A Woman of Grace and Talents Dr. Deborah White Associate Professor of Education and Music

When she talks the overtones of her southern accent betray her origins. Born in Tazwell, Virginia, Dr. Deborah White moved with her family to Bluefield when she was in the ninth grade. After graduating from high school she left Virginia to attend Central Bible Institute in Springfield, Missouri. It was there she met Cal White. Married in late summer of 1970, they have one daughter, Amy, to whom Dr. White passed on their love for teaching.

By the time she moved with her husband to the Pacific Northwest, Dr. White had finished two years of study at CBC. She went back to school and received her B.A. degree from Northwest College in 1979. With a hunger to learn and a desire to teach, Dr. White entered the University of Washington, graduating with a Doctorate in Systematic Musicology in 1988.

A familiar figure at the Chapel organ, Dr. White has played the piano since early childhood and started playing the organ for church as a teenager. After arriving at Northwest College, she taught piano lessons for a number of years. In 1983 she began her classroom instruction and came on faculty full-time in 1988.

Something that is not generally known about Dr. White is her love of drama. While in high school, she was an active Thespian.

To get to know Dr. White is to discover a person who loves to teach but also loves to play table games, to read, and to travel — to enjoy life. She made her first trip overseas last summer to the Philippines. There she used her gift for teaching to enrich the lives of students from Southeast Asia at the Asia Pacific Theological Seminary.

To be in her classes is to be taught by a gifted and dedicated teacher. Her love and devotion for her students is shown in the long hours she works with them as individuals, preparing and guiding them to teach with excellence in their own classrooms.

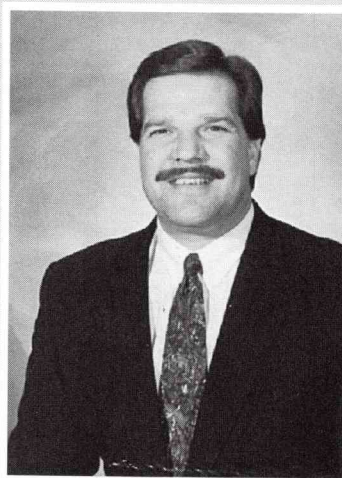

Pastor Jack's hobbies include running, computers, reading (he loves history), and, it must be known, Jack is a "Next-Generation Trecky."

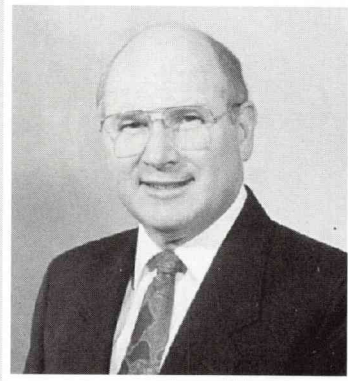

Normal? Not a Chance!

“Oh God, whatever You do, please don’t let me be normal!” is the heartfelt prayer of NC’s new English professor, Debbie Pope. In her introductory address to the students, Prof. Pope declared, “I am abnormal. I’m an abnormal Christian. I asked God to make me abnormal.”

Prof. Pope’s prayer for individuality has certainly been answered, for her attitude toward both teaching and life itself is anything but average. Energy and a bold personality accompany everything she does. Miss Pope’s background and present outlook on life reflect her own statement of herself: “I don’t fit any mold.”

Debbie Pope’s early years were spent in Chattanooga, Tennessee with her parents and younger sister. At the age of 23, she left Chattanooga for a life of her own. Have you ever wondered about life in a convent? Ask Debbie Pope. She spent seven months

living in an Episcopalian convent in the upper west side of Manhattan.

Debbie Pope’s experiences prior to coming to NC include working as an ESL coordinator for World Relief Organization, and teaching at several different colleges. In 1991, Pope traveled to Kochi, Japan, and held a teaching position for six months. Although it was a growing experience, homesickness drove her to vow that she would “never leave the U.S. again.”

What sets Debbie Pope apart as abnormal? Ms. Pope considers her gender a major point of difference from other professors. She makes little effort to be mainstream, and doesn’t seem concerned about what others think of her. Despite her differences and successful abnormality, it seems she will be an asset to the NC faculty.

Why do students choose Northwest College? In a world where bigger means better, how does small NC compete with larger colleges and universities?

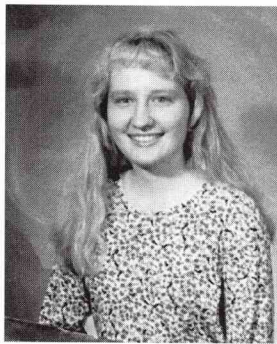

How appropriate that God calls His people to a place where they have opportunity to learn how to make **A WORLD OF DIFFERENCE.**

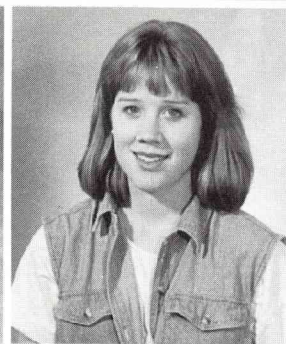

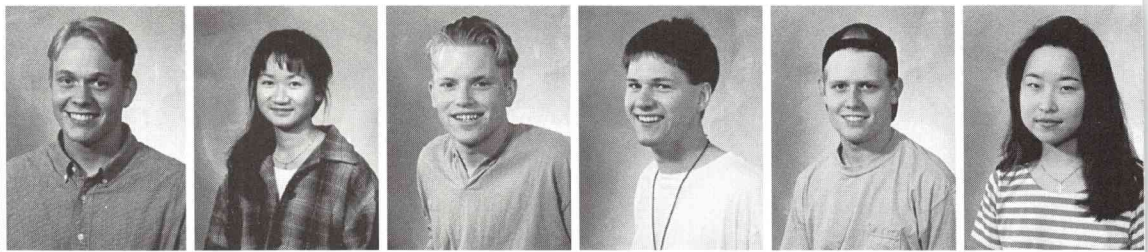
On the subject of whether his son's attending NC has strengthened their relationship, Dr. Hobson says, "No. Our relationship was strong to begin with."

