the Word of God.

While Dan taught in the classroom, Esther managed the Northwest College bookstore for twenty-five years. Esther not only ran the bookstore, she also served as an unofficial counselor, Mom-away-from-home, supporter, encourager, and sounding board for hundreds of students.

These two loving people have had a profound impact on the lives of students and colleagues, helping and encouraging people from all walks of life. More recent students and alumni remember Dan, or "Doc," as the Christian Doctrine Professor, and we are all fortunate that Dan will continue to teach Christian Doctrine for the near future.

For many it is difficult to imagine Northwest College without Dr. Dan Pecota as a full time professor. It is not Dan's nature to believe he has been or has done anything special, but those who have sat in his classes and those who have worked alongside him know differently

We, the Student Body of 1994-95, salute Dan and Esther Pecota, and say from the bottom of our hearts, "Thank you for all you have done for the Kingdom of God and for Northwest College."
