DEGREES

Northwest College offers graduation options at the two-year, the three-year, the four-year, and the five-year level.

The two-year programs lead to graduation with the Associate in Arts degree. They center around a common core distribution of studies in the Humanities (English, Speech, Literature), in the Sciences, in the Social Studies (History, Psychology, Sociology), and some vital courses in religion. Suggested outlines show how elective hours can be scheduled for emphasis in such fields as English, Literature, History, Social Science, Language, General Science, Business, or Education.

The three-year Bible program leads to a diploma. It affords the opportunity to concentrate on Biblical and Theological subjects. This program is most practical in terms of personal Christian growth and development.



The Bachelor of Arts Degree is awarded upon completion of four years of work which includes the General Studies Distribution, and a major and a minor. Majors may be selected from Bible, Christian Education, Missions, or a divisional major in Religion and Philosophy (for those planning on seminary training).

Minors may be selected from Biblical Languages, Christian Education, Missions and International Studies, Pastoral Studies, Sacred Music, Philosophy and Apologetics, Business Education (for church office-staff training), and Preaching and Speech.

The Bachelor of Science Degree is awarded upon satisfactory completion of four years of work selected from one of two technically-oriented fields of preparation — Pastoral Studies or Christian Education taken in combination with a minor in Business or Music. The B.S. program places emphasis upon skills-training in lieu of the foreign language requirement of the B.A. programs.

The Bachelor of Theology Degree is a five year program based upon the major in Biblical Literature and a minor in Pastoral Studies. It provides in-depth training in the fields of Biblical studies, Theology, Biblical Languages, and Church History.

pleasant, casual and Christ-centered

You'll live in one of the new and modern residence halls situated on an open park-like campus. You can curl up under a tree to study, attend a religion class conducted informally in the outdoors, and stroll the shady walks or across the chapel bridge on your way to lunch.

You'll live in an attractive double room surrounded by warm and congenial friends. Meals are served each day in the modern and spacious cafeteria dining room. Lounge areas feature color television and provide informal meeting areas.

You'll enjoy the student center which includes the Snack Shack, student post boxes, the college bookstore, music rooms, KCNC radio station, a film processing center, and student body offices. Open throughout the day, students find it a pleasant place to meet.

In the College Library you'll find access to thousands of volumes and a fine collection of periodicals, films, records and educational equipment. Closed-circuit television is used in the classroom. The science building features a well-equipped laboratory center. The Pavilion provides a full compliment of year-around physical education programs for both men and women. Intercollegiate sports include basketball for men and volleyball for women. Intramural activities provide opportunities in a wide variety of indoor-outdoor sports.

Planned Cultural Events bring to the campus prominent religious leaders as well as other professional, political and social figures. Guest musicians and touring groups are a part of the community life you will enjoy at NORTHWEST.

The Associated Student Body sponsors a broad spiritual, cultural and social life program throughout the year aimed at the development of the total Christian life.

You will become involved in one or more of several Ministry Interest Groups making up the exciting World Outreach Ministries program at NORTHWEST. Opportunities are yours in Gospel Teams, Children and Youth ministries, Evangelism, World Missions, Hospital visitation, Servicemen's Work and traveling choral groups — just to name a few. Daily chapels and a spiritual emphasis week each quarter give ample time for spiritual growth and worship.

The Harvestime Social, the All-College Banquet, the Missionary Food Fair, the Valentine Box Social are a few of the student-sponsored group gatherings. Other organizations such as the Associated Women Students, the Associated Men Students, the Radio Club (both general broadcasting and HAM radio equipment is available), the Married Student Association and class organizations are sponsored by the ASB and provide numerous opportunities for leadership experience and training.

Near the campus are many areas where you may ride, swim, play golf or sail.

You will enjoy NORTHWEST because of its distinctive purposes for existence which focus on the stimulation and development of students to a broadened awareness

of the Christ-centered perspective in today's world. The College considers that concern for and involvement in the spiritual and social welfare of its students are integral parts of its reason for being. In keeping with this concern, the College has sought to evaluate certain matters of conduct and has developed a code of student citizenship. It has concluded that such things as the use of alcoholic beverages, tobacco, the misuse of narcotics, the attendance at public theatres, dancing, or the reading of prurient or pornographic literature do not serve the best spiritual and social interest of the students. Such behavior disturbs and often destroys the spiritual and social educative processes the College seeks to conduct.

It is assumed that when a student applies for admission to NORTHWEST COLLEGE, he affirms that he is in agreement with the citizenship standard of the College and will conduct himself in a manner that is in keeping with that standard. It is further assumed that the College has the right to terminate the enrollment of any student who by his action disrupts College efforts to attain its objectives.

FIELDS OF STUDY

The College offers courses of study in two general divisions — Biblical Studies and General Studies. The basic premise of NC's programs and courses of study is preparation for life. It is the form of education which helps prepare young people to cope with the complexities of today's world and to fulfill a purpose in life that

relates to both eternal and temporal values.