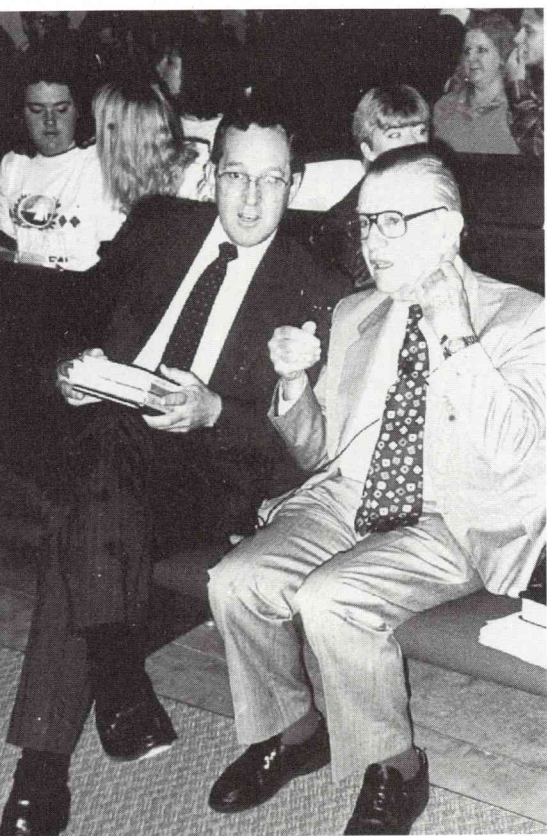

"Unforgettable" is the word that came up again and again in regards to this fall's Spiritual Emphasis Week. It was an "interruption" that truly touched lives at Northwest.

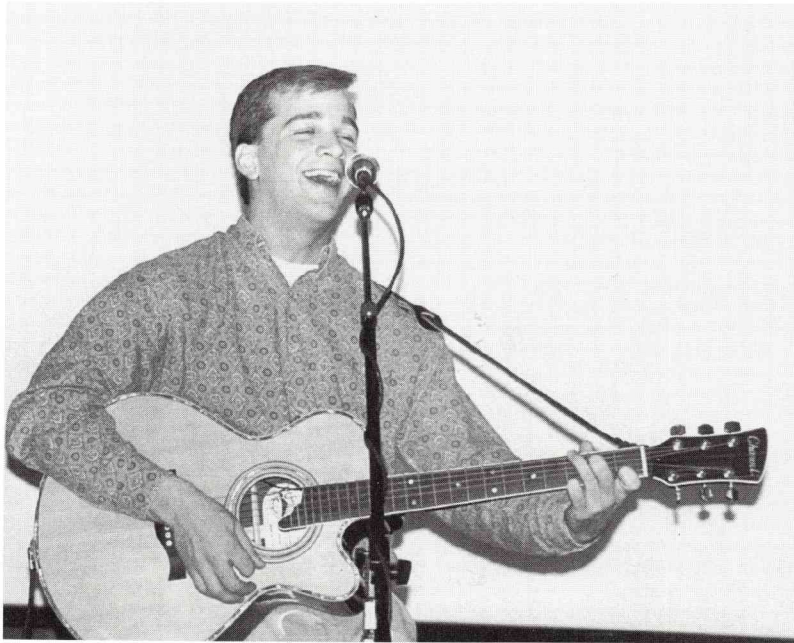

More recent students and alumni remember Dan, or "Doc," as the Christian Doctrine Professor, and we are all fortunate that Dan will continue to teach Christian Doctrine for the near future.

Resident Life Staff

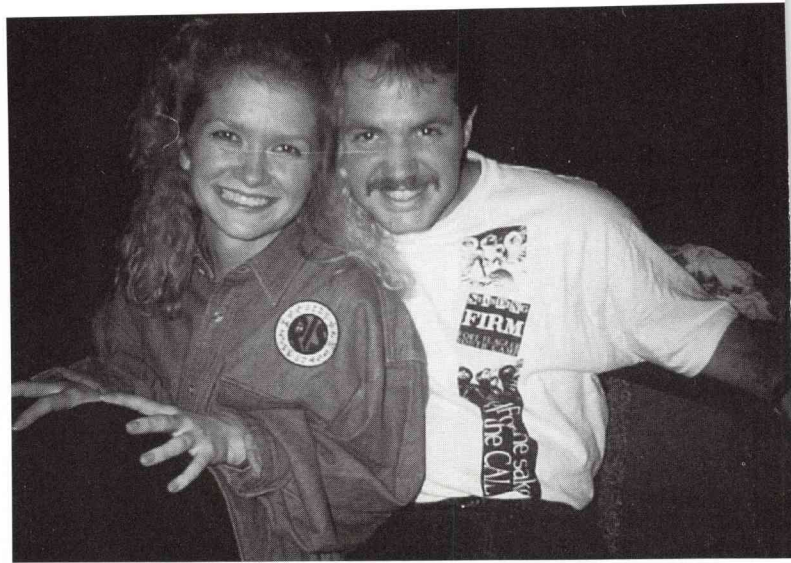

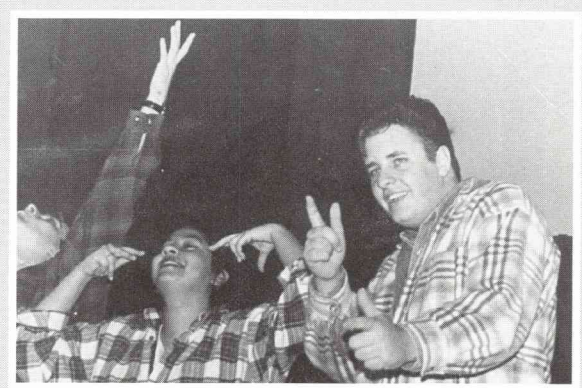

It has been a privilege to serve with the ASB officers to keep this vision going. My prayer is that God may continue to propel Northwest College toward the greatness we have witnessed this year.

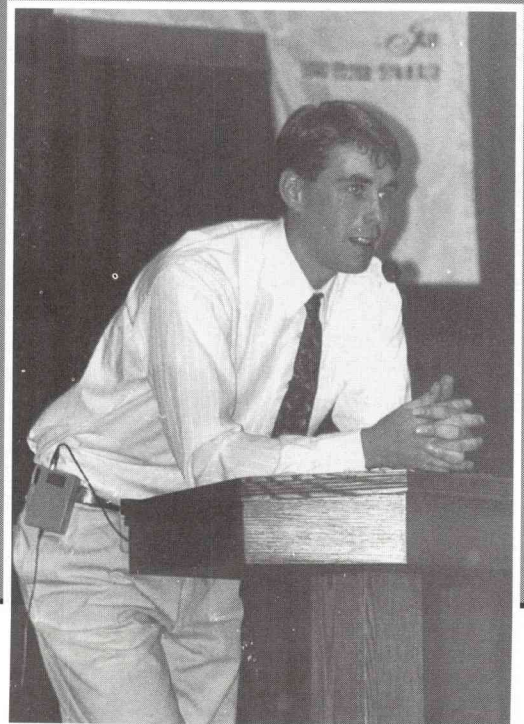

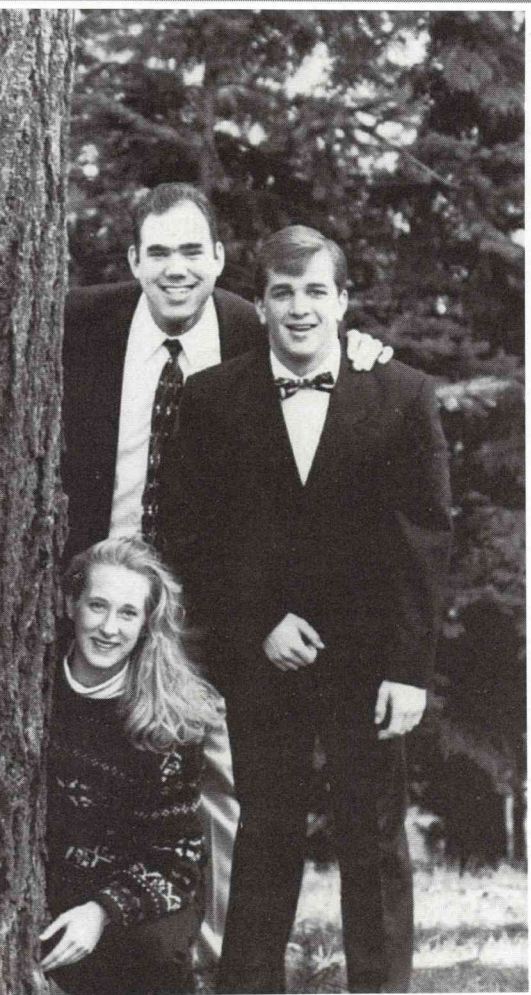

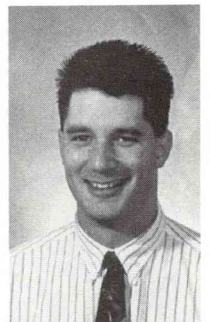

Send It On Down!