The spiritual values of education at Northwest are highlighted in the classroom in several ways — through certain foundational courses required of all students, designed to acquaint them with the content of the Bible, with the tenets of the Christian faith, and with the principles of Christian witness; through the general atmosphere and spiritual culture of the classroom regardless of its subject-matter, and through the orientation to content and perspective taken towards the various disciplines or fields of study offered at the college.

BIBLICAL STUDIES

A student may major in Bible by completing 45 quarter hours of course work in Biblical literature (direct Bible study). Courses commence at a survey level and progress towards more detailed analytical types of studies, embodying a mastery of content and interpretative skills. Bible majors will select a minor concentration from Christian Education, Missions, Pastoral Studies, Music, Greek or

Philosophy and Apologetics or Speech and Preaching.

Courses offered in Bible include Old Testament Studies in Survey, Pentateuch, Historical Books, Wisdom Literature, Psalms, and the Prophets. Those in the New Testament includes courses in Survey, Acts, Gospels, John, Corinthians, Romans, the Prison Letters, Thessalonian and Pastoral Letters, Hebrews, General Epistles and Daniel-Revelation. Courses in specialized areas of study include Bible Geography, Methods of Bible Study, Principles of Interpretation, Archaeology, the Flying Seminar, and background courses.

CHRISTIAN EDUCATION

Concentrations in Christian Education (a major or a minor) are designed to train the student for the work of Christian Education in the Church. In certain program patterns a student can train for Christian Education together with work in the Church Office or in Sacred Music.







Courses in Christian Education include Introduction to Christian Education, the Vacation Bible School, Audio Visual Methods, Youth Leadership, Educational Psychology, Child Growth and Development, Psychology of Adolescence, Church School Administration, and Principles and Methods of Teaching.

THE THREE YEAR BIBLE PROGRAM

A three-year program with a concentration in Bible, Theology, and Practical Theology is offered to those who for various reasons may not be able to complete the standard four-year degree. A diploma is awarded to those completing the requirements of this program. It is especially designed for mature individuals wishing to prepare for the pastoral ministry.

MISSIONS

Concentrations in Missions may be pursued either as a major or a minor and are designed to provide background and orientation to missionary service in today's world. The missions

program is heavily supported with studies in Bible and Theology.

Courses in Missions include History, Missionary Anthropology, Missionary Principles, Missions Survey, Home Missions together with a number of practical and supporting studies drawn from Evangelism, First Aid, Nursing, Theology, History and Philosophy. The spectrum of course offerings reflects the breadth of understanding needed by the missionary of today.

PASTORAL STUDIES

The Pastoral Studies concentration is a strong minor, taken together with a major in Bible. It is designed to provide the background and orientation to the increasing complex spectrum of work found in today's pastorate. It combines work in the fields of Pastoral Studies, Theology, Biblical Languages and other supporting course work. Increasing opportunities for Internship training are offered as corollary part of this program.

Courses in Pastoral Training include Homiletics (Preaching), Pastoral Theology, Pastoral Counseling, Church Administration, Systematic Theology, Parliamentary Law, Church Building, and other supporting course work selected from the fields of Philosophy and Church History.

THE TH.B. PROGRAM

This is a five-year program which combines a Bible major/Pastoral Studies minor with a year of advanced studies in Greek, Theology, Bible, and Church History. In content it offers the pastoral student an equivalent training to the standard three-year seminary program. It is an undergraduate professional concentration designed for the prospective pastor.

RELIGION AND PHILOSOPHY

This is a divisional major especially designed to prepare students for seminary. It draws upon a broad spectrum of courses from Bible, Theology and Philosophy. When combined with a minor in New Testament Greek, it offers a good foundation for the seminary student. The major can also be combined with other minors.

NEW TESTAMENT GREEK

A minor is offered in New Testament Greek and consists of two years of study in sequence. The first year in elementary Greek is foundational and is followed by a sequence of one year of study in the Greek of the New Testament Scriptures.

SACRED MUSIC

A strong minor in Sacred Music is offered and can be taken in combination with any of the four majors offered in the Division of Biblical Studies. The emphasis is in the study of music theory combined with courses in conducting, music administration, and performance courses. The program is especially for the student who is preparing himself for a ministry of music in the Church.

Courses in music include Introduction, Music Appreciation, Music Theory (sequence of four courses), Conducting I, II, Hymnology, Counterpoint, Form and Analysis, Church Music Administration, Applied Music in voice, organ, piano, or instruments, and performance courses in one of several college choral or instrumental groups.

SPEECH AND PREACHING

This selection of course work, organized as a minor, is designed to augment any of the majors offered in the Division of Bible. It provides specialization and training for the oral communication of the Gospel. It is useful to those planning to be evangelists or any form of ministry which places an emphasis upon public speaking and preaching.


Courses offered in Speech and Preaching include Basic Communications Skills, (two courses), Radio Speech, Interpretative Reading, Argumentation and Debate, Group Discussion and Conference, American Public Address, Homiletics (two courses) and Advanced Preaching. Certain kinds of internship experience will provide opportunity for practical development of communications skills in the ministry.