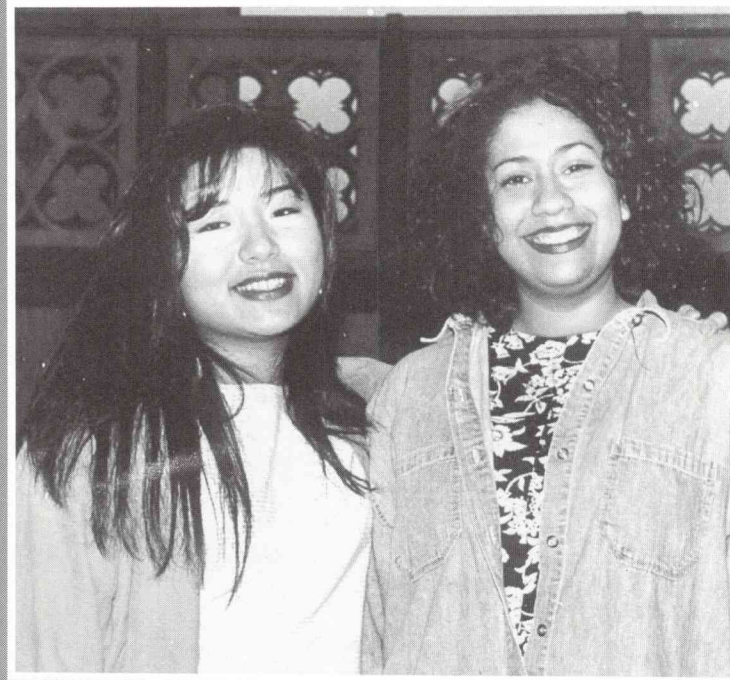

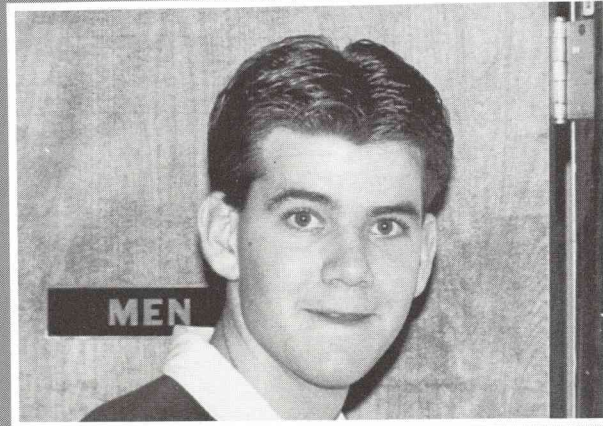

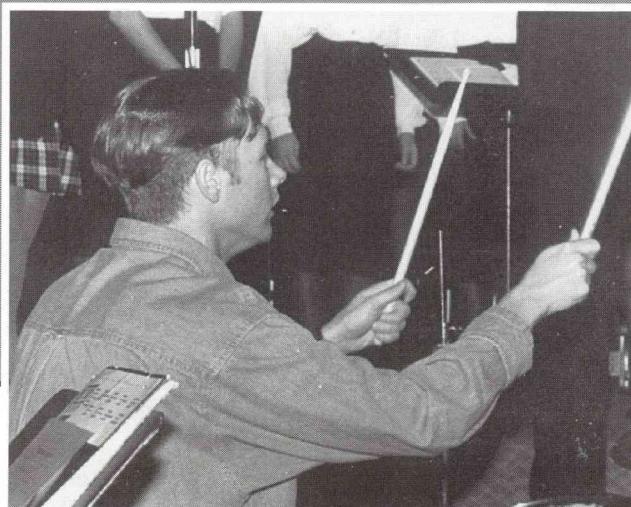

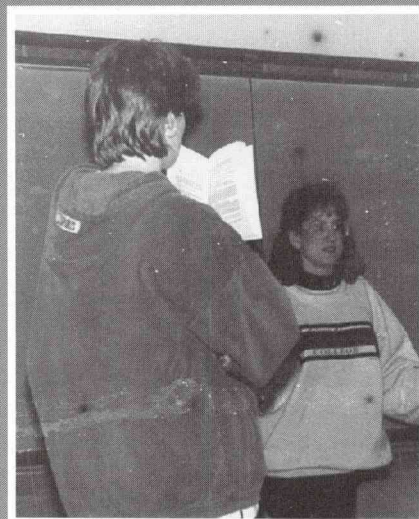
Additionally, Northwest College forged relations with the Kirkland Youth Theatre, allowing for more elaborate sets through a compilation of resources.

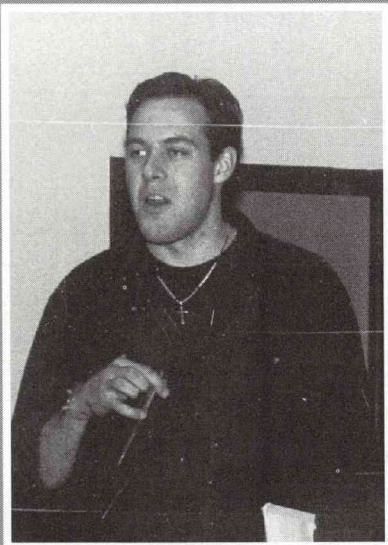
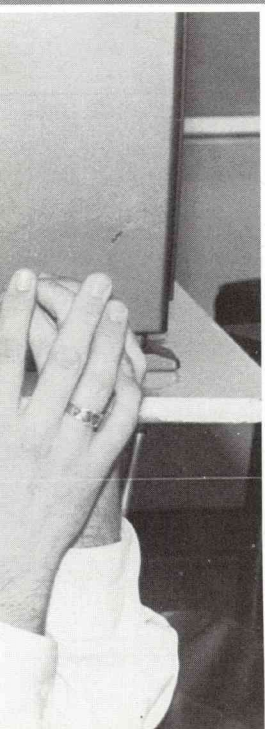
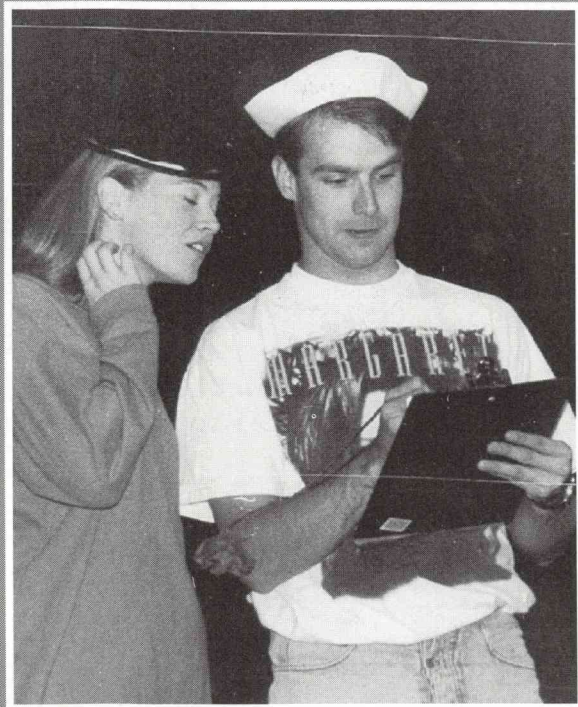
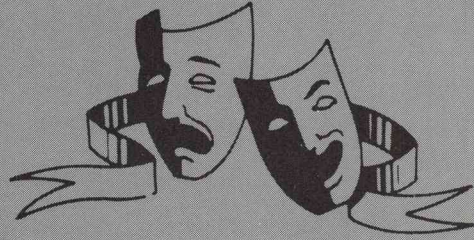
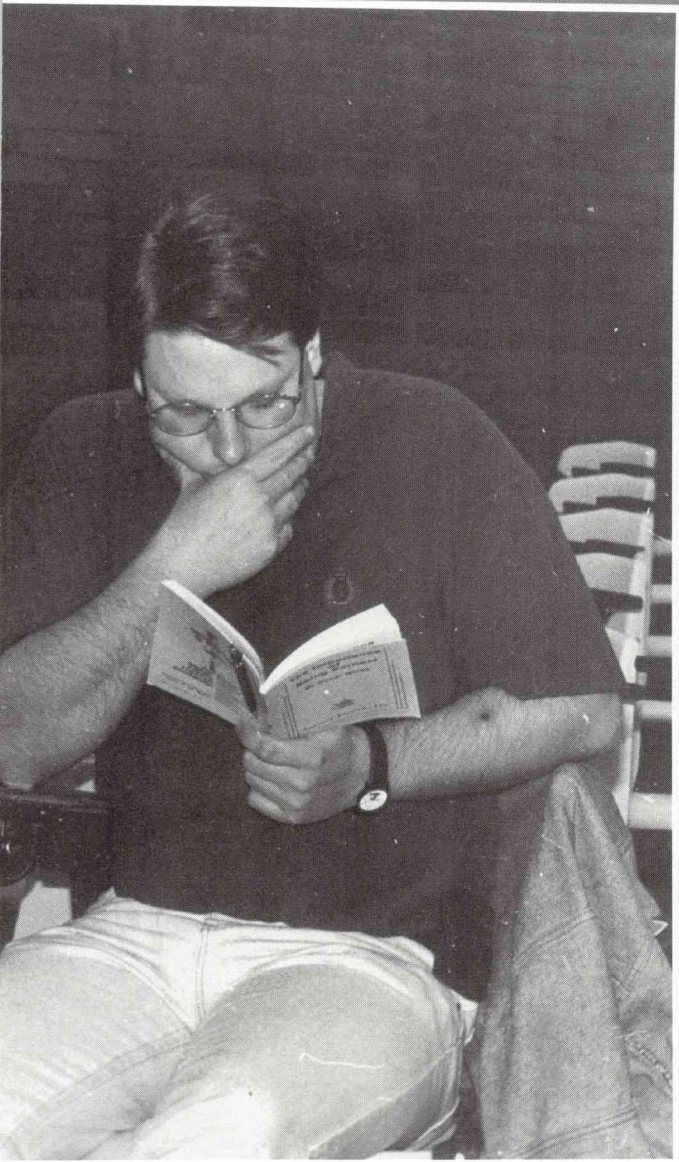