BUSINESS

This selection of courses is designed for those planning a career in office work or in the Business world. The courses are more oriented toward secretarial science than toward Busi-







ness Administration, though there are several courses, which when taken together with the General Studies core, will contibute significantly to a foundation for Business Administration

upon transfer.

Courses offered in Business include Introduction to Business, Beginning, Intermediate and Advanced Typewriting, Beginning, Intermediate and Advanced Shorthand, Business Machines, Business Math, Business English, Office Procedures, and two sequence programs in Principles of Accounting.

PRE-EDUCATION

This selection of courses is designed for those planning to prepare for teaching. It centers around the General Studies distribution and offers some course work directed towards teacher-education (primarily in Psychology) and course work towards the college major, depending on what major the student plans to pursue. The components of teacher-education include Basic Liberal Arts, teacher training and a course major. The NC programs primarily covers the first.

Courses in Education and Psychology, include Introduction to Education, General Psychology,

Educational Psychology, Child Growth and Development, and Psychology of Adolescence.

HUMANITIES EMPHASIS

The term "humanities" in academic parlance denotes "classical learning and literature." It encompasses course work designed to teach skills for effective writing and speaking and to provide instruction in the reading, writing, and speaking of modern languages, the arts, and literature. The student can adapt his work in this frame towards majors in Fine Arts (Art, Music), Speech, Literature, English, or Modern Languages.

Courses in the Humanities include Introduction to Art, English Composition, American and

English Literature, Speech, Parliamentary Law, Spanish, French, and Music.





MUSIC EDUCATION

This selection of course work is designed for those planning a major in music for teaching or for musical performance. It concentrates in Music Theory in a two-year sequence which is built around the General Studies core. The student may then go on to complete a major in music built on these foundational studies. It differs from sacred music in that it is foundational, rather professional learning for the Church.

Courses in Music include Introduction, Appreciation, Music Theory (sequence of four courses), Conducting courses (a sequence of two), Counterpoint, Form and Analysis, Applied Music in voice, piano, organ, or instruments, and performance courses in choral or

instrumental groups.

COMMUNICATIONS AND SPEECH

This selection of course work is especially for the student who wishes to major in speech or oral communications. It also offers a practical foundation for those planning careers where public speaking may be a frequent activity (such as political science, business, or education).

Courses in Communications and Speech include Basic Speech I, Advanced Speech . . . Interpretative Reading, Group Discussion and Conference, Argumentation and Debate, Radio Speech, Parliamen-

tary Law, American Public Address.

SOCIAL SCIENCE

This selection of subject-matter is designed for students planning majors in Psychology, Sociology, or History. It centers around a basic core of liberal arts course work and is adaptable towards the student's specific field of interest in which he plans to major upon transfer to a senior college.

Courses offered in History include History of Civilization (sequence of two courses), United States History (sequence of two courses), American Government, History of the Pacific Northwest, Latin American History, and Modern Far East History. For a list of the Psychology courses, see the Pre-education curriculum. Courses offered in Sociology, include Survey of Sociology and Sociology

of the Family.

Included in the category of the Social Sciences are courses in Physical Education and Health. Offered at the College are P.E. courses for men in Badminton, Basketball, Football, Soccer, Softball, Tennis, Track, Varsity Basketball, Volleyball, and Wrestling. Courses offered for women include Archery, Badminton, Basketball, Softball, Tennis, Tumbling, and Volleyball. Golf is offered on a co-educational basis. A basic course in Personal Hygiene is offered and required of all students studying within a degree program.

GENERAL SCIENCE

This selection of course work is designed for those seeking a General Science foundation for a major in some field of science or math. It seeks to offer foundational rather than advanced course work and should be considered in the light of the student's specific field of interest and long range academic plans. Courses are offered in three broad fields: The Biological Sciences, Chemistry and Physical Science Survey, and Mathematics.

Courses offered in science and math include Intermediate and College Algebra, Math for Elementary Teachers, Principles of Biology, General Botany, General Zoology, Human Anatomy and Physiology, College Chemistry (two course sequence), General Chemistry and Qualitative

Analysis (three course sequence), and Physical Science Survey.

THE ONE-YEAR PRE-NURSING PROGRAM

This selection of course work is designed for those planning to enter nurses' training. It provides basic work in certain general studies and chemistry together with some foundational courses in religion for personal witness and spiritual development.

EXPENSES

Tuition is \$295 per quarter for 12 to 17 credit hours. The estimated cost of fees, books, board and room is approximately \$350 per quarter. This amount will vary according to academic loads carried and whether or not special instruction in applied music is taken.



FINANCIAL AID

Northwest College makes every effort to assist admitted students with funds to complete their educational goals. Any student admitted by the college is eligible to apply for financial aid which may take the form of scholarships, grants, loans, discounts and employment, or a combination of these.