Staffing Makes a Difference

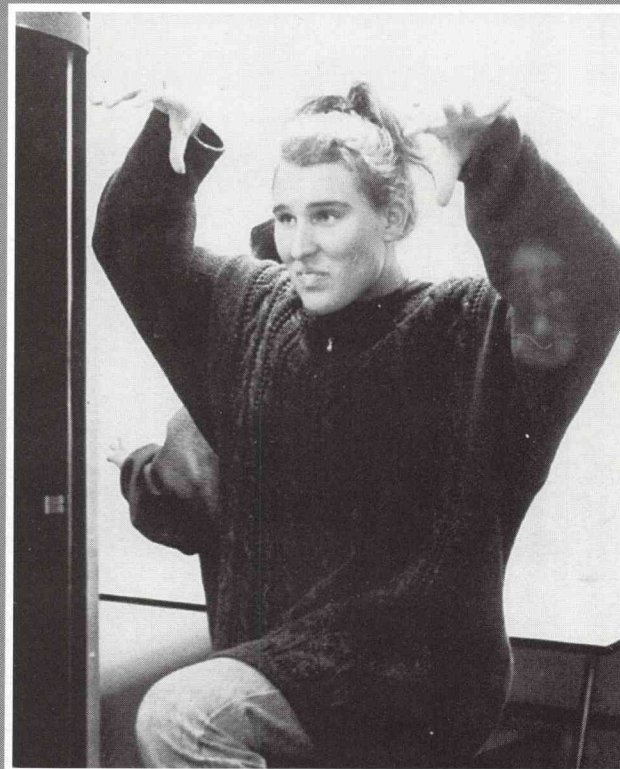

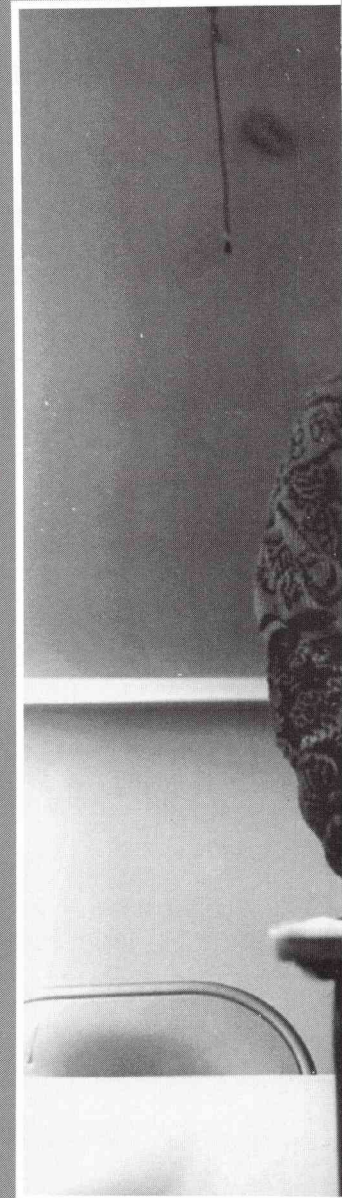
The 1994-95 year has seen many new faces and changes for the NC Speech and Debate Team. The

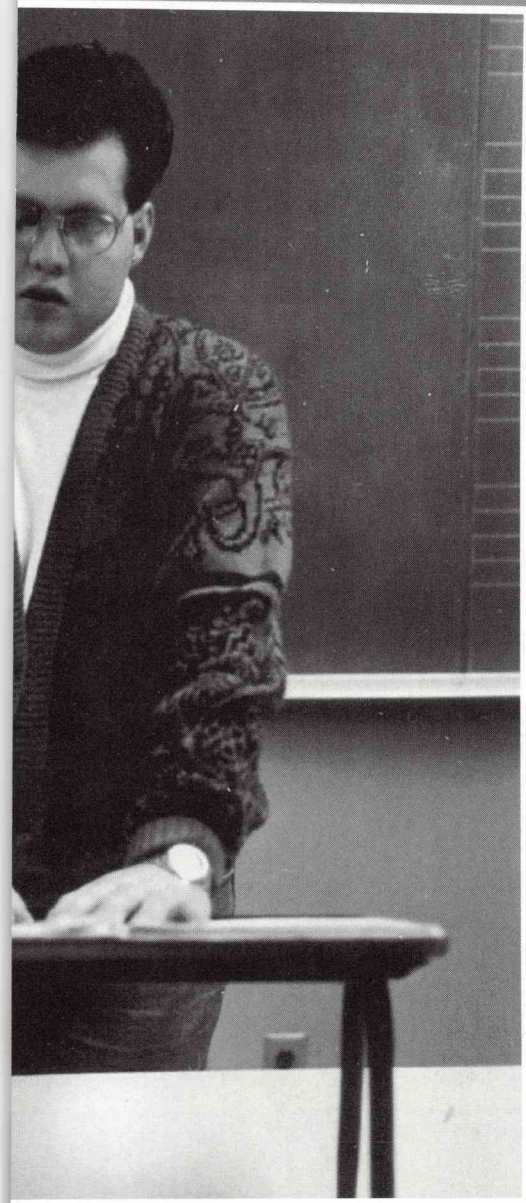

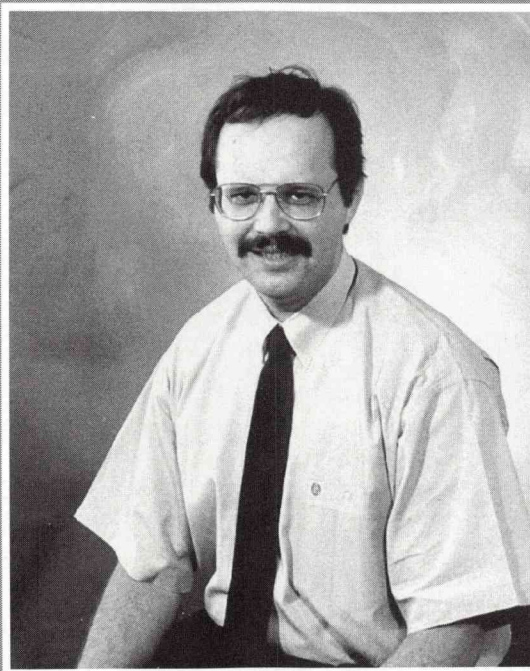

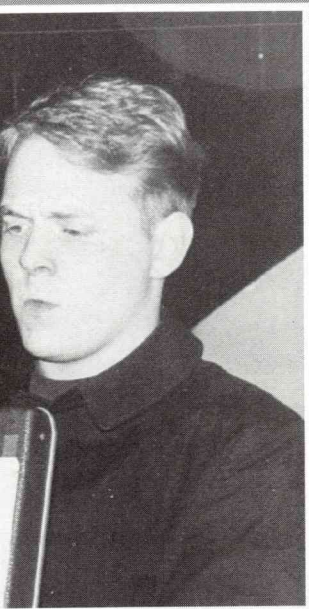


The Edge, comprised of Jeff Duchemin and Dave Needham begin their SMT tryout set to the theme from "Mission Impossible."

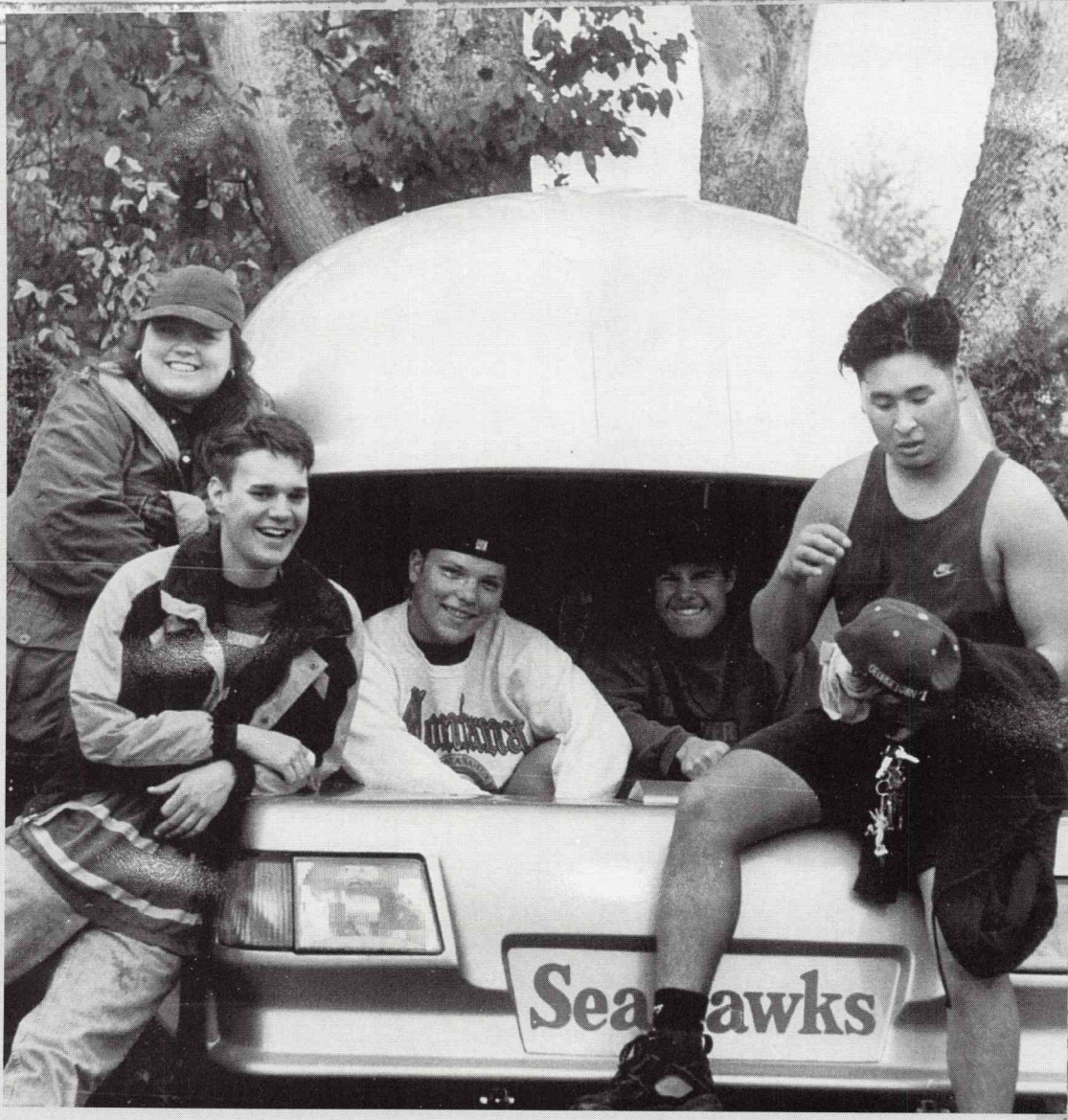

Team unity was evident from the beginning. On a trip to Oregon, the team had to play two games without three of its players but it pulled through with flying colors.



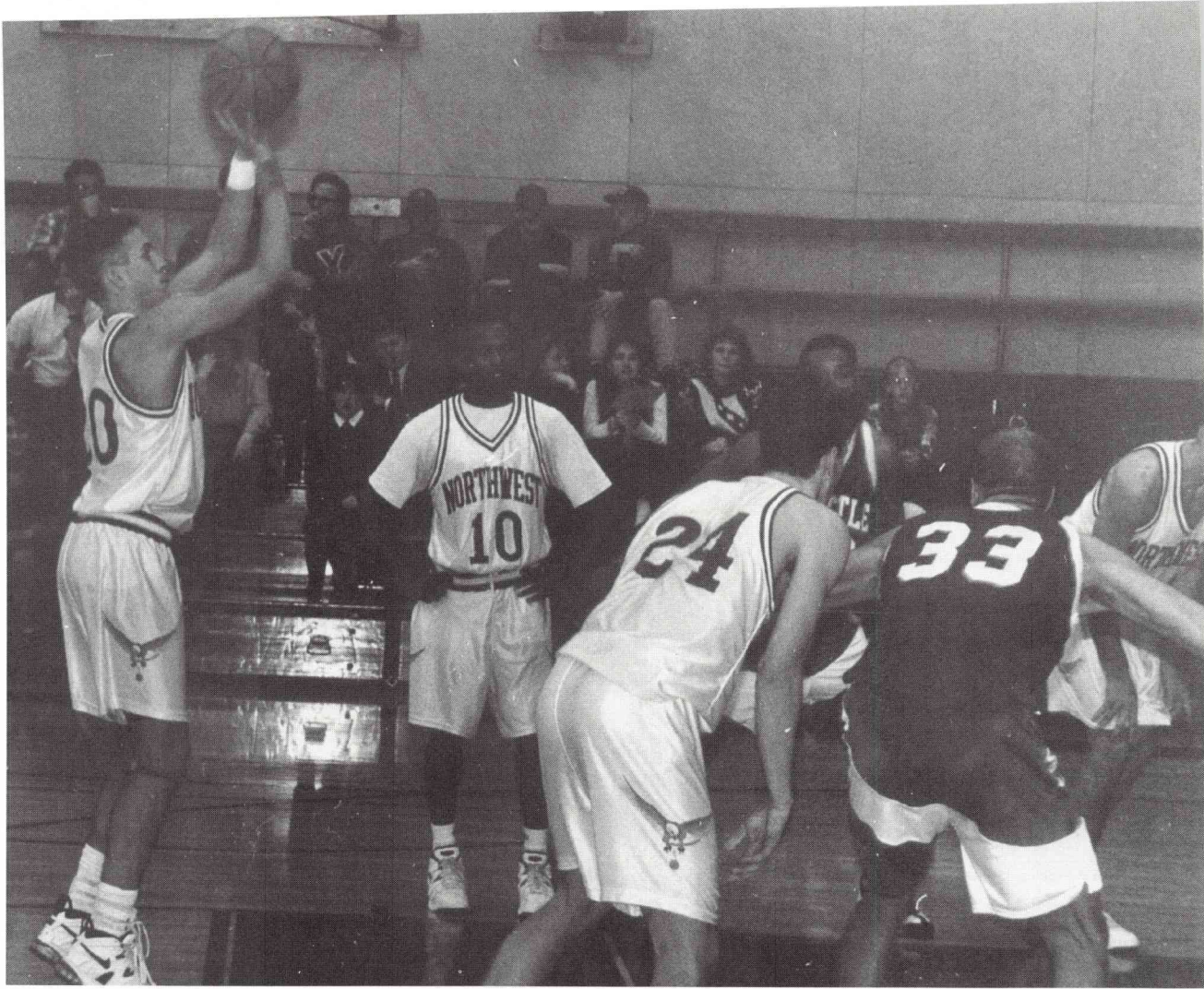

Setting a Standard

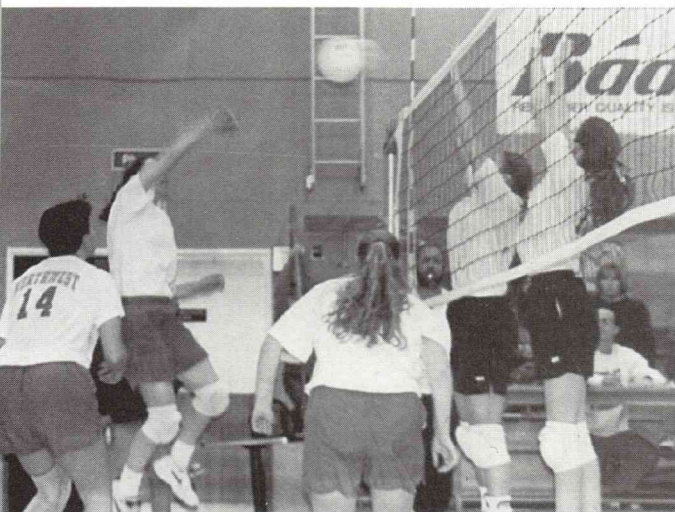

Coach Ross Johnson and all of Northwest College were pleased with the team's effort and success over the season.



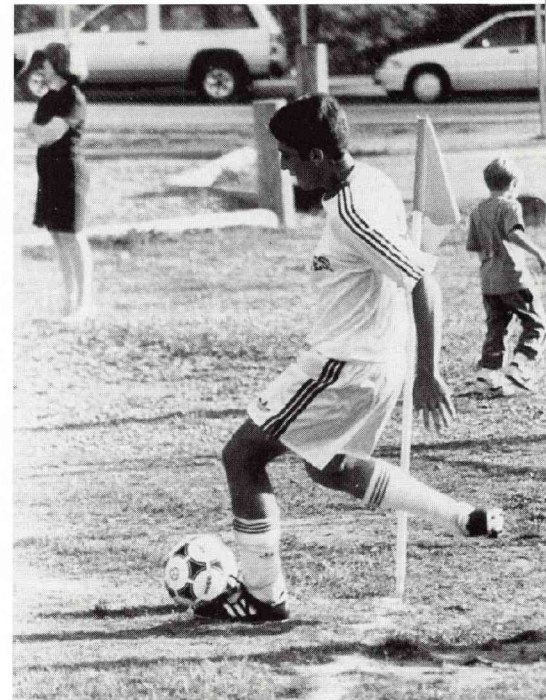
